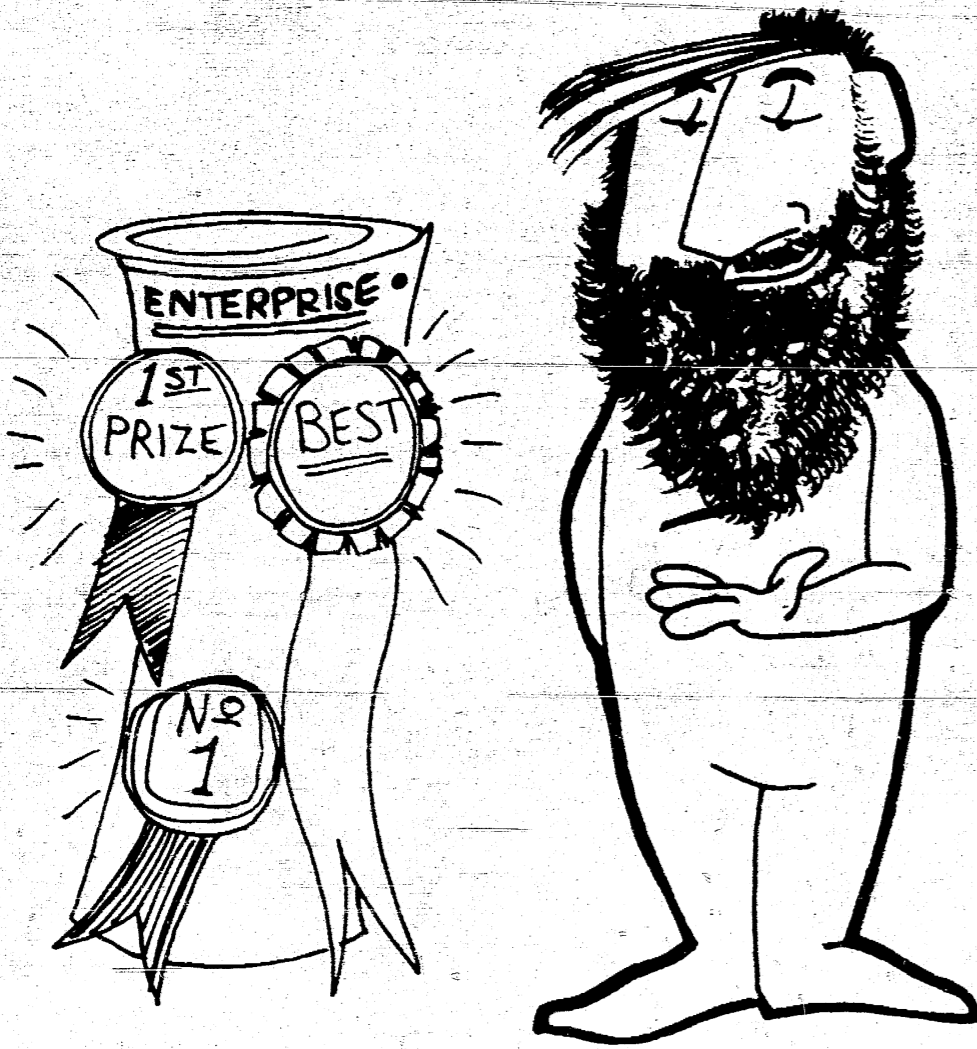

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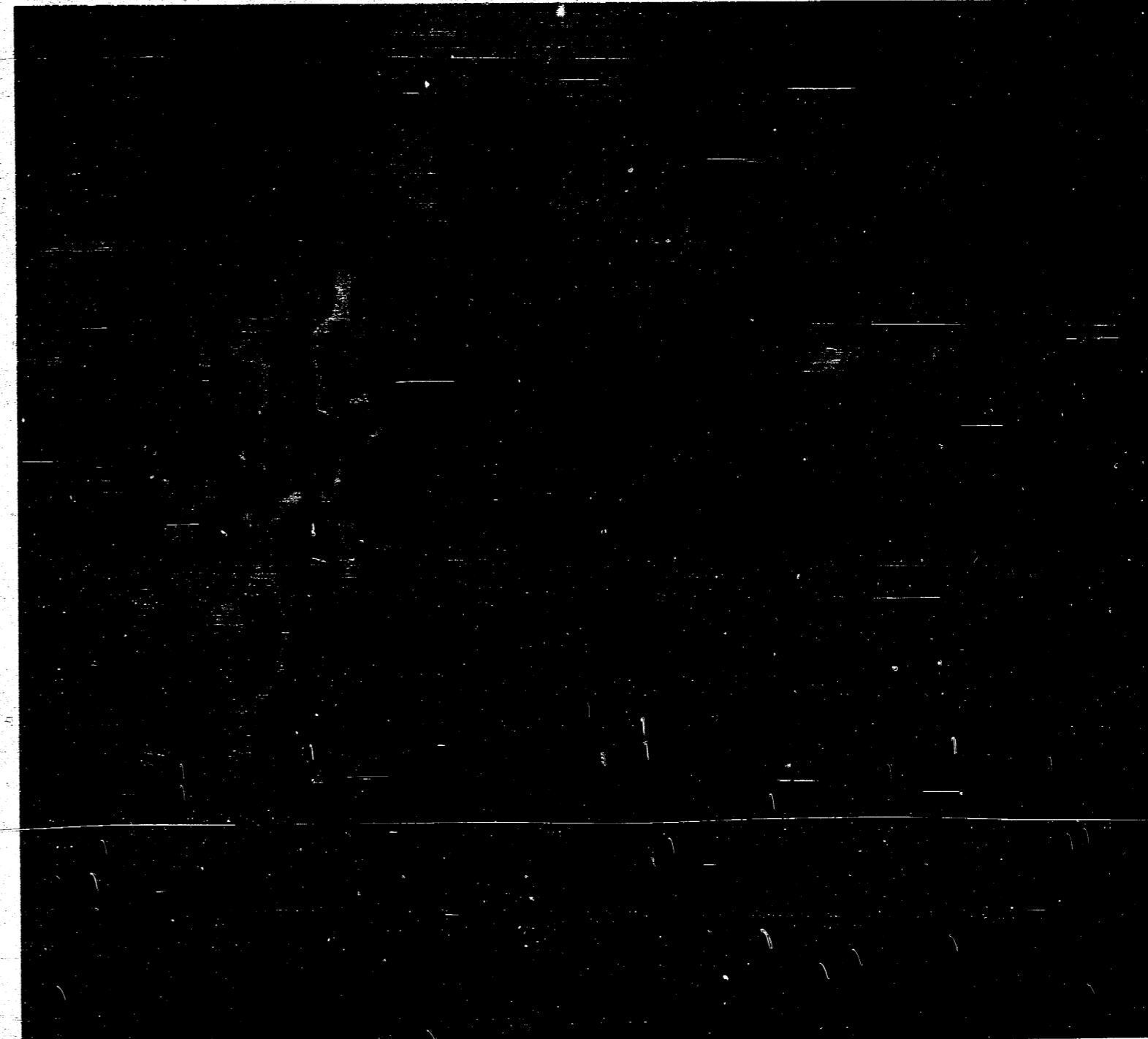

### LOCAL BOY, 14, DROWNS

Thomas Miller of 423 East Main and a friend, 12-year old Mandel Armstrong of 18646 Austin, were fishing in the Raisin River Wednesday afternoon when they both decided to take a swim.

Because they had not brought along swimming trunks, the boys dove into the water fully clothed, including socks and shoes.

The Armstrong boy said the 14-year old was swimming about 75 feet from the shore when he appeared to be having a hard time staying afloat. Suddenly the youth disappeared under the water and the Armstrong dived beneath the surface in a vain effort to find him.

Unable to locate Miller, Armstrong swam to shore and ran to a nearby house to ask for help. The Manchester village police and volunteer firemen were summoned to the scene. A call was also placed for skindivers from the Sheriff's Department.

However, before the sheriff's men could reach the scene, Manchester volunteer firemen located the body while checking the river from a boat. Firemen said they could see bubbles rising to the surface where the body was found.

The youth was taken to shore where firemen unsuccessfully used a resuscitator on him for 20 minutes. Dr. William Purfield pronounced the boy dead.

