### RED CROSS WARNS OF BREATH-HOLDING GAME

The danger of drowning from extended breath-holding under water was emphasized today by Sister Dorcas of the Washington County Chapter of the Red Cross.

Ms. Dorcas said life warning was addressed to children and teenagers who compete with each other to see who can stay under water the longest.

"Whenever you play this game the simply holding your breath and staying under water is a dangerous practice. This is what happens physiologically," she explained. "Before going under water an individual takes several deep breaths in order to build up as much oxygen in the lungs as possible. This deep breathing, called hyperventilation, does not increase the oxygen, but it lowers the carbon dioxide level in the blood. As a result, the body does not know it is out of oxygen and the person may not know it is out of oxygen until it is too late. This is why you should never play this game. It is a dangerous game and should be avoided."

The same principles apply to swimming under water for long periods, Dorcas said.

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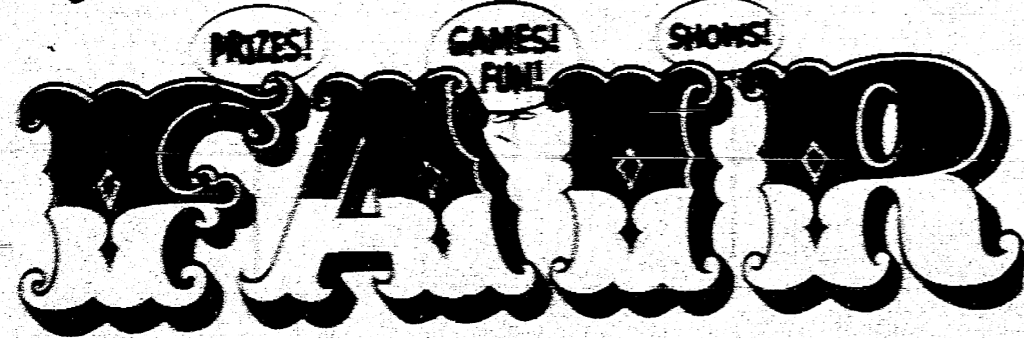

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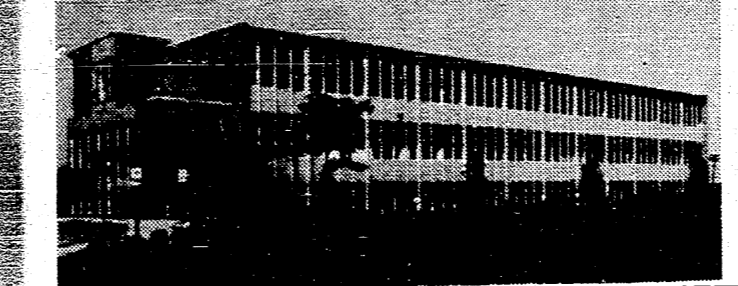
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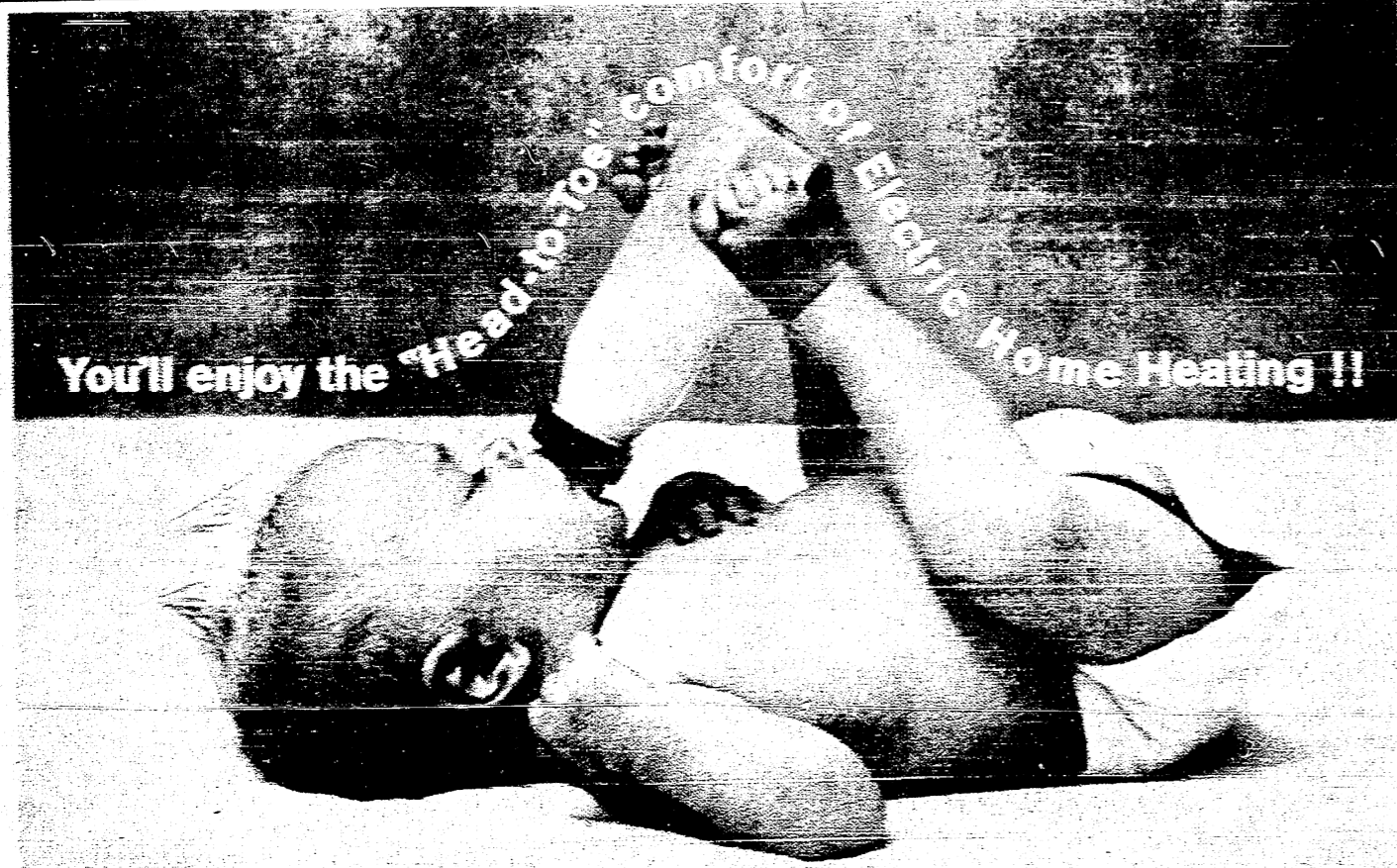

BORDER COLLIE SHOW AS CENTENNIAL EVENT
