Boys and girls interested in enrolling in the 1965 beef program should contact the county extension office or a club leader advises the National 4-H Service committee.



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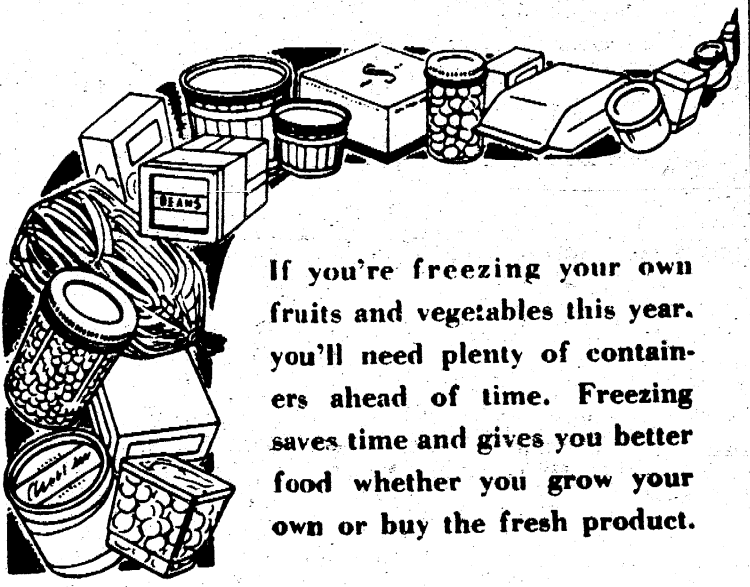

