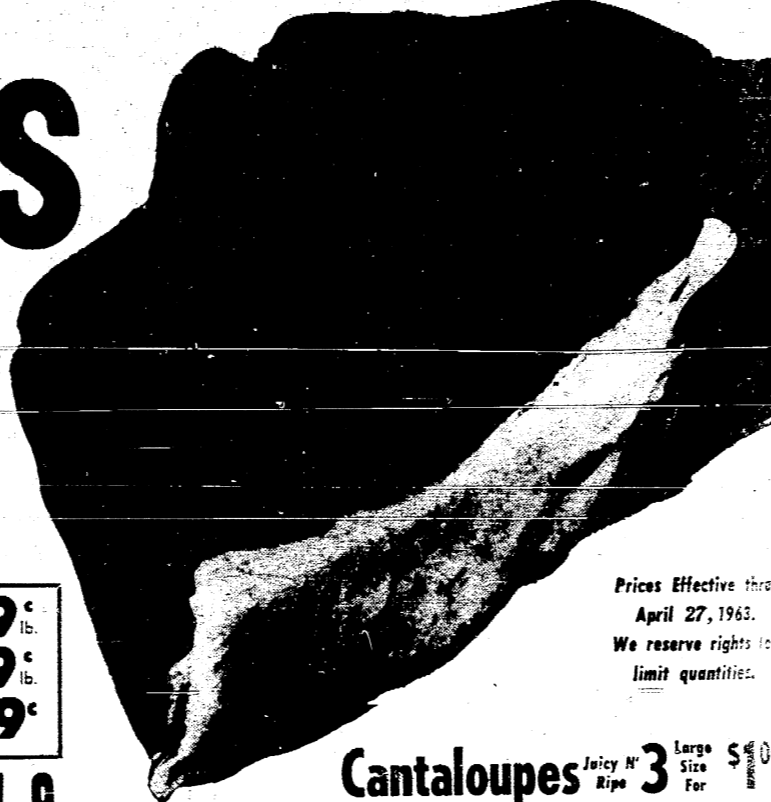

Diane Kay Dresselhouse, 419 E. Main Street, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Dresselhouse has been selected as the local candidate to attend Wolverine Girls' State this year.

She was selected from a list of eligible girls from the Junior Class which were picked by the students and Faculty of Manchester High School and final selection was made by the members of the American Legion Auxiliary, Emil Jacob Unit 117, the sponsoring organization.

Wolverine Girls' State is under the direction of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Michigan and will be held on the University of Michigan Campus at Ann Arbor June 18 to June 27. Diane will be one of the 420 girls from Michigan High Schools to participate in this program. These girls will be instructed in government as it actually operates in the State of Michigan from City County and State levels.

It will include a visit to University Hospital and a Tour of the entire Campus area. The program is designed to inspire and develop the potentials of already active minds. ### Local Priest Telecasts

"A chain is no stronger than its weakest link—so a nation is only as strong as the moral fibers of its homes," with these words the Rev. Fr. Raymond R. Schlinkert begins telecasting his Sunday morning talks over station WJBK TV (channel 2). A program he has been doing for about two and one half years. Fr. Schlinkert has recently been named pastor of St. Mary's at Manchester.

The program "With This Ring" is heard each Sunday at 10:45 a.m. on Channel 2. He does another program following the late show on Sunday night on moral virtues. He is considering the subjects, prudence, justice, temperance and fortitude, and approaching them from the position of helping as many people as possible. Since this program has been on he has received hundreds of letters from people in every walk of life and is noted for being able to give sober subjects an interesting picture.

The latest calculation of his early morning show rating is 75,000. His director is John Weber. Besides his seminary work in Detroit and Cincinnati, Ohio he also studied at the Catholic University, Washington, D. C. before beginning his radio and television work. When he was first asked to do telecasting he was invited to use his own technique on Christmas and Easter programs.

He was moderator of Science for a teachers program which was declared the best educational series in Detroit television in 1959-60. Television work seems to interest other members of his own family for his brother, Robert Schlinkert is vice president of Taft Broadcasting Corporation and is one of the "Pioneers of Television Management". He is currently manager of WBRB-TV, Birmingham, Alabama.

From the mail he receives the local priest notes that his listeners include the mayor of a large city, police superintendents, waitresses, doctors, elevator operators, hospital patients, bar patrons and a surprising number of older viewers. The Detroit Police Officers Association made a movie of one of his telecasts on "Respect we should have for Police Authority". This movie has been used in their work in community relations and shown to thousands of Detroiters.

