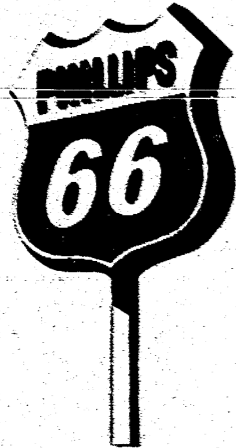

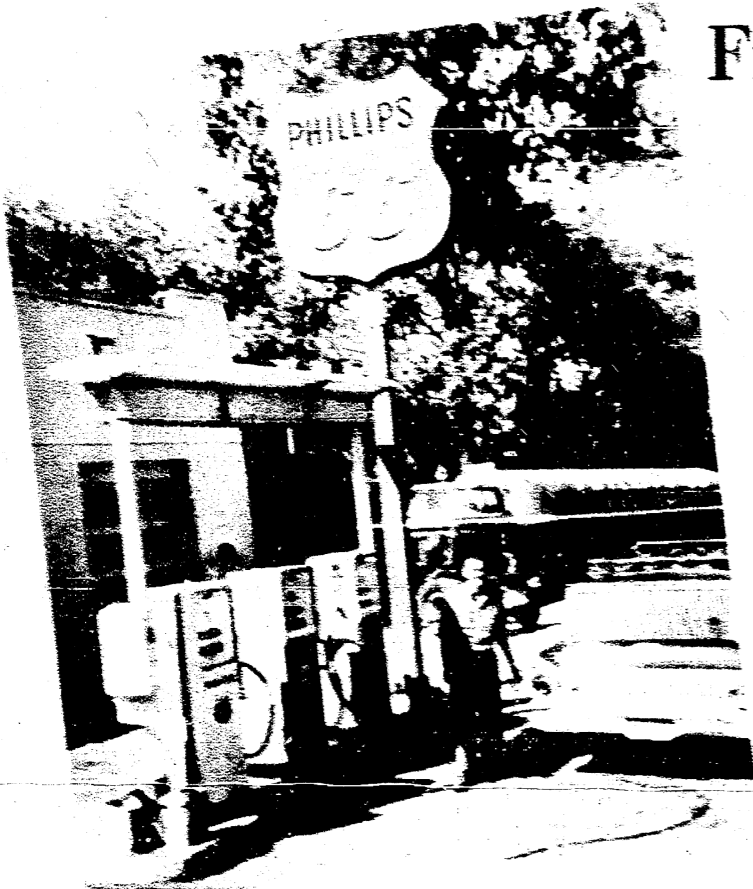

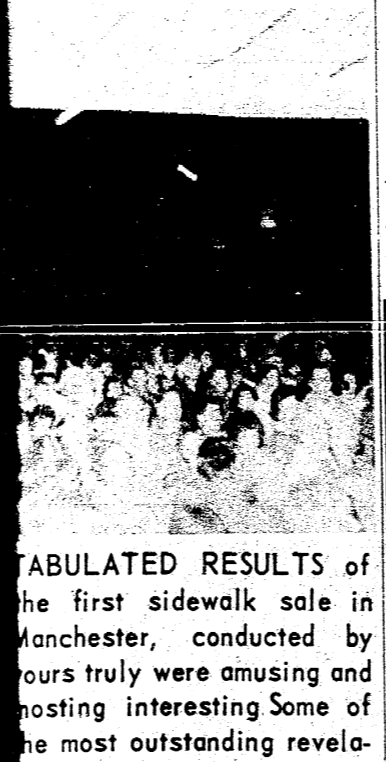
RED CROSS SWIM PROGRAM BEGINS
The fall series of the Red Cross Adult Swim classes will start Wednesday, Oct. 2 at 7:15 p.m. at the Ann Arbor High School, Washtenaw County Chapter officials announce. The swimming classes will be taught by volunteer Water Safety Instructors for the eight week session. Series will include the special sections for non-swimmers, swimmers and a Senior Life Saving Course. These co-educational classes are open to anyone at least 18 years of age in the county; however, registration will be limited. As with all Red Cross courses, there is no charge. A small locker and custodial fee is required by the Ann Arbor school system and will be collected the first evening in Room C-100 at the high school. The first lesson will begin as soon as everyone has been accommodated. Participants should bring along their suits, towels and caps.

UNITED FUND GOAL SET AT \$9,383



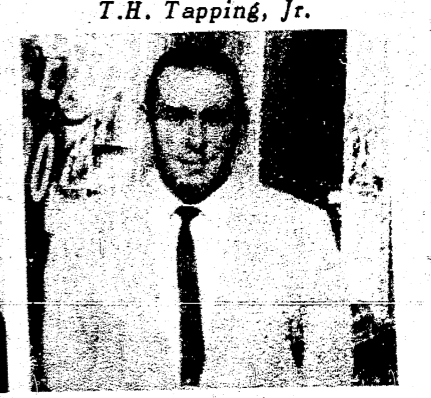