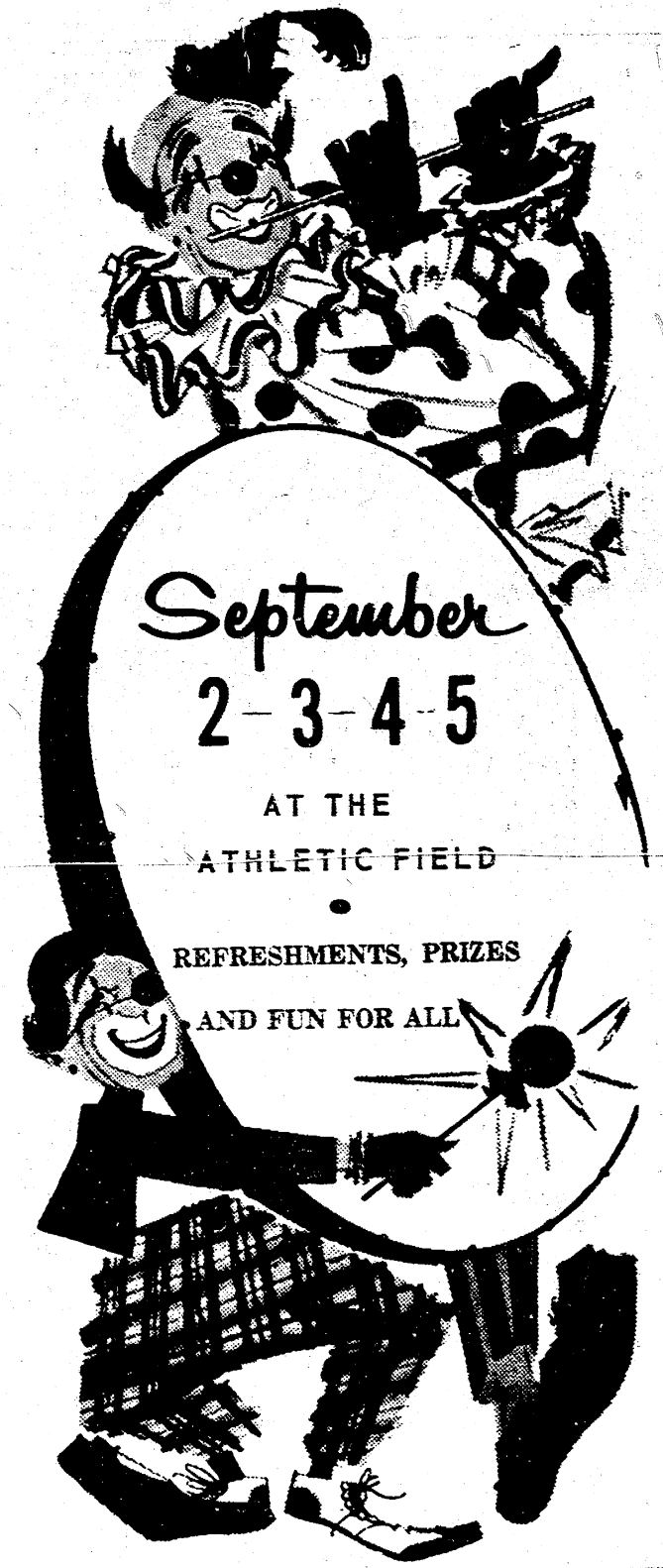

REZONING APPROVED BY VILLAGE COUNCIL

Let's put out the red carpet for Hoover Ball & Bearing. That was the general opinion which by standers got when they attended Monday's Council meeting at the township hall. The council room was full and interested spectators spilled over into the hallway.

All this was good for it showed that a large number of people are more than mildly interested in seeing Manchester progress.

J. C. Hendley, acting for the company and presenting the facts to the council, did much to clarify some of the questions.

It was clearly brought out that the Manchester Township and Village Zoning Ordinances have a list of 47 types of manufacturing concerns which cannot be put into operation in Manchester. Hoover Ball & Bearing is not in any of these categories. Their plants in this area speak for themselves as to what they add to the communities in which they are located.

If the plant moves in it will face M-52 and not Sooten Road. The council unanimously approved the rezoning of the 1.9 acres of the Lowell Farm farm, which is in the village, from agricultural to commercial.

Manchester township board last week approved the rezoning of about 18.5 acres of the farm from agricultural to commercial. The tract of land is slated as a plant site for Hoover Ball & Bearing Co. of Ann Arbor.

Luther Klager, on behalf of the public assembled asked that a motion be made for the village clerk to insert a note in the minutes, that the assembled people also go on record as approving the measure. His motion was supported by Ed. Galloway. There was no dissenting vote when the vote was taken by Village president, Eugene Bentschneider.

People took advantage of their right to express an opinion and to ask questions during the hour-long time which was open to the public for their views. All of this shows that folks in town are anxious to progress but at the same time they want to know all the facts concerning any change in policy.

The Council also named a committee to study a request by the company to set up a water supply system, sewage disposal, and a road to the plant site.

Three councilmen were named to the committee along with village president Eugene Bentschneider. They are: Public Works department head, Basil McGuire, finance committee head, Robert Clark; and Donald Dorff.

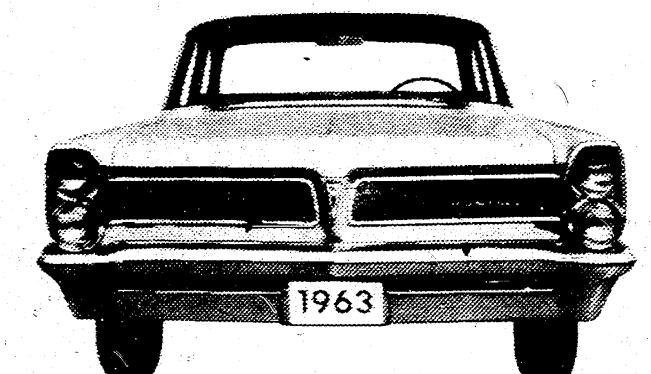

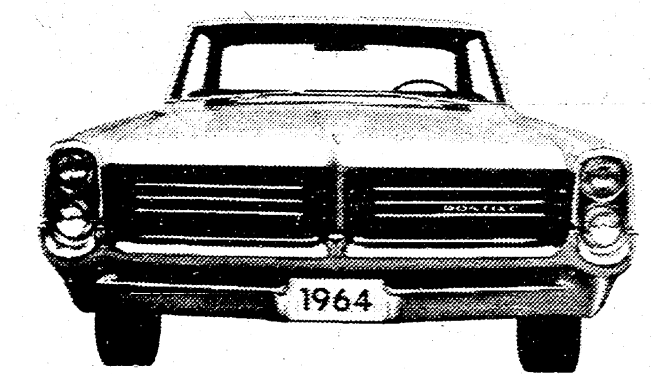
