

the college. For the past two years studies have been made in the county to determine the need for a community college. It has been establishd that at least forty per cent of the high school youth would be nterested in a special kind of training in semi-professional. vocational or technical programs. and others are interested in a general education of liberal arts. Many persons want and need this kind of special knowledge and they need it at a reasonable cost. Iniustry and business are calling for eople with special skills.

Federal and State Funds are vailable to help in financing the nstruction of a community college, to provide student loans, and to purchase specific kinds of quipment. Washtenaw could be aking advantage of continuing education for persons interested in special classes for upgrading in their jobs, for retraining for those who have been automated out of their present employment, for persons who have been wanting to eceive basics and transfer to a four year program later, and for those who want to develop or imrove skills so that they will have marketable skill or vocation.

This education could be proided at about \$250 a year, as compared with costs of about \$2000 a year in a state college and \$4000 a year in a private college. For those farmers whose children will be interested in agricultural short courses, business or industry, this could be a real advantage. An investment in an more value than funds spent later in corrective action-perhaps financial aid for those unemployed and untrained for other work, or for covering various osts of dealing with juvenille
