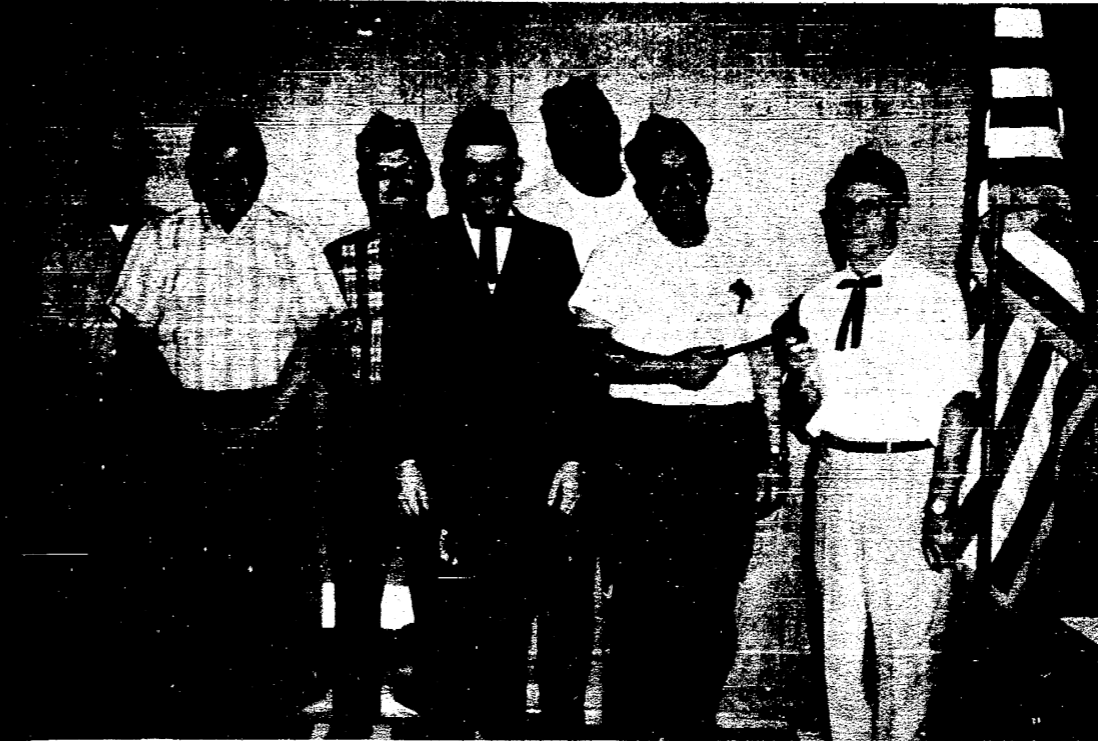

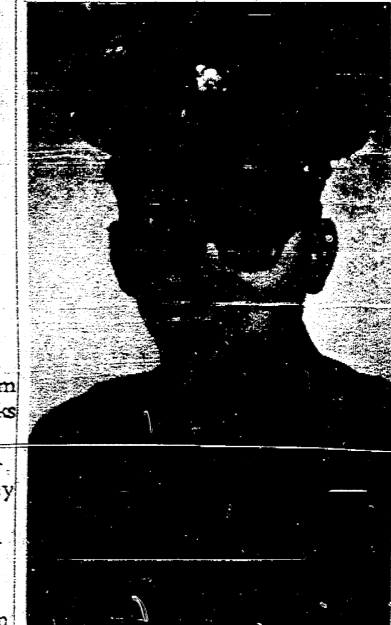

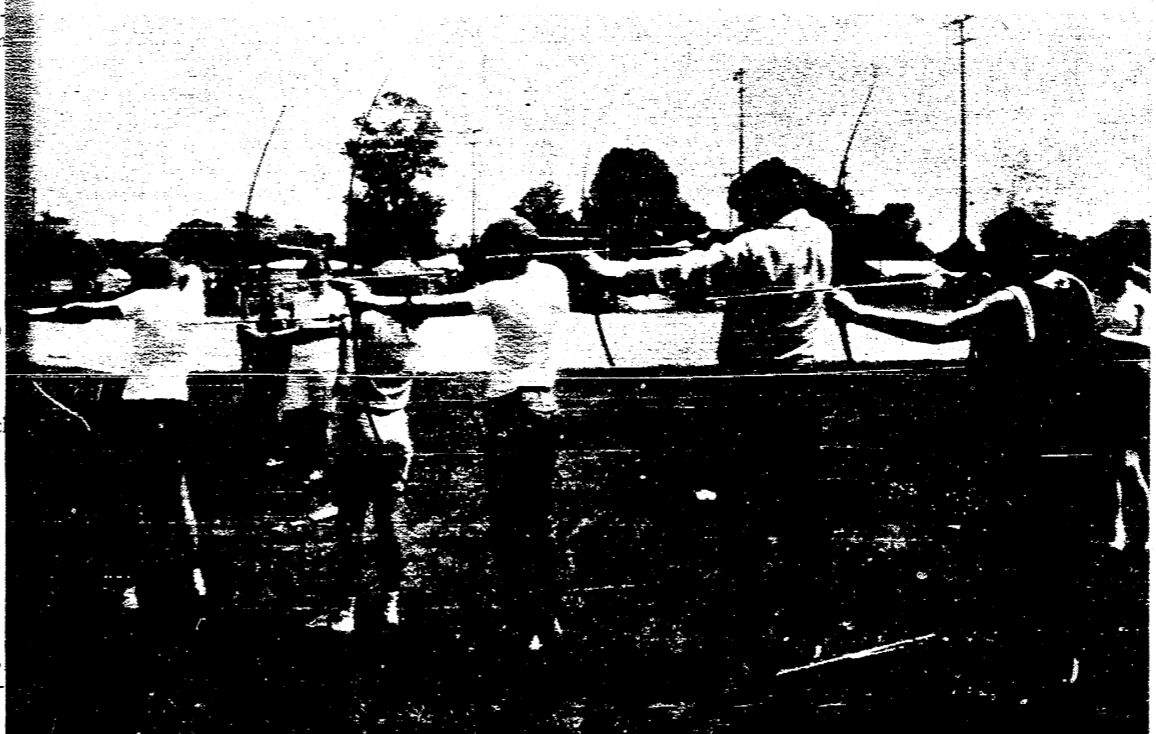

## Do Students Want Job Training?

It is true that high school students are not interested in training for skilled and semi-skilled occupations. Is there an acute shortage of workers trained to do the work of the world because young people do not take advantage of available training, or is it because skilled training is not available to them? An area occupational skills center was made available to them, and high school students take advantage of the training offered? An attempt to answer the above questions, all 10th grade students of high schools in Livingston and Washtenaw Counties were given an opportunity to voice their opinions this past May. As a part of the two-county study on vocational-technical training needs, a questionnaire designed to measure their interest in job training. The questionnaire was mailed to all 10th grade students in the two counties. The results of the questionnaire revealed the following: 939 tenth graders said they would definitely be interested in attending an area occupational skills center for part of their school in the 11th and 12th grades. Another 1,377 tenth graders said they would be interested in attending the skills center if they did not continue on their present course of study (primarily college preparatory) at their home high school. Therefore, 2,316 tenth graders (71% of those filling out the questionnaire) indicated an interest in occupational training. When asked to identify specific occupations for which they were interested in training, 50 or more tenth graders expressed an interest in each of 30 different occupations. It seems from the results of this study that, given an adequate variety of occupational choices, high school students are definitely interested in taking advantage of training programs. The study is presently being surveyed by the Michigan State Fair.

**PRODUCER CERTIFICATION**  
Producers in all of the counties in the lower peninsula of Michigan may now certify their compliance with Federal farm programs. This program was started in 25 Michigan counties in 1965 stated Frank Light, Chairman of the Michigan Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation State Committee. Farmers participating in the wheat and feed grain programs report their planted wheat and feed grain acreages to the local ASCS county office and certify to their program compliance. This plan of producer certification has reduced Government costs because fewer farm visits are required to measure the farm crop acreages. In order to provide adequate controls, a percentage of the farms participating in the programs are spot checked to determine accuracy and correctness of data supplied by the participating farmers. In the past two years, the spot checks have revealed very few discrepancies. This proves that the farmers are giving honest and accurate reports to the local ASCS county offices. As a result of the producer certification program, Government costs have been reduced approximately \$100,000 annually in Michigan, thereby saving taxpayers' money.

