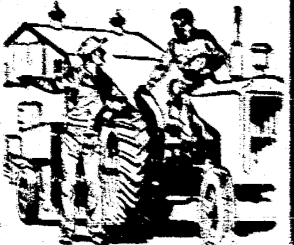

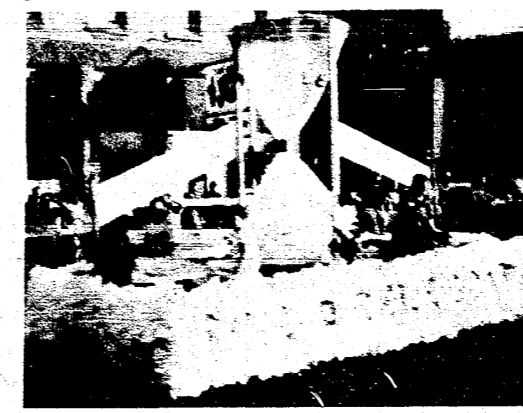

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL CHANGES ANNOUNCED

Changes in the junior high curriculum for the 1967-1968 school year have been announced by Mr. Ted Tapping, Principal. For the first time students will be grouped according to ability for their English classes in both 7th and 8th grades. An experimental course in Linguistics was offered to the 8th graders last year who had a relatively high degree of English proficiency. This is being continued. In addition to this an attempt will be made to schedule other students in such a manner that the English class they are assigned to will be tailored to meet his needs to a greater extent than has been possible in past years. The Junior High Band will be divided with 7th and 8th grade band members practicing on alternate days. Mr. Sortor feels this type of scheduling will enable him to give more individual attention to each student. A Junior High handbook is to be distributed to each student. This includes pertinent information about the school and system wide rules and regulations. All junior high students will be required to register before school opens on September 5th at 8:25 A.M. in the junior high office according to the following schedule: Monday, August 28--7th grade Tuesday, August 29--8th grade Friday, September 1--8th grade appointment only. Students not able to register according to the above schedule and dates will do so on Sept 5, but may have a long wait that day. No student will be admitted to any class until he or she is registered. Fees are due and payable at time of registration. 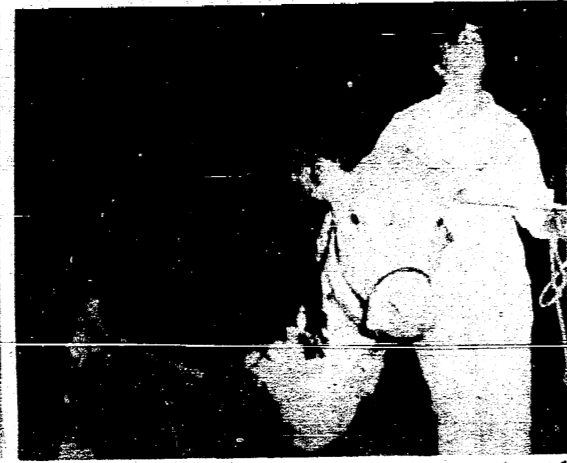
