SCHOOL TO OPEN SEPT. 3rd
1963-64 school year will officially begin Tuesday, Sept. 3rd. There will be no classes Tuesday morning. School will be called at 1:30 for the purpose of organizing classes and orienting students. Kindergarten will begin Wednesday for both morning and afternoon classes. There will be no school Friday, Sept. 6th. Bus routes will be comparable to last year with the exception that Mr. Fuller's route will be reversed. Children are asked to be out by the road at least 5 minutes ahead of last year's scheduled time for the first few days. All rural kindergarten students will attend in the morning and rural children residing in Sharon township will attend the Pleasant Lake school. These children will be transported home during noon hour. Village children will attend in the afternoon. New students to the district are to register before school opens by calling Ga8-2341 or going to Ted Tapping's office before school opens. Student insurance may be purchased the first week of school. Rates will be slightly higher than last year and all students participating in athletics will be required to have insurance. Rates (kindergarten-6) \$1.50; (7-12) \$2.25 and 24 hour insurance \$12. Students who took Physical Science last year as tenth graders and wish to sell books should contact Ted Tapping before school opens. Physical Science will no longer be offered at high school level.

Next year there will be new text books in World History, Chemistry, 9th grade literature and grammar, 10th grade Biology, shorthand and driver training. 1963 Visage yearbooks have arrived and can be purchased at the High School principal's office on the first come first sold basis.

MAJOR CATHEY LEARNS OF PROMOTION



Air Force Maj. Forrest F. Cathey, native of Manchester, Mich. and resident of Redlands, Calif. was on a special assignment in Weisbaden, West Germany when he learned that his promotion to major had become official. Major Cathey, the flight coordinator with the 1002nd Inspector General Group at Norton AFB, Calif. has responsibility for consolidating worldwide transportation needs of the Pentagon-level Inspection and Safety directorates. He was graduated from Manchester High School in June 1941 and enlisted as an aviation cadet in December 1942. His first commission was granted May 9, 1944, when he became a second lieutenant. At that period of World War II he was assigned to the Caribbean Air Command, piloting B-24 aircraft on submarine patrols out of the Panama Canal, Guatemala, and the Galapagos Islands. He also assisted in the training of Pacific-bound carrier task forces while flying simulated bombing runs. A jet-qualified pilot with more than 5,000 hours flying time, Major Cathey completed six of his 15 yrs. military service with the Strategic Air Command on KC-97 tanker missions in Morocco, Spain, England, and Labrador. The Air Force has awarded him the National Defense Service Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and the Air Force Commendation Medal. Perversing with his desire for a bachelor of arts degree in political science, Major Cathey, through the years, has completed day, evening, and correspondence courses at the Universities of Michigan Michigan State and Colorado from which last named institutions he earned his degree in 1949. He was president of the University of Colorado Chapter of Phi Sigma Iota during his junior year. In 1959 he was made aide de camp to Maj. Gen. Chus W. Schoot, who was then vice commander of Second Air Force, Barksdale AFB La., and who later became the 1002nd's first Deputy Inspector General. Major Cathey is unmarried and lives at 1140 W. Sunset Drive in Redlands. His mother is Mrs. Gaita Waters-Cathey of 15921 West Austin Road, Manchester. Two of his brothers, Arthur and Owen live in Manchester and another brother, James Cathey, Jr. is a resident of Eldorado Hills, Calif., his sister is Joyce Cathey-Beck of Okemos, Michigan.

