





26 TON CRANE GETS DUNKED

Someone who has always wanted to drive a crane did Sunday at Manchester. A 26-ton Washenaw County Road Commission crane was driven into the Raisin River at the eastern village limits and it took a road grader and gravel loader to free it.

The crane was being used in remodeling the bridge which crosses Austin Road, just east of the village limits. The crane was being used to lift the decking at the bridge site.

NEW SHELTERS FOR CARR PARK

**KNOW YOUR MICHIGAN LAW**

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs would do well to consult a private attorney.)

Consumers are often victimized by contracts they do not understand. Naturally, most consumers have a limited knowledge of the techniques used in drafting a formal contract. Perhaps for this reason they feel that they are at fault if the contract they are asked to sign is not clear to them. Nothing could be further from the truth.

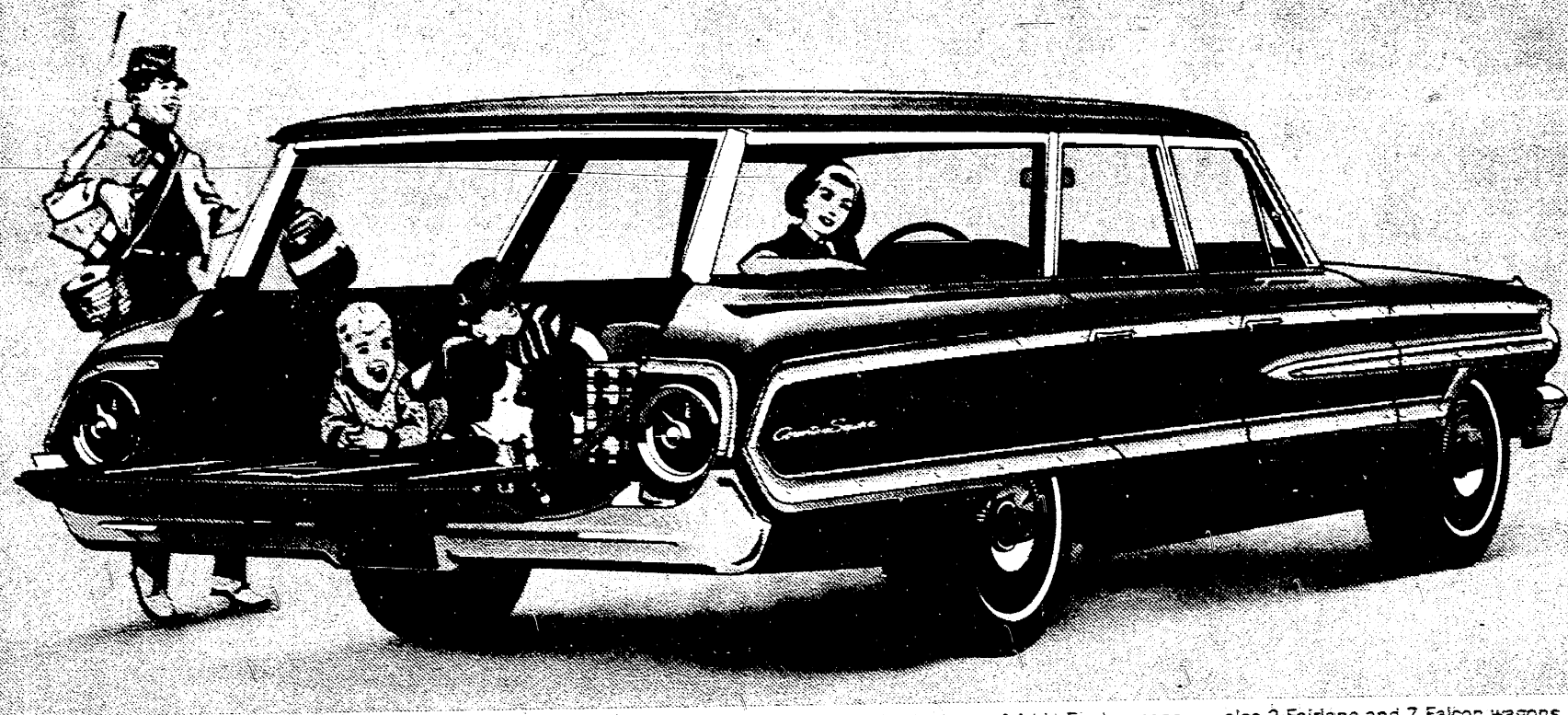
After all, any seller of goods or services wants the consumer to buy. It is the seller's obligation to present the prospective purchaser with a contract he can read and understand. It is not the buyers' fault if he cannot understand the sales contract. Indeed, to understand many of the con-

tracts would tax the ability of the finest lawyers.

If a proposed contract involves a larger sum, it, of course, should be discussed with your lawyer. But even contracts for smaller amounts which you do not feel are important enough to take up with an attorney should not be signed if they are

not understood fully. And do not rely on what the salesman says the contract means. His opinion will not help you in a law suit based on the contract. Don't sign what you don't understand.