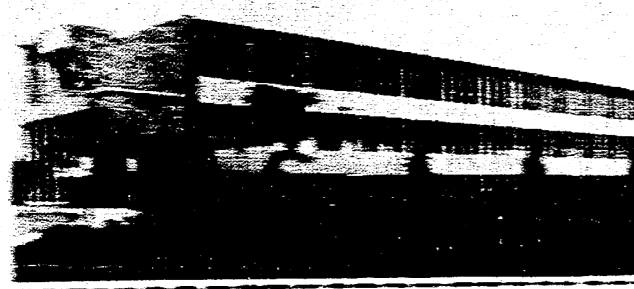

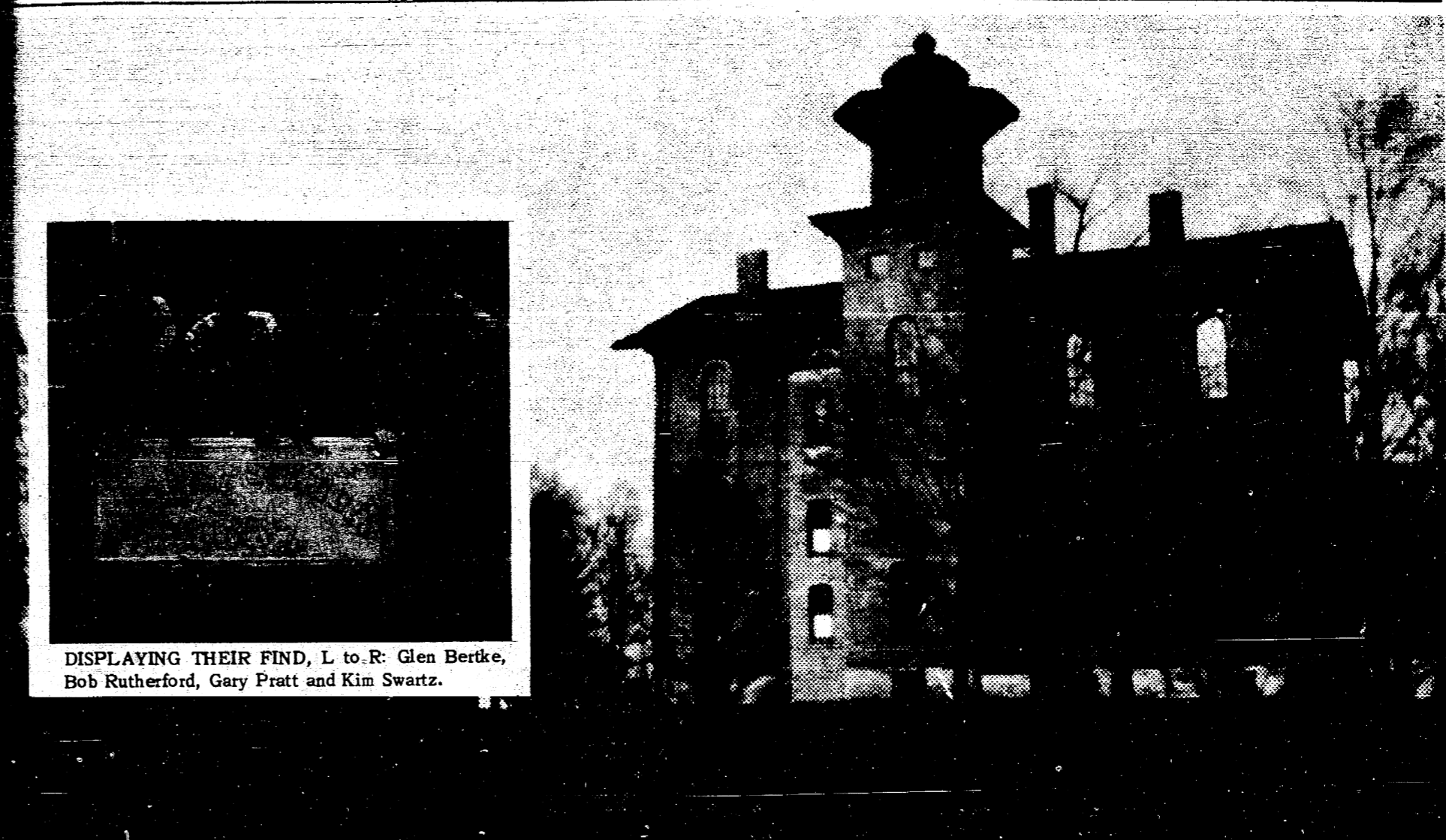

We came down with our camera for a look at the find and found out it was the cornerstone for the Union School of Manchester, a school that was built in 1866. Although the inscription read "Union School 1867", it was our educated guess that this was the dedication date for the school.

So, with our interested more than mildly aroused, we decided to do a little "digging", and after "unearthing" several old Enterprises, came up with the following information: The Union School was built in 1866 at a cost \$21,000. The lot that the school was built on was valued at \$1,000. The entire enrollment, from kindergarten through the 12th grade was 371 students.
