## FARM PROGRAM DISCUSSIONS SET

The general public is invited to attend the Farmer discussion group sponsored by the Manchester Board of Education in cooperation with the County Extension Service. Maynard Blossom, Vocational Agricultural Instructor will direct the program.

Dates have been set up as follows: Tuesday, Jan. 7-Tel-Farm (Farm Management) with Bill Dexter and Don Johnson of the County Extension Service in charge.

Tuesday, Jan. 14-Plant Diseases and Insects with Dr. N. Ch Smith, MSU Plant Pathology Specialist and Dr. Ray Jones, Entomology Specialist at MSU. Tuesday, Feb. 11-No Class is scheduled because of county dairy meeting.

Tuesday, February 25, Sheep Management, Graydon Blank, Animal Husbandry Specialist at MSU and Dr. Henry Eames, Veterinarian.

Classes are scheduled for Tuesdays, Jan. 21, 28, Feb. 4, and 18 and March 3, 10, and 17.

## RED CROSS ADULT SWIM PROGRAM

Winter series of the Red Cross Adult Swim classes will start Wednesday, Jan. 8 at 7:15 p.m. at the Ann Arbor High School.

The sections for the non-swimmer, intermediate swimmer, swimmer and Senior Life Saving will again be taught by Red Cross Volunteer Instructors each Wednesday evening for 8 weeks.

These co-educational classes are open to anyone at least 13 years of age in the county. Registration will be limited. There is no charge. A small custodial fee is required by the Ann Arbor school system and will be collected the first evening in the Little Theatre Auditorium, directly adjacent to the high school rear entrance. Program arrangements provide that participants bring along their suits, towels and caps.

## ADULT CLASSES OFFERED HERE

Manchester Board of Education is offering an adult education program through January, February and March. To convenience the citizens of the town the members of the classes will have a opportunity to choose the meeting date and time.

Registration for classes will be January 8 (Wednesday) from 8 to 9 p.m. at the High School building. Meeting dates and times will be established at that time. For the registration classes will meet in the following rooms:

Room 3-Women's Physical Education. Instructor, Deloris Dahl. Fee \$3 will include exercises, group games such as volley ball and basket ball and fundamentals of tennis and bad minton.

Room 2-Beginning typing with Richard Howell instructor-Fee \$5. Course designed to give basic knowledge of operation of typewriter by touch method. Drills included will allow the student to learn the typing in a short time. Books will be furnished and paper can be purchased at the high school building.

Room 7-Standard Red Cross First Aid-Herbert Keighley instructor. No fee. Ten hours course covering four basic areas of first aid assistance. Standard Red Cross First Aid Certificate will be issued at completion of course.

Music Room-Ball room dancing with Susan Wood instructor, \$6 per couple. Basic steps for fox trot, waltz, cha-cha, rumba and bossa nova.

Office-Driver Training-fee\$25 Five hours of driving behind the wheel. People enrolling must understand that a driver's license is not guaranteed by the school.

Room 8-Beginning bridge with Theodore Tapping. Course is for individuals who have no little or no previous experience playing bridge. Fee is \$3. Each class member will learn enough to be able to get along at social gatherings.

Room 5-Beginning instructions in knitting and crocheting with Ethel Griffin the instructor. Need 8 or 9 crochet hook, crochet cotton, four-ply yarn and #7 or #8 knitting needles.

Room 6-Modern Math taught by Burrill Hansen. No fee. Course is designed to explain new concepts and methods included in elementary and junior high curriculum.

## JANUARY 2 SET FOR WATERSHED MEETING

The River Raisin application for watershed assistance under congressional Act 566 has been accepted by the State Soil Conservation Committee on behalf of the Governor.

In order for the committee to be aware of the public's attitude toward the project, a public hearing is conducted in the area by the committee under consideration before official approval is granted.

The date has been set for Friday, Jan. 10 at 1:30 p.m. at the Tecumseh Community Center in Tecumseh.

