Basketball Terms Hot-rod fans use.

ASSIST -The critical pass to an offensive player that sets up a basket.

BACKCOURT -The half of the court nearest the basket which a team is defending.

DANGLE -Player who dribbles near his opponent's hands to draw attention away from his offensive play.

DRIBBLE -The act of moving the ball with one hand or both hands.

FAST BREAK -A team's strategy to score quickly by taking the ball from the defense and attacking immediately on getting the ball.

FINGER -An offensive player who passes to teammates but seldom shoots.

FIVE-STAR -Basketball -A wild style of offense, including fast breaks, long passes and frequent shooting.

FULL COURT -Player tries to get his own missed shot.

GOAL TENDERS -The half of the court nearest the basket in which the opponents are defending.

GRIND -An offensive team's tactic of refusing to drive toward the basket or shoot, in an effort to delay the game or force offensive players away from the basket.

HORN SHOT -A one-hand shot in which the shooting arm is brought sideways and over the head.

JUMP BALL -Ball tossed up by the referee between two players facing each other.

LAY-UP -A one-hand banked-

shot taken after a cut or dribble to the basket.

POST PLAY -An offensive player who takes his position in or near the defensive foul line area.

POST UP -An offensive player who takes his position in or near the defensive foul line area.

REBOUND -The act of a player whose chief duty is to stand fast and let his teammates run their guarding man into his.

SET SHOT -Non-bank shot bouncing off the backboard or basket.

SET SHOT -A long or semi-long shot from a well-balanced position.

STALLING -Respectable tactic to keep possession of the ball so opponents can not score a vital goal.

TRICK SHOT -A shot that is difficult to make.

WALKING -A violation in which a player moves with the ball while dribbling.

NEW STUDENT ENROLLS AT MHS

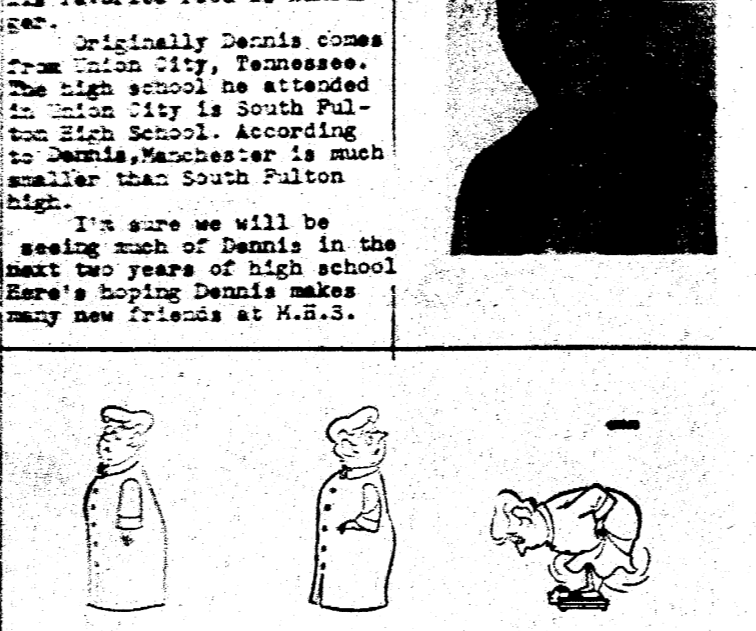

HOLIDAY TRAFFIC SAFETY REMINDER

What all this amounts to is that Chief Van DeGinste and his department wish to see that everyone in Manchester has the merriest of Christmas holidays; and something in their past experiences makes them very practical about it.

"I've seen pain in the eyes of people who have just had an accident," confided the chief. "Even if there are no serious injuries, there's the pain of plans redely interrupted, cherished activities and opportunity postponed temporarily or lost permanently. We always hate to see it—especially at this time of year."

Chief VanDeGinste is well aware that all sentiment and wishful thinking aside, the Christmas holidays are traditionally among the most dangerous of the year. (The National Safety Council lists 605 Christmas holiday traffic deaths throughout the nation last year—the highest death toll for any 1962 holiday period). He promises that his officers will be on extended duty helping to prevent unnecessary holiday accidents—by arresting you for a dangerous moving violation if you make that step necessary.

Incidentally, the best Christmas can ask for would be the cooperation of every driver and pedestrian in making this the safest holiday season Manchester has ever enjoyed.

Now that everyone has their Christmas shopping done our police chief, Jules VanDeGinste asks if everyone has made a business of planning for accident prevention. Did you remember new windshield wiper blades? Have you neglected that car tune up and safety—check you intended to get a long time ago?

Have you "winterized" your driving habits? Do you always slow down on slippery streets? If you plan to entertain, have you planned it so that your guests can drive home wide awake and sober?

If your friend has included all such items as the above in his Christmas and New Year preparations, there's not much to do about it, but admit it's a real winner—and make him your good example.

REDUCED TO 44 HOURS

Beginning January 1 Washtenaw Sheriff's department will officially go on a 44-hour work week as a decision of the board of supervisors, after a two-month study on the controversial issue.

