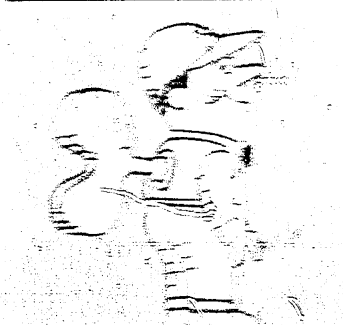

Dan Boutell outlined some of the possibilities of revenues of community income which might be earmarked for such an undertaking.

TRUCK WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS

The Washtenaw County Road Commission deems it necessary to preserve the roads under the jurisdiction of this Board and by virtue of the applicable sections of the Michigan Vehicle Code being Act 300, Public Acts of 1949 as amended, we impose springtime axle load restrictions effective 6 a.m. Thursday, January 26, 1967. The allowable truck loadings are as follows:

| MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE GROSS AXLE LOADINGS | | |

| Spacing Between Axles | Concrete | Black-Top & Gravel |
| 9 feet or over | 13,500 pounds | 11,700 pounds |

| When less than 3 1/2 feet the combined weight shall not exceed | 13,500 pounds | 11,700 pounds |
| Maximum load on any wheel shall not exceed: (pounds per inch of tire width) | 525 pounds | 450 pounds |

MAXIMUM TRUCK SPEED

No truck, tractor or tractor with trailer, nor any combination of such vehicles with a gross weight loaded or unloaded in excess of 3,000 pounds shall exceed a speed of 45 miles per hour, which shall be reduced to 35 miles per hour during the period when reduced loadings are being enforced.

WASHTENAW COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION

Federal Grant Not Officially Confirmed

Although Senator Philip Hart's Washington office called the Manchester Enterprise and announced that this community is to receive \$9,242 in a Federal 701 Grant the village president, Gale Koebbe, says that neither the village or the local Planning Commission has received any official verification.

The Grant was to be issued under an Urban Planning Assistance Program. Koebbe says that until he or the village clerk receives some confirmation no action can be taken for future village development.

The money is to be used to hire Planning Consultants, Villican and Leeman of Southfield to guide the community's development within the next 15 to 20 years, Koebbe said.

Applications For Feed Grain Bases

A feed grain base may be established under the 1967 Feed Grain Program for farms which did not plant feed grains in 1959 and/or 1960 that meet eligibility requirements, Mrs. Carolyn Stump of the Washtenaw County ASCS Office announced today.

Interested producers should contact the County ASCS Office not later than Feb. 28, 1967 and file an application, Mrs. Stump said.

To be eligible for a new feed grain base, Mrs. Stump said the operator must expect to receive 50 per cent or more of his livelihood in the current year from the production of agricultural commodities on the farm; must have had at least two years experience in the production of feed grains in the last five years; must have adequate equipment for the production of feed grains; the land must be suitable for the production of feed grains; and neither the owner nor the operator may have an interest in any other farm for which a feed grain base has been established.

A farm for which a new farm base is established may qualify for price support payments and price support loans. They are not eligible for any diversion payment. They must divert the minimum to be eligible for price support loans or purchases.

mothers, adoption, care of the aged, and personality problems that develop in the lives of children and adults.

During 1966 the Agency extended counseling services to 352 families wanting help with marital problems; and 481 children and adults with individual personality adjustment problems.

Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw County also placed 54 children in adoptive homes and supervised over 116 adoptive placements. There were 127 foster home placements provided in 63 licensed foster homes, as well as professional counseling and service to 182 unwed mothers.

The people who come for help at Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw County represent a wide range of vocations, ages, educational levels and incomes. They illustrate that misfortune comes in various degrees of intensity and rarely makes it target any one group of people. The family in need of social services often finds that unhappy living is expensive living in terms of energy and money. For the sake of each individual involved in a family problem and the community, the Agency stresses the importance of services early in the development of problems. Any individual or family is welcome to come to the Agency for assistance with a problem. Appointments can be made by personal contact, telephone or by letter.

Stock Meetings to Feature Housing

All the comforts of home" - hogs, beef cattle and poultry - be dramatically illustrated 30 through Feb. 3 during Farmers' Week on the Michigan University campus.

A life-size hog housing setup both farrowing and finishing will be exhibited in the Livestock Pavilion. MSU specialists point out how the housing facilities should be insulated and tilted.

A special report will also be on the use of concrete tiled floors for more efficient manure handling.

MSU's swine barns will also be on to visitors during the week. On Thursday, Russell Jeckel, Ivan, Illinois, one of the nation's outstanding swine producers, will tell how he and one of his men raised 3,500 hogs in farrowing to finish.

The beef cattle producers will be treated to a "new look in beef feedlot housing" Tuesday afternoon. Exhibits will include models of some of the new research developments in housing.

