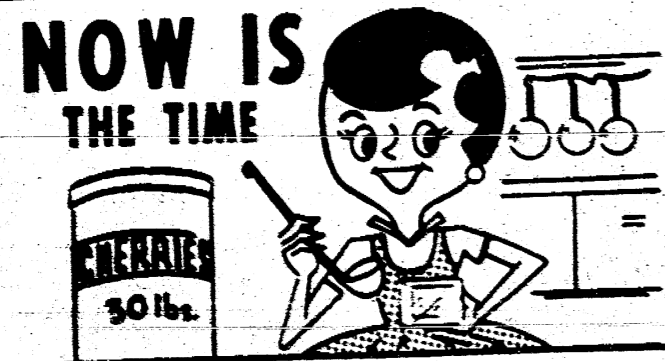

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## Agriculture in Action

 Canada has found a new excuse for dealing with Communists. She announces that rejection by American farmers of the wheat control program will now

cause her to step up wheat shipments to Red China. In the eyes of Canadian officials, refusal to accept the tight controls now means that American farmers will seek new markets. They are right, but one market American farmers are pledged never to seek lies behind the Iron Curtain. Canada

can be assured that in this area at least, she can sell freely without competition, if her conscience doesn't hurt too much.

How many Canadian boys were killed by Chinese bullets in Korea? When China "buries" the United States, as has been promised, will capitalistic Canada somehow be exempt?

In spite of the obvious disservice she is doing to the free world, Canada continues to ship wheat to the communist. So much that the British Columbia port of Vancouver is now the busiest in the northwest. Financially, it makes sense, for Canada has great quantities of wheat, and the price is good. Moral justification is another thing.

RED CHINA uses all the wheat she can get, just as she uses her people, as another part of the power-play to advance world communism.

Most of the grain has been used so far to madden Russia, already at loggerheads with China over how best to take over the world.

Russia promised aid to Red Albania, and when the differences as how best to bury the free world arose, Albania sided with China and the Russian support was withdrawn.

So, out goes the wheat from Canada, on goes the politics of international Communism, and choice has been that of the Red Chinese. The Canadians have been helping them, and now say they will increase that help.

Just as in the recent national wheat referendum here in the United States, the real issue is not price, not dollars and cents. The real issue is control. Control of people based on politics.

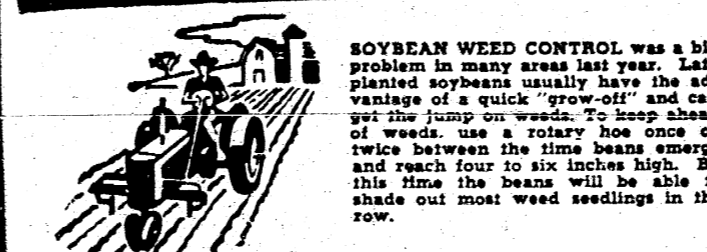

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## DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING.



SOYBEAN WEED CONTROL was a big problem in many areas last year. Late planted soybeans usually have the advantage of a quick "grow-off" and can get the jump on weeds. To keep ahead of weeds, use a rotary hoe once or twice between the time beans emerge and reach four to six inches high. By this time the beans will be able to shade out most weed seedlings in the row.

CAUTIOUS 2,4-D USE cannot be overstressed. Under favorable conditions, spray drift can carry a mile or more. Any damage caused by drift makes you liable, but the biggest danger is usually to your own crops. Crops such as soybeans, cotton and tomatoes are extremely susceptible to damage. To avoid drift, use amine forms of 2,4-D, keep pressures under 30 pounds per square inch and spray only when wind is below 10 mph.

IT PAYS TO USE NITROGEN on grass forage. The advantages are the increase in total forage and the percent of total crude protein. But there is another: Where nitrogen is added to land in great quantities as much as 10% more of the total protein is digestible compared with forage from unfertilized fields. Nitrogen not only increases pounds of forage, but each pound has more feed value.

SHIP HOGS IN FULL LOADS and under the coolest conditions possible shrink excessively. Under favorable conditions hogs will not hold shrink at a minimum. However, overcrowding or careless handling can push shrink up to 15%. Whenever possible ship early in the morning. Keep wet sand or ice on floor of the truck to help keep down temperature.

