TOWNSHIP TAXES TO BE CUT SUPERVISOR SAYS

Manchester's proposed township budget for this year has been set for \$22,935 compared to \$23,436 last year. The lower amount is accounted for because last year some three thousand dollars was set aside for the new fire truck.

Clayton Parr, township supervisor points out that there are some expenses which are higher, but everything considered, the millage will be down.

Last year's 1.1 mills will probably be reduced to around a mill or less. Building and higher valuation are attributed for the reduction in taxes Parr said.

Some areas have increased--such as the salaries of the township officers. The supervisor receives \$2,000 as compared to \$1,700; the clerk \$1,000 compared to \$800; treasurer, \$2,000 compared to \$1,600 last year.

Parr said that the sanitary land fill and dump site for use by the four townships of Bridgewater, Freedom, Sharon and Manchester will cost Manchester township an additional \$1,000. Zoning expenses are also higher the supervisor said.

But after weighing all of the added expenses and comparing with the anticipated revenue Parr still believes that the township tax won't be one mill this year.

Heads Township Zoning Board

Don Lippert, newly elected to the Manchester zoning board was named chairman of the board at the organizational meeting on Tuesday.

Orle Hand, who had been a member of the board since it was first organized in 1957 resigned because of ill health.

Mr. Hand said he believed that the most important work of the board during the nine years he served on it was the selection of a sanitary land fill and dump site for the four townships.

LoRen Trolz is the new vice chairman and Lowell Parr was re-elected secretary. Others on the Zoning Board are John Fahey and John Bus.

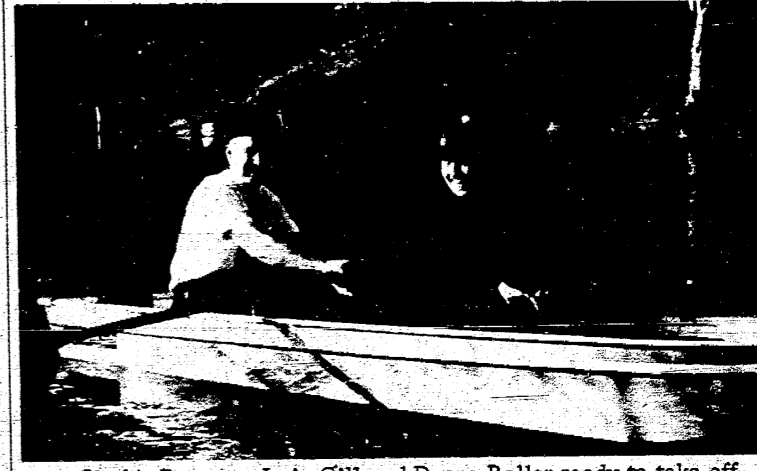

Saturday, April 22 promises to be a red letter day in Manchester. Folks will be watching with interest as those most gifted in the art of handling canoes and boats will be matching skills in the Centennial boat race. Many have expressed real pleasure that a boating contest is included in the Centennial highlights.

This is as it should be for the Raisin River played an important part in the settlement of Manchester. Without the Raisin there certainly would have been no community here. Water power was in great demand when the villages were laid out a hundred years ago. The nucleus of the community centered around the grist mill. This spelled wheat, flour and bread the staff of life for the early settler. The Raisin received its name because of the wild grapes that lined the banks.

Charles Hough and Allen Clark have worked out the details of the boat races. They have planned the affair and most people know that neither of them have to take a back seat to anyone when it comes to knowing the Raisin River. They have always lived along its banks and fished its waters. Few are as familiar with its every turn.

Boats will dip into the river at Fellow's Bridge at 1 p.m. on Sharon Valley Road in Sharon Township, about six miles northwest of Manchester. Those who plan to enter must be registered. There is an entry fee of one dollar. Boats must be registered by April 20. Clark and Hough have the details or if more convenient they can be obtained by calling the Centennial Headquarters at 111 E. Main Street.

