Village president, Eugene Bentschneider says that the company outlined three important factors: First-they will need an adequate water supply, primarily for a fire chester and Peggy Davis of Saline. revention sprinkling system. It is apparent that Manchester will have to put out some effort and money to bring industry into town and this, the village officials feel they are prepared to do. "We want new industry here," Bentschneider pointed out. "The company's thinking and the things they feel they will be needing are not out of line. Anyone can see the necessity of an adequate water supply, sewer and roads. These are essential to the operation of any business. As for the water supply-this problem has been with us for some time, and the only solution seems to be

sinking a new well." People on the street seem to be taking a very optimistic view of the possibility of a new industry coming into town and many have expressed hope that every possible means will be taken to make Manchester just a little more attractive than the other three sites now under consideration by

### TOWNSHIP APPROVES REZONING

Manchester Library

P.O. Manchester

At an hour-long meeting Wednesday night, the Manchester Zoning Board approved the rezoning of a part of the Lowell Parr farm from agricultural to commercial.

James C. Hendley, who has the option on the Parr property, opened the meeting and explained that Hoover Ball & Bearing is considering putting a 40,000 square foot manufacturing plant and a 3,000 square foot office on the Parr Property. A plant this size will employ about a hundred people, some women. Hiring will be done from the local area whenever possible. He pointed out that people who are interested, have only to drive to any of the Hoover Ball facilities to note that they are clean, neat and very

well maintained inside and out. The zoning board unanimously approved the rezoning of 18.1 acres in Manchester township (the north end of the Parr property) between Sooten and M-52 from

Agricultural to Commerical. Allen W. Schaffer, on behalf of he citizens present, made a motion to favor the rezoning measure. This was promptly supported by L. V. Kirk and unanimously approved by the 41 present. chaffer suggested that this upporting measure be written into the minutes of the meeting. The county (Washtenaw) must still pprove the rezoning before it is ffective.

Interested people say that they tope that a much larger representation will be present at next Monday's meeting. Everyone seems seems anxious to do everything possible to bring industry into the village. Village president, Eugene Bentschneider says that the village has promised to give Hoover Ball Bearing representatives their answer following next Monday's Council meeting on the improving of roads, sewer and water supply, if the plant moves to the Manchester location.






