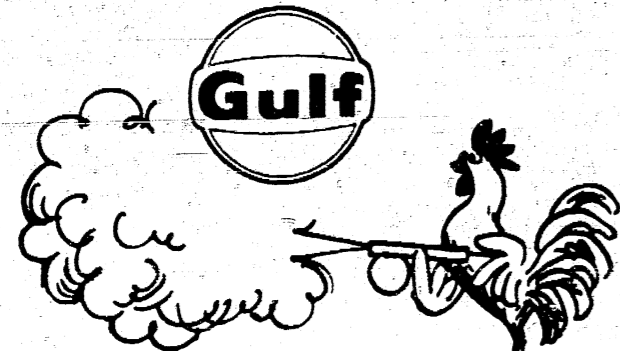

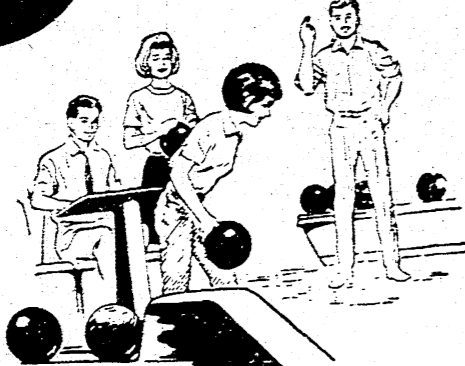

While here they attended several family graduation exercises. They left Monday morning to visit at several other points before returning to their home on June 18.

