FIRE LEVELS BARN ON HESLIP FARM

Local firemen battled a fire which leveled two barns Wednesday morning in freezing cold on the farm of James Heslip of 9330 Haron Hollow Road, Manchester, three and a half miles southwest of this community.

Fire chief James Kensler said that the Heslip boys, David 15 and Charles 11 had been using a torch to thaw out pipes in the barn about 7:30 a.m. They were not near the torch when it suddenly exploded and sprayed fire which ignited the baled hay.

The boys worked frantically to save 20 beef cattle, 4 cows, a bull and two heifers and a saddle horse before the building became a blazing inferno. They were unable to reach seven calves before the heat became too great.

The 80 by 30 foot barn filled with baled hay and grain was completely destroyed by flames which licked over the area and burned a tin roofed pole type shed used for feeder cattle and a tool shed.

Three tractors, a corn picker, grain drill and numerous other tools burned.

Tea for two? It could be—or maybe a complete dinner for 12. Mrs. Jack Smith of Tecumseh and Mrs. James E. Fahey of Manchester, both long time members of the Manchester China Painters Club, are the only members of the club to paint entire sets of dishes.

Both use the wild rose pattern which was designed by the club on avarian china. Mrs. Smith recently completed a service for six and presented to her granddaughter for her wedding in November. Another service, for six, complete with various odd dishes will be among the treasure dishes of a daughter-in-law. She was given the set for Christmas. Both are of the wild rose pattern. Mrs. Smith explained that for large gatherings the two can pool their dishes and have a 100-piece dinner service.

Does Mrs. Smith plan to paint a set for herself? She very much doubts it. Mrs. Fahey gave a service for eight to her daughter in Plymouth. This set was unique in that each place setting was of a different color design; all eight patterns were original. She has just completed a service for eight in the wild rose pattern like Mrs. Smith did. She plans to keep the dishes and will be making good use of them. As could be expected, she first used her set for Christmas when she hosted the Manchester China Painters at her home.

Although Mrs. Fahey painted the tea pot, sugar bowl and creamer and a large serving tray to match her set early this summer, it is missing at this time. The gold trimmed Bavarian dishes were taken to the Manchester Community fair where the lovely fragile china took the blue ribbon and prize money. It was left on display with the hobbies and antiques throughout the fair. Everyone remarked as to its grace and beauty. Someone must have especially liked it because it came up missing just at the close of the fair when people were gathering up their entries.

Other than that both of the china painters have had good luck with their hobby. Neither has broken dishes in the painting process. All pieces of the sets have been fired four times or more to bring out the color and shadings of fine china. They say that "hand painted china, which for years, was pushed back on the shelf, is again coming into its own."

Dr. William Purfield spoke on the health, safety and recreational advantages of a pool. He discussed some possibilities of using flowing wells in the area to provide the water for a man made lake.

Dan Boutell outlined some of the possibilities of revenues of community income which might be earmarked for such an undertaking. He mentioned the profits from the Chicken Broil as a possibility to be used for such a fund but pointed out that this would be only a drop in the bucket for a project of this type.

All of the money realized from the famous Chicken Broils has been used to promote something for the children of the community and included the Athletic Field Fence, Can Park facilities, Athletic Field Score Board, Main Street Lights, Library File, Athletic Field Announcer Booth, Mobile Bleachers and Playground Equipment.

Herbert Mahony, representing industry, mentioned the help that industry has always afforded community projects and indicated that industry would again support this undertaking. At the same time he made it clear that industry could not be expected to carry the load alone.

After a discussion period it was suggested that a committee study more completely the possibilities of a pool for Manchester.
