Village President Comments On Community College

Friday of this week, we will be voting on the issue of a Community College and also for trustees for this college. The need for a college of this type in our county is very great, we have students going to Junior Colleges in neighboring counties, which due to increasing enrollment will soon close their doors to anyone outside their area.

Mrs. Vogel is a member of the Washtenaw County Intermediate School District Board and has served as Vice Chairman the past three years. She is a past president of the Pleasant Lake Parent Teacher Association and Past President of Western Area PTA Council.



Mrs. Florence A. Mayer served on the education needs committee of the citizens' survey to determine the possibilities of a community college for this county.



Mrs. Elvira Vogel is a native Iowan and upon graduation from State College of Iowa at Cedar Falls, Iowa with majors in Economics and Business Education.

The special election on January 15 is an important one! There will be three issues on the ballot. 1. To establish a Washtenaw County Community College.

For the past two years studies have been made in the county to determine the need for a community college. It has been established that at least forty per cent of the high school youth would be interested in a special kind of training in semi-professional, vocational or technical programs, and others are interested in a general education of liberal arts.

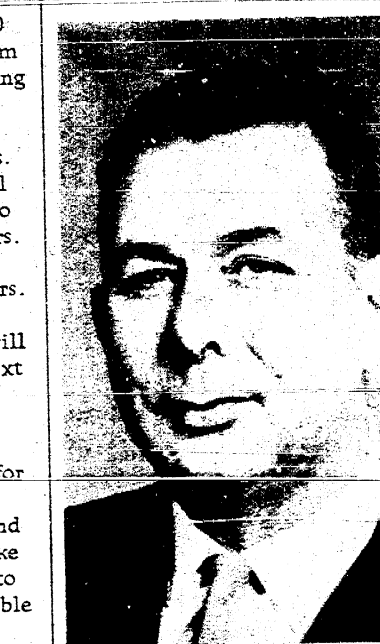
Federal and State Funds are available to help in financing the construction of a community college, to provide student loans, and to purchase specific kinds of equipment. Washtenaw could be taking advantage of continuing education for persons interested in special classes for upgrading in their jobs, for retraining for those who have been automated out of their present employment, for persons who have been wanting to receive basics and transfer to a four year program later, and for those who want to develop or improve skills so that they will have a marketable skill or vocation.

Attorney General Kelley continued work at the University of Detroit College of Commerce and graduated from the University of Detroit Law School. He is at the University of Michigan as vice-president of the student body and was a member of Moot Court, Law Journal, Alpha Kappa Psi, a commerce fraternity, and Gamma Eta Gamma legal fraternity.

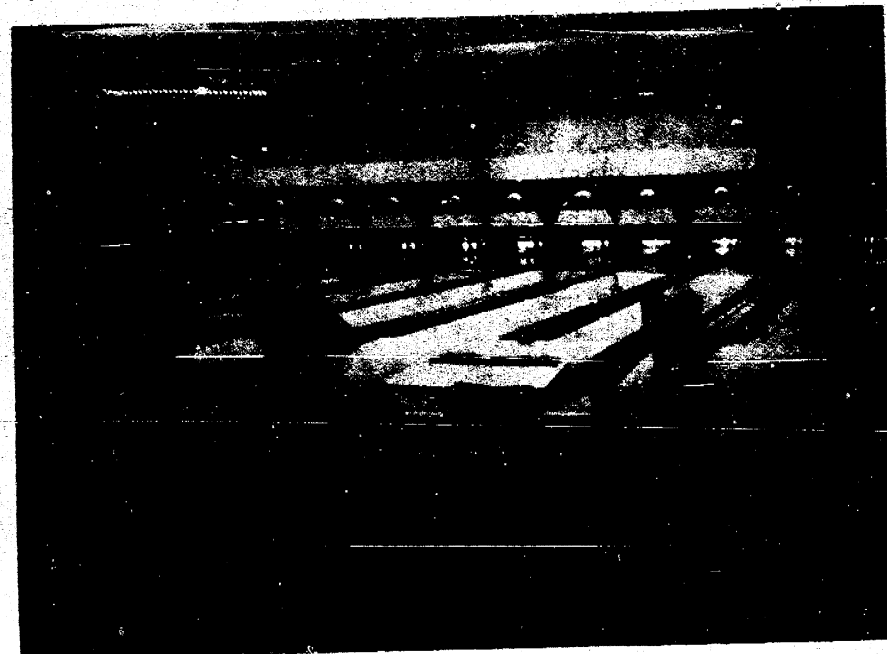

SEVEN HEPATITIS CASES REPORTED IN COUNTY

Since Thanksgiving Day 7 cases of infectious hepatitis have been reported in the county—namely in Milan, Dexter and Whitmore Lake areas, according to Dr. Otto K. Engelke, Director of the Washtenaw County Health Department.

He said that five of the seven reported cases of hepatitis have come from Milan, while one has been reported in Dexter and another in Livingston County, just out of Whitmore Lake.

Washtenaw has had 44 reported cases of hepatitis during 1964 as compared to 26 during 1963.