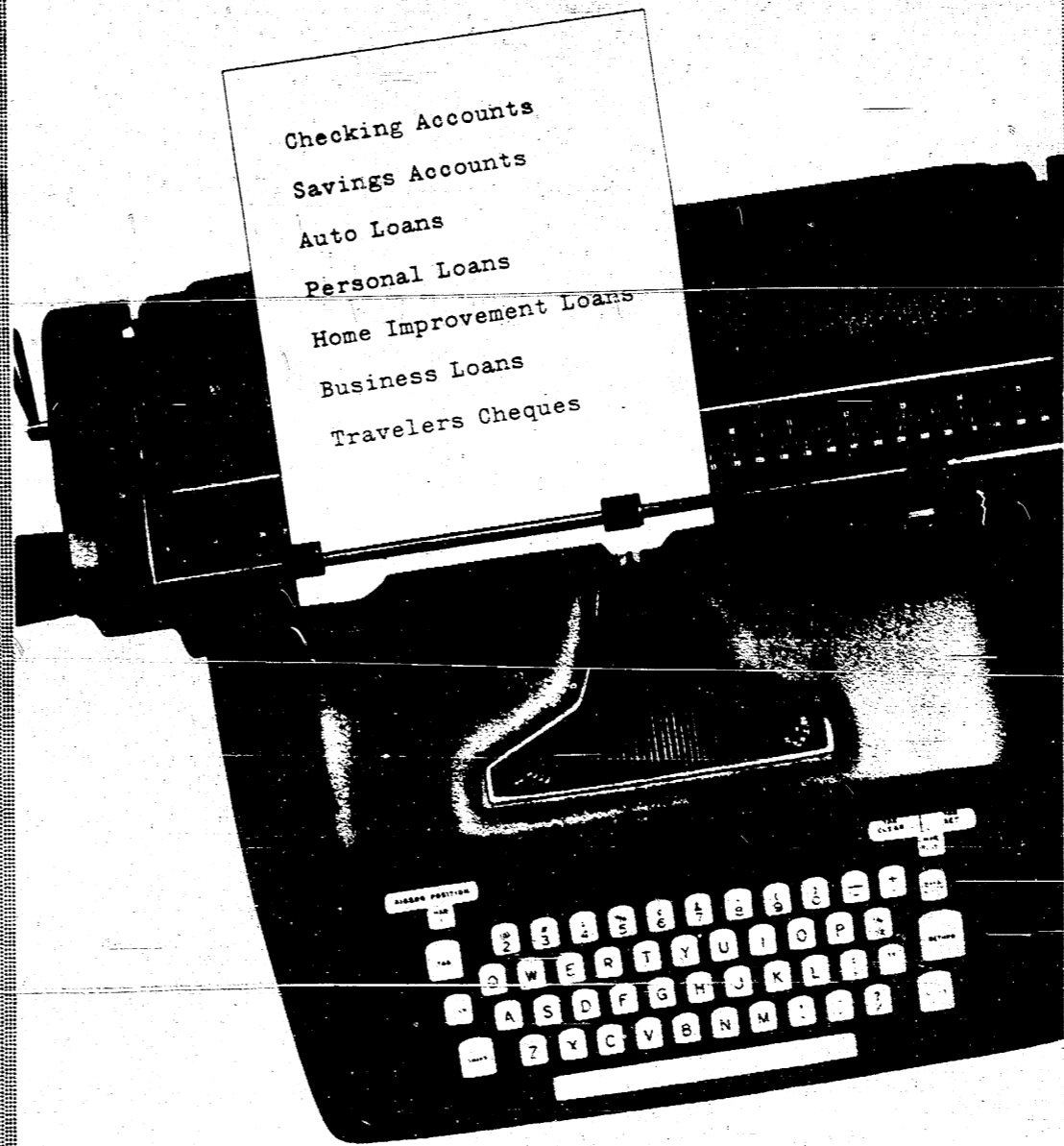

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# Bursitis--- Painful Joints Can Be Helped By Special Care

Sometimes it's "housemaid's knee." Or "policeman's heel." By any other name it's still bursitis, and it is one of mankind's more painful and disabling ailments.

Bursitis, says the American Medical Association, means inflammation of a lubricating sac about a joint. The sac, called a bursa, is similar to a collapsed balloon with some fluid inside. It is located at various places in the body where joints or tissues touch and rub, and without cushioning there would be friction.

Bursitis can hit at many points in the body, but most often occurs in the shoulder, elbow or knee.