Counting the bends and turns the Raisin will cover a nine mile stretch. Helping Clark see that the race is off to a good start will be J. C. Hendley and L. Dean Scott. At the finish line --just north of the Main Street Bridge will be the Centennial Chairman Irvin Gill, Allen Alber and Doug Hughes.

Centennial committee will be stationed along the banks of Raisin to help contestants in the event of accidents.

Some definite rules have been laid down. The contest is open to people of the Manchester area only. There will be two classes for both canoes and boats. There will be the father and son teams and the other class is open--choose your partners.

Motors are prohibited. This is a row, row, row your boat type of contest. One hundred years ago there were no motors on the boats. Canoes and boats must be equipped with proper life saving equipment aboard--or they will be disqualified. The canoes and boats must be kept in the river except when obstacles obstruct passage. This is no cross country portage. Only two persons are allowed in the canoes and boats.

In the past few days some eager beavers have been seen lowering their boats and canoes into the river for trial runs. There are rumors that at least one tipped. Now is the time to get into condition for the big race. Don't forget to register! May the best team win.

The race will be climaxed with a street dance. This is slated for 7:30 p.m. to 11:30 p.m.

The Centennial Parade Committee, headed by Bill Hainstock of 312 E. Main, is taking entries for the July 4 parade. This will be the time when the Brothers of the Brush Chapters will be out in full regalia. Harry Macomber, Centennial Secretary points out that now is the time to join a Chapter and take out a membership.

This includes the local merchants, businessmen and all organizations and clubs. Buttons, pins and certificates suitable for framing are available at the Centennial Headquarters.

Hainstock says that he is receiving almost complete cooperation from the merchants. He is interested in knowing just what type of entries will be taking part in the parade and the number of people involved. He wants to know if there will be floats and how many. What about horses and buggies, cars that date back to the 1940's. Bill is beginning early for he wants this to be a parade that folks will talk about long after the last sounds of the horses' hoofs have died away.

