SUPERINTENDENT ACCEPTS NEW POST

Harold Springsteen, Superintendent of the Manchester Public Schools, asked to be released from his contract at a special meeting of the Manchester Board of Education Monday evening, June 22nd. The Board granted his release.

Springsteen will be accepting the position as Superintendent of the Montcalm Central School system, located in the central part of the state.

He served as Superintendent of the Manchester Schools since July 1, 1963. Prior to coming to Manchester, he served as high school principal and then as Superintendent of the Sheridan Public Schools for a period of six years. In May of 1963 the Sheridan and Stanton School District consolidated to form the Central Montcalm School District. It is to this newly formed district that Mr. Springsteen will be going. It is a Class "B" system with a total enrollment of 1800.

In his letter of resignation, Springsteen stated that the decision to leave Manchester was a very difficult one. "You (the Manchester School Board) for many years, including my tenure here, have been sensitive and responsive to the educational needs of Manchester children and your record of supporting good education speaks for itself. I feel extremely fortunate for having had the experience of working with you. In addition to my fine relationship with you, the community of Manchester has been most kind and gracious to us. Its friendly people and the strong support they have given the school will always highlight our memories of the community."

Mr. Luther Klager, President of the Manchester Board expressed regrets regarding the superintendent's decision to leave the district.

"I know I speak on behalf of the Board and faculty when I say we are sorry to lose Mr. Springsteen. During the year plans have been made for introducing educational television into our system. We have discussed a tentative vocational educational education program and steps have been taken to determine the best way to implement it. A citizen's study group has been formed to study and make recommendations to the Board for additional classroom facilities. We have a good beginning in these areas and we're grateful to Harold for the leadership he has provided. We wish him every success in his new position and we hope he will come back and see us often."

Mr. Springsteen, his wife Dorothy, and their five children reside at 636 West Austin Street, Manchester. He will be assuming his new duties by the middle of July.

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DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING.

POST-EMERGENCE WEED SPRAYS FOR CORN give a second chance for controlling weeds. There are several materials now available for doing the job including 2, 4-D, Lortox and Dalapon. With the exception of 2, 4-D, these materials need to be applied as a directed spray, as illustrated, to avoid injury to the corn. Ideally, corn needs to be about twice as tall as the weeds. Best kill is obtained when weeds are 6 inches or less.

PRODUCTION OF FEED CATTLE IN CONFIDENT received support from University of Arkansas test results. Steers in close confinement of 22 square feet per animal gained 3.02 pounds daily compared with 2.06 pounds among steers having 556 square feet. Confined steers ate 2.64 pounds less feed per day and required 1.43 fewer pounds of feed per pound of gain. Results will vary, of course, with feed-lot conditions and time of year.

GRAZE PASTURE IN "SHIFTS" to get top milk production. Rotational grazing has long been recognized as one way to boost pasture yields. A new twist is to turn the milking herd in to graze the most nutritious forage first, then finish off with dry cows and heifers. In a Virginia test, "true shift" milking cows produced seven more pounds than milking cows turned in to graze the remaining half of the available forage.

OIL CONTAMINATED WELLS. WATER can result from a leaking fuel oil tank located too close to a well. If you have a fuel oil tank more than 10 years old which is buried near your well, better think about replacing it. Whether replacing an old tank or installing a new one, bury it at least 300 feet from your well.

