Kathy Richardson—State and the University of Michigan Instructors and Counselors will constitute the complete staff while Girls State is in session.

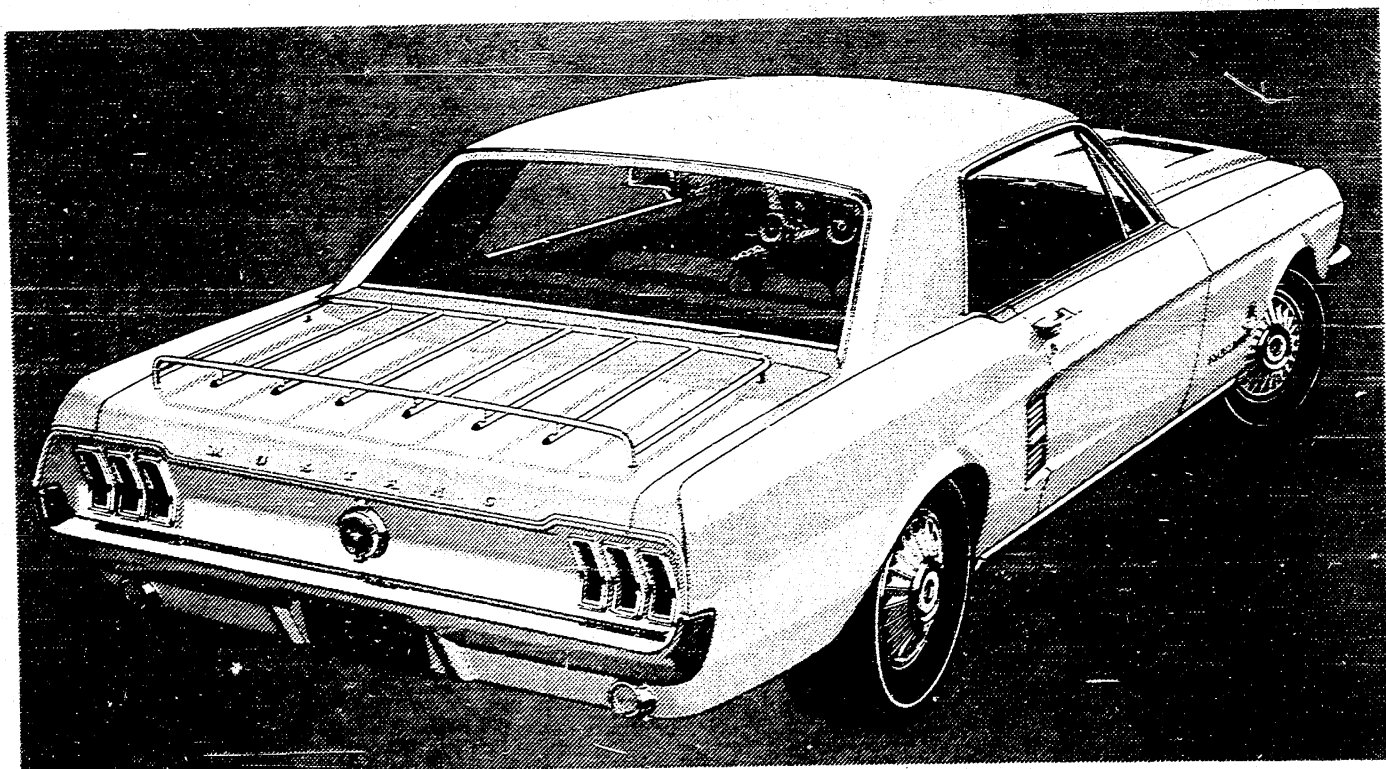

### SIGN FOR MEDICARE IF YOU ARE ELIGIBLE

The few Washtenaw county residents 65 and over who have not yet signed up for hospital insurance under Medicare fall into two general groups—those who do not understand that hospital insurance is available even to those who have never worked under social security and those who delay filing because they think they must wait until they retire.

Robert A. Kehoe, social security manager in Ann Arbor reports that even though nearly everyone reaching 65 before 1968 can have hospital insurance, some people who have not worked long enough under social security to receive cash benefits, and others who are still working have not come in because they do not realize they are eligible.

Mr. Kehoe emphasized that even people who may not even have a social security card and may never have worked under the program are eligible and should come in and sign up.

Starting in 1968 those reaching 65 who are not eligible for cash social security benefits will need some credit for work under the law to qualify for hospital insurance. People born in 1902 or earlier do not require any coverage under social security to qualify for hospital insurance. Also, people who are covered by social security but not eligible for cash benefits because they are still working can have hospital protection as soon as they reach 65.

Washtenaw residents who plan to continue working when they reach 65 should apply within the 3 months prior to the month in which they have their 65th birthday. By applying for social security they will be covered by hospital insurance and can make their decision on voluntary medical insurance coverage. Later on when they have retired or have reduced earnings which will permit payment of benefits, monthly checks can be started without delay.

