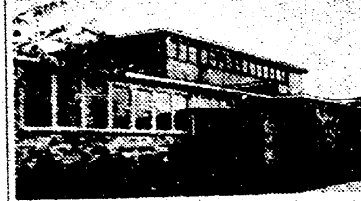

### HOSPITAL AUXILIARY MEMBERSHIP DRIVE TO START

More than 3,200 prominent individuals and organizations in Washtenaw County will be receiving letters in the next few days as one of the county's largest volunteer organizations launches its annual membership drive.

In its one major fund raising activity of the year, the Washtenaw County Hospital Auxiliary is seeking 11 individual memberships and \$2 club memberships to support a myriad of activities designed to provide basic comforts and a few small pleasures for patients at the County Hospital.

The membership drive is the main source of funds for the group and more important, the main source of volunteers willing to donate a few hours of their time for the pleasure of the patients. The mailing list, built up over the years through direct contacts and word-of-mouth information, includes only persons and groups that the auxiliary is reasonably certain will respond sympathetically. A more extensive, "blanket" mailing is not undertaken because of costs, but the invitation to join is extended to all citizens of the county.

People of this area are encouraged to send in their contributions whether they receive a letter from the Auxiliary or not according to local Auxiliary board members, Mrs. Don Mackintosh and Marie Schneider.

On its membership base, the auxiliary supports a continuing program of physical improvements at the hospital and personal visits to the patients that has been credited by hospital officials with significantly raising patients morale.

The auxiliary operates a card that makes the rounds of patients with books and small necessities each week and provides many of the patients with "pin money" to purchase small items. The group sponsors a monthly birthday party for those celebrating birthdays during each month and holds an annual Christmas party, with gifts individually chosen for each patient. A sheltered workshop where patients and instructors manufacture small items and handle small contracts for county industries is partially supported by the auxiliary, which also has a continuing project of beautifying and remodeling the hospital and grounds. Persons interested in becoming members of the auxiliary or in donating their time on a volunteer basis are invited to contact Mrs. Volney Jones, 509 Keesh, Ann Arbor or her committee.

In addition all clubs and organizations in the county are invited to schedule one or more regular meetings at the hospital where director Jack Reynolds will conduct a tour of the facilities and explain some of the needs. Reynolds and members of his staff are available to address meetings to discuss the hospital program, volunteer services and the workshop.

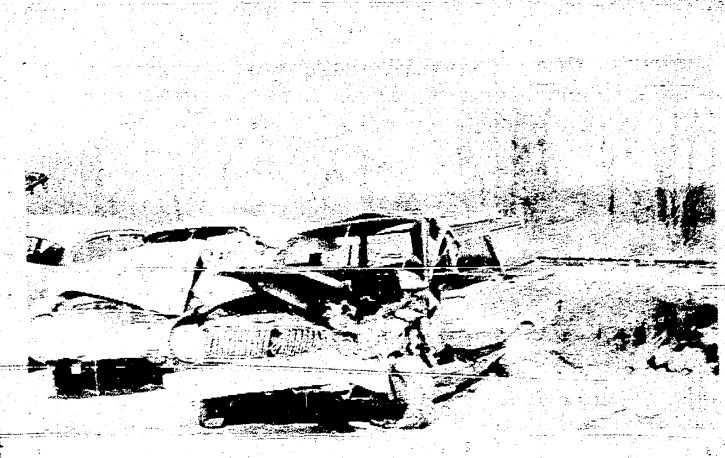

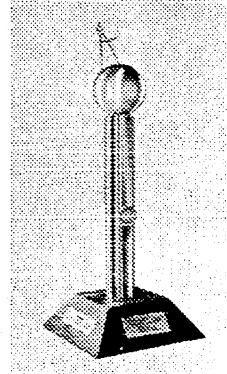

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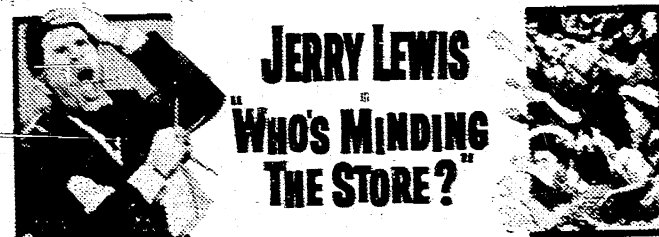

FUNDS OK'D TO HIRE FOSTER HOME AIDE

Ways and means committee of the County Board of Supervisors has approved an appropriation of \$4,591.50 to permit the Juvenile Division of Probate Court to hire a full-time person to recruit foster homes for court wards and to work with foster families.

The county's contribution matches a grant offered the court by the Ann Arbor Foundation. The foundation's grant was made from funds earmarked for experimental programs in the juvenile court by the Foster Foundation.

The request for the county matching funds was made by Probate Judge John W. Conlin, who outlined the need for foster homes and benefits to the children and the county of boarding home placement. The board then referred the request to the ways and means committee which was given power to act. Judge Conlin commented to the effect that the court is very grateful to the ways and means committee which by its action shows that the supervisors recognize the problems and are willing to help in every way they can.

Mrs. Saranne Bohuis, director of the juvenile division, said she expects to have a person named to the new post soon. She said the court workers had long recognized the value of foster home placement and had recommended the creation of the post because of their inability to give foster home findings the time and attention it needs. One of the most important goals of the foster home findings project will be the establishment of a group boarding home for teenaged boys which could accommodate up to six boys, Judge Conlin said.