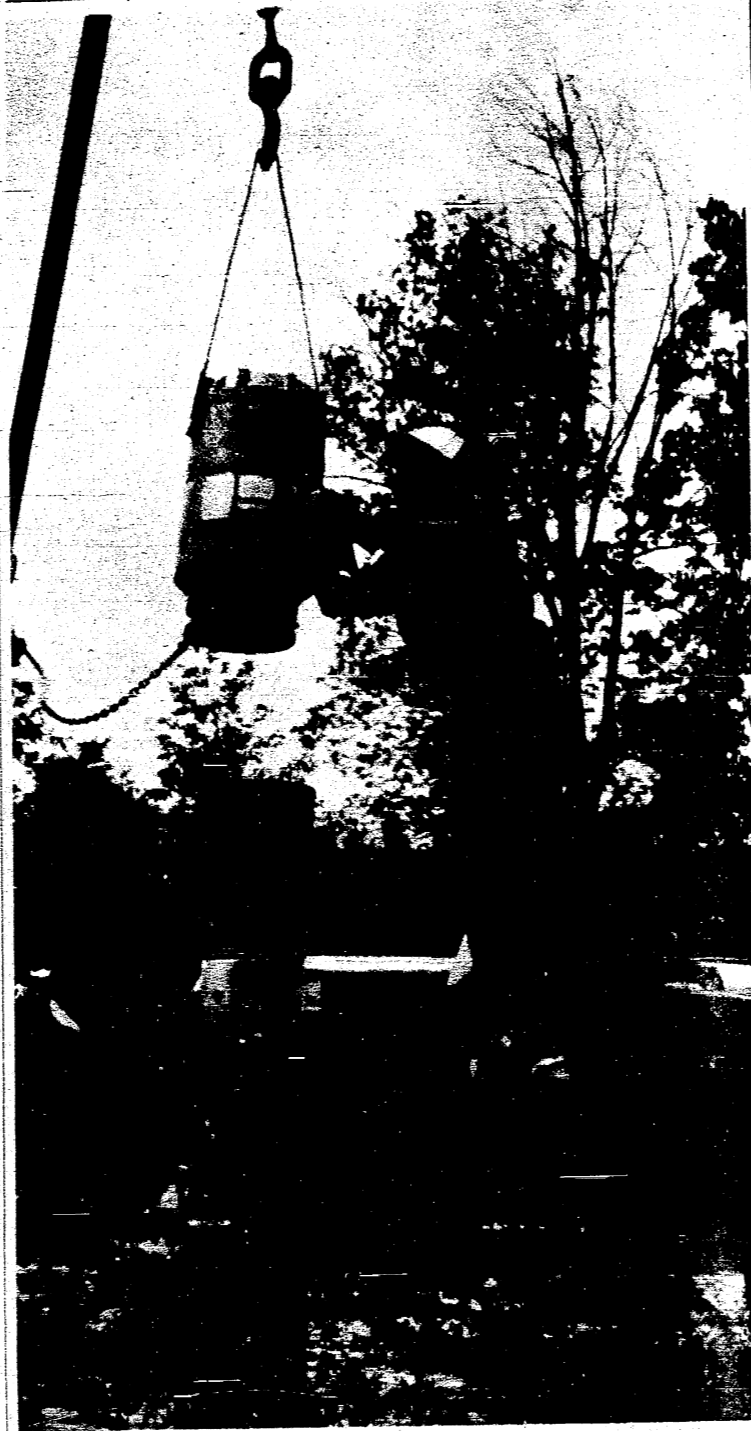

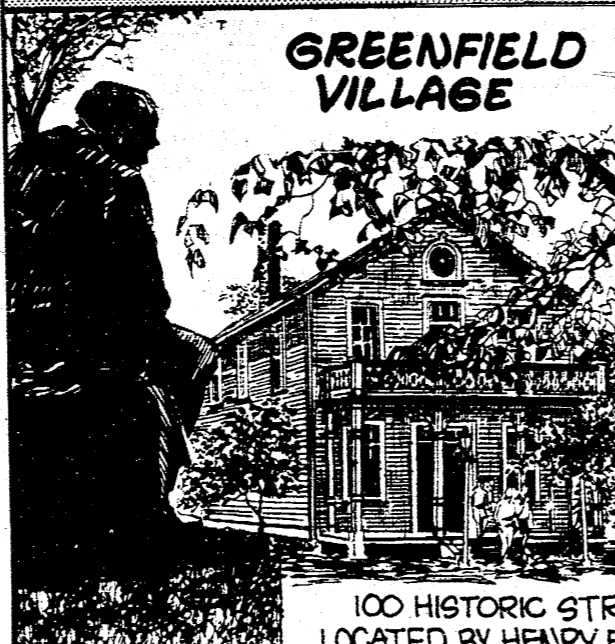

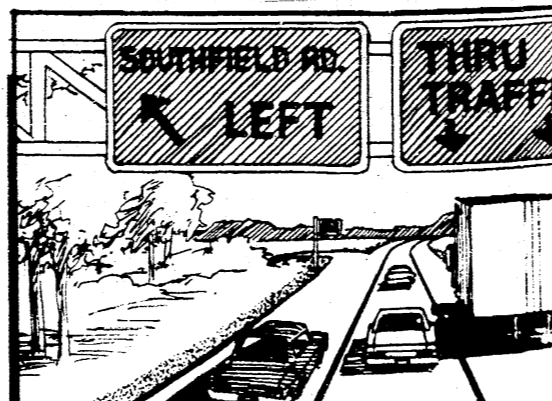

BENEFIT SPEEDWAY RACE FOR SCHILL FRIDAY

A benefit Speedway Race is slated for Friday, June 16 at the Manchester Speedway with time trials at 7 and racing at 8:30 p. m. The entire purse will be donated to Harold Schill, 27 years, of Howell who was critically injured at a race at the Speedway in June 2.

Last Friday following the races, one of the drivers, Sheriff Douglas Harvey (Washtenaw County) was discussing with the drivers that they might do to aid the injured driver. He suggested that they might give a part of a percentage of the purse to him.

The Sheriff said, "The boys not only went along with the suggestion but they voted a hundred percent to donate the entire purse to Schill. They are a good-hearted bunch of drivers."

The Washtenaw Sheriff is promoting the benefit race and is inviting some of the top names in the racing field to race at the speedway Friday night. The Sheriff says that there will be drivers from Toledo, Ohio, Flat Rock, Angola, Ind. and many other places-donating their efforts to this charity race.

"Drivers who have never been at the Manchester Speedway will be there and it promises to be an outstanding race. Don't forget that there is a Sunday night program in the event of rain," Harvey said.

The Washtenaw Sheriff often drives at the local Speedway--if someone furnishes him with a car. He drove in the race which followed the one in which Schill was injured on June 2. But he doesn't race for personal gain.

Schill has been racing for the past eight or nine years and raced at Angola, Indiana and the Butler Speedway before his father opened the speedway here six years ago. He remains in a semi-conscious condition at University Hospital.

Miss Carol Westfall has been selected by the Manchester Jaycees as the year's recipient of the Jaycee Scholarship. This year the scholarship is \$200.

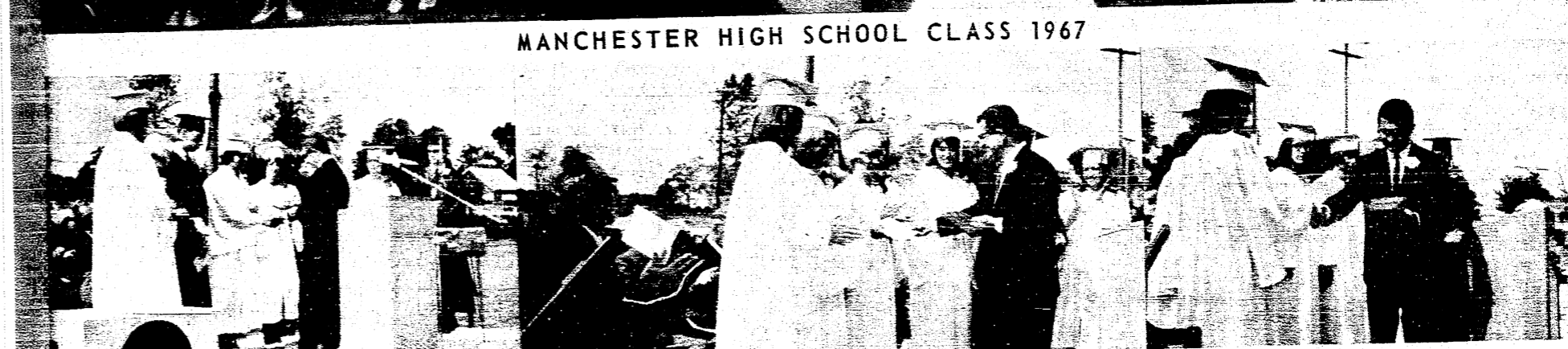
Carol was selected from 13 seniors of the Manchester High School graduating Class, who applied.

