Fire Destroys Barn on Heimerdinger Farm



Fire of undetermined origin demolished a Manchester township barn and some nearby buildings about 4:30 Wednesday, Nov. 27.

Two dogs and a hog perished in the blaze at the LeRoy Heimerdinger farm at 20432 Logan Road. Some 1,500 bushels of oats, three mows of hay, tools and a nearly new truck were destroyed.

The fire was whipped by a stiff breeze but the local fire department was able to save some of the out-buildings.

The barn was 90 by 60 feet and the flames which lighted the sky could be seen as far as Clinton. Heimerdinger's house was not damaged. Mr. Heimerdinger was asleep in the house at the time the fire was noticed by neighbors.

Fire chief James Kessler said the estimated loss would be about \$10,000. The loss is covered by insurance.

SADDLE OF VENISON

From Open Road Tours' famed Sonnenhof Hotel in Vaduz, the principal city of the tiny (82 square mile - 16,274 people) principality of Liechtenstein, comes this recipe for a delectable holiday dinner to delight your family and friends at Christmas time.

Although the original recipe calls for a saddle of venison, you can substitute a rump roast instead—it is "slightly" easier to obtain in local meat markets!

INGREDIENTS:

- a 3 lb. rump roast of beef (or blade cut pot roast)
- dry white wine
- 3 carrots
- 6 stalks of celery
- 3 small onions
- 20 peppercorns
- 6 oz. cognac
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1/4 tsp. thyme
- 6 oz. sour cream
- salt, pepper, lemon juice
- pineapple
- cooked pears and peaches
- lingonberries (cranberry preserves will work as well)

PROCEDURE:

Marinate the rump roast in the dry white wine for two days, turning often.

When you are ready to cook the roast, remove it from the marinade and brown the roast in a hot oven approximately 20-25 minutes until lightly browned. Then add the chopped vegetables and the peppercorns to the roast and let them brown also.

Add the cognac to the wine from the marinade along with basil and thyme. Add this liquid to the roast and braise until the meat is done.

Remove meat from the pan, slice and place on a hot platter. To the juices remaining in the pan, add the sour cream, salt, pepper and lemon juice to taste. Pour sauce over meat, garnish platter with pineapple slices, cooked pears and peaches filled with lingonberries.

Serve with buttered noodles. Serves five.

