Supervisors Stymied On Bond Proposal

County Administration Theodore P. Szmuck read several pages of a proposal to authorize the issuance and sale of \$1,490,000 in bonds for a juvenile court center...

Tax payers had approved the bond issue in the November 8 election and the board was ready for a formal vote.

The board of supervisors is still working and won't have their work completed until next Wednesday.

PETITIONS MUST BE FILED FOR VILLAGE OFFICIALS

Manchester village clerk, Lyle Widmayer will be sending out notices of Suspension of Registration to about 75 electors of the village who have failed to vote in any village election in the past two years.

Upon receipt by the elector, the card must be signed and returned. Failure to do so will result in removal of the voter's credentials from the Village files.

Widmayer pointed out that the Village registration has no connection with the township, which handles all school, state and national elections. In order to vote in all elections, the prospective voter must be registered in both the village and the township.

Legislation also requires that all candidates for office must be nominated by a primary election whenever there is more than one candidate running.

The new law requires that candidates for village office are nominated by petition and must be filed with the village clerk no later than 4 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 3, 1967.

The petition moreover must bear signatures of at least one percent and not more than four percent of the registered village voters—which in Manchester is 528. This means that the petition should be signed by at least 6 and not more than 24 voters.

If necessary, the primary election will be held on Monday, Feb. 20th. The general village election will be Monday, March 13.

This new method of nominating officers replaces nomination by caucus and was designed to make it possible for any qualified citizen after filing proper credentials, to become a candidate for village office.

Anyone wishing petitions can obtain them from village clerk, Lyle Widmayer, after December 15th.

Needs Funds For Children

Whether or not some 200 children in Washtenaw have a Christmas gift will depend on the generosity of the people of the county, according to Probate Judge John W. Conlin.

He has been receiving numerous requests for shoes, sweaters and other articles in "letters to Santa" received by Juvenile Court workers as Christmas nears.

Judge Conlin says that he hopes every child who has been removed from their own homes and placed by the court in boarding schools, state training schools and hospitals and foster homes will be provided at least one gift.

He has set up a Juvenile Court donation fund to buy presents for wards of the court who will not be receiving gifts from their families or other sources.

Contributions can be made by sending money to Judge Conlin at the Washtenaw County Building, Ann Arbor.

Last year, Judge Conlin received barely enough in donations to stretch out to a gift for every child. The number of court wards rises every year, he pointed out.

This year he hopes to take in about \$1,000 in donations so that each of the court's children will get at least one gayly wrapped gift.

Assisting with the gift wrapping will be Junior Girl Scout Troops No. 258 of Patehill School and 80 of St. Francis School.

Women's Auxiliary of the Washtenaw County Bar Association will buy the gifts and assist with the wrapping. They will deliver the gifts to the children with Mrs. Joseph C. Hooper Jr. directing the project for the Auxiliary.

Children will get gifts in both the dependent and neglected and delinquent categories of court wards and include those in age from infants to 17-year-olds. He is asking that people give money rather than gifts because of the varied age groups and the need for definite articles by each.

The gifts have to be selected with a definite child in mind. So the court needs cash for the gifts.

Checks should be made out to Judge John W. Conlin.

Sheriff to Crack Down on School Bus Passers

Sheriff Douglas J. Harvey of Washtenaw County has "stepped up a get tough policy against motorists who pass school buses which have stopped on county roads to pick up or discharge passengers.

"We have issued violations citations to drivers in the past few months but some we have let go with warnings. But now there are no more warnings to violators—only tickets," Harvey said.

"It is physically impossible to have scout cars covering the route of all school buses using county roads. There are more than 50 buses traveling thousands of miles of county roads daily and we can't have a scout car tracking every one. But we can get help from bus drivers and county residents," the sheriff said.

Acting Postmaster, Marvin Kirk wants to speed delivery of mail on the rural routes.

"It will be of great help to our carriers during the winter months if patrons along the routes will clear the snow from around the mail boxes after each snow storm.

If you happen to be one of those who sent in a list and have not yet had it returned to you it would be well to check with the post office.

Sheriff to Crack Down on School Bus Passers

The sheriff pointed out that his office is receiving calls daily from bus drivers with complaints that cars are passing school buses while children are being let on or off the buses. The state law is being violated and recently a boy was struck by a truck which had defective brakes. The youth had alighted from the bus only moments before the accident.

"It is physically impossible to have scout cars covering the route of all school buses using county roads. There are more than 50 buses traveling thousands of miles of county roads daily and we can't have a scout car tracking every one. But we can get help from bus drivers and county residents," the sheriff said.

