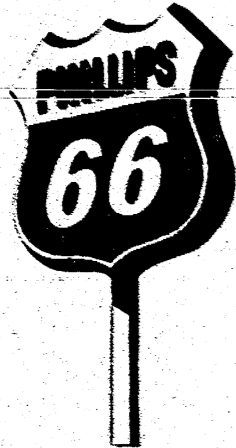

October 6-12 has been named National Business Women's Week. District 8 will hold a meeting in Wyandotte on September 21 and several members are planning to attend.

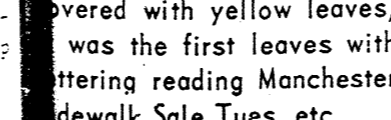
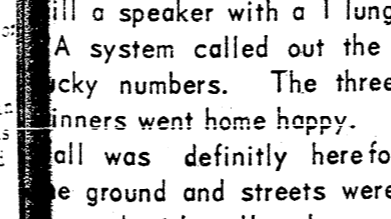
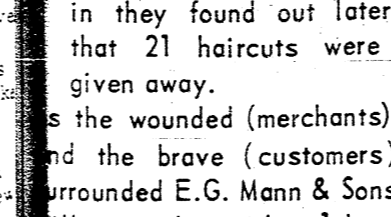
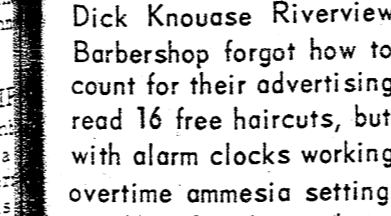
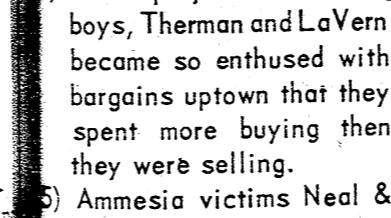
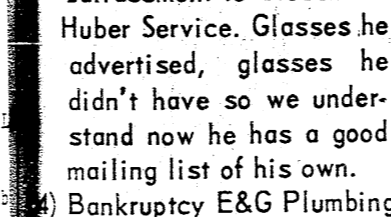
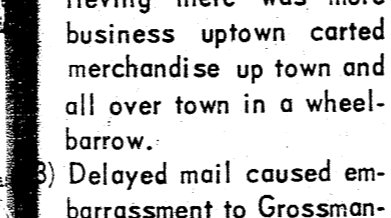
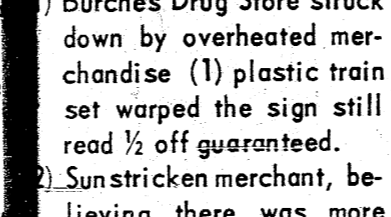
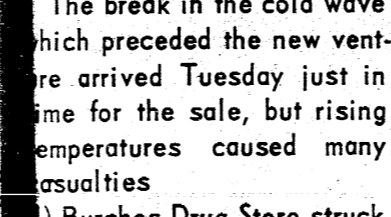
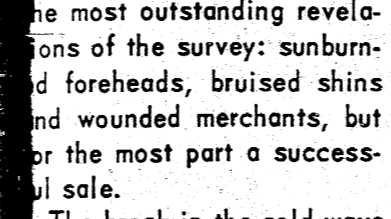
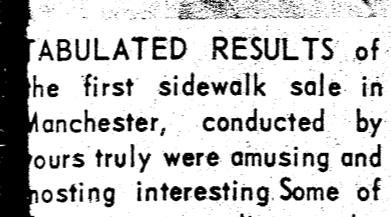
### RETURNS FROM TRIP

**4-H IN TRANSITION NEW PROJECT GUIDE**

Washtenaw County 4-H clubs are being organized as usual, young people and adults are eagerly anticipating project activities and 4-H events of the winter program. Youth between the ages of ten and eighteen and any responsible adults seeking to work with youths are eligible for the club work beginning in October.

4-H is in transition from summer project work to winter, but more importantly, the bulletin which serves as the leaders guide for clubs has just been revised.



**HOUSE TOUR SLATED FOR NEXT THURSDAY**

What started as a kitchen tour several years ago is now a house tour. This annual event is sponsored by St. Mary's Altar Society. Regardless of taste there is one to suit everyone—they are so varied. Everyone will find new and worthwhile ideas to take home. Mrs. Ted Tapping, society president believes, and expressed gratitude to the generous owners who so graciously agreed to open their homes. Hours are 1 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. with refreshments to be served at St. Mary's hall throughout the afternoon. Tickets may be obtained at the hall and at the homes. The Russell Braun home at 18050 W. Austin Rd. is a modern new 3 bedroom ranch type home. Much of the work has been completed by the Brauns. Montana floor covering is used in the spacious dining area and kitchen. Satiny lacquer lacquered cupboards and built in kitchen range are attractions. There are bi-fold closet doors throughout. All windows are aluminum Ida with marble sills,

