Vacationers Urged to Check Driver Licenses

Lansing-Michigan drivers planning winter vacations or moves to warm climates during the winter, and who have celebrated or are having birthdays while they are away, are urged to check their driver licenses to make sure they don't expire when they are gone.

A "kickoff" Veterinary Science 4-H Leaders' Workshop will be conducted in March at Camp Kett, Michigan's 4-H leadership training center near Tustin.

The program is cooperatively sponsored by the Michigan and American Veterinary Medical Associations, the Cooperative Extension Service, and the National 4-H Service Committee.

The program was introduced at the annual meeting of the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association held at Michigan State University.

The 4-H Veterinary Science program is suitable to all youth with an interest in animals, medicine, or public health. A member in an urban area will find it just as satisfying and as valuable as his rural counterpart.

Members will learn about animal anatomy, physiology, sanitation, causes of disease, and immunology.

Additional information is available through the office of the Cooperative Extension Service in the County Building, Ann Arbor.

Snow Must Be Cleared

Postmaster Marvin Kirk and his staff of rural mail carriers want to thank the people living on the rural routes for clearing the approaches to the mail boxes as efficiently as they have.

CAMPAIGNS HERE

Ross Campbell, candidate for Probate Judge, campaigned door-to-door in Manchester last Thursday, Feb. 3.

Campbell is seeking the probate court seat recently vacated by former Probate Judge John Conlin. The primary election is Monday, Feb. 20th.

Campbell, a practicing attorney, is a West Pointer and University of Michigan Law School graduate, has taught business law at Eastern Michigan University and Cleary College, and is an author of several articles on probate court law which have appeared in the Michigan State Bar Journal.

He is a member of the Bar of the Supreme Court of the State of Michigan and of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan. Campbell has served as a member of the Juvenile Court Committee and as chairman of the Legal Aid Committee of the Washtenaw County Bar Association. He has been appointed to the Special Committee on Mental Health and the Special Committee on Juvenile Problems of the State Bar of Michigan, and served for nearly three years as a Referee in the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court.

Doctors Outline Points for Safety on Roads

To a skier, snow is a blessing. To a driver, it is slippery, slushy roads. The physicians of Michigan offer five prescriptions for safe driving this winter.

"Many Michigan doctors of medicine," according to C. Allen Payne, M. D., President of the Michigan State Medical Society, "will be treating people who have suffered accidents this winter. They know first-hand the needless pain and anxiety auto injuries will cause in families throughout the state."

The five prescriptions Dr. Payne recommends for safe winter driving are:

- 1. Always keep at least one window in your car slightly open. If you don't you will fill with carbon monoxide... 2. Be sure your exhaust, muffler and manifold are free of leaks... 3. Keep front air vents closed in bumper-to-bumper traffic to avoid sucking in fumes from the car ahead... 4. If you begin to feel sleepy or ill while driving, pull to the side of the road and roll down the window... 5. Always drive slowly enough to be able to stop quickly.

Health authorities point out that measles usually attack children from late winter to early spring. Parents are urged to take advantage of the clinics. One dose protects the child. There is no charge to the parents.

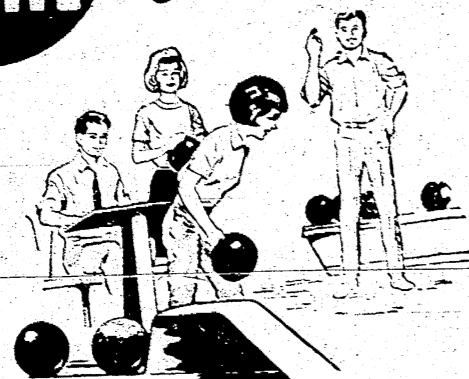
Parking in Village to be Checked

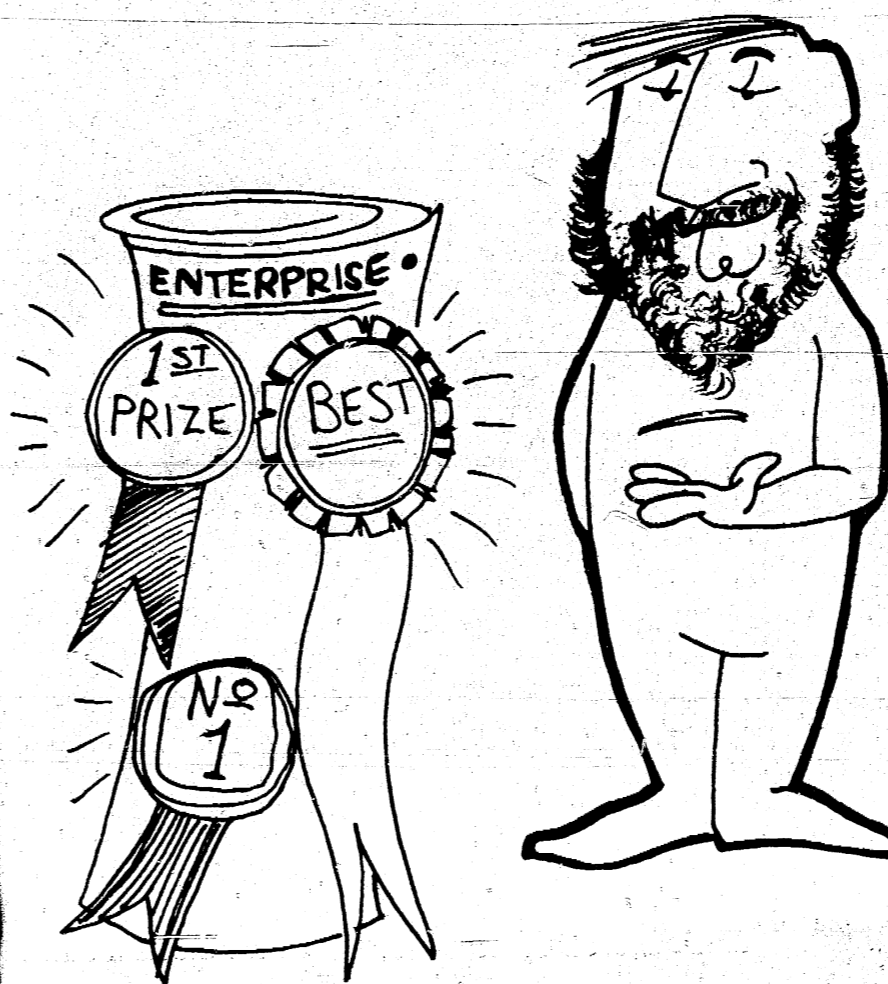
