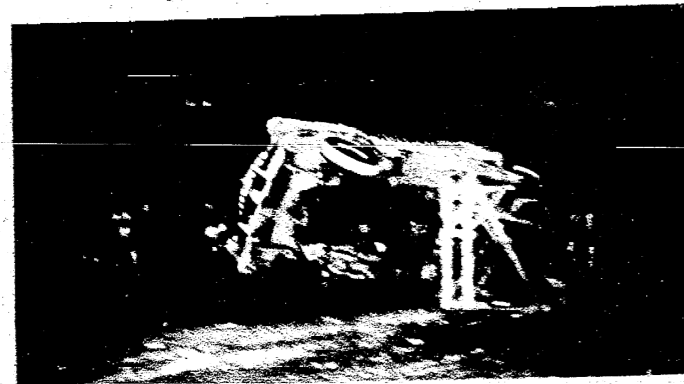

MR. AND MRS. FRED KENNEDY ENTERTAIN AT OPEN HOUSE

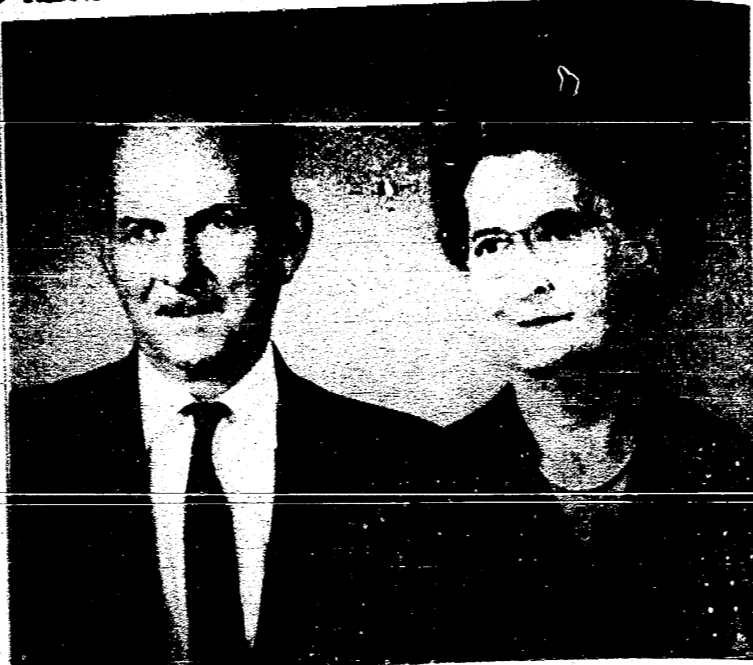
Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kennedy of 6481 M-52 celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Sunday, Sept. 1 at the home of their son and family, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Kennedy at 6379 M-52 with about 275 guests present.

The serving table featured a five tiered wedding cake and lighted gold candles—also an original wedding announcement and picture of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy in a double gold frame.

A daughter-in-law, Mrs. Chester Kennedy of Indianapolis cut the wedding cake and another daughter-in-law Mrs. William Kennedy of Peninsula, Ohio poured coffee. Friends of the family, Mrs. Paul Appel of St. Clair served punch and Mrs. George Elkins of Chelsea served ice cream and groom cake. Others assisting were Mrs. Norman Hinderer and daughter, Marilyn, Mrs. Loren Hinderer and daughter Jeanne, Mrs. Nim Wahi, Mrs. James Clark and Mrs. Clare Wahi, Mrs. Douglas Kennedy greeted guests and Miss Nancy Kennedy, grand daughter had charge of the guest book.

Mrs. Kennedy had on display her wedding dress of fifty years ago and high-button shoes and Mr. Kennedy's suit and stiff pleated shirt, also family pictures and the home of Mrs. Kennedy's parents where they were married.

Mrs. Kennedy is the former Edith Bench; she and Mr. Kennedy were married at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Bench on Sept. 3, 1913. The Bench family home was on Snyder road, Greenfield township, now part of Wooming Ave.



inside the city of Detroit. They lived on the Kennedy homestead farm on Grand River Ave., until it was sold for real estate business and residential property in 1914. The homestead farm was procured from the U.S. government in 1927 by Mr. Kennedy's grandfather, Crawford Kennedy, whose parents were Mr. and Mrs. William Kennedy, was born on the homestead farm. The location is now the site of the Sears Roebuck store on Grand River.

In 1915 the Fred Kennedys bought a 200-acre farm on Lily Rd., Plymouth; this was sold in 1925 and that same year they moved to the farm where they have resided for the past 38 years on Fletcher Rd. They first bought the Herman Fletcher farm on Freer Rd. in 1925 and in 1938 moved to their present home at 6481 Manchester—Chelsea Rd. The son, Douglas and his family live at

6379 M-52. Both places are on the Kennedy farm which has a Manchester postoffice address.

The Kennedys family includes three sons, Douglas on the home farm, William of Ostran, Mich. and Peninsula, Ohio, and Chester of Indianapolis, Ind. and five grandchildren.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy are in good health. Mr. Kennedy still does drainage work in addition to keeping busy in his garden and serving as state distributor for Wooster SealKote Paint.

