PRODUCTION OF FED CATTLE IN CONFINEMENT received support from University of Arkansas test results. Sters in close confinement of 32 square feet per animal gained 3.02 pounds daily compared with 2.06 pounds among steers having 556 square feet. Confined steers ate 2.64 pounds less feed per day and required 1.43 fewer pounds of feed per pound of gain. Results will vary, of course, with feed-lot conditions and time of year.

GRAZE PASTURE IN "SHIFTS" to get top milk production. Rotational grazing has long been recognized as one way to boost pasture yields. A new twist is to turn the milking herd in to graze the most nutritious forage first, then finish off with dry cows and heifers.