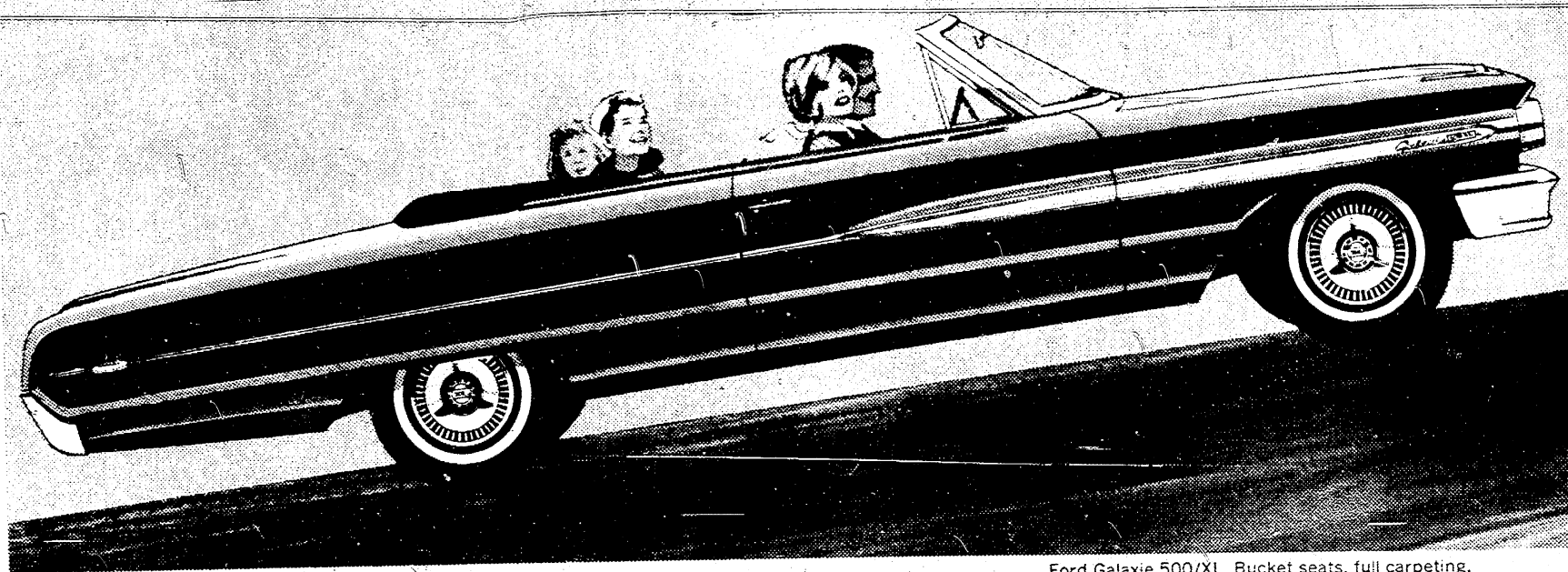
HILLSDALE DRIVER IS TRIPLE VICTOR

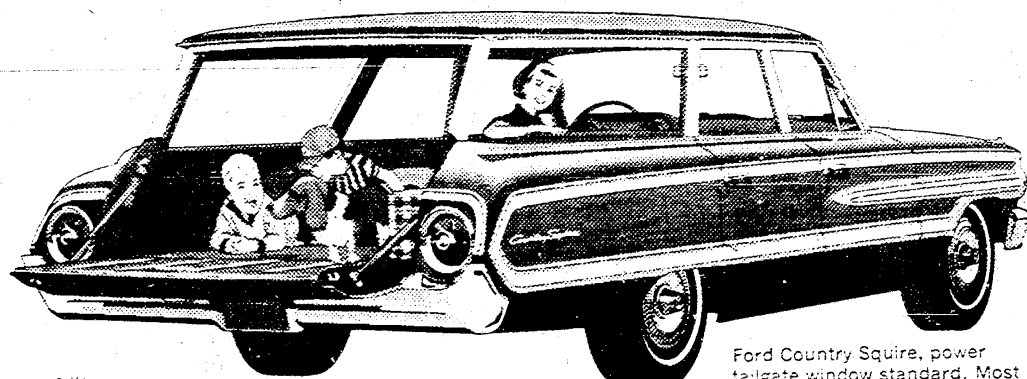

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BATTLE ON BEETLE SPREADS

Thirteen additional counties and parts of two others have been added to the 17 counties in southern Michigan already under quarantine for the cereal leaf beetle, Agriculture Department Director George McIntyre said.

The intention of the quarantine is to halt the spread of the beetle, which also is prevalent in Indiana and Ohio. The insect is a major destroyer of such growing cereal grains as oats, rye, barley, wheat and similar crops.

Included new counties are the townships of Sylvan, Sharon, Manchester, Freedom, Bridgewater, Saline and York in Washtenaw.

The quarantine requires an inspection certificate for the movement of anything out of the counties that might carry the cereal leaf beetle.

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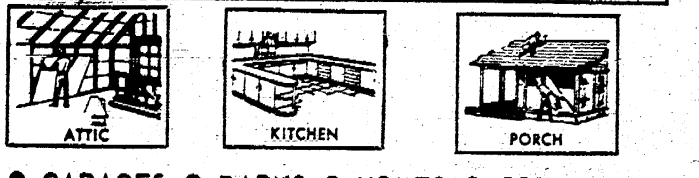

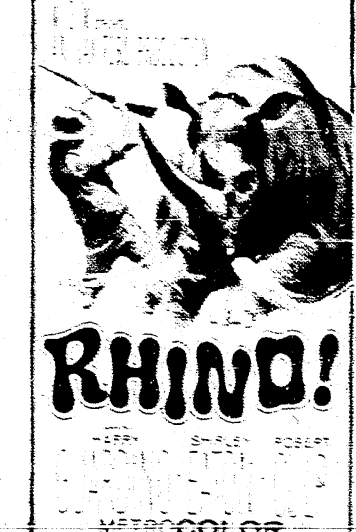

MOVING OF MEMORIAL STONE A WEIGHTY PROBLEM

Memorial stone in the village park at the northeast edge of the Main Street Bridge has been the target of a lot of controversy. And its a pretty weighty problem-

There is a definite parking problem on east Main Street, especially for the super food market. An enterprising group of business men, the Manchester Development Company bought and tore down the old Conklin Building to make way for a small parking area for the market, which they also own.