## Child's Safety Depends on Parents,



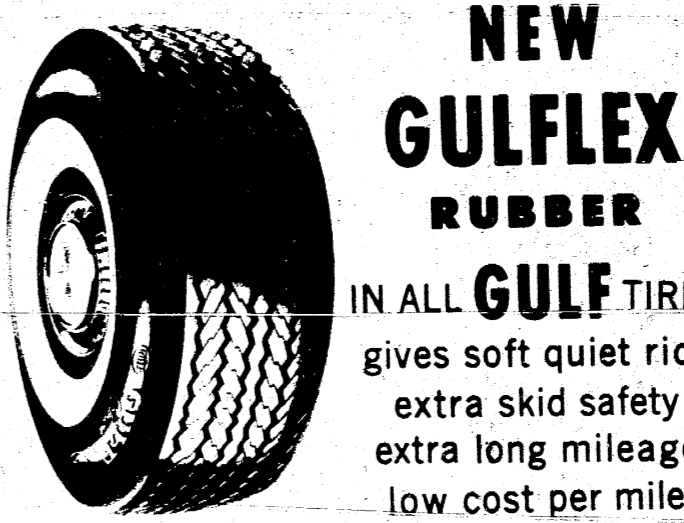
DETROIT—Your child may be one of the 15,000 children under the age of 15 who will die this year in the U.S. or one of the 3 million who will suffer non-fatal injuries. A lot depends on parents.

Accidents following the first year of birth are the leading causes of child deaths in this country, according to Prof. Ruben Meyer of Wayne State University's pediatrics department and a senior research associate at the Child Research Center of Michigan.

"Death is a relatively brief thing that causes grief," says Dr. Meyer, as spokesman for the American Academy of Pediatrics, in a campaign against childhood accidents. "But maiming and crippling not only produce sorrow but tragically change the role of the child in society."

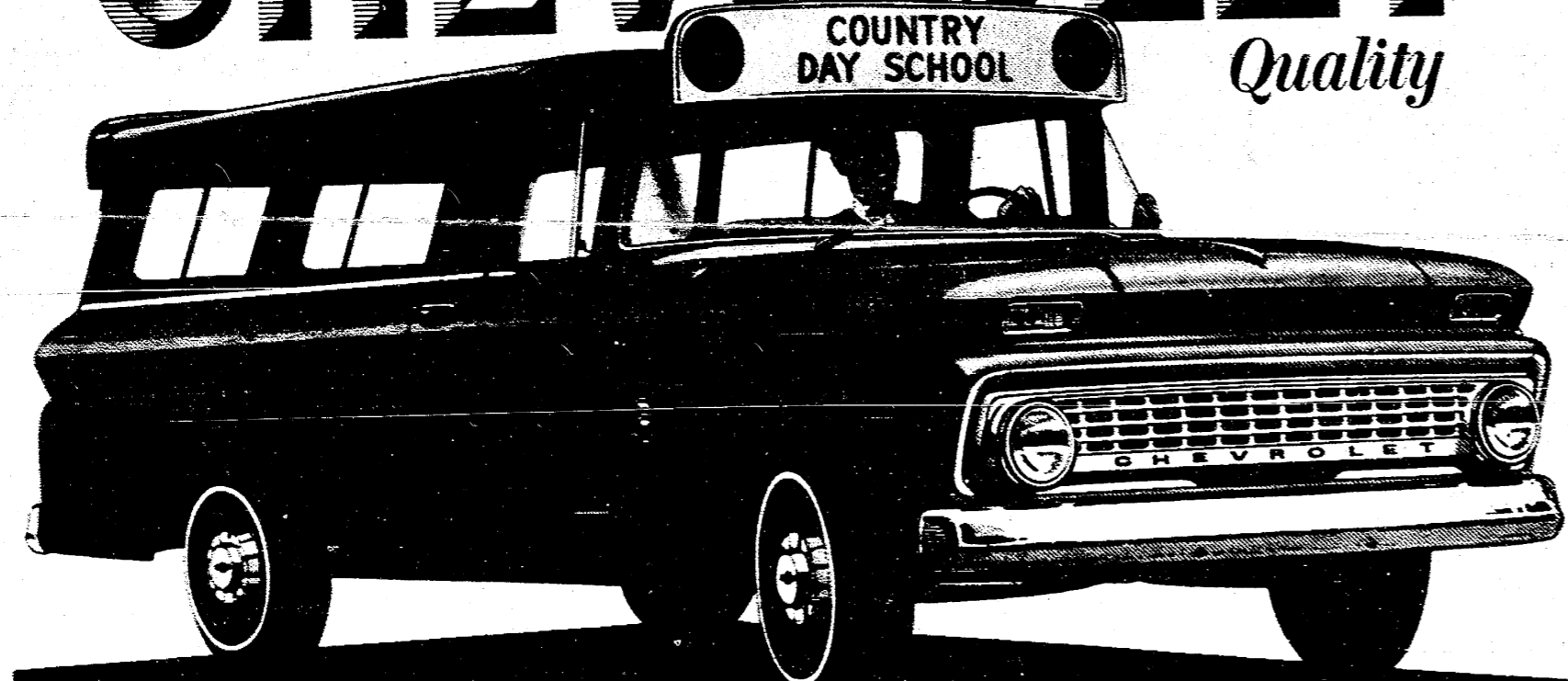
Some of the ways that parents may protect their children are pointed out by Dr. Meyer:

