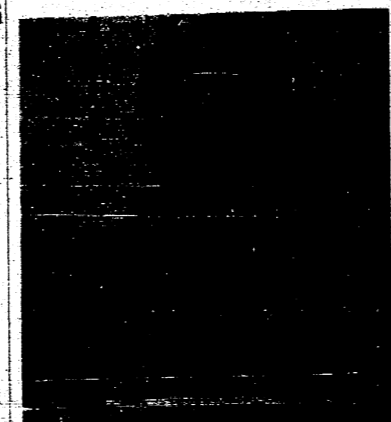

That was the nearest she came to being snowed in.

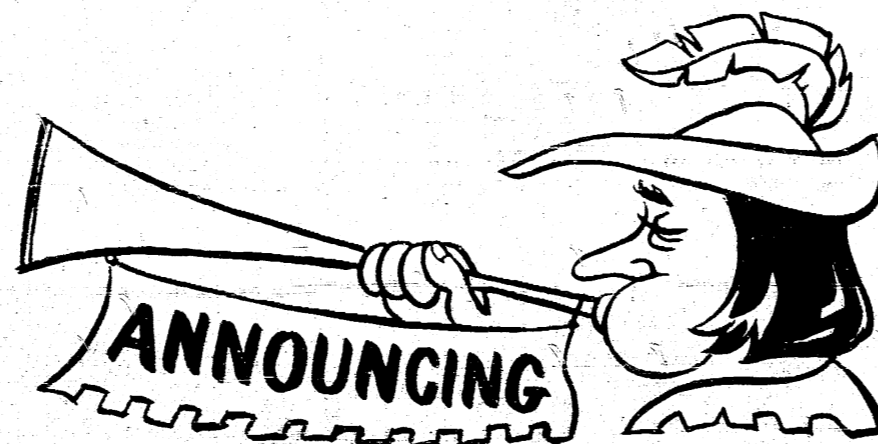

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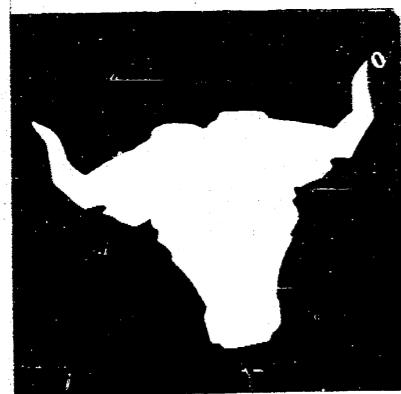

Sister Jane Rose, S.S.J. plans to come from Kalamazoo and sing for this occasion.

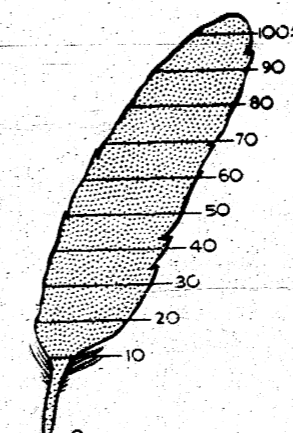
"Unearned"

high grade furniture. The lumberman hailed from North Salem, Indiana and bought in the area around Manchester for sometime before he decided to make Manchester his headquarters. The determining factor was the good railroad siding accommodations. He used to ship entirely by rail and sold to the Thisting Veneer Company of Indianapolis exclusively. Now he ships entirely by truck.

Early settlers in this area found walnut made excellent rafters, beams, fence boards for barns, as well as fine furniture and gun-stocks. They ate the nuts and rested in the pleasant shade. Now black walnut fits into modern life and it is considered a "blue chip" tree. The value has increased more than ever for both beauty and shade, lumber, veneer and novelty wood.

It is estimated that the yearly crop of nuts may soon yield more dollar return than the logs and still new ways to use the nuts, shells and trees are being sought.

Sellers says that when he first came to the area he was informed that the type of trees he needed weren't to be had. But since then he has been supplying the manufacturers with the type of trees they need without too much trouble. At the present time he is working the Lansing area.