A successful hearing is dependent upon representation from all areas of the watershed. It is imperative that all sponsoring organizations plan to attend and explain and support their sponsorship.

Because many sponsors have passed resolutions supporting the project on its general overall merits, more specific information is needed to prepare for the public hearing. To accomplish this, a pre-hearing meeting is being scheduled for Thursday Jan. 2 at 8 p.m., also at the Tecumseh Community Center. All persons interested in the project should be encouraged to attend this session designed to provide specific information for all significant areas of the watershed.

Participants will want to be prepared to answer questions concerning the degree of flooding, deterrred drainage, pollution and erosion in the areas of the watershed which they may represent. Information of this nature will be available at the January 2 meeting according to Harold Easton, president of the River Raisin Watershed Association.

## ONE WAY TRAFFIC AROUND SCHOOL IN EFFECT JAN. 13

To help ease the parking problem at the High School one way traffic around the building will go into effect January 13.

Entrance to the school will be by the West Drive, with the East Drive for exit only. During the evening activities parking will be provided for along the east side of the West Drive, behind the school, in the loop in front of the school, and along the east side of the East Drive.

Over the years, attendance at basketball games and other school functions has increased, creating a need to direct the flow of traffic one way.

**Author Jenter Retires**

After 53 years and nine months as a mortician in Manchester, Arthur Jenter hands over the reigns of the business to his son, Ronald, who has been working with his father since 1947. In that span of time Mr. Jenter has lived within two blocks of the present Jenter Funeral Home.

The name Jenter has been associated with this business in Manchester since 1886 when his father, Ernest C. Jenter and John Rauschenberger operated an embalming business in connection with their furniture store. Rauschenberger and Jenter dissolved partnership in 1906. Ernest Jenter worked alone with the help of a brother-in-law, John Schaible, until his son Arthur joined him in 1910.

The retiring funeral director is a graduate of Manchester High School and graduated at the top of his class from the University of Michigan embalming school. He was a member of the only class that didn't have to write the state board exam and had to wait a year for his license because an applicant had to be 21 years of age before being granted a license.

Both of his sons, Russell of Los Angeles and Ronald of Manchester are licensed morticians. Russell is not practicing his profession but is purchasing agent and office manager for A. Leitz Co. of Los Angeles. January 20, 1916 Mr. Jenter married Cora Grossman. They also have two daughters, Mrs. Edward (Maxine) Steele and Mrs. LeRoy (Alice) Dresselhouse. There are seven grandchildren.

Times have brought many changes in this type of business. When Mr. Jenter first started to work with his father embalming was done in the home of the deceased. There was no funeral parlor. The body was left at the residence where friends called and was taken to the church for services-or the services were sometimes held at the home. There was much more work connected with a funeral in those days. For even chairs had to be taken to the homes. Caskets were selected in their store basement. First the store was in the Dresselhouse and David building and later was in the building now housing the Manchester Laundromat.

Jenters had two horse-drawn hearse in those days. One was black and the other grey, for young people and the carved wooden drapery designs. The driver rode in an open seat up in front. They bought their first auto hearse in 1917. This was the first one in Washtenaw county.

When Mr. Jenter started to work, caskets were made nearly entirely of wood. Morticians often bought shirred silk materials and did their own trimming on the inside of the coffin. Different types of handles were offered and the buyer could make his own selection. Mr. Jenter recalls that after

his father was taken ill the first work he did alone in 1922 called for doing some sculpturing with plaster of paris, color and wax-a job which took him most of the day. He said there was always something very rewarding about doing his best work and there was always a challenge to make a corpse presentable.

Caskets used to be a standard six foot, with six foot three inches by special order. Now the standard size is 6-6. The materials have ranged from plush velour, silk brocades, crepes, and now more popular are the metals, mahogany, walnut and cherry. In this area the metal ones seem to be in greatest demand.

They closed the furniture business in 1933. For many years the Jenters have operated an ambulance service in conjunction with the mortuary work. Unless a person really enjoys this type of work, Mr. Jenter feels it would be useless to try it.
