Applications are being taken by the local police commission headed by Edward Wurster with Robert Clark and Gale Koebebe on the commission.

Their recommendations will be reviewed by the council according to village clerk, Lyle Widmayer.

The village police force has a full-time chief and three auxiliary police officers. It is understood that Van De Ginste will take a job with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

POLICE CHIEF HERE RESIGNS

DEAR EDITOR: Say, how about that picture of the Flying Dutchmen Basketball team in their new blazers! The Blazers were furnished as I understand by that newly formed Athletic Boosters Club. You know three or so months ago there were a few people in this old town of ours that would have bet you and I their bottom dollar that this organization wouldn't get as far off the ground as they have.

TAKES NEW POST

It is different being a police chief in a small community such as this, than being on the police force in a large city. It's a "round the clock" job, and in a way you have the welfare of a community in your hands, from the safety of the small children who stroll along the streets to the safety of the business houses, and homes in the community, commented Manchester police chief, Jules Van De Ginste, who is resigning his post here.

You patrol for the fire department, for the funeral director and for weddings. There is no chance to be bored with your work and it is varied. The responsibilities that a police chief shoulders in a small town cannot be easily weighed. Even when you are off duty, the community is uppermost in your mind, he mused.

Manchester Council has accepted the resignation of police chief, Van De Ginste, effective February 10. During the three years he has headed this department, the chief has won the esteem and respect of the teenagers, who no longer use the Main street as a race track in the early hours of the morning.

His prime concern has been the welfare of the young, which was brought out clearly when he first took over his duties. He, with the cooperation of the school authorities worked out a route for the school children to by-pass M-52 in walking to and from school. He maintained that it was unsafe for children to walk along the busy thoroughfare, even on the sidewalks for they would need to be crossing it.

He was the instigator of planning a parking area at the high school and liked him. During Van De Ginste's service to the community he apprehended five escaped convicts. Council recommended a citation in his behalf after he captured two Ionia escapees, Wheeling and Shephard.

Van De Ginste had been an officer for 15 years with the Grosse Pointe Police Department and a plant protection officer with Chrysler Corp. for ten years.

Until a new chief is appointed Donald J. Payeur will be acting chief. Applications are being taken by Police Commissioner committee, Edward Wurster, chairman, Robert Clark and Gale Koebebe.

Their recommendations will be submitted to council. Payeur, 25, was fee deputy, then marine deputy with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department before coming to be patrolman in Manchester.

The police force has a full-time chief and three auxiliary police officers.

It is understood that Chief Van De Ginste has accepted a job as deputy with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

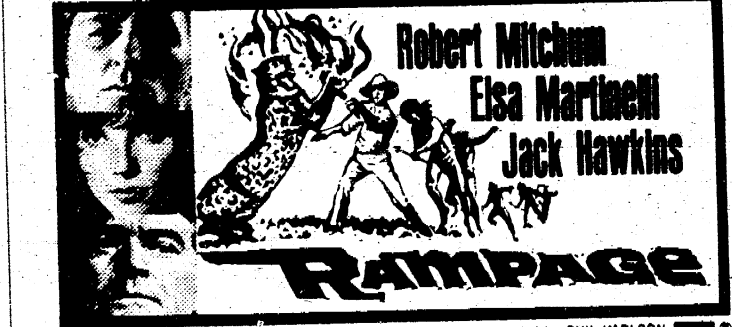

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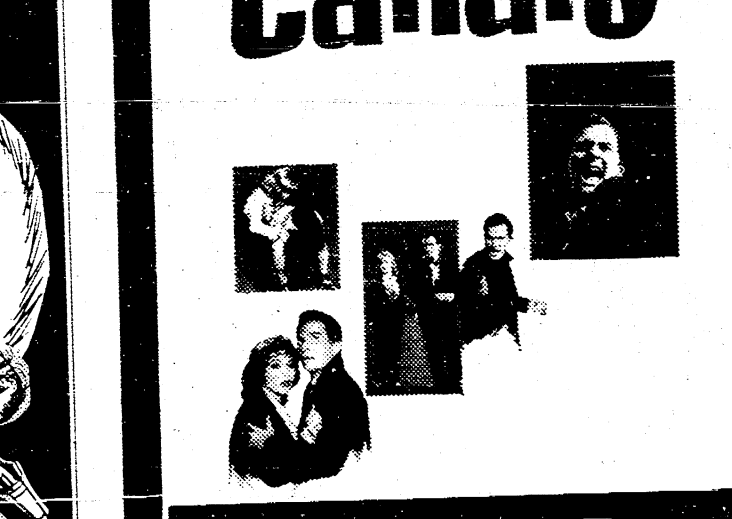