Fr. Schlinkert came to Manchester from St. Patrick's at Union Lake and is anxious that people in the area watch one or both of his programs. This is the first time that the television priest has been assigned as pastor of a parish. 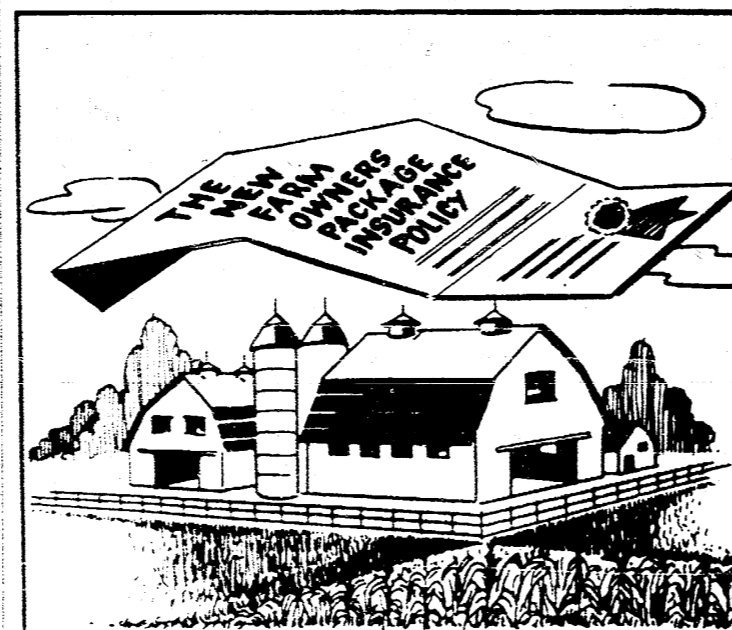

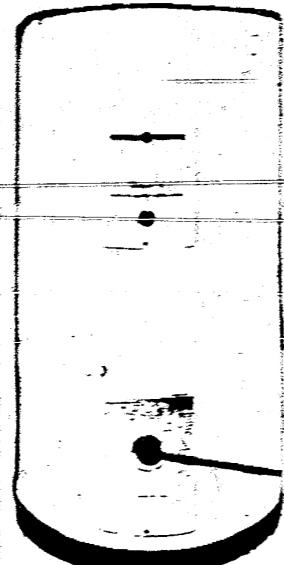



Keeping Puss Groomed

Puss makes instinctive efforts to keep herself groomed. Every time she licks her paws and rubs them over her face and body, she's proudly applying her feline makeup.

Just the same, she can use some grooming help from you. You should begin grooming puss from the time she's a little kitten. You'll be getting her accustomed to a daily routine of combing and brushing.

At the Purina Cat Care Center in St. Louis, Missouri, we recommend using different kinds of equipment for long haired and short haired cats.

A strong steel comb and stiff bristle brush should be used if your cat is long haired. The comb is used to prevent and unravel hair tangles. The brush, applied with long firm strokes from head to tail, will keep loose hairs to a minimum, protect furniture and clothing, and prevent puss from swallowing too many hairs — which could cause formation of a hair ball in the stomach.

For short haired cats, use combs and brushes made of rubber or plastic. If your short haired pet protests being brushed, stroke her firmly with the moistened palms of your hand instead, or use a piece of silk or chamois leather.

Cats should be bathed only on the rare occasions when they have managed to get into tar or some other toxic substance. Cats usually keep themselves clean, and bath tend to dry out their coats and remove natural oils.

Boil potatoes in jackets until tender. Peel and slice into 1-inch slices. Arrange slices on bottom of a buttered baking dish (12 x 8 x 2 inches). Sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon of the salt and 1/4 cup of the brown sugar. Mix pork, ham, crumbs, the 1/2 teaspoon salt, sage, pepper, egg and evaporated milk thoroughly. 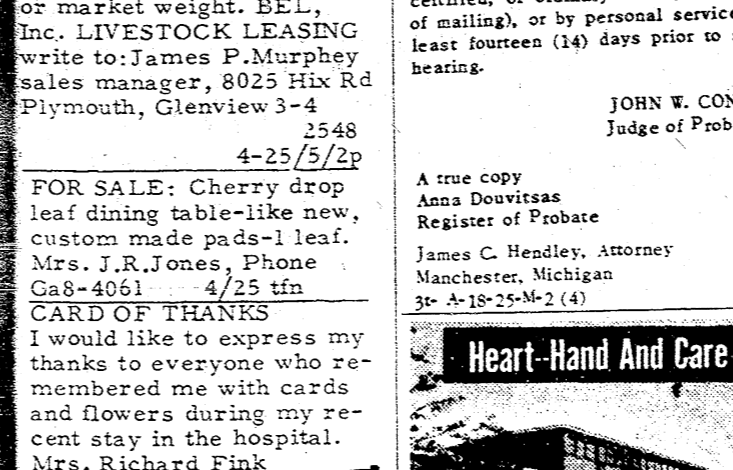
