## PROPOSED ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEEDS \$650,000, BOND ISSUE OK DISTRICT READIES FOR ANNUAL ELECTION

The annual election of the Manchester Public School District in Washitaw and Jackson counties will be held Monday, June 12. Polls will be open at 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. Monday, June 12 in the High School Music Room East Main Street.

Two members of the Board of Education for full four-year terms will be elected. Nominated to the vacancies are incumbents Charles C. Klager and Laurin F. Olson and Mrs. Don Limpert and Richard E. Way.

Only persons registered as voters in the township in which they reside are eligible to vote. Qualified electors will also vote on the proposition: Shall Manchester Public School District borrow the sum not to exceed \$650,000 so as to erect, furnish and equip a new elementary school house, construct and equip playgrounds, acquire additional

land for site purposes and develop and improve sites. Only property owners or the lawful husband or wife of a qualified voter will be eligible to vote on this issue.

The proposed new elementary building will consist of a kindergarten, 12 classrooms, multipurpose room, PTA kitchen, library storage, visiting teachers conference room faculty room, faculty toilets, offices for principal and secretary, waiting area, health room workroom and supply storage, heating plant and receiving and storage. A part of the money in the bond issue will be used to acquire a new site and develop a portion of it for elementary school play areas, walks, parking and drives.

Louis C. Kingscott & Associates have estimated all costs for acquisition and development of the site and for erecting and furnishing the proposed elementary

school at \$650,000. Bonds will be retired over a 29-period during which time taxes will be levied. School officials point out that bonding attorneys estimate that about 1.98 mills (\$1.98 per \$1,000) of state equalized valuation will be required to meet bond interest and principal payments.

If the additional cost to the taxpayer is \$1.98 per thousand on state equalized valuation the estimated amounts for each of the four major townships in the school district would be: Bridgewater \$4.38 per \$1,000 Freedom \$4.85 per \$1,000 Manchester \$4.95 per \$1,000 Sharon \$6.24 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Based on past experiences of the Manchester School District, school officials point out that it is unlikely that the tax rate will be higher, but it is quite possible

## Manchester Students 'Adopt' Korean Orphans

"Whenever our teenagers stray from the straight and narrow path we are quick to complain and the student is brought to the attention of everyone. But often times our young people do worthy projects and little is said," Mrs. Robert Swartz remarked.

She was looking at the certificate which came to the Manchester High School in recognition of the school's participation in applying money to make living a little easier for two Korean children.

Her daughter, Sue, had read about the Taegu Appenzeller children's Project of Taegu, Korea and how it was handled by the Christian Children's Fund of Richmond, Va. It explained how these Korean children could literally be "adopted" for \$10 a month and the money would be sent to

help some deserving child. It sounded like a good idea to Sue and she suggested it to the Student Council. If 200 students would give ten cents a month the school could "adopt" two children.

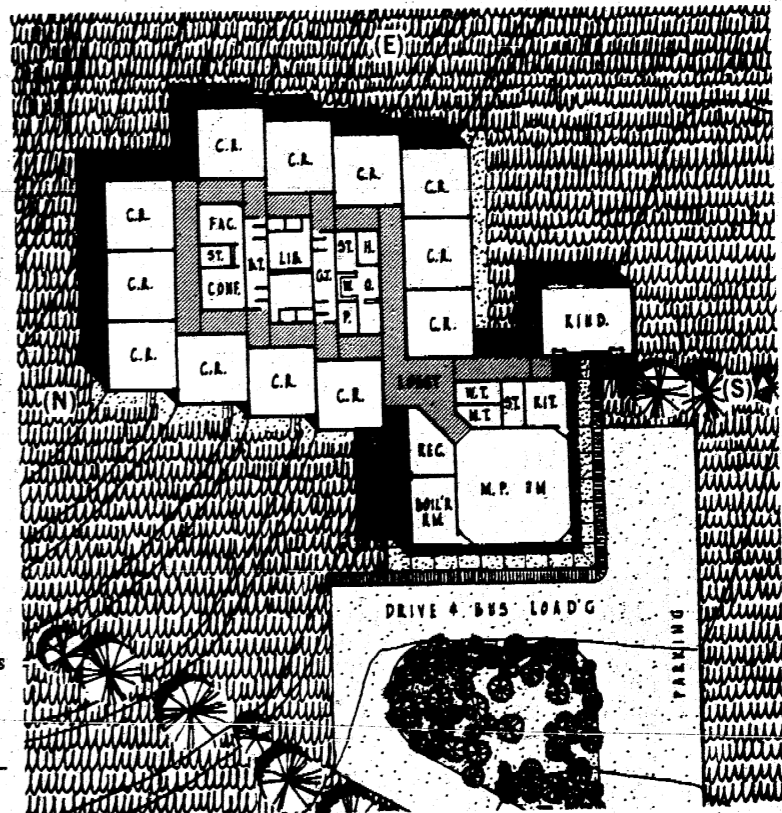
The two children assisted by the Manchester High School were Yoon Sung Ji (boy) and Chang Sun Ae (a girl). The students managed an extra \$5 for Christmas for each of them and also for their birthdays.

