#### TOWNSHIP TAXES TO BE CUT Manchester Community Chest SUPERVISOR SAYS

Manchester's proposed township budget for this year has been set for \$22,935 compared to \$23, 436 last year. The lower amount is accounted for because last year some three thousand dollars was set aside for the new fire truck.

Clayton Parr, township super sor points out that there are me expenses which are higher, but everything considered, the millage will be down.

Last year's 1.1 mills will proably be reduced to around a mill or less. Building and higher valuation are attributed for the reduction in taxes Parr said. Some areas have increased --

such as the salaries of the township officers. The supervisor receives \$2,000 as compared to \$1,700; the clerk \$1,000 compared to \$800; treasurer, \$2,000 ompared to \$1,600 last year.

Parr said that the sanitary land fill and dump site for use by the four townships of Bridgewater, Freedom, Sharon and Manchester will cost Manchester township an additional \$1,000. Zoning expenses are also higher the supervisor said.

But after weighing all of the idded expenses and comparing with the anticipated revenue Parr still believes that the township tax won't be one mill this year.

This is as it should be for the Raisin River played an important part in the settlement of Manchester. Without the Raisin there certainly would have been no community here. Water power was n great demand when the villages were laid out a hundred years ago. The nucleus of the community centered around the grist mill. This spelled wheat, flour and bread the staff of life for the early settler. The Raisin received its name because of the wild grapes that lined the banks.