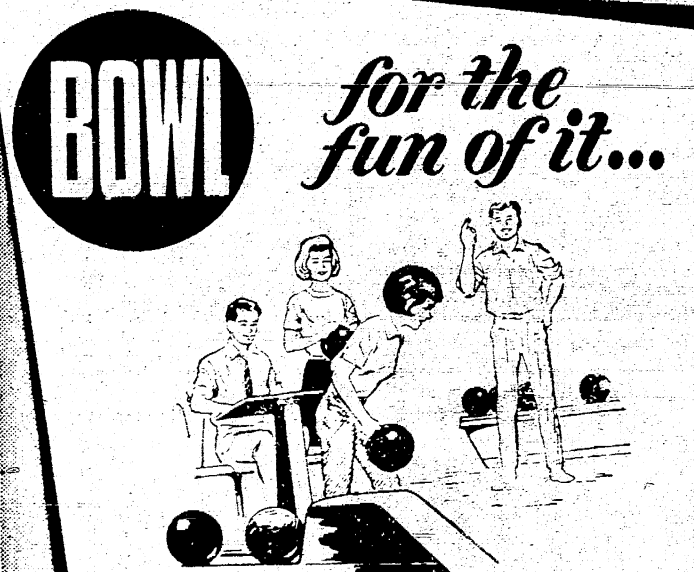

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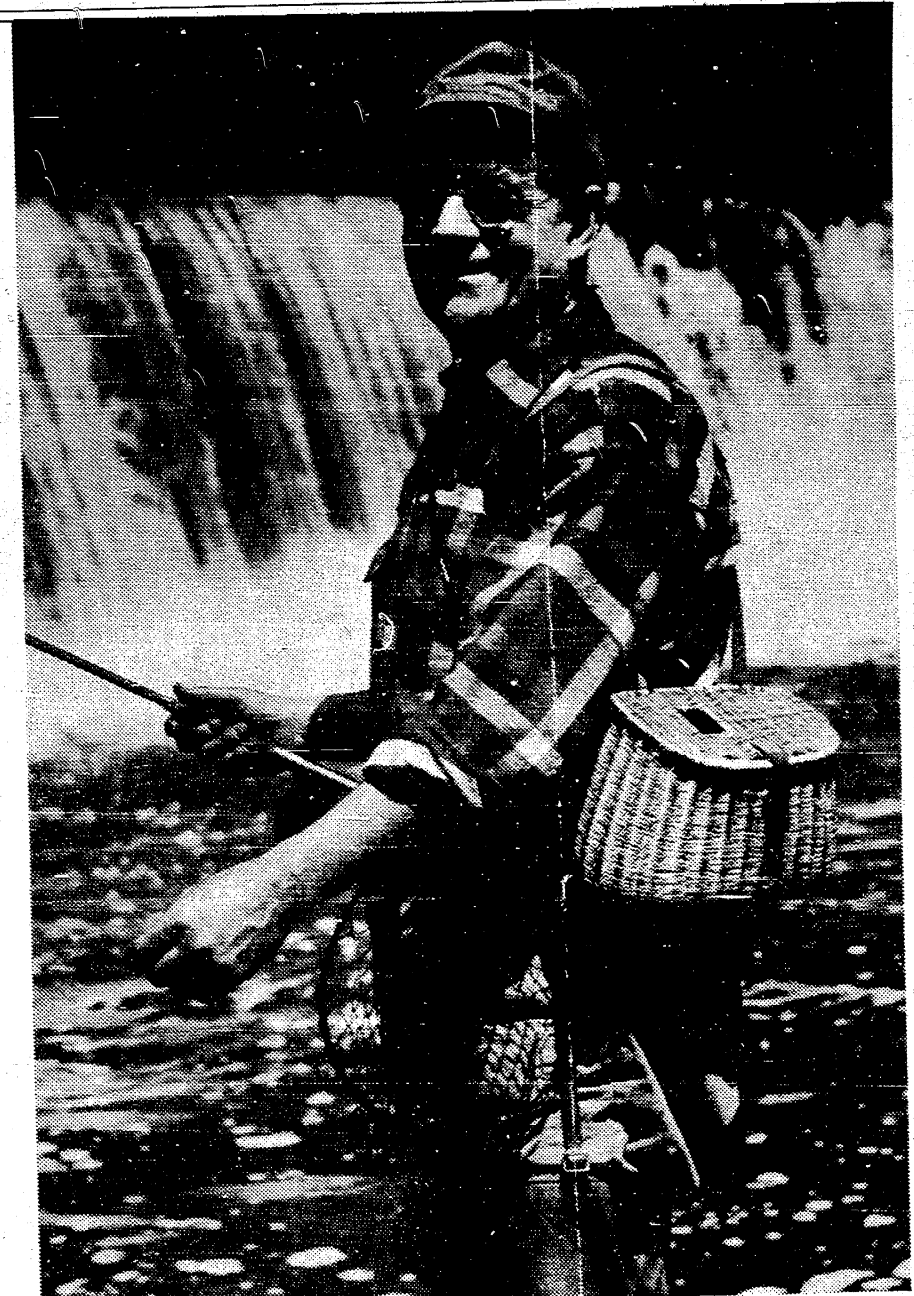

**AG Development Award to be Presented at Fair**

The contest to pick Michigan Agricultural Development of the Year will extend into the summer and the state award will be presented at the State Fair in Detroit, President Edgar Harden of Northern Michigan University, Marquette, general chairman of the 14th annual Michigan Week May 21-27, has announced.

