

supplies. The total school millage is up only 2.6 mills over last year, covering both the new high school debt and the increased operational

The total millage levied for 1966=67 is 16.22 compared to 14.22 for the year 1965-66 and 14.20 for 1964-65 school year. The school debt retirement amounts to 21.27 for 1966-67 com-

pared to 18.67 for 1965-66. Voters will also elect two nembers to the school board. Vieing for the posts are: incumbent, LoRen Trolz, also Clarence Fielder

School officials point out that although the Board is asking for a total of 5 mills extra operational mills above the allocated amount of 11.22 and the new building addition requires 3 mills, the total overall increase over last year is 2.6 mills.
