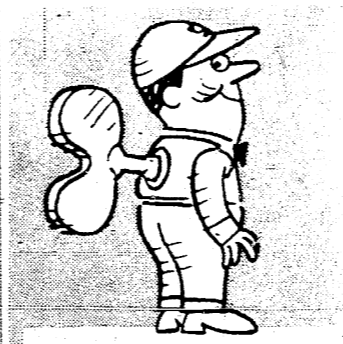

IRVIN GILL TO HEAD CENTENNIAL

This is Manchester's Centennial year. Just what action will be taken to celebrate the event has not been decided but the wheels are beginning to turn. Village president Gale Koebbe named a committee several months ago to make a study of celebration prospects. This committee headed by Irvin Gill has been sounding out a feeling of the community and last Monday called a meeting of interested citizens. Some sixty people arrived at the school and Irvin Gill was elected chairman of the Centennial Committee with Ted Curley as the co-chairman. They will hand pick their committees to work out some type of celebration which may be tied in with other community projects.

DOUBLE A RECEIVES LABOR GRANT

U.S. Representative Marvin L. Esch has announced a \$31,504 grant of labor grant to the Double A Products Company of Manchester under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act. According to Representative Esch the grant will provide on-the-job training for 141 unemployed persons for periods ranging from four to 20 weeks. The Double A Products Company, located at 15 East Duncan in Manchester, will supplement the grant with approximately \$130,000 in wages paid to the trainees. It is expected that most of the participants in the project will be residents of Washtenaw County and the surrounding area. Representative Esch praised the Double A Company for its participation in the program. "This approach gets to the root of the real problem of the unemployed," he said. "Such cooperation between government and private enterprise will result in creating more productive members of society as well as providing a decent wage and a future for formerly unemployed persons and their families," he said. Donald A. Roach, Vice President and General Manager of Double A Products Company, was quoted as saying, "Our Company is pleased to be the recipient of this grant under the provisions of the Manpower Development and Training Act. The value of in-plant training has long been recognized as essential to any successful industrial operation. This grant will allow our Company to continue with its program and recover a portion of the high cost associated with such training." Congressman Esch last week was appointed to the House Education and Labor Committee which holds the initial responsibility for legislation in the manpower development and training field.

The Wilsons have seven children: Billy 17, Robert 16, John 15, Paula 12, Lisa 8, Michael 6 and Mark 2. Mrs. Wilson and the children will be moving to Manchester this summer. The family also has a trained German shepherd.

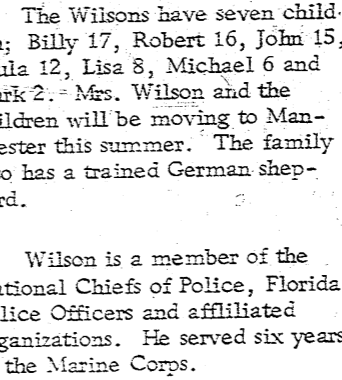

CHURCH GROUP HEARS PHILIPPINE SPEAKER

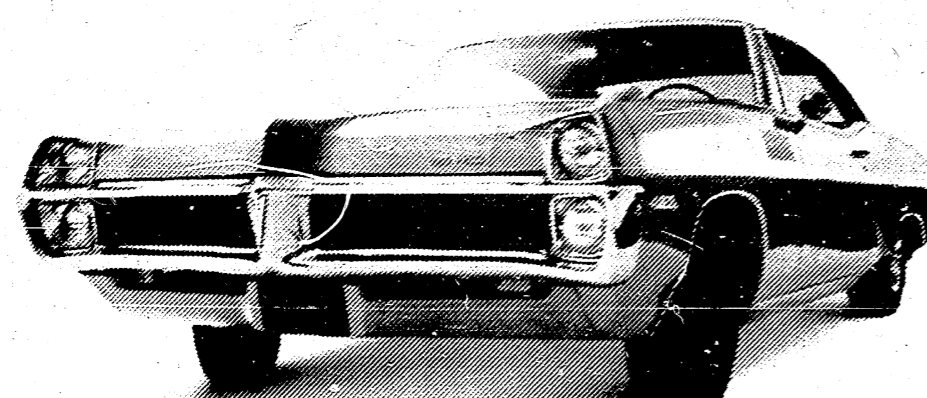
The WSCS of the Methodist Church and their guests listened to the Rev. David Sobrepna speak on "Living in a Multi-religious world". The program was held at the Methodist Church hall. His talk was based on experiences he encountered in his native country, the Philippines. There, he said, a large number of the Christians are Roman Catholics. Others were of various faiths. Also in Malaysia, where he lived in a multi-religious atmosphere of Hinduism, Mohammedanism, Islam and Buddhism, he was given an insight into different religions.