In the return letters written in Korean there was always an accompanying translation. Many times the money was used to "supplement the house rent" or to buy food.

One girl was designated from each of the high school classes to take up the collection once a month. The project is over and the dimes which added to \$200

were scarcely noticed by the donors but they brought a wealth of happiness to the young Koreans who received the monthly gifts for their support.

In a letter to the Manchester Schools from the Christian Children's Fund early this month it is explained that once a child is taken into the home he is not dismissed when the sponsor finds it necessary to cancel. The home continues to care for the child from a General Fund until another sponsor can be found. They do not write or send packages after the sponsorship has been cancelled. This privilege is assumed by the child's new sponsor and might cause misunderstanding, according to Verbon Kemp, executive Director of the Christian Children's Fund.

FOCUS ON POSITIVES FOR CHILDREN

Focus on "do's" instead of "don'ts" if you want to give your child the best guidance. Mrs. Helen Fairman, home economist with the Cooperative Extension Service in Washtenaw, Washe, and Monroe counties, suggests several helpful guidelines.

Mrs. Fairman says, "If you turn to the ways parents guide children, you'll hear the words, 'do', 'stop', and 'quit' preceding many commands to children."

"If the child is in danger of hurting himself or someone else, these words may be necessary. However, in most situations just telling a child what not to do doesn't prepare for what to do, or teach him how to handle a situation in a better way."

Mrs. Fairman suggests an exercise for parents in translating "don'ts" into "do's".

Instead of saying "Don't throw the ball," translate it into, "Roll the ball on the floor." Or, "Hold the kitty gently," instead of "Don't squeeze the kitten."

Mrs. Fairman adds that it is important for a child to develop a feeling that he is capable of doing things. "A 'can do' feeling enables a child to try new things and to approach school and other life situations with confidence."

Being exposed to too many exciting experiences destroys self-confidence in a child, she notes. "A home economist points out, for instance, if after a mistake he tells a child, 'Can't you ever do anything right?' We may never see him do anything right, but we may be helping a child go to better things by learning to do it right, within the limits of his ability and maturity."

These suggestions, and others, are being placed in a new bulletin, "Child Guidance Techniques," available at the Washtenaw county office by asking for Extension Bulletin 65.

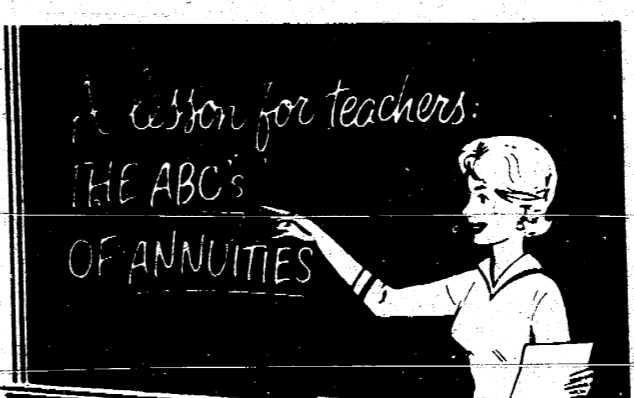

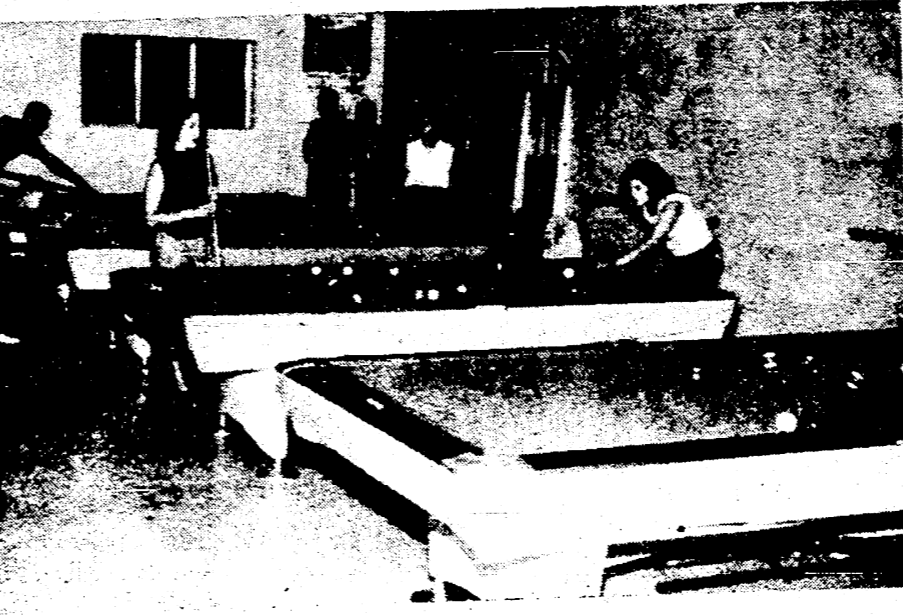