In the annual state sheep shearing contest Ronald Kuhl of Manchester won the championship in a contest with Willie Bill of Sand Creek. Sand Creek, Warren Thorne of Hanover; Carroll Wells of Vermontville; and Orman Roehm of Clinton. More than 300,000 sheep are sheared each year in Michigan. Farmers do this work on a custom basis. The rules allow a competitor to win the senior championship only once. The sweepstakes, open only to former champions and the new title winner, was won by Hugh Thorne of Hanover. Others in the top five, in order of finish were Louell Roehm of Ann Arbor; Vern Kulenkamp of Manchester; Kuhl; and Larry Roehm, son of Louell Roehm. Davi d Roehm, Louell's 18-year-old son, won the junior championship, with Alex Puhar, of Gladwin, second; Dale Wiedmayer of Ann Arbor, third; and James Clark of Eaton Rapids, fourth. Hugh Thorne won the special shearing contest in which general quality of the job counts 90 per cent and time only ten per cent. Ron Kuhl was in third place.

ENROLLMENT SETS ALL TIME RECORD

About 1135 students have enrolled in the Manchester Public Schools with a few more still expected, school officials said. Three hundred ten are in the high school and 825 in the kindergarten through the eighth grade. About two-thirds of the students are brought in by bus. According to Junior High School principal, Ted Tapping there are three sections to each of the grades through the sixth grade with the exception of the kindergarten which has four sections. There are 96 in the 7th and 84 in the 8th grade. A few new text books are replacing the old ones. This is true especially in the science department. The sixth grade is having a semi-rotating schedule with three teachers changing classes. Junior high has been doing this for several years successfully. The better math students in the eighth grade are being offered algebra for the first time and to date 30 have enrolled in the advanced class. Physical science is offered in the eighth grade—a class which formerly was a tenth grade subject. This gives the good science students a chance for more advanced science in high school, the school officials point out. Algebra is also an elective 9th grade subject. This modern math program is one suggested by the citizen's committee which studied possibilities for improvements in the school last year. As a result of this study the Manchester School Board is offering to its teachers a graduate course. This will be taught by Ralph Gesler, math instructor from Eastern Michigan University. Tuition for the course will be paid by the Manchester School Board for all teachers who want to enter. This is an "in service" program which will start Sept. 11. About 15 of the fifty teachers employed in the school system have already signed up for the course. Twenty-two boys have signed up for junior high football with coaches, Ron McNally and Roger Marrison. Parents of the players will be asked to a meeting at the Civic auditorium, probably next Wednesday, Sept. 11 at 7:30. The largest junior high school chorus in the history of the school is enrolled this year under the direction of Roger Marrison. Junior high band will be taught by R. C. Sortor. New teachers at the school include Patricia Blaska, Speech Correctionist; Karole Higgins, High School Math and Science; Ronald Smith, Jr., High School Science and Math; John Raffaelli, Jr., High Physical Education and English; Mary Blossom, High School half-time Librarian; Burrill Hansen, Pleasant Lake Principal and fourth grade; Doris McElfresh, Pleasant Lake third grade; and Margaret Hanks, Pleasant Lake Special Education.

There is no known cure for C/F's "Built-in" defect of human chemistry but investigators are trying to pinpoint the exact deficiency or error in hopes of supplying what the body needs to correct it. A Research Center has been established at University Medical Center and has received over \$25,000 in the past three years.

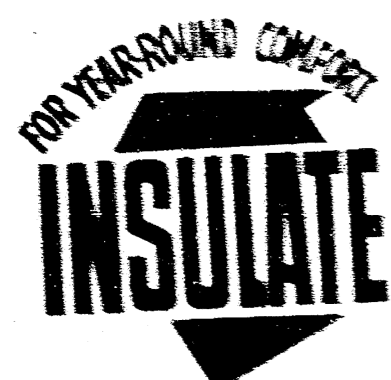
Summer proved to be a busy time for the readers in Washtenaw county who participated in the county-wide reading plan. There were 2,939 county elementary school students who took part in the Summer Reading Program co-ordinated through the County Library, according to librarian George A. Curtis.

The largest number of students, 898 participated in the program through the county library bookmobile. In a break down there were 126 from Manchester, 136 from Milan, 155 in Saline, 379 in Ypsilanti, 261 in Willow Run and 69 in South Lyon.