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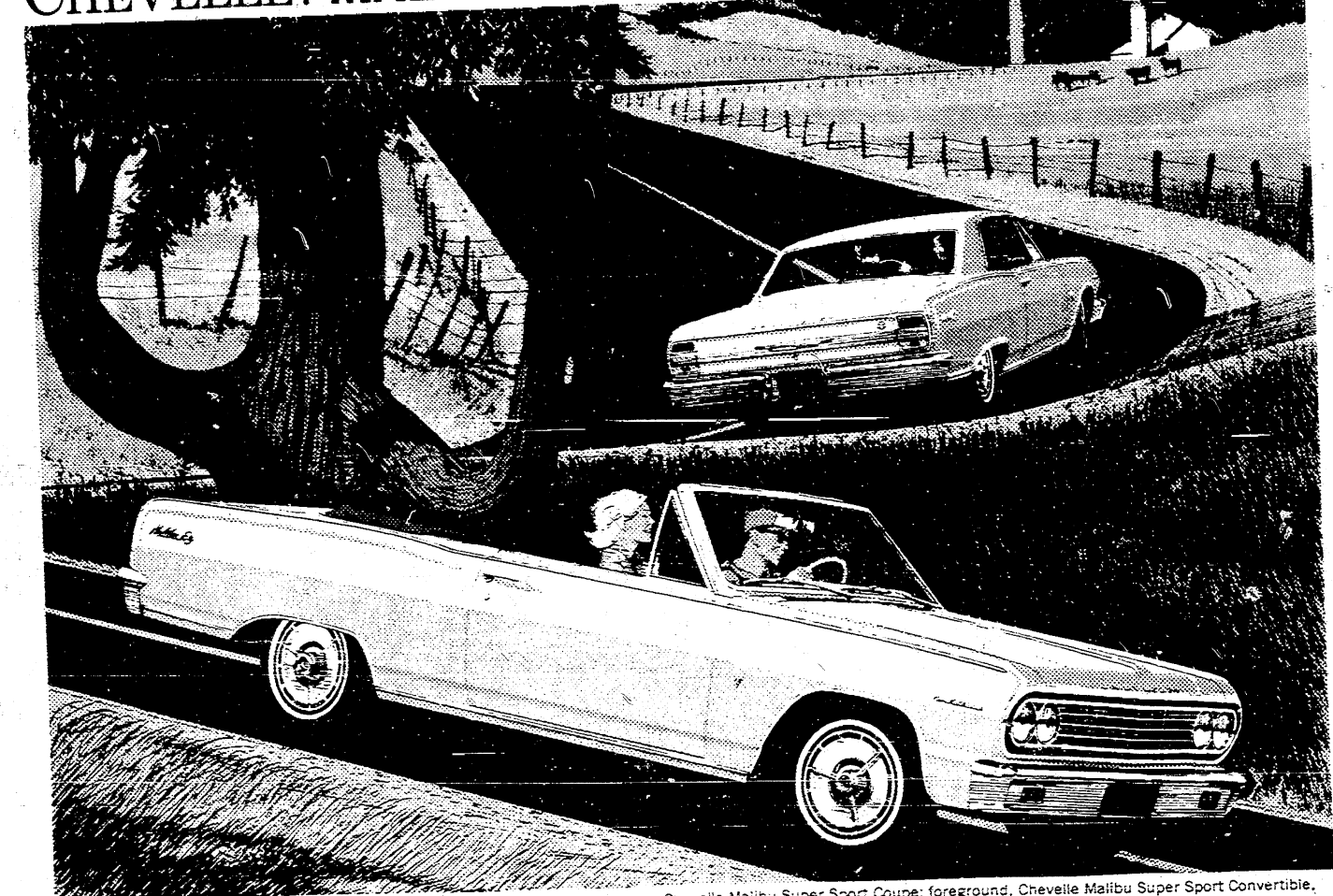

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### HOSPITAL AUXILIARY MEMBERSHIP DRIVE TO START

More than 3,200 prominent individuals and organizations in Washtenaw County will be receiving letters in the next few days as one of the county's largest volunteer organizations launches its annual membership drive.

In its one major fund raising activity of the year, the Washtenaw County Hospital Auxiliary is seeking 11 individual memberships and \$2 club memberships to support a myriad of activities designed to provide basic comforts and a few small pleasures for patients at the County Hospital.

The membership drive is the main source of funds for the group and more important, the main source of volunteers willing to donate a few hours of their time for the pleasure of the patients.

The mailing list, built up over the years through direct contacts and word-of-mouth information, includes only persons and groups that the auxiliary is reasonably certain will respond sympathetically. A more extensive, "blanket" mailing is not undertaken because of costs, but the invitation to join is extended to all citizens of the county.

People of this area are encouraged to send in their contributions whether they receive a letter from the Auxiliary or not according to local Auxiliary board members, Mrs. Don Mackintosh and Marie Schneider.

On its membership base, the auxiliary supports a continuing program of physical improvements at the hospital and personal visits to the patients that has been credited by hospital officials with significantly raising patients morale.

The auxiliary operates a card that makes the rounds of patients with books and small necessities each week and provides many of the patients with "pin money" to purchase small items. The group sponsors a monthly birthday party for those celebrating birthdays during each month and holds an annual Christmas party, with gifts individually chosen for each patient.

A sheltered workshop where patients and instructors manufacture small items and handle small contracts for county industries is partially supported by the auxiliary, which also has a continuing project of beautifying and remodeling the hospital and grounds. Persons interested in becoming members of the auxiliary or in donating their time on a volunteer basis are invited to contact Mrs. Volney Jones, 509 Keesh, Ann Arbor or her committee.

In addition all clubs and organizations in the county are invited to schedule one or more regular meetings at the hospital where director Jack Reynolds will conduct a tour of the facilities and explain some of the needs. Reynolds and members of his staff are available to address meetings to discuss the hospital program, volunteer services and the workshop.
