There will be a public meeting at 8 p.m. Monday, May 23, in the Nellie Ackerson School to discuss the budget needs and millage election on June 13.

The Board of Education is asking for 5 mills of extra operating money for the 1966-67 school year. This request represents an increase of 2 mills over last year's request.

School officials point out that these funds are needed if the school district is to maintain its current program and make improvements in its education offerings.

The 1966-67 school district budget is up about \$55,000 over last year's budget. A substantial amount of this increase will go to the teachers in the form of a salary improvement. Additional teachers to accommodate a growing enrollment and rising operational costs will also account for some of the increase.

The Manchester school system is growing both in enrollment and services, according to Superintendent Robert Swartz. Courses are being expanded in several areas, More improvements

are being contemplated for next year. All of the improvements will enhance and enrich each student's school experience regardless of the direction of the student relative to a college prep program or a vocational program, Swartz said.

Manchester will be offering Art instruction with a full time instructor; kindergarten through 12th grade; office machines course; expanded high school physical education program, including bowling golfing and swimming; expanded laboratory work in chemistry and in elementary and advanced biology; and improvements in the high school English program.

Improvements being considered include: An upper elementary and junior high guidance and counseling program; full time remedial reading teacher with expanded reading services available to high school students; and a more extensive mathematics program in the high school.

The latter includes a program to accommodate the vocational bound student, the college prep student and the gifted student. Also in the plans are: in-service training programs for teachers; an additional bus route to accommodate growing enrollment; and expanded bus route service.
