**Diabetes Week Nov. 17-23**

To encourage Americans to find out whether they have diabetes, the week of Nov. 17-23 has been named Diabetes Week.

Manchester woman, Mrs. Schaefer is the chairman of the Ann Arbor Diabetic Association. She says that everyone in this area should avail themselves of the opportunity to have the Blood Sugar Test from Nov. 25 through Nov. 30 when the Free Test Blood Mobile will be in Ann Arbor. On Nov. 25, 26, and 27 it will be on Main Street when anyone can stop and have the test. The results will be mailed to you and to your doctor. On November 29 and 30 the Mobile Unit will be at the Ann Arbor Public Library at 8 p.m. to talk on "What relatives of diabetics should know." This program is sponsored by the Ann Arbor Diabetic Association.

Experts have estimated that there are more than 100,000 known diabetics in the United States, and it is estimated that there are about 1,440,000 Americans who have diabetes and don't know it. These figures are plus undiagnosed cases of thousands of people who may develop diabetes if they don't follow a strict diet, keep their weight down and have periodic physical examinations. Their doctors to detect changes in how their bodies use sugar.

Diabetes is a disorder in which the body cannot make use of some of the foods we eat—mainly the carbohydrates, or sugars and starches. The pancreas, a large gland lying behind the stomach, does not make available enough insulin to turn these foods into energy or store them for future use.

Symptoms include increase in thirst, constant hunger, frequent urination, loss of weight, itching, easy tiring, changes in vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches. Most likely candidates for diabetes are overweight persons past 40, particularly those who are related to diabetics and especially older women. But diabetes can hit anyone at any age.

Diabetes can be controlled by a planned diet, exercise, and insulin or oral medication. Well-controlled diabetes can lead active and useful lives.

**Celebrates 90th Birthday**

A Manchester woman will observe her 90th birthday, Sunday, Nov. 17. Mrs. Anna Davidter, widow of Otto Davidter says, "Somehow the years slipped by so swiftly I can hardly comprehend I'm ninety years old. Only when I recall my early years of nursing does the time take on a real value."



Mrs. Davidter was the oldest girl in a family of ten children of Fred and Katherine Haschle Maurer. The youngest in the family, Ben Maurer of West Austin Road and herself are the only ones living. She was born in 1873 on what is now the Gaita Cathey farm at 11521 Austin Road, Manchester township.

After completing the eight grades at the Spafard School she helped her mother with the housework and because of her natural ability and good natured ways soon found herself caring for the sick and doing practical nursing. One case took her to Ann Arbor and there friends encouraged her to enter the University School of Nursing. A high school diploma was not required to enter training. There were not many nurses and few girls entered training.

Careers for women were not common when she enrolled at the turn of the century. There were 10 girls in her group at University hospital. "Things have changed. It took two years to complete training. First, we served a two-month probation period and during that time we worked in the hospital, wearing light colored house dresses. The work was hard, but I loved it. The hospital was without a supervisor of nurses for a short time and they were expecting one to come from the east. Shortly before she arrived I was called into the Head Nurses' office and told to begin to wear uniforms at once. Because, it was rumored, the new supervisor would be unduly strict with girls on probation.

"You may think that wasn't much of an order, but we couldn't step out and buy uniforms. We could make them ourselves or hire them made. They were

of blue chambray with round collar and cuffs for the first year nurses and the same type for the second year except we wore a white organdy kerchief at the neck and deep white cuffs.

"I was so happy to be told to get uniforms because I knew I had been accepted. In training we were paid \$4 a month after the probation period for the first year and \$6 a month the second year. That was considered very good. For, we received our training, room and board and laundry. If we were sick we were cared for by the hospital free of charge. Our only expense was the uniform.

"Now, I'm told the first year student does no floor duty. She spends all her time studying. We started caring for the patients as soon as we enrolled and did our studying on our free time.

"Can you imagine nurses making their rounds at night carrying a lighted candle? That is what we did. We didn't have flashlights. When I see University hospital today, and think back to its size when I worked there then I realize a great many years have intervened to cause such drastic changes.

"After completion of training it was the custom to register with doctors and surgeons for private duty. I really wanted to do nursing in Jackson, Mich. Direct train service was very important to me.

"Those were the horse and buggy days, so it was necessary to have quicker transportation. I took a room at the YWCA in Jackson. I seldom stayed there for, after finishing a case I liked to board the train and come home to spend a few days with my family and rest up.

"We had a telephone at the farm and being registered with the doctors, they could call when there would be a case for me.

"The salary for a nurse was \$3 for 24-hour duty. No one had heard of an 8-hour day. Hospital duty was a twelve hour shift, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. etc.

"Sometimes when people would be very sick and there wouldn't be a nurse for the nurse, I'd find myself sleeping on the floor with a pillow at my head, catching a few winks of sleep whenever I could.

"Treatment of diseases has changed so drastically. Take typhoid fever. We treated the patient by immersing them in a tub of ice cold water.

"Patients used to dread treatment and I could

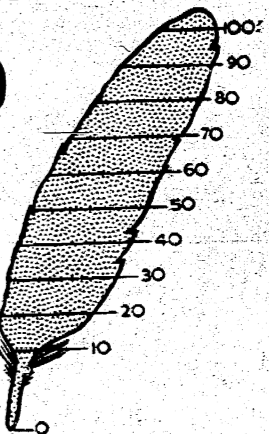
**United Fund Over the Top**

"Last year when I celebrated my ninetieth birthday I figured I'd just about come to the end of the line, like the Ypsilanti-Hillsdale branch of the railroad which they have discontinued. Last year they tore up the tracks and the last thing to go was the railroad bridge," Mr. Widmayer said.

He lives at the home of the Duffield Balls at 528 City Road. He moved there about four years ago when he decided he shouldn't live alone anymore.

When N. W. Holt took over the grist mill, where E. G. Mann's mill is now, he installed the new roller process. Before that time the grain was ground with old-fashioned stone. He bought lots of wheat and ground it, put it in flour barrels, took it by wagon to the depot and there shipped out, "he remembers.

Mr. Widmayer doesn't believe there are many who remember the old wooden bridge across Main Street. The road was dirt and along the sidewalk was a stone trough where horses stood tied to hitching posts.

"Each merchant was responsible for keeping it clean in front of his store and shoveled out the snow along the street edge. The village wagon would come along and pick it up from there. I tell you things were different. They had a fellow drive a sprinkling wagon up and down Main Street in the hot dry weather and the store keepers chipped in 50 cents a week for the service," he said.

My father took the Enterprise ever since it started in 1872. When we were at home we took another paper The Washtenaw Post. That was printed in German and published in Ann Arbor.

He has never missed a presidential election and voted for Kennedy. He never cared about holding a public office in the community but was elected for constable the only time he did run for public office. He and the supervisors were elected on the democratic ticket and all the rest were republicans.

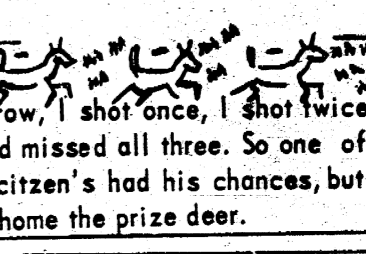