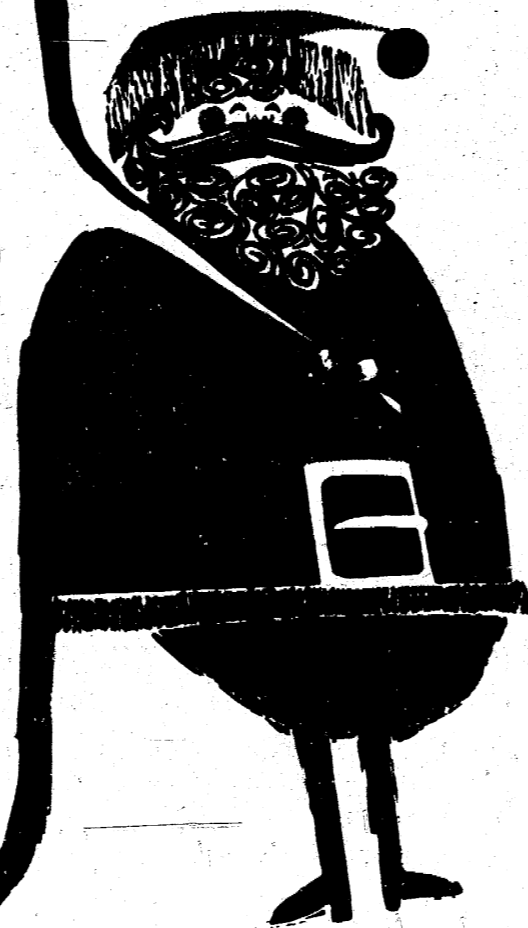

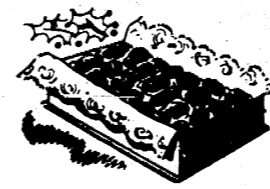

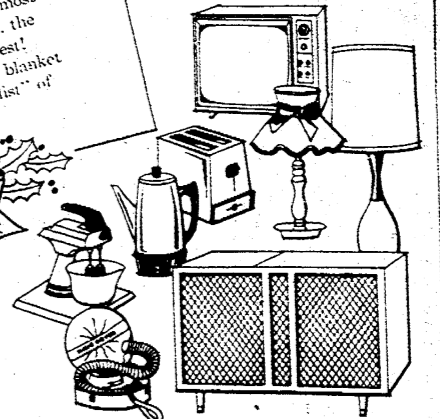

Red Cross Center
 New Operations Center of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross will be used as a Sub-Center of the Detroit Regional Blood Program starting in February, according to Chairman James M. Davis. He said that while Washtenaw appreciates the Bloodmobile service which has permitted the collection of blood throughout the county for the past ten years, a location in the county is most necessary so that people could come at least once a month. With the completion of Red Cross Operations Center at 2729 Packard in Ann Arbor space was designed to permit the Multi-purpose Room to be used for Blood Clinics. Even before the building was dedicated it was necessary to use this building for blood collection for the various Ann Arbor industries. More than one thousand persons were processed in a single week.
 Dr. A. James French, Chairman of the Blood Program, pointed out that persons who are unable to give blood at the regular date of their group may go to this center. It is now planned that the Center will be open for blood collections the second Friday of each month and additional days as needed.
 This is especially important in view of the expanded need for heart surgery collections. The Red Cross is now providing for the blood needs of 90% of the people who live or work in Washtenaw County. Dr. French said, and added that it is hoped to provide facilities for the other ten per cent so that any person in the county who wishes to protect himself

Letter From Germany to Ann Walton
 The following letter was received from Ann Walton's girl friend, Liesel Neumann of Oldenburg, Germany, daughter of the family Ann Stayed with while on the Michigan Chorale tour.
 "Oldenburg, Nov. 24 1963
 Dear Ann,
 What terrible news has agitated the world. It was on Friday at 2 o'clock when I listened to the radio, suddenly the program was interrupted and the announcer told about the attempt on Kennedy. Later we heard that he was dead. At first we couldn't believe it, and now we are moved deeply; it's not only you who have lost him, but we, too. We remember very well his triumphal journey through Germany and his words: "Ich bin ein Berliner".
 Our teacher brought to us from her journey to the United States of America, a calendar on which are all the 35 presidents' pictures. There we can see the dates of the birth and death, but we can't write beside the picture of Kennedy his date of death.
 Ann, I hope you understand my words. I want to tell you how much my family and I fell with you and the American population. You know that we Germans loved Kennedy, that he helped us to endure the unnatural separation of our country.
 Now we, too, say goodbye to him, but we won't forget him.

How To Select Christmas Toys For Pre-School Children

If your child isn't old enough to write a "Dear Santa" letter, choosing his Christmas toys can be a problem.

The pre-schooler who "wants everything" the week before Christmas is often the same child who "hasn't anything to play with" a week after Christmas. Many of the costly toys that loving Santas gave him — so attractive on television or the toy counter — may already be abandoned or broken. To avoid these post-Christmas disappointments, parents should select pre-school toys with special care, according to Playskool Research.

Select Toys For Growth

For the pre-schooler, his toys are just as important as his clothing, and he usually outgrows them faster. Like his clothing, toys should be selected to fit the child's stage of growth and his particular needs.