He explained that he has asked all bus drivers in the area to be on the alert for cars passing their stopped vehicles on county roads and to write down the license numbers of such cars. When the drivers are identified sheriff's deputies will obtain a warrant for the driver's arrest and he will be taken into custody, the sheriff said.

"I don't know of a more dangerous practice than driving past a bus which is letting school kids off or on. It is a critical minute or two which could mean a child's life. We're setting enough traffic fatality records as it is without putting up with that kind of foolishness," Harvey declared.

Mailing Hints From Mr. Zip

- 1. Airmail cards and parcels should be mailed to Servicemen overseas no later than December 10 to assure before Christmas delivery.
2. Don't forget to use ZIP Codes on all your Christmas mail in both the address and the return address.
3. All gifts should be packed in sturdy boxes. Cardboard boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord.
4. Don't let any gifts rattle around in your Christmas mail packages. Sufficient cushioning is important to give the box strength.
5. Each package you mail should include a slip showing the person receiving your Christmas gift and listing the contents.
6. In addition to articles normally prohibited in the mails, matches and lighter fluid may not be mailed overseas to military addresses.
7. Make sure your addresses are written or printed clearly and that they are complete.
8. Gift parcels to distant States should be mailed by early Dec. and these for local delivery by December 15.
9. Don't forget that under normal conditions there is no delivery of cards and letters on Christmas Day other than Special Delivery.
10. Put ZIP in your Christmas mail add ZIP Codes to the address and return address.
11. Greeting cards with a five-cent stamp may be sealed and contain written messages.
12. Remember to mark all mail for which you have paid special charges with the type of handling it should get.
13. You can write DO NOT OPEN UNTIL CHRISTMAS on the outside of a Christmas package that goes through the mails.
14. During the week just before Christmas long distance gifts and greetings should be sent by airmail to assure on-time delivery.
15. You can help the post office by separating greeting cards into local and out-of-town bundles.
16. Check the return addresses of the people who send you gifts and greeting cards and add their ZIP Codes to your mailing list.
17. Special Christmas boxes are in effect at the post office.
18. Using the new Christmas stamps as postage for your greetings assures first-class service and decorates the envelope, too.
19. This time of the year there are quite a few temporary postal employees delivering mail.
20. Everyone at the Post Office wishes you a Happy Holiday Season and thanks you sincerely for your cooperation.

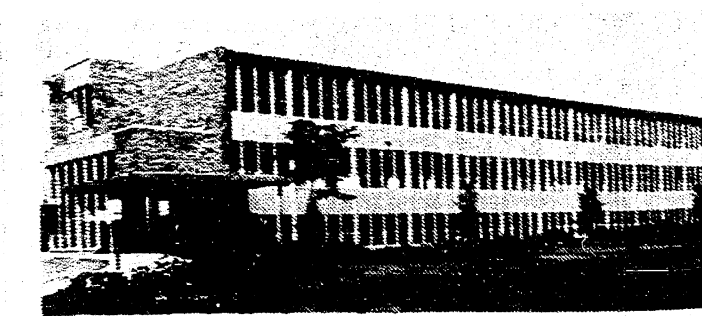

RESEARCH FOR MOST POPULAR CHRISTMAS TREE

Michigan is the nation's leading producer of Christmas trees, accounting for 10 per cent of all plantation grown trees sold in the United States.

Scotch pine is the most popular Christmas tree sold in the state. This combination should spur some important research.

Michigan State University forestry researchers, Jonathan W. Wright, has a Scotch pine project that is the largest and most comprehensive experiment of its kind in the world. It involves more than 100,000 trees on 15,000 plots in 39 separate localities throughout the U.S. and Canada.

This past year, Wright had made hybrids of various races of Scotch pine trees that are better shaped, better colored and more insect resistant than varieties now being grown.

One of his main efforts has been aimed at finding trees resistant to the pine sawfly. The larvae of the insect attacks the pine and can destroy its needles. Wright has found that the Scotch pine that originated in eastern Europe has a resistance to the pest and is breeding this resistance into the new hybrids.

Wright has also found that the best colored Scotch pines come from seed which originated in Spain, southern France and Scotland.

"The Belgium, French, Italian and Hungarian types are medium green in summer and winter, while the Greek and Turkish types are darker green all season of the year," he noted. "Scotch pines from Scotland are the only exceptions to the rule that says the greenest trees come from southern European seed."

"I'm not quite sure why this is true. Perhaps it is because the trees in the British Isles are relatively recent arrivals from somewhere in France or Spain and evolution has not yet made them completely adapted to northern conditions."

Wright notes that Michigan Christmas trees do better if the growers try to avoid the seed from all the northern parts of Europe, particularly from the Ural mountains which separate European and Asiatic Russia.

"Trees grown from these seeds develop yellow needles," reports Wright. "They start to turn color in early September and by Christmas time some of the needles are almost the same color as a ripe lemon."

