

TRUCK WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS

The Washtenaw County Road Commission deems it necessary to preserve the roads under the jurisdiction of this Board and by virtue of the applicable sections of the Michigan Vehicle Code being Act 300, Public Acts of 1949 as amended, we impose springtime axle load restrictions effective 6 a.m. Thursday, January 26, 1967. The allowable truck loadings are as follows:

MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE GROSS AXLE LOADINGS

Spacing Between Axles

Concrete Black-Top & Gravel

9 feet or over 13,500 pounds 11,700 pounds More than 3½ feet, but less than 9 feet 9,750 pounds 8,450 pounds

Maximum load on any wheel shall not exceed: (pounds per inch of tire width)