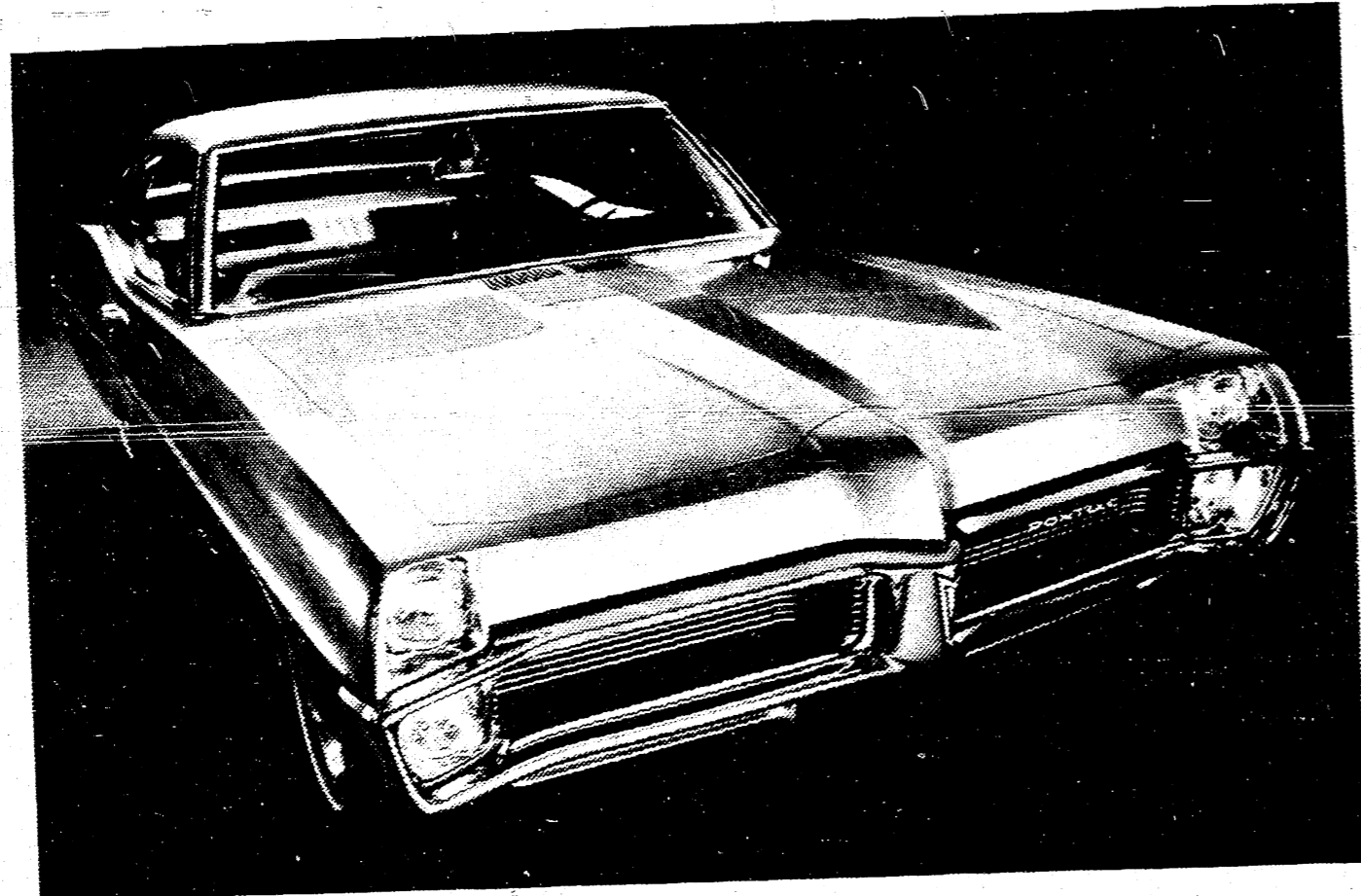

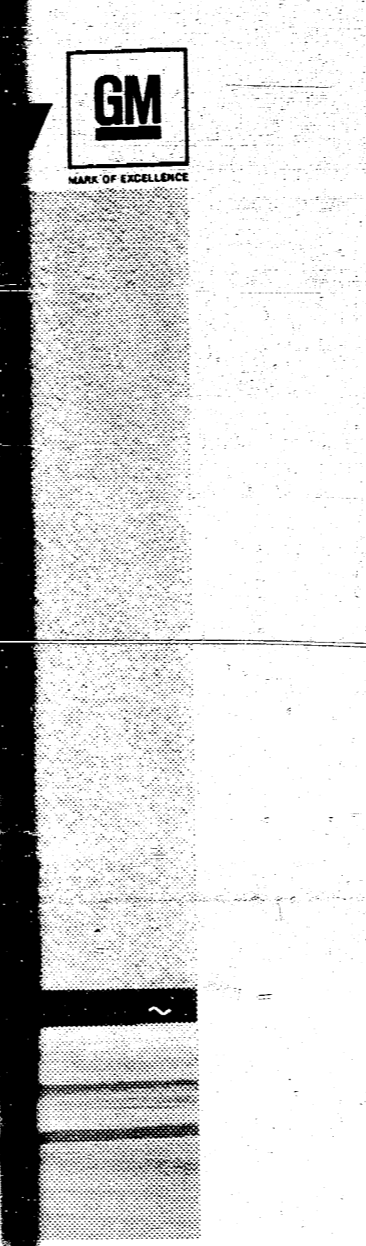

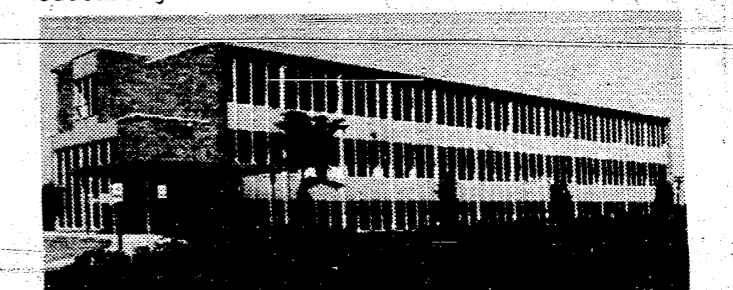