Robert Maddox, MSU agricultural engineer, will offer plans specifications and costs of building and installing modern beef raising facilities.

Wesley Anderson, Cokato, Minnesota, who feeds out 600 head of beef cattle each year,

will report on one of the chief trends in beef cattle housing when he discusses "Six Years of Experiments with Controlled Environment and Slatted Floors."

Other beef specialists will discuss the potential for expanding cow-calf herds in Michigan. Since only about one-third of all the beef consumed in Michigan is actually produced here, the possibilities for expanding this industry are great.

MSU's Beef Cattle Research Center will also be open to visitors attending Farmer's Week/ The sheep program, which will be held Wednesday, will feature an exhibit of the measures necessary to economically "increase productivity per ewe."

In the morning, MSU Veterinarian Clifford Beck will demonstrate the characteristics of a sound sheep.

In the afternoon, Arthur Brandt, Versailles, Ohio, will discuss the management techniques he is using in the operation of his 270-ewe commercial operation.

Brandt has earned the Master Shepherd Award in Ohio for the past two years because of the high profit returns he has received from his flock.

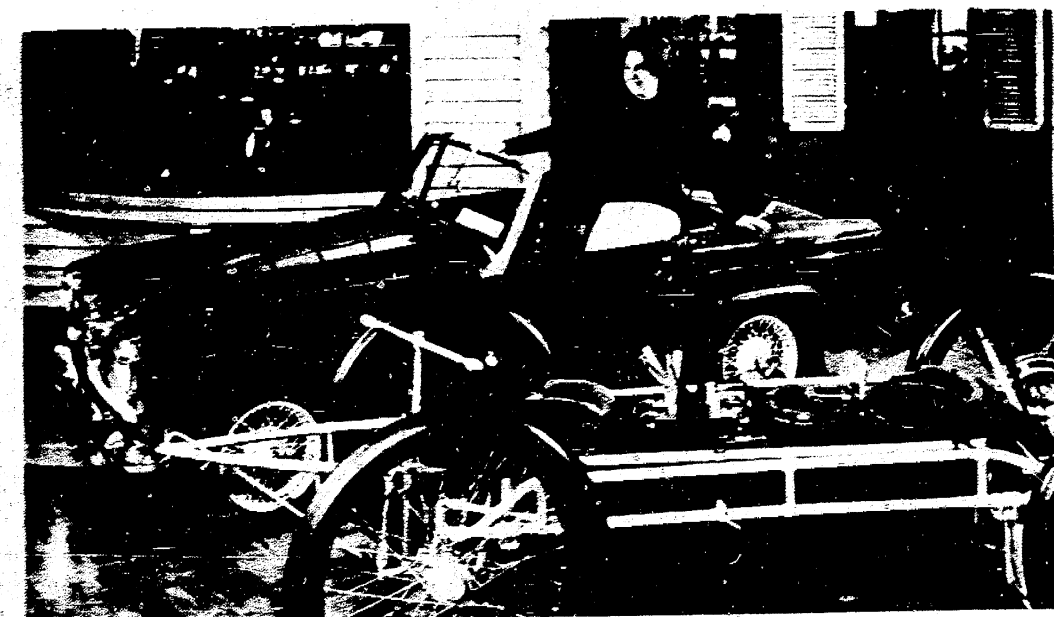

PRIMARY ELECTION HAS ALL THE EAR MARKS OF SOMETHING HOT

IRVIN GILL TO HEAD CENTENNIAL

This is Manchester's Centennial year. Just what action will be taken to celebrate the event has not been decided but the wheels are beginning to turn.

Village president Gale Koebbe named a committee several months ago to make a study of celebration prospects.

This committee headed by Irvin Gill has been sounding out the feeling of the community and last Monday called a meeting of interested citizens.

Some sixty people arrived at the school and Irvin Gill was elected chairman of the Centennial Committee with Ted Curley as the co-chairman. They will hand pick their committees to work out some type of celebration which may be tied in with other community projects.

DOUBLE A RECEIVES LABOR GRANT

U.S. Representative Marvin L. Esch has announced a \$31,504 grant of labor grant to the Double A Products Company of Manchester under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act.

According to Representative Esch the grant will provide on-the-job training for 141 unemployed persons for periods ranging from four to 20 weeks. The Double A Products Company, located at 15 East Duncan in Manchester, will supplement the grant with approximately \$130,000 in wages paid to the trainees. It is expected that most of the participants in the project will be residents of Washtenaw County and the surrounding area.

Representative Esch praised the Double A Company for its participation in the program. "This approach gets to the root of the real problem of the unemployed," he said.

"Such cooperation between government and private enterprise will result in creating more productive members of society as well as providing a decent wage and a future for formerly unemployed persons and their families," Esch said.

