These candy makers study the weather carefully. Many times their original plans have had to be changed because of a studden warming of temperature. These marble slabs must be cold. If the slabs are very thick, the experts say they can use the mark for three batches before setting it out to get cold again. That is

they can "if" they work fast. Oh, yes! a good thermometer is a must for heating this delecta able mixture to exactly 300 degrees. The thermometer should be steel, an all glass one would break too quickly. They know. They have had experience with both and they break them too.

This well guarded receipe came to town from a friend of one of the band boosters in Ohio. She told the Manchester top band booster president how her group made money in this unique way.

This week the local candy makers did away with about a hundred pounds of sugar, about five pails of white Karo syrup and a sizable amount of pure oil of cinnamon, cloves, lemon, orange and our v favorite powdered charcoal and annis, which makes a delectable icorice candy. There is a wintergreen flavor too, Each batch is carefully colored. Mrs. Robert Armentrout, who has worked making candy every year says that her only sad experience was burning a single batch. That was the time that the thermometer broke.

These elves in their workshop must work fast, that is a trick of the trade. When the candy is poured on the cold marble it cools around the edges very fast and this must be turned in quickly and other portions allowed to cool. At exactly the right consistancy the sweet mass is cut with a shears into strips and powdered with confectioners' sugar and later snipped into bite sized pieces.

They plan making about 50 batches a day, one crew of women and when they are finished they have between 115 and 130 pounds

This candy making project is truly, "sugar, spice and everything

Sometimes the ladies are lucky and can engage a few of the fathers of band members to join in and help with the heavy work of carrying the marble slabs around for them. It all depends on who has the time when the weather is right to work.

The Band Boosters need a lot of candy made this year. They have an extra need for the money. This year there are more students in the band than at any time in the history of the school. The Band Boosters and the school split the cost of the uniforms.

The membership in band jumped from 55 last year to 70 this year. Four students are sent for two weeks to Camp at Interlochen and two are sent to a drum majors' camp in Indiana. The band awards are purchased by the Band Boosters' Club.

The Christmas candy is sold in conjunction with the annual Christmas Concert Tuesday, December 15 and again in February at the Variety Show.

The candy makers will tell you that there is something fascinating about making the candy and that they really enjoy doing it. As for the ordinary person wanting the receipe, we doubt it. Most of us do not have that first requirement that marble slab, and secondly. we aren't interested in taking a chance on having it land on our toes Then too, who wants to stock up on a lot of oil flavoring we would have little use for?

Mrs. Bernard Kemner and Mrs. Leon Heimerdinger head the publicity committee for the candy project. It is packaged out at the home of the president, Mrs. Al Vogel and orders can be left with these people, by people who find it impossible to pick it up the night of the concert.



For the eastern horizon is host to some of the most striking and colorful constellations of the year, according to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel Losh "Auriga, the large five -sided figure, ruled by the bright yellow

star, Capella, rises soon after sunset. "The winter constellations center mostly around Orion. With his Hunting Dogs, this giant with the red star strides across the souther

Miss Losh continues by saying that Sirius is easily identified by extending a line downward through the Belt of Stars of Orion. From time immemorial, Sirius has been watched, admired and revered rising as it does in the early evenings around Christmas time. It was the 'Star of the East', pointed to by 'Three Wise Men of Orion'

"Fittingly, the Northern Cross is steadily moving toward the west. and may be seen to splendid advantage on Christmas Eve. After dark, it will stand upright against the western sky, a beautiful symbol of the season," Dr. Losh said.

tion 1. DEFINITIONS. The term "public place" as used in S Chapter shall mean any street, alley, park, public building, ly place of business or assembly open to or frequented by the blic, and other place which is open to the public view, or to hich the public has access.

ction 2. ACTS PROHIBITED. No person shall:

1) Commit an assault, or an assault and battery on any person; (2) Be drunk in any public place or under the influence of any cotic drug in any public place;

(3) Drive or attempt to drive or operate any motor vehicle on y highway within the Village of Manchester while showing any dence of having drunk intoxicating liquor;

(4) Discharge any firearm, air rifle, air pistol or bow and row in the Village, except when in connection with a regularly cheduled educational or training program under adequate super-

(5) Fire, discharge, display, or possess any fireworks except the type and under the conditions permitted by Chapter 39 of Penal Code of the State of Michigan, as last amended by

(18) Loiter on any street or sidewalk or in any park or public lding or conduct himself in any public place so as to obstruct free and uninterrupted passage of the public;

19) Play any ball game in any public street or sidewalk or erwise obstruct traffic on any street or sidewalk by collectin groups thereon, for any purpose;

20) Engage in any act of prostitution; Attend, frequent, operate or be an occupant or inmate of place where prostitution, gambling, the illegal sale of incating liquor, or where any other illegal or immoral business cupation is permitted or conducted;