At this time buying trees is highly competitive, Sellers said. The job calls for skill and experience in determining the proper trees from which veneer can be cut. After the trees are selected and marked they are sold at the

Manchester Businessman, Frank Tirb Dies Suddenly



Frank H. Tirb, 73, for many years operator of the Chevrolet agency here, died Saturday of a heart attack while deer hunting at a Hubbard Lake lodge, near Alpena.

Hunting companions said Mr. Tirb was talking to another hunter Saturday morning when he collapsed. Mr. Tirb had shot his buck in the opening hours of the hunting season, but he died moments later.

He had left Manchester Thursday with friends on the hunting trip for the lodge where he had gone for several years.

Mr. Tirb owned the Chevrolet dealership here for many years. At the time of his death he was associated in the business with his son Ray.

He was a member of the board of directors of the Union Savings Bank, president of the Oak Grove Cemetery Association, and a member of the Emanuel United Church of Christ. He was also a past Commander of Emil Jacob Post 117 of the American Legion.

He was a life long Manchester area resident and was born Jan. 19 1894 in Freedom Township, the son of William and Wilhelmina Dresselhouse Tirb. On Sept. 18, 1924 he was married to Alma Wiedman. She survives.

Besides the son Ray, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Kenneth (Joyce) Kirkpatrick of Manchester; three grandchildren; 3 brothers, Fred and Clarence of Clinton and Alvin of Manchester; three sisters, Mrs. Frieda Weidman of Clinton, Mrs. Amanda Haussler of Manchester and Mrs. Julia Grossman of Jackson.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Nov. 21 at 1:30 p.m. at Emanuel Church with the Rev. Ralph Kuether officiating. The body was in state at the church from noon until time of the service. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Village Pump to Have House

At the council meeting on Monday the public works committee asked council to approve the purchase of a steel building 8 x 8 x 18 to house the new pump. The recommendation was approved. When the building is no longer needed at the Ann Arbor Street location it will be moved to the treatment plant for a storage facility.

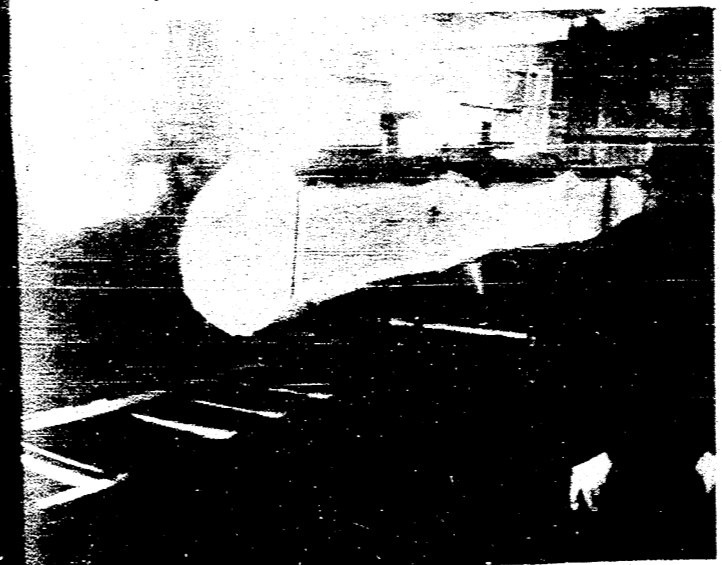
Seller's Sawmill Turns Out Quality Lumber

As you look at a lovely piece of veneer furniture or feel the smoothness of a wall finished without paneling, you will admire the exquisite grain. You can't imagine that it must have come from some far off place and might very well be wrong. Black walnut is Michigan's highly valued wood and its important nut. We can go further and say that it is probably America's most precious wood at this time," said Max

Sellers of Manchester. He is a buyer of veneer logs and operates Seller's sawmill in Manchester. He's a veteran in the business having started to learn it back in 1922 when he went to work with Jesse Lackey, a buyer for Tawls Mahogany. This is the African Company which controlled the mahogany market in the United States. Its central office at that time was in Indianapolis, Ind. and they bought black walnut.