1. Discipline a child in some appropriate manner when he violates obedience rules. Remember that the purpose of punishment is to educate.
  2. Always tell the truth to a child. If you use the words "hot" or "burn" falsely, the child will soon be doing things to test your veracity.
  3. Be wary of backyard swimming and wading pools. Even the very shallowest ones are dangerous to children. Teach your child to swim at an early age as a safeguard against water hazards.
  4. Keep dangerous objects such as plastic bags and scissors out of small children's reach.
  5. Keep all household remedies in a safe place. Aspirin alone has caused 15 per cent of all child poisoning cases.
  6. Teach hazard recognition and avoidance.

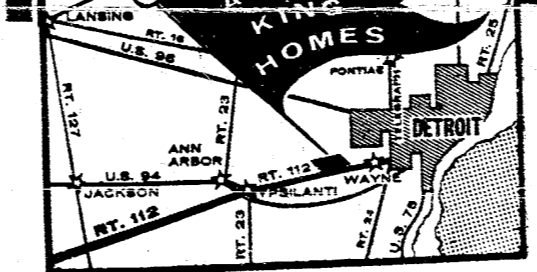

## Speaking of YOUR HEALTH...

### Doctor, I'd Like To Know—

**Removing Moles**  
Is it safe to remove moles from the face?

**J. W. T. Ohio**  
Dear Mr. T.: No. Nearsightedness, or myopia, is due to a lengthening of the eyeball. Exercise cannot correct this condition. Eyeglasses do help to compensate for the changes in the eyeball.



**Dr. Coleman**  
Dear Mrs. L.: Adhesions are bands of scar tissue which sometimes form around the intestines or around the ovaries following surgery. Newer surgical techniques have reduced the possibility of adhesions to a minimum.

**Neuritis Vs. Neuralgia**  
Is there a difference between neuritis and neuralgia?

**R. T. Tenn.**  
Dear Mrs. S.: Although the word "mole" is commonly used to describe any brown blemish on the face or body, not all "moles" are alike in character. It is a good and safe rule to get expert advice before any blemish, pimple or "mole" is removed from the skin.

**Sign Of Trouble?**  
Is frequency of urination a definite sign of prostate trouble?

**A. J. S. Illinois**  
Dear Mr. S.: First, let us correct a common mistake. The male gland you refer to is the prostate, not the prostate gland. Because this gland lies near the bladder, symptoms of an enlarged prostate will usually show up first in this area. Frequency of urination, especially during the night, is a

common complaint. However, other conditions, too, are identified with these symptoms. It is foolish not to consult your doctor. Because prostate trouble is associated with advanced age, many men have a tendency to neglect this condition.

**Neuritis Vs. Neuralgia**  
Is there a difference between neuritis and neuralgia?

**R. T. Tenn.**  
Dear Mrs. T.: Yes, there is a difference. Neuritis is an inflammation of one or more nerves. It is a painful condition that can occur anywhere in the body. If the particular nerve can be identified, such as the sciatic nerve, the diagnosis would be a neuritis of that nerve.

**Neuralgia**  
Is a painful disorder of a nerve without actual inflammation. Injury, infection or rapid chilling may be responsible for either neuritis or neuralgia.

**Big Blisters**  
I sometimes get big red blisters that itch terribly. What are they?

**Mrs. G. F. E. New York**  
Dear Mrs. E.: Those big red blisters are probably hives. These giant hives usually have a white center and are almost always caused by some allergic sensitivity to foods or drugs, or even an emotional disturbance. Persistent attacks of hives respond rapidly to antihistamines, cortisone and its derivatives. Of course, drugs of this sort must be administered only under your doctor's careful supervision.

## Safari At The Fair

Ground was broken recently in the International Area of the New York 1964-1965 World's Fair for a major pavilion representing thirteen French-speaking nations of Africa. A fitting symbol of the showcase of freedom which the Fair represents, the pavilion will be sponsored by the African and Malagasy Organization of Economic Co-operation (OAMCE).

Participating at the groundbreaking ceremonies were Ambassadors from the nations that make up the OAMCE: Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Congo (Brazzaville), Madagascar, Mauritania, Niger, Rwanda, Senegal, and Upper Volta. The other participants included Peter F. Lobkowitz, president, Dunbarry African Development, Inc., a private banking group, U.S. State Department officials and Fair executives.

