JANUARY 2 SET FOR WATERSHED MEETING

The River Raisin application for watershed assistance under congressional Act 566 has been accepted by the State Soil Conservation Committee on behalf of the Governor.

In order for the committee to be aware of the public's attitude oward the project, a public hearing is conducted in the area by the committee under consideration before official approval is granted.

The date has been set for Fri. Jan. 10 at 1:30 p.m. at the Tecumseh Community Center in Tecumseh.

A successful hearing is dependent upon representation from all areas of the watershed It is imperative that all sponsoring organizations plan to attend and explain and support their sponsorship.

Because many sponsors have passed resolutions supporting the project on its general overall merits, more specific information is needed to prepare for the public hearing. To accomplish this, a pre-hearing meeting is being scheduled for Thursday Jan. 2 at 8 p.m., also at the Tecumseh Community Center. All persons interested in the project should be encouraged to attend this session designed to provide specific information for all significant areas of the watershed.

Participants will want to be repared to answer questions concerning the degree of floodtion and erosion in the areas of the watershed which they may represent. Information of this nature will be available at the January 2 meeting according to Harold Easton, president Association.