Dr. Engelke stressed that protective measures are extremely important in the prevention of hepatitis. "These can be accomplished," he said, "by a high standard of personal cleanliness and home sanitation." Eating utensils and glassware should be thoroughly cleaned.

Safe sewage disposal is essential, preferably by means of a public sewer or a septic tank system in perfect operating condition.

Dr. Engelke said that strict quarantine for people with known cases of hepatitis is not emphasized because many contagious cases of the disease are so mild that they cannot be seen by a doctor and are not diagnosed. Because of these subclinical or mild cases of hepatitis in the community unnumbered the diagnosed cases it is useless to quarantine or to close schools or institutions. Also the schools and institutions generally have well operated food operations and lavatory facilities.

Health Department Sanitarians are checking the schools in Milan and elsewhere to be certain that these facilities remain above reproach.

Dr. Engelke said that the symptoms of hepatitis include loss of appetite, nausea or vomiting, fever, muscle pains, abdominal distress and sometimes jaundice. He noted that individuals should notify their physicians if any of these symptoms are noticed.

Gamma Globulin injections may be recommended by physicians for the family contacts of a person who has hepatitis. Gamma Globulin does not prevent hepatitis—it may make the disease milder.

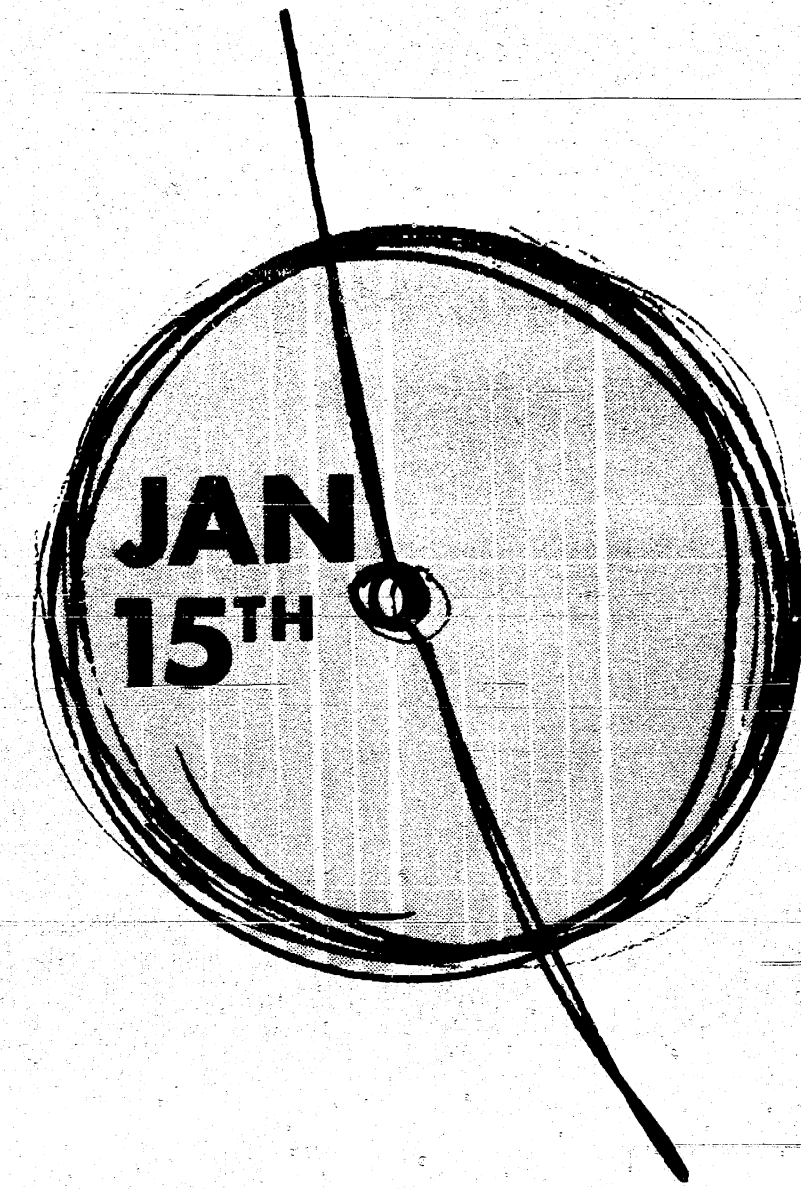
It will not prevent or curtail an outbreak of hepatitis. Its use for other than close family contacts is not recommended by Health authorities.

Dr. Engelke pointed out that no vaccines are available for the prevention of infectious hepatitis.