Their present farm was known as the Peckens farm; they purchased it from the Lehman Estate and lived in the original farm house until their son Douglas moved in in August 1953 when they built their new house nearby.

Grand Opening

Announcement is made of the opening of the Phillip 66 station at 320 Riverside Drive. The station was purchased by Reuben Axelrod from Russell Aiuto, formerly the Gulf Service Station.

Mr. Axelrod is the 66 distributor in Washtenaw county and will be doing business under the R-X Oil Co. Mr. Axelrod is not new to the oil business. For the past 16 years of the 23 he has been affiliated with this type of operation he was a partner in the gasoline distributing company operating 120 service stations in Michigan. He sold his interest in the company and is now starting Phillip 66 in Washtenaw County.

Operating the station here is Al Baxter, who is not new to the community. He came to Manchester in 1951 and attended Manchester High school where he was first team guard on the high school football team. He worked at the Manchester Enterprise for a short time before going to work at the Manchester Country Market to work six years ago.

Al is married to the former Betty L. Vacek and has two children Ronda 18 months and Randy 4 months.

The station is getting its face lifted with gleaming white aluminum siding, re-berbed and painted on the exterior. It is planned that customers will receive complete service facilities.

Phillip 66 has been sold in Jackson for the past 28 years and is now beginning to extend east through Washtenaw county. Manchester is the first to have a station in Washtenaw county. Often referred to as the "biggest of the little giants" it is the 7th largest American Oil Company and has been represented in Michigan for 40 years. The first station opened in 1927 in Wichita, Kansas and now extends along the Alaskan Highway.

Phillips is 32nd among the top 60 industrial giants by amount of sales and markets gasoline, oil, fertilizer synthetic rubber tires, plastics, batteries and accessories. It was the first oil company to operate an atomic energy plant for the government.

After having been without the benefit of the pipe organ in the Manchester Methodist church, the congregation is now again enjoying the organ after it was completely rebuilt by Mr. Charles Bent-schneider of Napoleon.

The organ console is now completely electrically operated by six cables of wires running to the organ chamber proper from the new location of the console on the floor level and off the platform. Each of the four cables carries 60 wires each to the various pipes and another cable carries 40 wires which controls the stops and other actions.

A set of chimes has been added to the organ - a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Walton. These chimes are electrically operated and a cable of 21 wires are used for the controls of the chimes. These add considerable beauty to the organ music during services.

LAST YEAR SCHOOLING GI BILL BEGINS

The last full year for veterans taking education or training courses under the Korean GI Bill begins this September. When this school year ends, only a half year of schooling will still be obtainable under the program. Courses starting in Sept. 1964 must come to a close January 31, 1965. The law gives no authority to the VA to extend these benefits beyond these dates. Originally Korean Conflict veterans were eligible for 36 months of readjustment courses but now only 17 months will remain before the final deadline when school resumes in September.