In the past the agriculture award program, which is a contest for manufacturing companies from county and regional eliminations to the state finals and then presentation of awards during Michigan Week.

"From now on, the agriculture contest will have its own timetable and spotlight," General Chairman Harden said, "We decided on this to give Michigan agriculture the recognition it de-

serves and to avoid any risk that at award time the agriculture winner will be found somewhere in the shadow of the product winner so far as public attention is concerned."

As announced last month, Richard Arnold, executive secretary of the Michigan Agricultural Conference and farm director of radio station WKAR at MSU, is the deputy chairman of the state Product and Agriculture Awards committee who will direct the agriculture contest.

Following is the Agricultural Development of the Year Award schedule:

All 83 counties must keep their contest open for entries until Monday, May 8.

County judging is to be completed by Saturday, May 13.

The 16 Michigan Week regions will keep their contests open for entry of county winners until Monday, June 12.

Regional judging is to be

completed by Saturday, June 24.

All material on the regional winners must be in the hands of the state committee by Tuesday, August 1 ready for the state judging to begin.

The state award will be presented at a special event during the Michigan State Fair August 25-September 4.

Entries may be made by farmers, associations, food processors and other individuals and organizations engaged in any phase of agricultural activity in Michigan. State and federal agencies are not eligible nor is a state college or university.

An entry may be a product, a process, machinery, a device or a marketing, research or other program significant to Michigan agriculture or to farming in any area of the state.

The 1966 winner was Gerber Products Co., Fremont baby food manufacturer, for development of sweet potato growing in

Michigan. The 1965 winner was Andrew F. Murch of Paw Paw for a new method of grape juice processing.

General Chairman Harden urged that farm organizations and chamber of commerce in every county start now lining up entries for the county contests. He asked them to contact awards chairmen of their county and regional Michigan Week organizations without delay. He said representatives of the Cooperative - Extension Service, both in the counties and at MSU in East Lansing, will be glad to assist, as will the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

A handbook with detailed rules and procedures for both contests will then be available in all communities and at the state Michigan Week Office, 520 Cherry St., Lansing 48933.

**Consumers to Construct Pipe Line**

The Michigan Public Service Commission has announced authorized Consumer Power Company to construct a 20-inch pipeline from the junction of its 26-inch White Pigeon-Northville pipeline and the Michigan Gas Storage Company's 20-inch pipeline in Sylvania Township of Washtenaw County to a point on Highway M-52 where metering and regulating facilities will be installed.

The Company in its petition pointed out that the cost of the pipeline would be higher than the expense of building a road into the center of the section for metering purposes, but that elimination of future road maintenance and convenience of operation of the metering and regulation facility would justify the additional cost of construction.

OPEN LETTER TO CITIZENS OF MANCHESTER

Con gressman Melvin Laird has introduced in the House of representatives a resolution which expresses the following:

The sense of Congress that in the interest of peace in Vietnam the Government of the United States should only consider further expansions of trade, educational and cultural exchanges, and other related agreements with the Soviet Union and its East European satellites when there is demonstrable evidence that their actions and policies with regard to Vietnam have been redirected toward peace and an honorable settlement and when there is demonstrable evidence that they have abandoned their policy of support for so-called wars of national liberation."

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Construction Helps Washtenaw Values

Manchester Township Supervisor Clayton Parr who cast the only "no" vote on the equalization report before the Washtenaw County Board of Supervisors, said later he will not submit an appeal to the State Tax Commission.

He said that he did not have time to study the report before he was asked to vote but is satisfied now that he has had time to talk over the questions with the equalization advisor George Kotishak.

In Washtenaw, the construction boom has increased the county valuation by a record \$85 million or a new high of \$866,720,254.

The new Ford Motor Co. plant in Saline, building programs in the county and equalization studies in some areas brought the valuation up. This year's equalized valuation is up 11 per cent.

Last year's percentage increase was 6.48 per cent and the year before there was a 6.1 per cent increase.

In Manchester Township, which had the greatest increase in the townships, the amount of gain was \$4,946,152.

Manchester Township's assessed valuation went up more than a million dollars and the equalized valuation climbed from \$8 million to \$12 million.

The bulk is in new property adjustment, Parr said.

Townships with gains of more than \$1 million include Dexter, Lima, Pittsfield and Superior.

Saline increased its valuation from \$15,052,100 to \$27,004,300 and its percentage of the county total from 1.92 to 3.11 per cent.

The valuation hike of \$85 million was called "remarkable" by Supt. Robert Harrison Jr., chairman of the county supervisors' equalization committee.

He said that the committee had previously estimated an increase of between \$55 and \$75 million.

The county lost \$10 million in farm personal property which has been exempted from taxation by the Legislature.

The state equalized valuation will be used by school districts, the county and some townships against which to levy their regular and extra voted millage rates in the winter of 1967.

The state equalized is about the same as last year's.

The new rates will pretty much affect everyone in the village.