The OAMCE Pavilion, a graceful stylized version of native architecture which will have exhibits from all 13 countries, each in its own building, is based on a design concept by Ray Graham and Tom John. Novel features include a 150-seat tree house restaurant, a theatre and a live animal exhibit with an elephant ride.

## The Fish Are In The Bag!



The idea of spooning shrimp sauce over boned fish, then baking in a cleverly folded heavy paper, originated in old New Orleans French restaurants for serving Gulf pompano "en papillote." But it is adaptable to any fish, fresh or frozen, and ordinary brown paper sandwich bags, well brushed with oil, will do the trick. The bags keep the sauced fish piping hot and everyone opens his own and eats from it. It's an easy exciting way to serve fish outdoors. The filled bags may be prepared hours ahead and refrigerated. Time-saving canned shrimp, always at their best in a sauce, are used in this one, and it goes together quickly. Later, these shrimp pop up in the bag, after extra cooking, as tasty, pink, and shrimp-shapely as you please.

- SHRIMP SAUCE FOR FISH, EN PAPILOTE**
- 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) shrimp
  - 3 tablespoons butter
  - 1 can (4 ounces) mushrooms, drained
  - 1 cup flour
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
  - 1/2 teaspoon cayenne
  - 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
  - 1/4 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
  - 1 egg yolk, slightly beaten
  - 2 teaspoons lemon juice
  - 6 raw fish fillets
  - 6 brown paper sandwich bags, oiled

Drain and rinse shrimp. Melt butter in a saucepan; saute mushrooms a minute or so. Blend in flour; add milk and dry seasonings. Cook over medium-low heat until sauce begins to thicken. Quickly stir a little of it into the egg yolk, then add yolk to sauce. Cook until sauce is quite thick. Remove from heat; add lemon juice and shrimp. Blot fillets dry and spoon sauce over them. Place one in each bag; fold bag ends under. Bake about 25 minutes at 400 degrees.

Scientist Says:

Gaps Still Exist in Lung Cancer And Heart Disease Knowledge

NEW YORK - Research studies have increased factual knowledge about lung cancer, heart diseases and other ailments but "great and critical" gaps still exist, the Scientific Director of the Tobacco Industry Research Committee says in his Annual Report.

"There does not exist the essential experimental and clinical knowledge with which science can even define or identify the multiple factors or influences that may contribute to the origin and progress of these diseases," said the Report of Dr. Clarence Cook Little, international cancer researcher and founder of the Rocco B. Jackson Memorial Laboratory at Bar Harbor, Me.

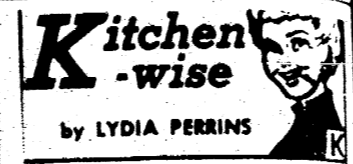

**POSTOFFICE GETS NEW ZIP CODE**

Our five-digit Code is 48158, postmaster George Merriman announced today.  
"Everyone in Manchester, Michigan will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," postmaster Merriman said.  
ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1. Postmaster Merriman stressed the importance of all citizens of Manchester learning the city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.  
"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Merriman said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."  
The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. Merriman said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.  
"The address on mail must now be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. Merriman said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."  
"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."  
Mr. Merriman said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

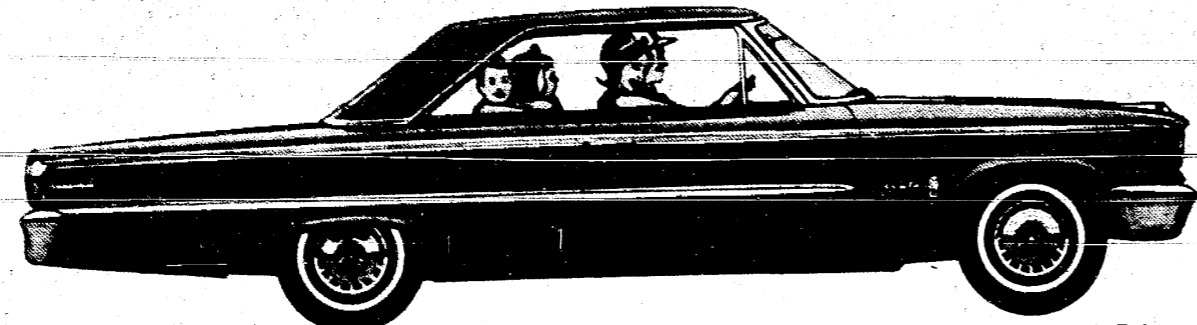