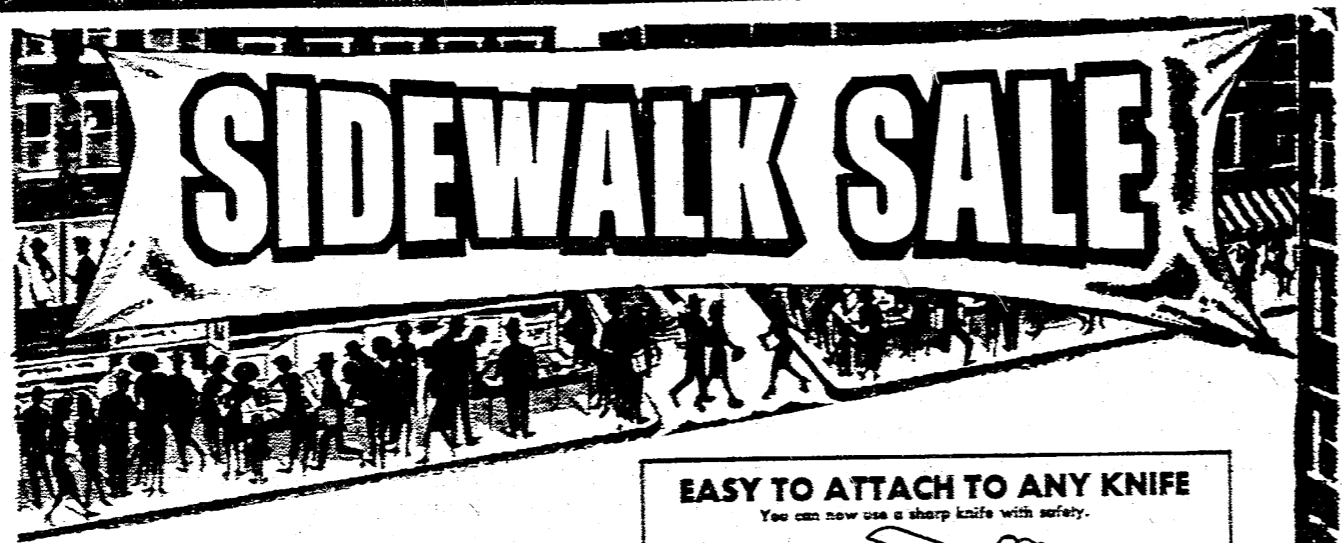

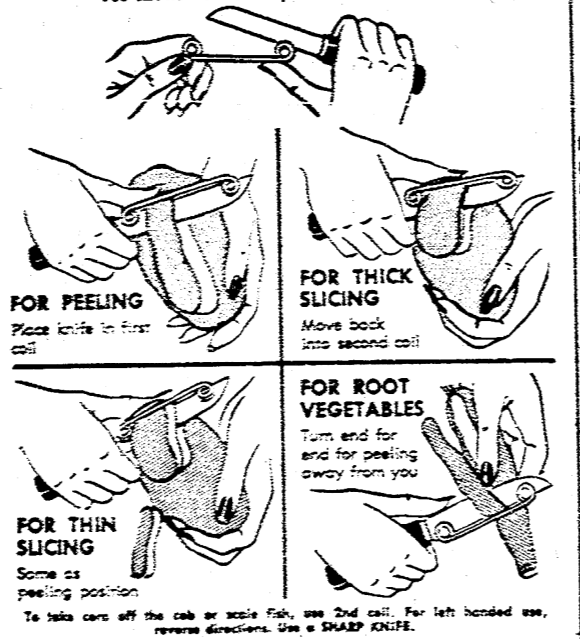

FADED AUTO LICENSE PLATES REPLACED

Michigan Department of State in Lansing is announcing that if your auto license plates are fading or rusting out any, of the 270 branch outlets of the Department of State will supply you with a new set for a handling fee of \$1.00. The special service was initiated after Secretary of State James M. Hare became concerned over the fact that a substantial number of plates are deteriorating badly. Branch offices in all 83 counties have been instructed to issue a complete new set of passenger plates for a fee of \$1.00.

To get this service, the car owner must surrender both faded or rusted license plates at the time the new plates are issued. The title or application for title must be presented at the time of the transaction so that the new plate number can be recorded thereon. Hare pointed out that this \$1.00 rate is available only to owners of 1962 green on white passenger plates which are faded or rusted. It does not apply to 1963 tabs, commercial, farm commercial, trailer, or motorcycle plates. In cases where the passenger plates have been mutilated, lost or stolen and both old plates cannot be turned in, a fee of \$2.00 will be charged.

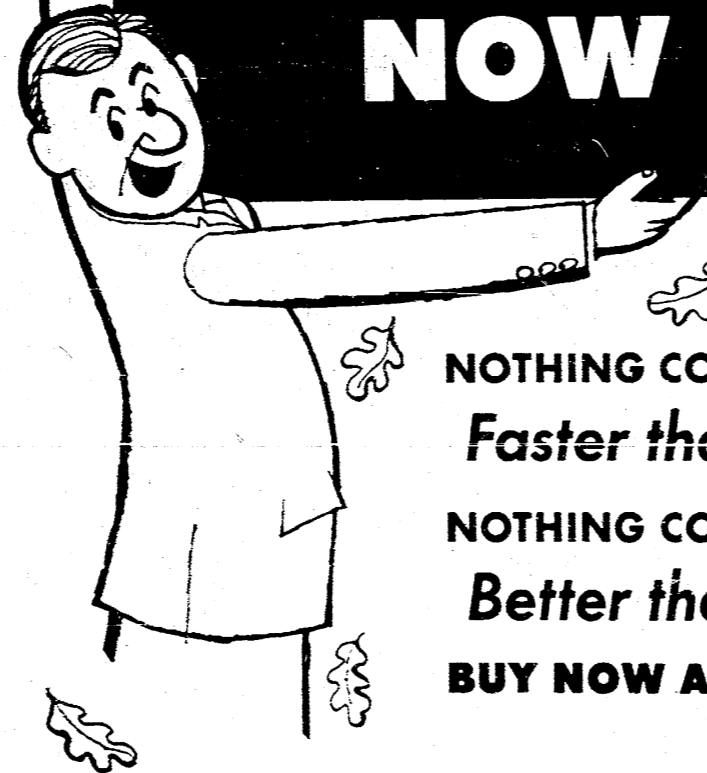

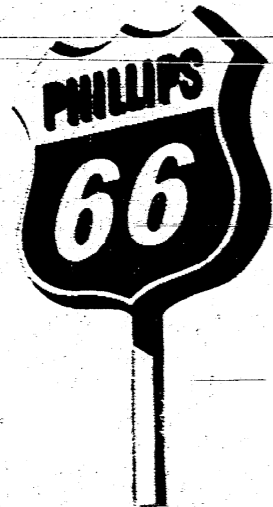
