





The CEO is acting on a federal directive to restructure its board by March 1 to include one third of its membership reprechester High. He is a member of the Senior Choir sented and directly elected by income persons and membership selected by and representing pul lic officials and social and com munity agencies.

> The new plan reduces the number of persons to be directly elected by the poor in "target areas" from 22 to 19 and increas the representation of community agencies from six to nine.

Under the new plan those elected by the poor would be a simple majority--19 of the 36 members. Only 12 of the 19 di rectly elected members would be required to be in the low income

The others could be persons "demonstrating their prior concern for problems of poverty."

The apportionment of outcounty representatives for a total of six, will include one each from Chelsea, Milan and Willow Run increase of \$2,592,054 compared and one representative represent the following two communities. Manchester and Saline, Whittake and Willis and Whitmore Lake an Dexter. Low income persons should be the representatives from the latter four areas, the plan

> Seven persons instead of nine will be elected in Ann Arbor, four of these to have low incom six instead of seven to be elected in Ypsilanti.

The number of social agenci and community organizations was increased from three to five to Ann Arbor and from two to three for Ypsilanti and the out-county areas will retain one representa-

No change was made in the apportionment of representatives to be named by public officials. These include 2 from the Board of Supervisors and one each from Washtenaw Community College County Intermediate School District, Ann Arbor City Council, Ypsilanti City Council, University of Michigan and Eastern

Wheeler is suggesting that alternates be elected who may for any absent member. This has been approved by the CEO Wheeler says he doesn't expect the national office to approve.

The plan is for the poor to elect low income persons as alter nates f rom Ann Arbor (4), Ypsi (2) and from the rural areas two on a rotating basis starting with Chelsea and Willow Run.

People who vote in the Sun-

day elections must be at least 17 years with income of not more than \$1,500 for single persons with \$500 additional for each dependent and those persons who live in a low income residential area. Persons who vote will be asked to sign their names and addresses on a register to provide election records.