"We must be aware of the different interpretations on the same word—'agape' in Greek means love, they may use numerous words all meaning 'love'—but in a different phase. 'Agape' means Christ love—not loving us because we are good but loving us in spite of our weakness. He explained that this is the quality of responsible relations possible among men because of God's self-giving love. Rev. Sobrepna said that too many denominations retard true Christianity growth. He mentioned that although Christians believe in the same God yet there is not harmony. The meeting was closed with the hymn "Lead Kindly Light" which was the favorite hymn of Mahatma Gandhi. Rev. Sobrepna is assistant pastor at the Ecumenical Center for International Students at the U of M. He also works with the Hospitality committee to find homes for foreign students to spend a week end or holiday in a home atmosphere. 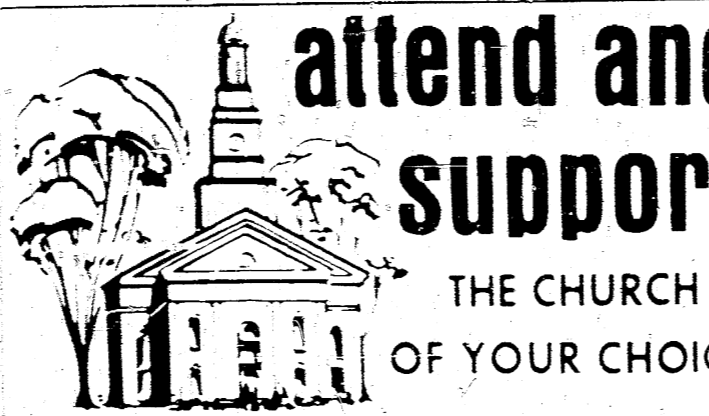
Home From California

From Trenton the Renners went to Castalia. The Rev. Renner was installed as pastor of Zion Lutheran church in a special ceremony in Nov. 1958. Rev. Renner suffered a stroke a year ago and since that time his duties have been becoming increasingly difficult for him because of his poor health. The pastor and his wife plan to stay in the area for a few months and then return to Ohio where several relatives of the family live. The Renners came to Rogers Corners from Castalia, Ohio where he had been pastor for 15 years of the Grace Lutheran church. Rev. Renner was born on a farm in Franklin county, near Columbus, Ohio and attended rural and city schools in the area before entering Capital University Academy in Columbus, graduating in 1922. He received an AB degree from Capital University in 1926 and a BD degree at Capital University Seminary in 1929. Obituary LeRoy Heimerdinger LeRoy F. Heimerdinger, a prominent farmer and a life-long Manchester area resident, died suddenly at his home at 20432 Logan Road, Manchester Township while working on his farm, Thursday morning. Mr. Heimerdinger, 63, had operated an automobile and farm implement agency in Manchester for many years until selling it in 1952. He was a member of the Emanuel United Church of Christ in Manchester. Mr. Heimerdinger was born on February 12, 1903 in Manchester Township, the son of Fred and Bertha Haschle Heimerdinger. He was married to Ethel Furgason on May 26, 1923. She survives. 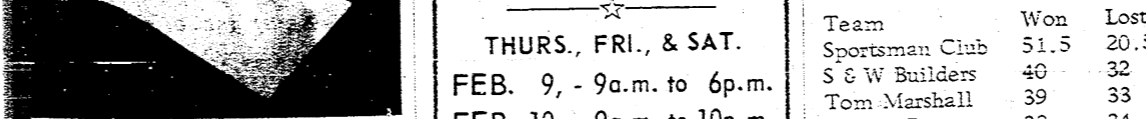