even in the garage which is attached. Light colored carpeting in the living room is accented by large picture window and walnut paneling. The house is plastered and some rooms have cove ceilings. Tennessee ledge rock is used for the fireplace in the recreation room for the planter divider between dining and living rooms and a wall section of the dining area. They are using a baseboard hot water heating system. The Roger Hardenbergh home is a direct contrast at 11285 E. Austin Road. This was a sturdy, well built built farm house and shows what can be accomplished with a lot of hard work, imagination and money to make a place more livable. Owners did much of the work themselves with no previous experience. Most of the house is furnished with family antiques and old type furniture. Their "kitchen-sitting room" has a Greenfield Village type fireplace. Some of the bricks were made in Bridgewater over 100 years ago and salvaged from the Bridgewater salon. Mrs. Hardenbergh, with a mason's hammer recon-

ditioned each brick. The kitchen table is fashioned from an old door on one of her father's farms. A school desk from the Paul district school is now an end table. A Shaker type rocker and a couch add to the charm of the spacious room. Cabinets in the kitchen were custom built of knotty pine. A melodeon in the living room dates back to 1854 and has curved ivory keys. There's a Victorian rosewood table and a marble topped dressing table brought by her grandmother from England in 1898. Wall paper in the reception hall is in the hospitality pineapple pattern. The Robert Huber home at 351 Schaffer Court is a new two story-three bedroom home. A redwood room divider between the reception hall and living room displays treasured bric-a-brac. An oval braided rug in the living room partly covers the hardwood floors. A cathedral window in the open stairway is accented by a hanging antique light fixture with a cranberry glass shade trimmed with prism crystals, a gift of Mr. Huber's mother. The kitchen has a built in stove and birch cupboards.

The Erwin Paul home at 7612 Lamb Road shows how to remodel furniture. In the dining room, a large walnut extension table with carved legs has been cut down and modernized. Wedgewood china is used in the table setting. Mr. Paul, a carpenter, made both the china cabinet and buffet in walnut to match the table. All have formica tops. Chairs too, are custom made. A typewriter table is fashioned out of a commode and a vanity converted into a desk. In the recreation room are custom built TV tables by Mr. Paul. Other articles throughout the house have been made by the carpenter in his spare time which he does as a hobby. Mrs. Webster Schill's home at 316 Clinton St. is a compact, modern, new two-bedroom home, completely on one floor—no basement or stairs. Living room, halls and bedrooms are carpeted. Draperies, windows, color-schemes have received special attention. Furnishings are all modern. Corlon covers the large kitchen with dining area. Built-in stove and refrigerator are bronze to carry out the color scheme. Garage is attached. Spacious cupboards and closets are step savers. This is an interesting home for those wanting everything on one floor. The Frank Spafard home at 417 E. Main St. combines modern and antique furniture in a homey setting. Here is part of the collection of Mr. Spafard's aunt, Mrs. Scott, noted New York artist and of his sister, Myra Spafard. Some of their paintings are in the living room. On an antique table below one of the paintings is the pitcher which the artist filled with flowers over 50 years ago when she painted the picture. A Roman lamp (candle) is another treasure. Near the gas fireplace is an antique spinning wheel chair. One of Mrs. Spafard's hooked rugs is in front of the fireplace on the carpeted floor. In the dining room is a fam-

ily silver tea service dating back a century and her collection of hand painted china and milk glass. Off the modern kitchen on the enclosed porch is a wicker table on which is a Russian samovar (tea service). 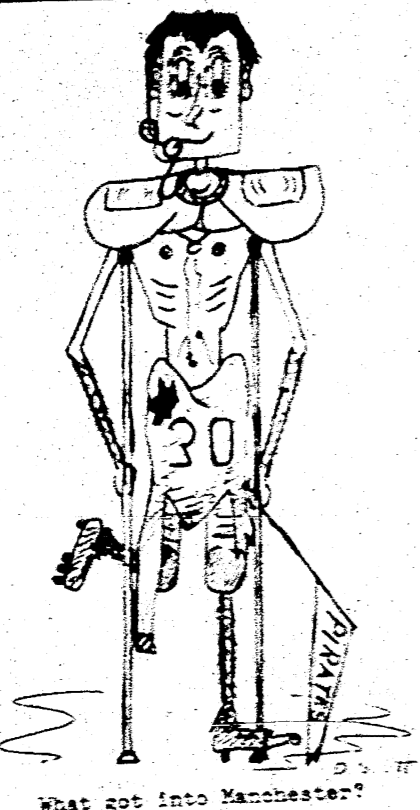