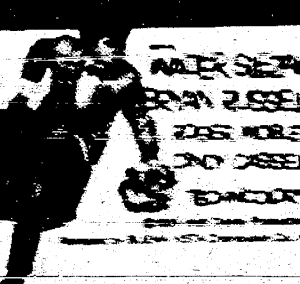

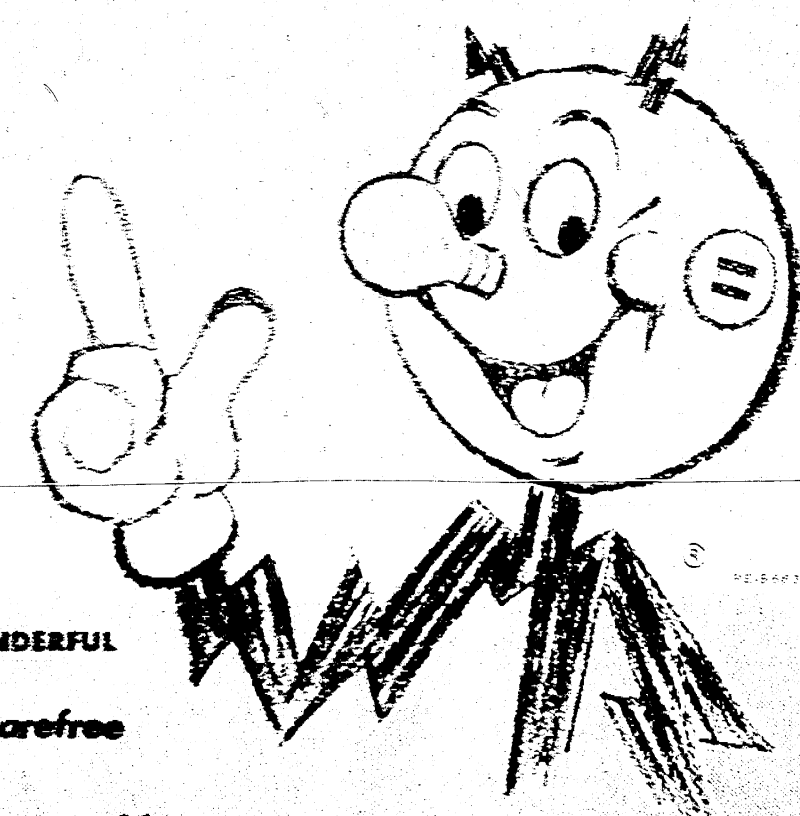

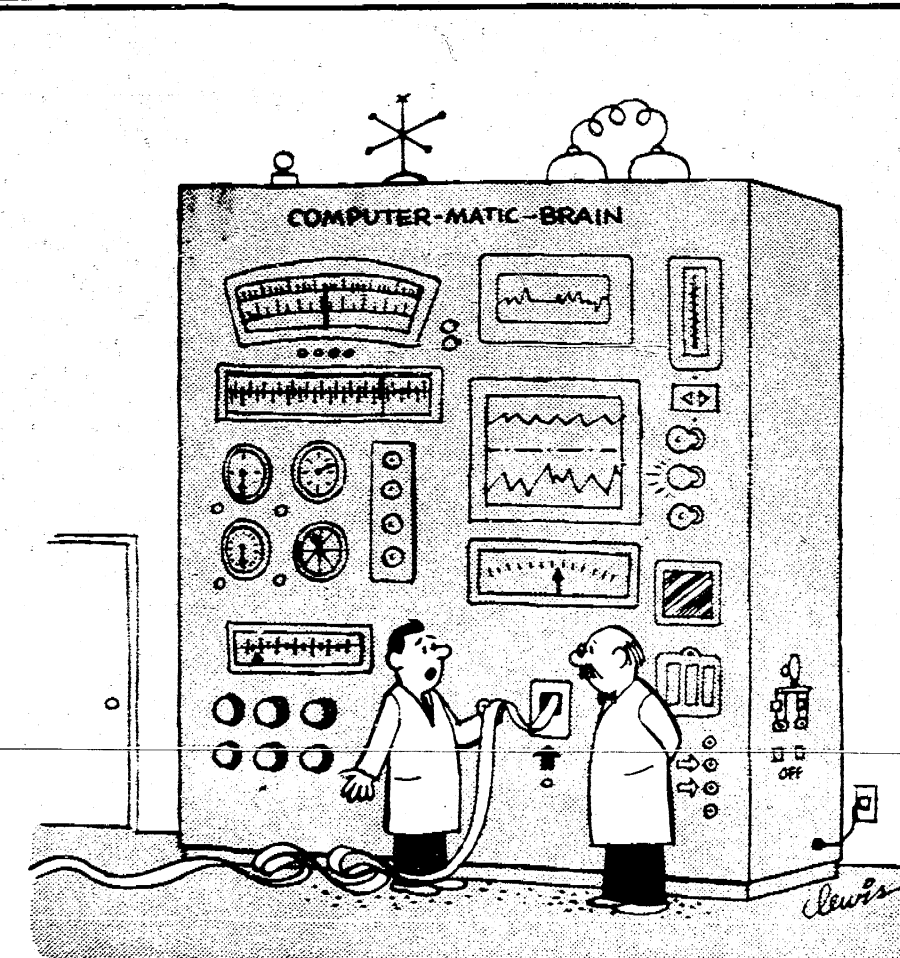