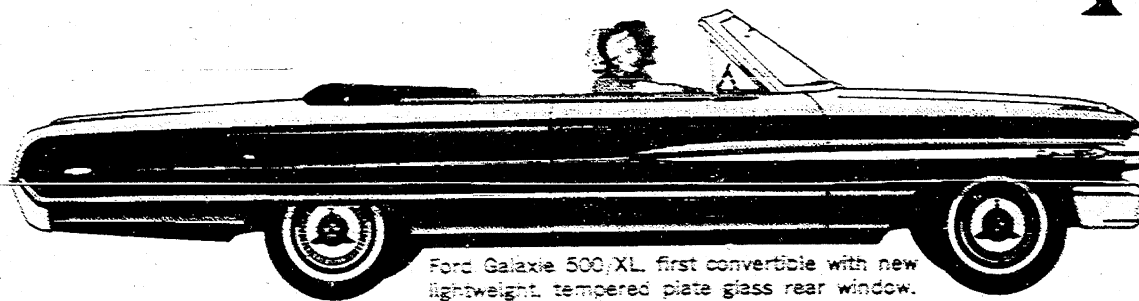

Ten foot cantilever roof overhang is useful to provide shelter when manger is located along the free of frame leg. It is also used along the open side of a cattle shed to keep rain and snow out of bedded area as well as to provide more shade in summer.

Pruden frame sheds are frequently used to shelter cattle in one end, and to store hay in the other. This building near Brussels, Wisconsin, uses the mill type of metal roofing on wall as well as roof.

Hay is fed directly into feed bunk under cantilever. Note how hay can be "poked to the peak" where there are no internal posts, ties or framework in the usable storage area.

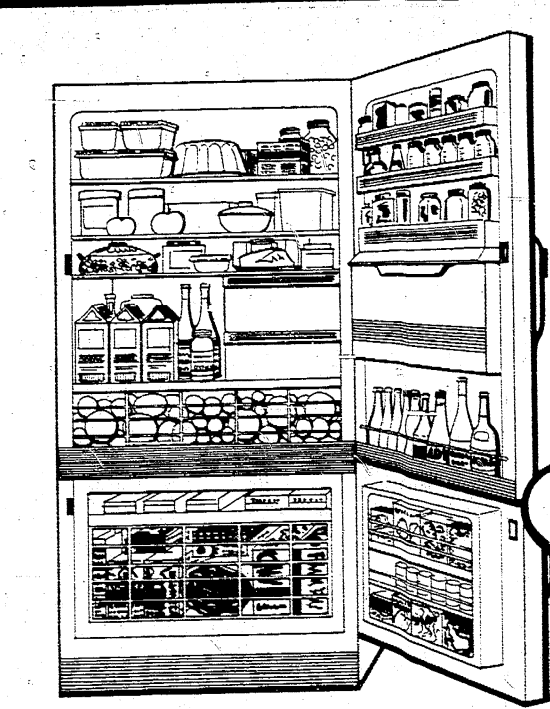

## SUPERINTENDENT ACCEPTS NEW POST

Harold Springsteen, Superintendent of the Manchester Public Schools, asked to be released from his contract at a special meeting of the Manchester Board of Education Monday evening, June 22nd. The Board granted his release.

Springsteen will be accepting the position as Superintendent of the Montcalm Central School system, located in the central part of the state.

He served as Superintendent of the Manchester Schools since July 1, 1963. Prior to coming to Manchester, he served as high school principal and then as Superintendent of the Sheridan Public Schools for a period of six years. In May of 1963 the Sheridan and Stanton School District consolidated to form the Central Montcalm School District. It is to this newly formed district that Mr. Springsteen will be going. It is a Class "B" system with a total enrollment of 1800.

In his letter of resignation, Springsteen stated that the decision to leave Manchester was a very difficult one. "You (the Manchester School Board) for many years, including my tenure here, have been sensitive and responsive to the educational needs of Manchester children and your record of supporting good education speaks for itself. I feel extremely fortunate for having had the experience of working with you. In addition to my fine relationship with you, the community of Manchester has been most kind and gracious to us. Its friendly people and the strong support they have given the school will always highlight our memories of the community."

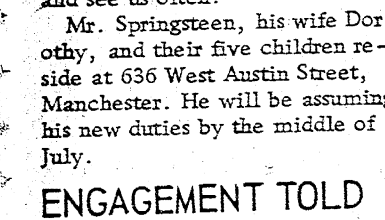
Mr. Luther Klager, President of the Manchester Board expressed regrets regarding the superintendent's decision to leave the district.

"I know I speak on behalf of the Board and faculty when I say we are sorry to lose Mr. Springsteen. During the year plans have been made for introducing educational television into our system. We have discussed a tentative vocational educational education program and steps have been taken to determine the best way to implement it. A citizen's study group has been formed to study and make recommendations to the Board for additional classroom facilities. We have a good beginning in these areas and we're grateful to Harold for the leadership he has provided. We wish him every success in his new position and we hope he will come back and see us often."

Mr. Springsteen, his wife Dorothy, and their five children reside at 636 West Austin Street, Manchester. He will be assuming his new duties by the middle of July.

**POST-EMERGENCE WEED SPRAYS FOR CORN** give a second chance for controlling weeds. There are several materials now available for doing the job including 2, 4-D, Lortox and Dalapon. With the exception of 2, 4-D, these materials need to be applied as a directed spray, as illustrated, to avoid injury to the corn. Ideally, corn needs to be about twice as tall as the weeds. Best kill is obtained when weeds are 6 inches or less.

**PRODUCTION OF FEED CATTLE IN CONFINEMENT** received support from University of Arkansas test results. Steers in close confinement of 22 square feet per animal gained 302 pounds during 56 weeks compared with 206 pounds among steers having 556 square feet. Confined steers ate 2.64 pounds less feed per day and required 1.43 fewer pounds of feed per pound of gain. Results will vary, of course, with feed-lot conditions and time of year.

**GRAZE PASTURE IN "SHIFTS"** to get top milk production. Rotational grazing has long been recognized as one way to boost pasture yields. A new twist is to turn the milking herd in to graze the most nutritious forage first, then finish off with dry cows and heifers. In a Virginia test, "two shift" milking cows produced seven more pounds than milking cows turned in to graze the remaining half of the available forage.