The board authorized the addition of four new deputies to allow for conversion to the 44-hour week. The salary costs addition will be \$20,176. Uniform allowances totaling \$600 has been allotted.

Sheriff George Petersen asked for an additional patrol of three deputy sheriffs. The cost will be \$15,132 for salaries and \$450 for uniforms and \$2,500 for one more patrol car. The sheriff had asked for a 49-hour week because he was losing men on the 48-hour schedule.

SKATING RINK NOW OPEN

Skating is open to all the skaters in the Manchester area at the public skating rink on West Main Street across from the churches. Robert Lowery, council member in charge of the rink says that the ice is smooth and now ready for use. Mr. Lowery has worked with the street crew to get the ice into shape for the holidays so that those getting skates for Christmas will have a good place to test them. Special hockey hours have been set up for 2 to 4 p.m. daily and again at night from 8 to 10 p.m. If at any time the skating rink is not to be used, in the event of a sudden thaw or if the ice is not ready to be used, Mr. Lowery says that signs will be posted.

CHRISTMAS TREE FARMING SAVED

Science, a single insecticide spray and a summer shearing job are protecting Michigan's \$3 million Christmas tree industry from serious insect damage. The four most serious insects which can raise havoc with the state's pine nurseries are the Zimmerman moth, white pine weevil, root collar weevil and European pine shoot moth. The best controller is benzene hexachloride has proven to be the best control for all of these except the European pine shoot moth which is best kept in check with DDT plus summer shearing. This control is not only effective, but it is also safe for both the grower and the user of the tree. Findings that a single pesticide application before mid-April controls all but the pine shoot moth come about through an intensive research project at Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station. As a result, Michigan nurserymen have been pretty well able to keep insects in check. But the Michigan Christmas tree wasn't nearly as rosy-or should we say green-three or four years ago. Growers were experiencing almost a total loss of some of their tree stands. The lateral branches of the trees were turning brown and yellow and the worst part of it was that the insect didn't hit until the growers were about ready to harvest their trees. By that time control was too late.

First Stocking Filled by Accident

In Britain, it is the custom for children to leave their toys under the tree until the afternoon of Christmas Day. Santa Claus (Father Christmas) makes his Christmas Eve visit, however, filling the stockings left by the children at the hearth or beside their bed. British legend says the stocking custom originated by accident. Once, St. Nicholas was making his descent down a chimney to leave some toys for a family of children and some gold coins fell from his pocket, dropping into a dry. Since that time, Santa has always had something for every stocking.

ENGLISH CUSTOM

In England, ash fagots often are burned for good luck on Christmas and a common custom is for each of a group of girls to mark one fagot as her own. The girl whose fagot first takes fire is supposed to be the first to marry.

CHRISTMAS SEALS

Christmas seals, the seasonal reminder of the fight to stamp out tuberculosis, have been with us since 1904.

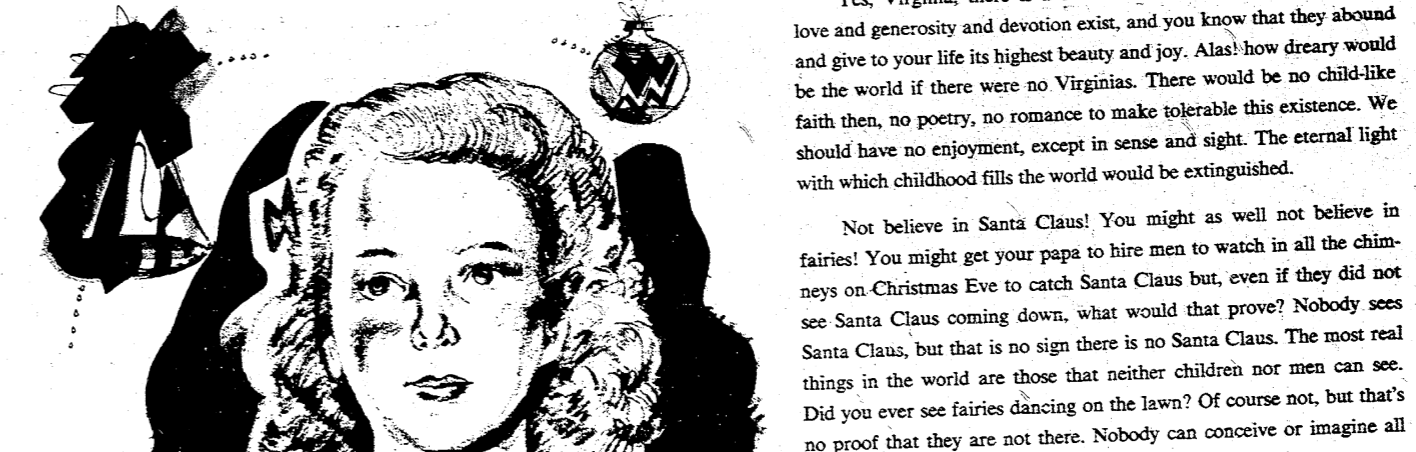
SIGNS OF Christmas

Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?")

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except what they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth, and knowledge.



Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Virginias. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus but, even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world. You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else more real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.