The village park, next to the Raisin River and adjoining the Development Company's land, offered a 10 foot strip to the Company in order to expand the small parking area. The park boasts of only one thing-the memorial stone with the names of Manchester area soldiers who gave their lives in World Wars I and II.

The Development Company offered to move the stone to another location if the people responsible for its location approved.

Mrs. Mike Wolfe was president of the Manchester MOMS back in 1949 when it was decided to dispose of the honor roll which had the names of all service men from the area. It was Mrs. Wolfe and the MOMS club who had decided to see what best suited the needs of the community in the kind of memorial to be erected. She invited a group of local citizens to her home to make plans for a suitable memorial.

In April 1949 the Manchester Enterprise carried the story of the first meeting and the names of the people who attended including village president, L. V. Kirk; Commander of the American Legion Post, Russell Middlemiss; Chamber of Commerce, Mike Wolfe; MacCabe's, Carl Wuerthner; Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. Basil Schwab; and from the MOMs, Mrs. Clayton Parr, Mrs. Herman Weidman and Mrs. Wolfe.

There was little money to be found for this project and it was decided to try and find a large field stone which would be suitable Mrs. Schwab, Russell Middlemiss

and Harold Alexander were named to find the stone and the present one was located by Mrs. Schwab near the Chrysler Proving Ground, hauled in by Louis Aiken's Moving Company for ten dollars. The committee to see that the plaque was mounted including the village president, Kirk, Wolfe and Carl Wuerthner.

The stone was set in a concrete foundation by Melvin Hesel-schwert for \$12 and the Truesdale Monument Co. mounted the plaque for \$67.50. This was the actual cost of the memorial stone.

So again, Mrs. Wolfe called a meeting of the same organization, many were the same representatives to find out their thinking on moving memorial stone. They decided they would like to have it moved to Wurster Memorial Park, and placed in front of the library.

An air hammer rang out as it worked to free the stone from its concrete bed and by the close of the day there was the stone free of concrete.

Within the next few days it is expected that it will be hauled down Main Street and placed in front of the library. Robert Lowery and L. V. Kirk were appointed to a committee to see that posts with a chain are placed around it in front of the library.

An interesting note is that Mrs. Basil Schwab, who was president of the American Legion Auxiliary in 1949 and Mrs. C. W. Knass was the Auxiliary treasurer at that time were both re-elected to the same offices 15 years later and the first problems they face will be helping to get the memorial stone located. Fifteen years ago they were finding the stone and we are wondering if they aren't wishing they hadn't picked such a weighty one-in a concrete base.

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SENIOR CITIZENS ENJOY HIDDEN GARDENS

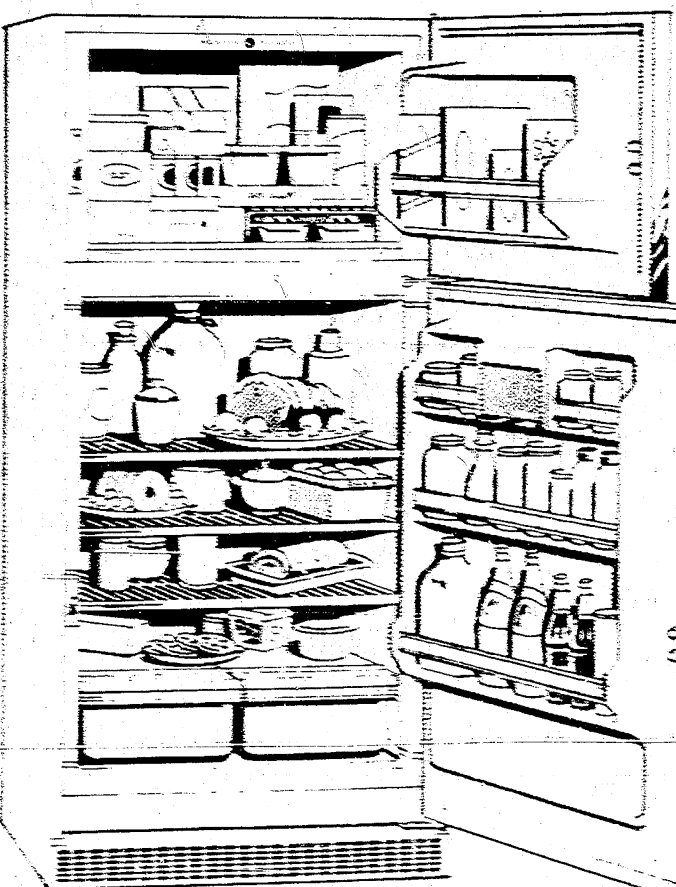