In almost every case bursitis follows unaccustomed strain or overuse of an extremity. By taking a little time to work up to your physical condition, and especially by working up the muscles that you plan to use in any repetitious motion outside your normal activity (strengthening your wrist and arm before starting to paint the house,



for instance) you can probably keep clear of this common and painful ailment.

If you get bursitis, no one need suggest that you see a doctor. The pain is so acute that you will be the first to seek relief.

In recent years science has learned much about bursitis, and there is much your doctor can do to relieve the pain and promote healing. One of the mainstays in treatment is a mild pain killer. The newer cortisone-type drugs have been used with some success. Heat treatments also have their place in bursitis therapy. In extreme cases surgery may be required. A treatment long used in this painful ailment is complete rest in bed. Anything that will lessen the chance of the afflicted joint being moved will ease the pain and speed healing.

Like any other bearings, your bursae stay trouble-free much longer if you warm them up slowly and let them get fully lubricated before you race the motor.

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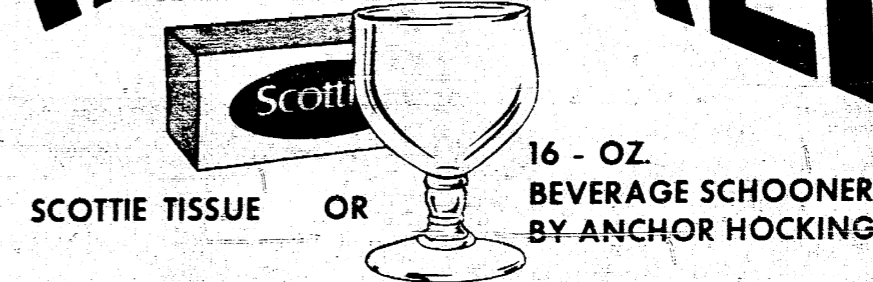


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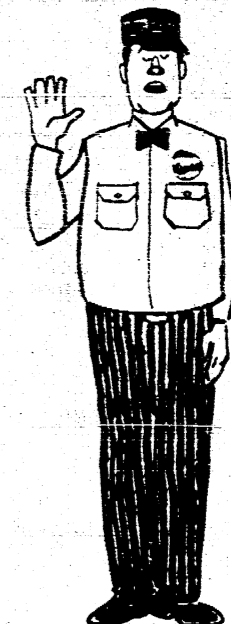
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**GREENHILL SCHOOL OPENING ASSURED**

Opening of Greenhills School in the fall of 1968 was assured today as pledges and gifts to the school passed the \$531,000 mark in a drive to raise funds for construction of the first complex of classrooms, according to Donald A. Roach, president of Greenhills' board of trustees.

The capital gifts committee, headed by co-chairmen Dr. and Mrs. Richard D. Judge, has an ultimate objective of \$2.6 million to be raised over the next five years.

Plans for the school will be let out for bidding next week, with groundbreaking scheduled for early September, Roach said.

Two other major objectives were achieved last week when the school was approved by the State Board of Education and also received a charter of incorporation as a non-profit educational institution.

"The enthusiasm and generosity with which friends of Greenhills School have responded to our request for funds to meet this first objective gives us great confidence that we can meet our final goal of \$2.6 million," Judge said.

"We extend our sincere thanks to them who have been working almost around the clock in an effort to guarantee opening of the school next year."

Judge said that more than 200 families representing some 400 boys and girls have expressed an interest in enrolling their children in the school when it opens in 1968.

Phase one of the construction program calls for six classrooms for grades seven, eight and nine, handling an enrollment of about 75 boys and girls.

Judge emphasized that the campaign for funds will continue.

The campaign committee, in addition to the judges, includes Mr. and Mrs. Roach, Mrs. Harry W. Anderson, Thomas L. Dickson, Mrs. John W. Edwards Jr., Michael Radock, Jack L. Shipman, Paul Tippet, and Mrs. Charles F. Weist.