Playskool Research advises parents to keep these hints in mind when choosing toys for a pre-school child:

1. Select toys that are sturdy and durable. Toys that break their promises to the child are disappointing to the youngster as well as to the parents' pocketbook.
2. Choose toys suited to the child's age, his stage of development and interests. A toy that is too simple isn't interesting. A toy that is too complicated is frustrating and should be put away until the child grows up to it.
3. Choose toys that are fun for the child, not easily broken novelties or gimmicks that only amuse him briefly or merely appeal to an adult. Non-specific toys, like blocks,

Baby Sitters Know What to Do In Case of Fire

Baby sitters who know what to do in case of fire or other emergency can make your Christmas a merrier one.

The possibility of a Christmas tree fire always adds to the responsibilities of a baby sitter and should be of special concern at this time of year.

When she comes into your home, at any time of year, you can give her a hand by providing her with phone numbers she might have to use quickly. Place a card beside the phone with the phone numbers of (1) the fire department, (2) the police department, (3) the family doctor, (4) the number of the phone where the parents may be reached, and (5) the phone number of a nearby neighbor.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters gives these other suggestions:

1. Employ a sitter you know. Be sure she knows her job, is responsible, and likes children.
2. Employ a sitter your children will enjoy being with, and let her get acquainted with them before you leave. If you have pets, let her get acquainted with them, too.
3. Make sure the sitter clearly understands that in case of fire, she should get the children out of the house quickly.

W. Rauschenberg will remodel the old marble shop into a residence. A good improvement for Jefferson St....4 homes have been connected for city water...Although landlord Husted has furnished 12 new sleeping rooms, Manchester house was crowded Monday night and cots and couches were brought in to accommodate the guests. Work of bringing lines of Sharon subscribers of Michigan Bell connecting with local exchange switchboard is underway...Now there are 540 subscribers. Mr. and Mrs. Howard Clark plan to build a new house on the site of the old one which was bought a few years ago from John D. my thirty pupils a small bag. What would children today think of such a gift?" she wondered. Among her treasured possessions is a china Easter egg given her in 1895 by one of her pupils, and a china slipper with a kitten perched on top. This was brought by her uncle to her on her fourth birthday. There was always a Christmas program at school and someone always brought in a Christmas tree which would be gayly decorated by the children with strings of pop corn and paper ornaments. She attended Saline high school and the Albion Academy, Albion New York. When she was teaching she went to summer school at Ypsilanti State Normal. "My bicycle cost \$50 but I really needed it. I used to ride it from Clinton to Saline week-ends so I could spend sometime with my sister, Mrs. John Lutz. I paid \$2 a week for room and board. A good pair of shoes cost \$2 and calico was 5 cents a yard. She married Frank Brown Oct. 15, 1901 and farmed until he died in 1919. She and the family moved to town in 1920. "When our farm barn was built we boarded the carpenters. Maybe that wasn't a lot of work. Baking and cooking for all those men every day. Neighbors said my basement looked like a bakery. Two of her three children are living. Besides her daughter Ethel, her son Frank also lives in Manchester and operates his radio and television store. She has two grandsons. Mrs. Brown has the books that she and her husband used to keep their farm accounts in. She still uses the Montgomery Ward sewing machine which they bought shortly after they were married for \$17.70. Everything they bought or sold throughout the years is recorded in her account books and she can show you that she sold 22 pounds of lard at 12.5 cents in Feb. 1907 and made and sold butter for 27 cents in 1908. One of her neighbors, Ed Braun and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary this fall. Ed was one of her students. There are others in town who went to school to "Miss Tucker." At present she is busy knitting for her own son and grandsons. Many a sock she knit for her brothers for Christmas. She does some crocheting and enjoys reading the paper. But she believes that anyone should have some time for pleasure. "I remember she was always sitting around knitting before Christmas, when word reached that my uncle, Gilbert Tucker had died in Kansas. Everyone stopped to talk it over. Just then grandmother spoke up in her clear level voice, Dont stop knitting girls, keep right on. Grandmother was a good woman but she didn't believe in wasting a minute. I like to believe that there's time to work and also time to rest."