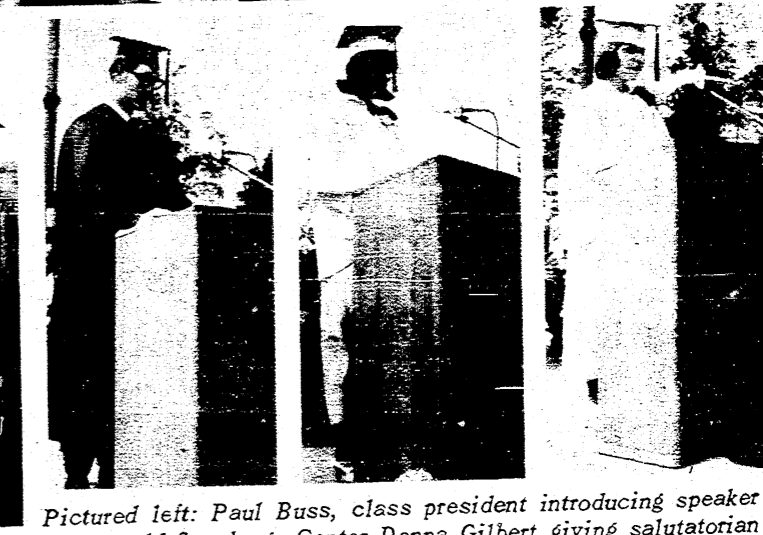

FEDERAL GRANTS FOR LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT

Congressman Marvin L. Esch has announced approval of applications for federal grants submitted to the U. S. Office of Education by the Washtenaw County Community College and Monroe County Community College for library development.

On April 10, 1967, the Washtenaw County Community College submitted an application to receive a grant available through Title 11-A of the Library Services and Construction Act. COUNTY GIVEN \$646,640 FOR ROAD WORK

The department of the State Highways has allotted \$646,640 to Washtenaw county from Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections for the first quarter of 1967.

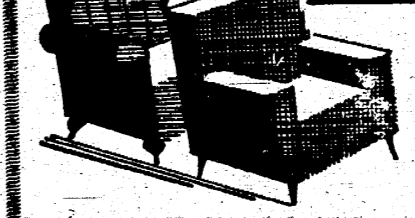
The amounts to be paid to incorporated cities and villages in the area include: Manchester, \$7,360; Chelsea, \$11,785; Dexter, \$6,691; Ann Arbor, \$248,813; Clinton, \$5,663; Milan, \$13,469; Saline, \$8,408; Tecumseh, \$26,836.

State Highway Director Howard Hill said gross collections during January, February and March of 1967 amounted to \$101,812,791 from which collection costs of \$1,778,109 and the Waterways Commission's share amounting to \$221,485 were deducted before distribution.

The net amount of Motor Vehicle Highway Fund revenues available for distribution for the quarter amounted to \$99,813,197 an increase of \$2,819,081 over revenues distributed for the same period in 1966.

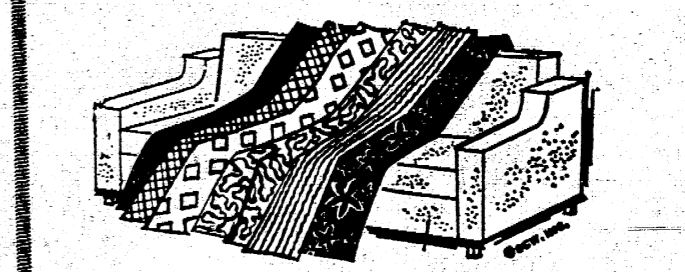
After deductions the money is distributed under provisions of state law which provides that 47 per cent goes to the Department of State Highways for use on state highways, 35 percent to the state's 83 counties for use on county roads, and 18 percent to 522 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

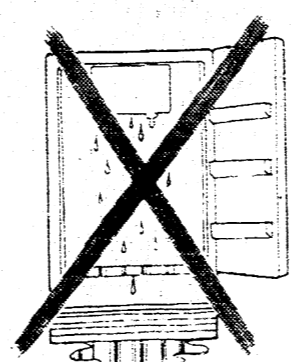