## ORDINANCE NO. 2 AMENDMENT TO MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP PERMANENT ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH ZONING DISTRICTS AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE UNINCORPORATED PORTIONS OF MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 184 OF THE PUBLIC ACTS OF 1943 AS AMENDED: TO PROVIDE FOR REGULATIONS GOVERNING NONCONFORMING USES AND STRUCTURES: TO PROVIDE FOR A BOARD OF APPEALS AND ITS DUTIES AND POWERS: TO PROVIDE FOR BUILDING PERMITS AND THE COLLECTION OF FEES THEREFOR: TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF THIS ORDINANCE INCLUDING THE OFFICIAL WHOSE DUTY IT SHALL BE TO ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS THEREOF: TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE: AND TO PROVIDE FOR CONFLICTS WITH OTHER ORDINANCES OR REGULATIONS.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

1. Section 3.02 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

### 3.02-ZONING

Said districts are bounded and defined as shown on a map entitled "Zoning Map of Manchester Township" which accompanies and which, with all explanatory matter thereof, is hereby made a part of this ordinance.

2. Section 3.03 thereof is deleted and the following substituted therefor:

### 3.03-LOCATION OF DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

A. Unless otherwise shown on the Zoning Map, the boundary lines of districts shall follow along the lines indicated on the United States Land Office Survey Maps, or the lines of legal subdivisions of land indicated on such maps; or the center line of highways, streets, alleys or waterways; or the shore lines of water bodies; or the boundaries of unincorporated areas; or the boundary lines or recorded plats; or property lines and the extension of any such lines indicated on the Zoning Map.

B. Where the boundaries of use districts are so indicated that they appear parallel to the right-of-way lines of roads, such boundaries shall be construed as parallel thereto and at such distance therefrom as indicated on the Zoning Map. If no distance is indicated such dimensions shall be determined by the use of the scale shown on said Zoning Map.

3. Section 10.09 Subsection B, is deleted therefrom.

4. Section 11.07 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

### Section 11.07 - APPLICATION FOR TEMPORARY STRUCTURE PERMIT

An application for a permit for the erection or movement of a temporary structure for dwelling purpose shall be made to the Board of Appeals on a special form used exclusively for that purpose, and fee paid as required under Section 11.16 of this ordinance.

5. Section 11.08 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

### Section 11.08 - HEARING AND REQUIRED FINDINGS

The Board of Appeals shall give due notice of a hearing on such application. No permit shall be granted by the Board of Appeals unless it finds adequate evidence showing:

A. That the proposed location will not be detrimental to the property in the immediate vicinity.

B. That the proposed water supply and sanitary facilities have been approved by the Washtenaw County Health Department.

6. Section 11.09 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

### Section 11.09 - TEMPORARY STRUCTURE PERMIT LIMITATIONS

In the granting of such a permit the Board of Appeals may impose any reasonable conditions deemed necessary to protect the public welfare and the breach of any such condition shall automatically invalidate the permit. The Board of Appeals before granting such permit shall require that the person to whom such permit is to be issued post a cash indemnity bond not to exceed \$200.00, which shall be forfeited to the Township upon the breach of any cond-

tion so imposed for use of the temporary structure for dwelling purposes after expiration of the temporary permit. Said permit shall clearly set forth that the structure proposed is intended for temporary dwelling purposes and that said structure is to be vacated upon the expiration of a specific time limit to be determined by the Township Board of Appeals not to exceed one year. On delivery of the permit, the owner and occupant shall certify in a space allotted for the purposes that he or she has full knowledge of the terms of the permit and penalty pertaining thereto. No permit shall be transferable to any other owner or occupant. No permit shall be renewed, except after hearing as herein provided for the original permit and then only for a period not to exceed six months or in cases of extreme hardship upon written evidence, additional one year extension may be granted.