O'BRIEN NAMES PROBATE OFFICIAL

Probate Judge-Elect Francis L. O'Brien has announced the appointment of Harold Benner of 431 N. Hamilton, Ypsilanti as probate registrar.

He will succeed Miss Anna Douvitas, who has been probate registrar since 1954. Miss Douvitas has announced her intention to resign from the Probate Court post to become secretary to Judge John W. Conlin when he leaves Probate Court to become circuit judge on January 1.

Benner, a long-time resident of Ypsilanti, is an accountant and operated his own accounting service in Ypsilanti. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto.

This is a key position in the Probate Court, ranking second to the judge. This office has custody of the court calendar for all probate matters including estates, hospital commitments of mentally ill, epileptic and alcoholic persons. It also coordinates the work of the Probate Court with other courts and agencies.

Benner will work with Miss Douvitas in December before taking office January 1.

Two Pruning Demonstrations Set For Saturday

It may be a little too early to prune fruit trees, however, not too early to be thinking about it. Saturday, Dec. 10, there will be a pruning demonstration at two locations.

The first will be held at 9:30 a. m. at Dr. Harmon Webb's Orchard, 13260 North Territorial Rd., south side of North Lake, the first farm east of Inverness Golf course.

According to Donald R. Johnson, County Extension Agricultural Agent, Dr. Webb has an excellent young commercial orchard including several varieties of apples and peaches, one to five years old. He also has an excellent new sales room.

The second demonstration will be at the Robert Schluppe farm at 11 a. m. The farm is located at 8225 Jackson Road, Ann Arbor, between Baker and Parker Roads, south side, about 6 miles west of Ann Arbor.

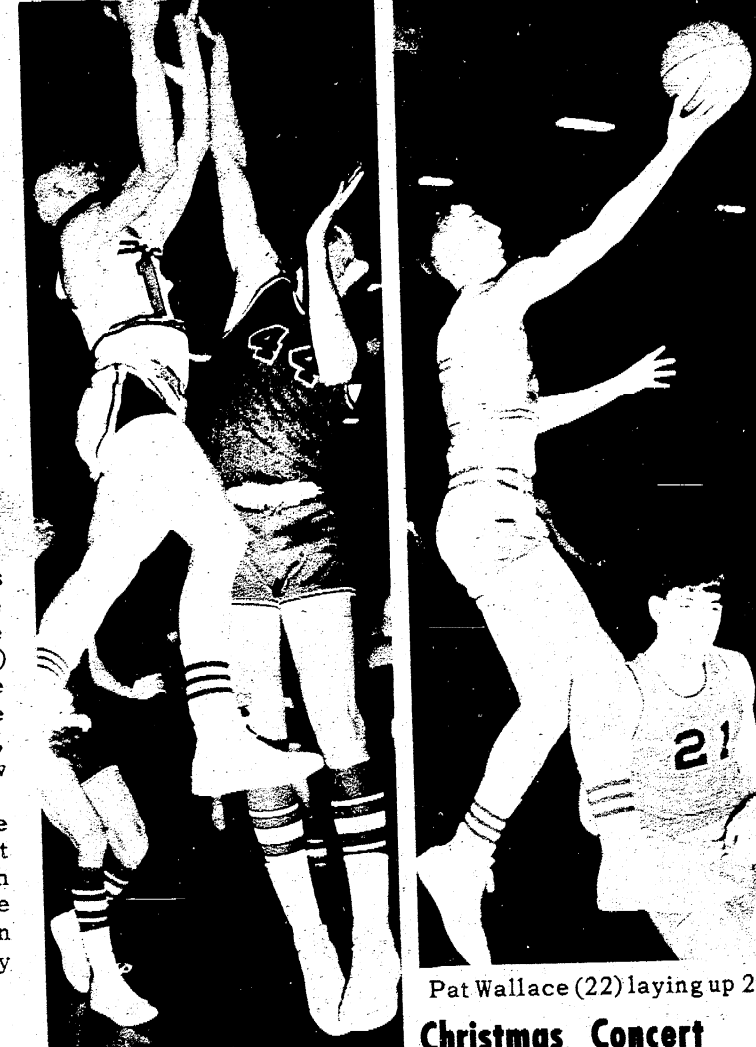

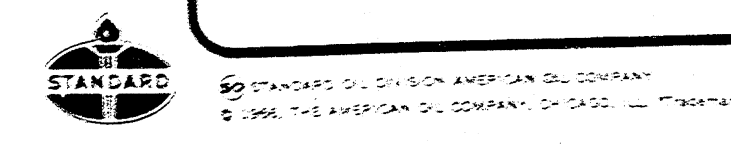