22) Engage in prostitution, gambling, the illegal sale of xicating liquor, or any other illegal or immoral business or upation. Proof of recent reputation for engaging in prostitutgambling, illegal sale of intoxicating liquor, or other illegal moral occupation or business shall be prima-facie evide of being engaged or occupied therein;

23) Solicit or accost any person for the purpose of inducing commission of any illegal or immoral act;

(27) Permit or suffer any place occupied or controlled by him to be a resort of noisy, boisterous, or disorderly persons; (28) Obstruct, resist, hinder, or oppose any member of the police force, or any peace of ficer in the discharge of his duties as such;

(29) Wander about the streets, either by day or night, or loiter in any public building, without any lawful means of support or without being able to give satisfactory account of

(39) Prowl about any alley or the private premises of any person in the nighttime, without authority or the permission of the owner of such premises.

(31) Spit on any sidewalk or on the floor or seat of any public assemblage;

(32) Wrongfully throw or propel any snowball, missile or object from any moving automobile;

(33) Wrongfully throw or propel any snowball, missile or

object toward any person or automobile; (34) Neglect or fail to support his wife, children or family, if he shall have sufficient ability to do so, or leave or desert his wife children or family without sufficient means of support; (35) Vend, sell or distribute in any manner whatsoever, any article or medicinal preparation primarily manufactured for, or which may be used as, a contraceptive except sales or distribu-

tions by or to any licensed medical practitioner or registered

pharmacist; (36) Wilfully destroy, remove, damage, alter or in any manner deface any property not his own, or any public school building, or any public building, bridge, fire hydrant, alarm box, street light, street sign, traffic control device, railroad sign or signal, parking meter, or shade tree belonging to the Village or located in the public places of the Village, or mark or post handbills on, or in any manner mar the walls of, any public building, or fence, tree, or pole within the Village, or destroy, take, or meddle with any property belonging to the Village, or remove the same from the building or place where it may be kept, placed, or stored, without proper authority;

(37) Summon, as a joke or prank or otherwise without any good reason therefor, by telephone or otherwise, the Police or the Fire Department or any public or private ambulance to go to any address where the service called for is not needed;

(38) Go upon the lands of another or upon the right of way of any railroad company, or climb, stand in or upon any tree for the purpose of witnessing or looking at any football game, baseball game or other athletic sports or games whatooever, or any fair, show or other entertainment whatsoever, without the consent and permission of the owner or occupant of such lands, right of way or the owner of any such tree;

(39) I f under the age of twenty-one (21) years be in the possession of alcoholic beverages as defined by the appropriate statutes of the State of Michigan;

(40) Furnish alcoholic beverages as defined by the appropriate statutes of the State of Michigan to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 3. VIOLATION. Any person doing any of the acts, things, or doing in the last preceding section prohibited shall be deemed a disorderly person, and to be guilty of disorderly conduct and on conviction thereof shall be punished for every such offense by a fine of not more than one hundred (100) dollars or imprisonment in the Washtenaw County Jail for a period of not longer than ninety (90) days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 4. REPEAL. Ordinance number entitled an ordinance relative to disorderly persons and disorderly conduct and ordinance number 57 amending ordinance number 8, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced twenty (20) days after legal publi-

Section 6. VALIDITY. Should any section, clause or provision of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

COMMITTEE ON ANTI POVERTY TO MEET JANUARY 5th

Washtenaw County's anti-poverty effort is getting underway and interested individuals have outlined the membership of a community action committee which will decide where the greatest need is and screen proposals for federal and anti-povery funds.

A full group of representatives from governmental units, public and private agencies and civic organizations will meet January 5 to consider nominations of a sixman nominating committee.

Tentatively on the nominating committee are Curt Will, chairman of the County Board of Supervisors; Guy Larcom, Ann Arbor city administrator, Dr. Albert Wheeler, civil rights leader; Robert Kershbaum, executive director of the Ann Arbor Area United Fund; and John Salcau, Ypsilanti Public chools curriculum director .

A representative of the Washtenaw School Superintendents Association will be a member of the nominating group.

A guideline for representation on the community action committee, as set up gives the county two members, one an administrator and one a supervisor. The county's three cities together, one member the four villages together; one member; and all schools, together an administrative and a board

It also includes representation for the community services organization and a single member from each of the following: civil rights groups, labor, Farm Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, the med rofession, churches, the professional social workers and Planned Parenthood.

Three citizens-at-large may be chosen and the Michigan Employnent Security Commission will be represented.

It is believed that a county of this size would probably be eligible for \$500,000. Programs initiated under the anti-poverty act should concentrate on the most poverty stricken areas to have the best effect, according to Malcom Lovell, director of the State Office of Economic Opportunity.

The role of the community action committee will be to do broad planning and to screen proposals from a wide variety of