Donald A. Roach, Vice President and General Manager of Double A Products Company, was quoted as saying, "Our Company is pleased to be the recipient of this grant under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act. The value of in-plant training has long been recognized as essential to any successful industrial operation. This grant will allow our Company to continue with its program and recover a portion of the high cost associated with such training."

Congressman Esch last week was appointed to the House Education and Labor Committee which holds the initial responsibility for legislation in the manpower development and training field.

SCOUTS TO HAVE COURT OF HONOR

A Boy Scout Court of Honor will be held at the Junior High School Auditorium at 8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 9.

The Scouts now have two troops. The newest, Troop 436 will receive its Charter. The leader is Larry England.

Two Scouts will receive the Eagle Scout award. A special invitation is extended to all Eagle Scouts in the area to attend the Court of Honor, according to Robert Armentrout, scoutmaster of Troop 42.

At this time there are some 50 scouts in the two troops.

MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE EXTENDED

The Mothers' March which was scheduled for Tuesday has been extended until Saturday afternoon because of the snow.

Some of the solicitors were out on Tuesday but for the most part the marchers were content to wait for better roads. The county chairman extended the time limit for the drive a week due to the four inch snow which caused high drifts in many areas.

Both village and county work crews were putting in long hours even on Wednesday clearing away the banks of snow which lined the village streets.

Mrs. Hugh Sutton, local Mothers' March chairman said that the peanut and balloon sale postponed from last Saturday is again scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 4th because most of the solicitors are from the rural areas.

NEW POLICE CHIEF

Manchester has hired a new police chief. Billy Wilson, 46, of Lynden, Michigan is beginning his duties at once. Wilson was called to Michigan from Cocoa Beach, Florida because of the serious illness of his father. Prior to that he had been in security work at Cape Kennedy for 17 yrs.

The Wilsons have seven children: Billy 17, Robert 16, John 15, Paula 12, Lisa 8, Michael 6 and Mark 2. Mrs. Wilson and the children will be moving to Manchester this summer. The family also has a trained German shepherd.

Wilson is a member of the National Chiefs of Police, Florida Police Officers and affiliated organizations. He served six years in the Marine Corps.

RETIREES

Miss Lydia Kulenkamp has retired from the bookkeeping department of Lewis, Norris & May after 15 years with the engineering firm.

SCHOOL DISMISSED

School was dismissed Tuesday before 10 a.m. when an ice storm blanketed this area and school officials feared that it would increase as the day progressed.

There are 1155 students enrolled in the school system. About 5 buses including the town bus, special education car and kindergarten bus make up the system which transports children to and from school.

It has been pointed out that in the village, according to Eugene Bentschneider, the village primary will determine the new officers and council members. Bentschneider, who is chairman of the Progressive ticket explains the situation:

"On the Progressive ticket we have incumbents, Gale Koebbe, president; Lyle Widmayer, Clerk; and Ed. R. Kirk, treasurer.

"Then there are incumbents, James Bauer, Robert Lowery and John Althouse for two-year terms as trustees. Another incumbent is Herbert Mahony. Mahony is running for a one-year-term. He was appointed by President Koebbe last year to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Robert Clark as a councilman," Bentschneider explained.

"Also vying for a two-year term as councilman on the same Progressive ticket is Dan Singer. Had Singer run on the Citizens ticket for the office the village would not have been forced to have a primary election. The outcome would have been the same and the village would have been saved the cost of a second election," Bentschneider pointed out.

In an interview with Mr. Singer by the publisher the candidate was asked, "Why are you running on the Progressive ticket?"

Mr. Singer's reply was, "First I want to cause a primary election and second, I would stand a better chance running with the stronger party."

"When asked if he understood that this would create an extra expense to the village by causing a primary, Mr. Singer said, "Yes, but if I could make people see that an outsider could make the council it might encourage others to run for office. Also if there were two other parties, such as Democrats and Republicans I would run on the other ticket and would have saved the village the expense of a primary election."

This is the first time that Singer has entered the contest for a village office. He resigned last year as the village chief of police.

In order to save the Citizens ticket—so that it would not have to be reinstated another year, incumbent Russell Widmayer, village assessor who had been elected to his post on the Progressive ticket, changed over and is running unopposed on the Citizens ticket.

In summing up the facts—the village primary is the real contest. The village election will only be a formality.

There are four men running for two-year-terms as councilmen. Three will be elected. They will be selected at the primary because all four names appear on the same ticket. One man, H. Mahony, is running for a one-year-term. He is unopposed.

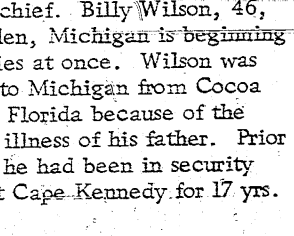
Had the incumbents run on the Progressive ticket again this year and the fourth candidate run on the Citizens ticket there would have been no primary.
