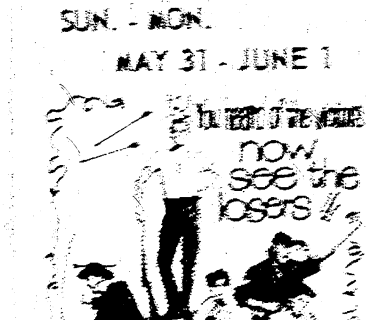

FR. SCHLINKERT'S BACCALAUREATE ADDRESS

A very large crowd attended the first baccalaureate services held Sunday, May 24 at the High School. Speaker was the Rev. Fr. Raymond Schlinkert, pastor of St. Mary's. His topic was "I Am Responsible" because many have inquired if his talk would be in print we asked the television priest for it. It follows:

I AM RESPONSIBLE
I am responsible to God because he has made me wonderfully I am responsible in the form of my commitments I am responsible in the eyes of my fellow-men

Yet there is something which makes the ordinarily different from every lower creature on this earth. That difference is my immortal soul. Because of this soul I have two wonderful powers which enable me to know the truth, to choose the good. Thus, because I am immortal, I am responsible. I must seek the truth. I must do what is good. Beware of those who would deceive you. How often do people in a thump beneath the dignity of their nature and say, "It's only natural." When I act as if I were a brute animal, I am NOT natural. In fact, it is contrary to my nature. I am nobly made. I must act in accordance with my dignity. Whenever I am, at any time, alone or with others, God always sees me. Any my conscience which is "higher reason telling me what to do and what to avoid" must be followed.

AND IN THE EYES OF MY FELLOW-MAN
I am responsible, too, in the eyes of my fellow-men. No person achieves his salvation alone. Other persons are dependent on me. I am responsible for respecting their rights. Long centuries ago Cain, the murderer, asked God, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

Recently in New York City, a woman was murdered. The killer struck and killed her a number of times. From the first attack until the last and fatal blow, three hours of fighting and arguing passed by. This took place just outside an apartment house. Dozens of citizens heard the commotion. NOT ONE person notified the police. On questioning they said, "We don't want to become involved."

NO-ALLEN THE
What we need is more persons of the caliber of an Eisenhower. On D Day there was assembled the largest armada of naval vessels ever seen. They were in the English Channel, ready for the invasion of Normandy. Walking up and down was General Eisenhower. In the pocket of his jacket was a memorandum which read: "In the event that this invasion fails, I want it clear that I assume full responsibility." (Signed) Dwight D. Eisenhower.

FROM THIS DAY FORWARD
No one knows if the members of this class will be rich or famous. That does not matter. What does matter is that you remember always that God created you in a responsible manner. You must ever live up to the nobility to which you were called. Think of God who ever sees you. Follow your conscience-your higher reason telling you what to do and what to avoid. Remember your duty to your fellow-men.
Then, when this Class re-assembles in Heaven, God will reward you. This reward will come if from this Graduation Day on you will say and will act upon this principle: In the sight of God, in the form of my conscience, in the eyes of my fellow-men, I AM RESPONSIBLE!

It takes a lot of money to complete this project. The cooperation of the community is needed—and the help from every organization. Many donations were given this year, from one dollar to fifty, and those who contributed \$100 or more received a Scholarship Certificate.

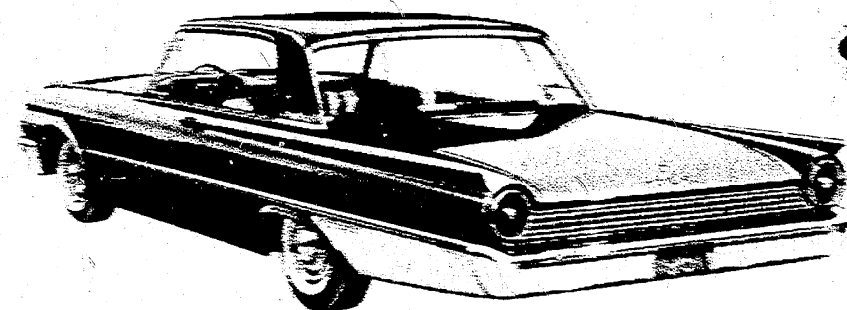

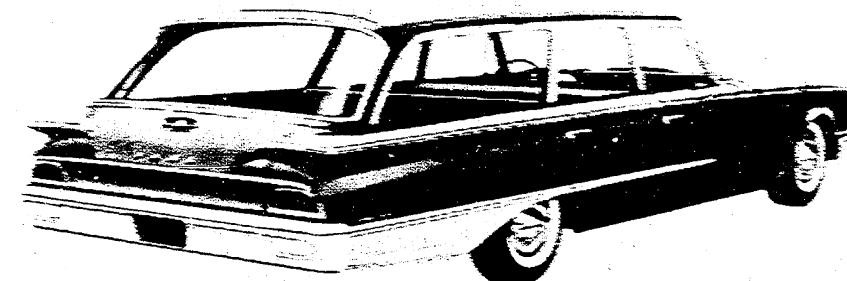

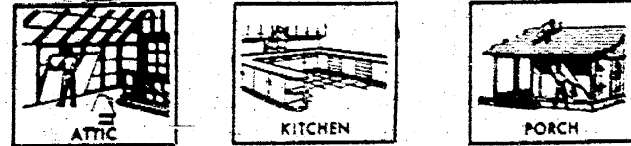

Open letter to Mr. A. Weber, Edmonton, Alberta, regarding his 'Knuckle Protectors for bike riders' appearing in PSM June 1964, page 110:

Dear Mr. Weber:
No, No, innumerable times NO!!!! What you have is not so much a device to protect knuckles as to compoundly fracture phalanges, metacarpals, carpals, radius, ulna and even humerus, to say nothing of dislocating shoulders, or even amputating whole fingers!

Consider what happens should the young or old bike rider slip in gravel, break a front fork, be struck by another vehicle, or even dismount clumsily... we would be dealing with sharply applied lateral (shearing) or torsion-type forces acting on the rider's fingers with several hundred pounds effective force. This would be comparable to winding the arm with a spin-type clothes dryer or extractor... the total damage depending mainly on how long it takes for something to finally tear loose completely.

I've ridden a good many young and reckless miles on a bike, and not a few more sedentary units, and have skinned my share of knuckles-give me the battered hide on me, my kid, and everyone else anytime! Spare parts for people are so hard to come by, at least in my area!
It is always very nice to see parents and others concerned with safety for themselves and the oncoming young'uns. How about the seatbelts, body restraints, and kiddie harnesses in your family car? How about the lights and reflectors on the bikes... are these things there? They work, if used.
And please, Mr. PSM men-have somebody advise on some of these safety ideas... hmmm? Yours, in unbelieving horror,

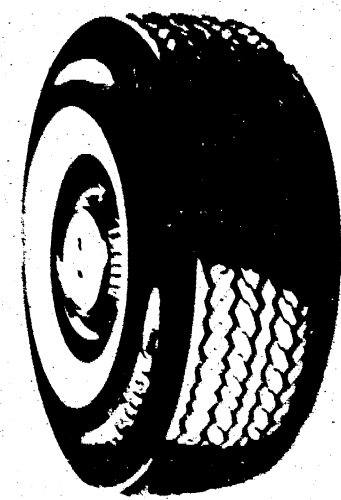

Working on the election board were chairman, Clayton Parr, Darrill Hanson, Herbert Jacob, Ted Tapping, Loren Trolz, LeRoy Marx, Walter Hieber and Basil McGuire.