Boys placed in this home would be those who do not require the security of the detention home but who would adjust and attend school while living in a group setting, he said. The group home for boys would be similar to one which has been operated for the court for six teen-aged girls. This home, which has been in operation since 1962 has been very successful, according to Judge Conlin.

Mrs. Bohuis said the main responsibility of the new court worker will be to find boarding homes for teen-agers who otherwise would have to be placed in institutions because no foster homes are available.

She estimated that there is at least one juvenile ward each month in this group. The juvenile court now has 34 boarding homes, and 46 children in foster home placement, including the group home for girls.

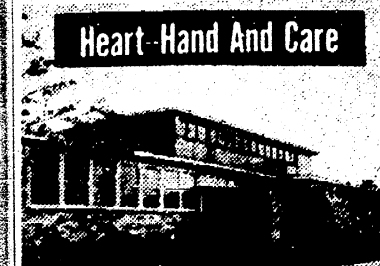
The benefits of the foster home over institutional placement are keeping the children in a home situation where they are closer to the court worker and to their own families.

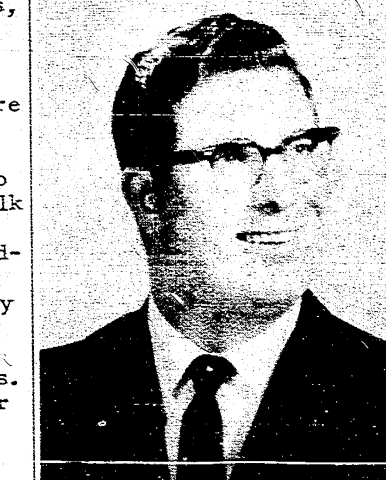
## Bad Checks Passed Here

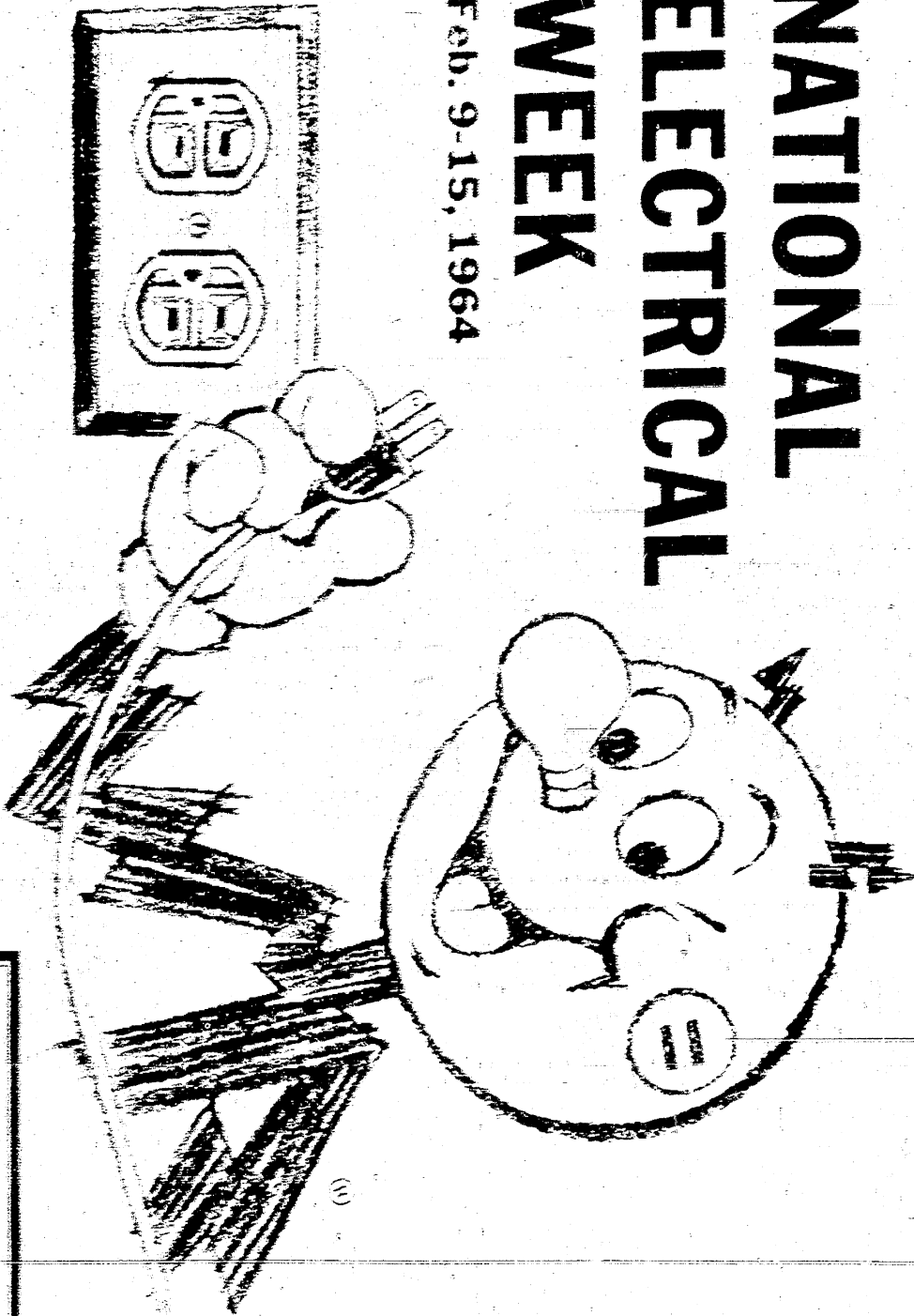
