MANCHESTER VOTERS CONTINUED THEIR TRADITIONAL SUPPORT

Manchester voters continued their tradition of supporting school taxes in Monday's annual school election. There were 478 votes cast. It was expected that there would be a very small election for only 97 had cast a vote by 1 P.M. but late in the afternoon voters flocked to the polls at the Music Room of the High School on East Main St. Willis Uphaus, seeking a second four-year-term, was reelected by 345 votes. Clarence Fielder, also seeking a second term was defeated. He received 227 votes.

Carl Pedersen was elected with 253 votes. A fourth candidate, Richard Way tallied 99 votes.

Proposition No. 1 which asked for the continuation of four mills for general operating purposes which was voted last year was approved again by the voters with 372 in favor and 101 against.

Proposition No. 2 which asks for a continuation of one mill to be earmarked for additional library purchases, science and math equipment, and educational television on a limited basis was approved with 336 in favor and 138 against. One vote was blank and three were void.

Working on the election board were chairman, Clayton Parr, Darrill Hanson, Herbert Jacob, Ted Tapping, Loren Trolz, LeRoy Marx, Walter Hieber and Basil McGuire.

ATTENTION ALL SWIMMERS

Swimming trips will be made every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons. For those who are interested in taking beginning swimming instructions, the bus will leave at 12:15 P.M. from the Athletic Field. Only those people taking beginning swimming instructions will be able to ride the 12:15 P.M. bus.

The bus for the advanced swimming group will leave the Athletic Field at 1:15 P.M.

Children going into the third grade this fall are eligible for swimming.

The Manchester Recreation Department will provide the swimming instruction four days each week with Dewey Smith from the Manchester Recreation Department as the instructors.