7. The forgoing amendment to the Manchester Township Permanent Zoning Ordinance was approved and adopted by the Township Board of Manchester Township on July 10, 1967, in order to take effect after elapse of thirty days from its publication in the Manchester Enterprise a newspaper having a general circulation within Manchester Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan as required by Act 191 of the Public Acts for the State of Michigan for 1939 as amended.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 63 ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE ERECTION, CONSTRUCTION, ENLARGEMENT, ALTERATION, REPAIR, MOVING, REMOVAL, DEMOLITION, REPAIR, MOVING, REMOVAL, PANCY HEIGHT AND AREA AND MAINTENANCE OF ALL BUILDINGS AND/OR STRUCTURES AND THEIR APPURTENANCES AND SERVICE EQUIPMENT IN THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER, MICHIGAN: PROVIDING AND OFFICE FOR THE BUILDING OFFICIAL; DEFINING THE SCOPE OF AUTHORITY OF THE BUILDING OFFICIAL; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Village of Manchester Ordains:  
Section 1. Section of Ordinance No. 63 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor: Section 1. That certain documents, copies of which are on file in the Office of the Village Clerk of the Village of Manchester being marked and designated as "BASIC BUILDING CODE, of 1965 BUILDING OFFICIALS CONFERENCE OF AMERICA, INC." together with Supplements thereto, be and the same are hereby adopted by reference, including all reference, including all references therein printed EXCEPT those Sections and Appendices herein amended or added, and this document, together with the provisions of this ordinance, shall be known as the Official Building Code of the Village of Manchester for regulating the erection, construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving, removal, demolition, conversion, use and occupancy, height, area and maintenance of all buildings and/or structures and their appurtenances and service equipment in the Village of Manchester; providing for the office of the Building Official; defining the scope of authority of the Building Official; providing penalties for violation thereof.

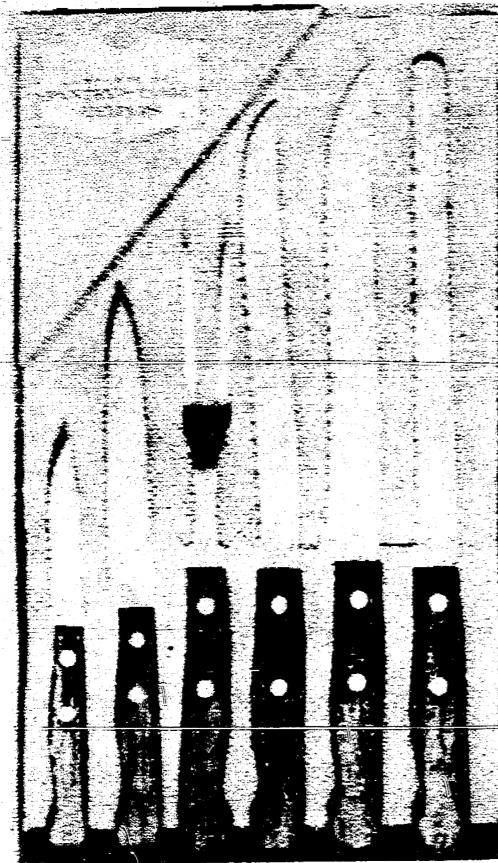

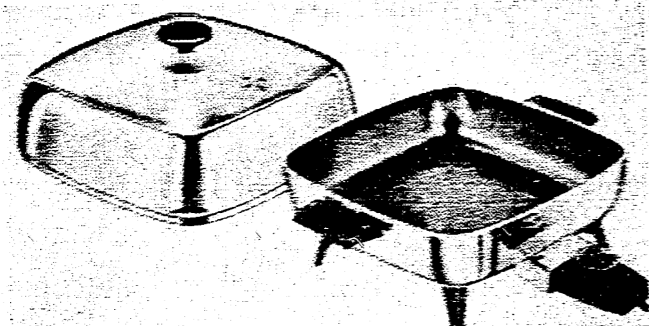

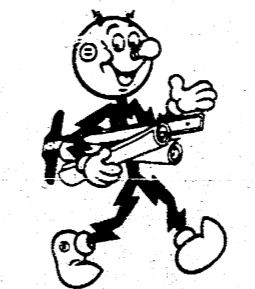

WHEREAS, The Village of Manchester and the Manchester area will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of Manchester during the year of 1967; and

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Village of Manchester and to Mr. Irvin Gill, President of the Manchester Area Centennial Corporation.

Mr. Koceski explained the fact that the money given represented not a gift but a loan, saying "Many individual citizens and business people from Manchester area have made this money available to you through yearly contributions. If this loan is returned to the foundation in due time, this money can again be made available to educate another deserving student".

Each student signed the following statement: "I understand that after completion of my education, to the extent that I am financially able to do so, I will be expected to contribute to this chapter of the Citizens Scholarship Foundation an amount at least equal to any loan I received so that other deserving students in my community may receive help".

Father Schlinkert congratulated each of the students present and pledged that a full report of the monies received and expended in the current "Dollars for Scholars" campaign would be published in the Manchester Enterprise next week.