Seller's logs of walnut, white oak, wild cherry, and maple go into the making of veneer and



peek of their maximum growth and value. Then the cutting team moves in and brings down the big fellows.

The buyer has to know his business or blind lions on the trees for first class lumber. Wind shakes, caused by bending from the wind while growing often opens the grain of the wood. Frost checks have the same effect. Sellers does not favor cutting trees which are less than 17 or 18 inches in diameter.

"It used to be that we wouldn't buy under 20 inches (diameter) trees. But 18" trees make good panelling. The price is figured by the board feet and quality. The largest amount I shipped in a year was 68 carloads--that was when we were using the stumps," Sellers said.

Since 1937 he has been hauling by truck. Sellers has been selling to Thisting Veneer since 1926 and still does when he sells the whole log for veneer.

Sellers put up the sawmill in Manchester in 1948 after being in Dexter for seven years. He employs 15 men. Much of the lumber processed here is inspected by Gerald Seese and sold to Budres Lumber Co. of Grand Rapids.

Black walnut can be planted on rough ground, small areas, odd-shaped areas, along roads and fences, in large lawns and around the farm yard. It grows best on rich soil with good drainage and along streams and at the base of

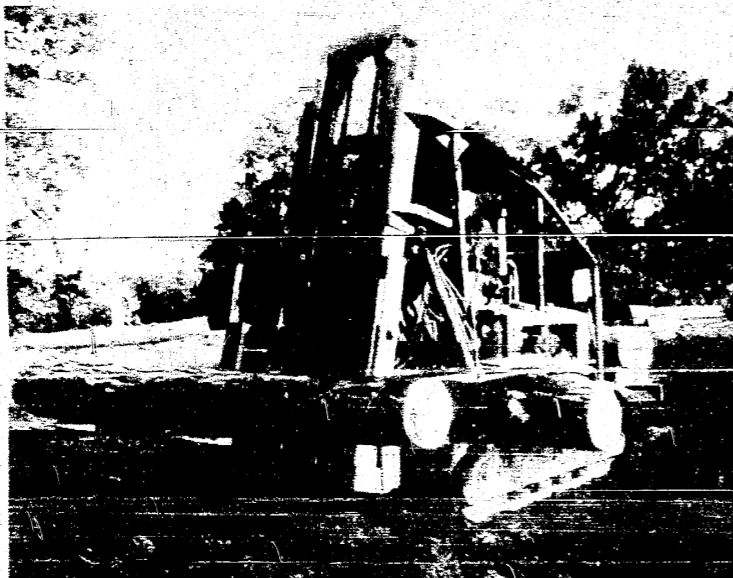
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GERALD SEESE of the Budres Lumber Co., of Grand Rapids is shown grading rough lumber at the Sellers sawmill.

slopes. Walnut grows naturally on some sites in southern Michigan, south of the Bay City-Muskegon line and is common on limestone soils.

Sellers said that on deep rich moist soil the seedlings might grow three feet in height the first season and double the figure the second year. It takes about 35 years to produce a log ten inches in diameter. If the soil is poor the trees are likely to be subject to frost damage and disease, grow slowly and be of poor quality. Walnut is very sensitive to soil and site conditions the lumberman explains. It will not grow in the shade.



stump. It proved too expensive to produce. The stump had a far different type grain than the trunk of a tree. As far as I know the last stump slicer in the United States was owned by Bacon Veneer in Arkansas and was sold to a company in Africa in 1959," Sellers said.

Reforestation is being carried on in many parts of the country. In Indiana they planted the 50 millionth tree this year in a surface mined land area. This tree was a tulip poplar which is the Indiana state tree and it was planted in the Greene-Sullivan State forest on newly mined land adjacent to an artificial lake. Wood is planted annually on coal mined land since 1927. Foresters say that plowed rock shale and soil areas will grow planted hardwood trees where abandoned farm land will not.

In Indiana approximately every 8th tree is planted to pine adjacent to the highway. The mixture of pine is increased to 50 per cent for beautifying the area. About 900 acres of coal stripped mining land has been planted to trees in Indiana.

Buying trees is still somewhat of a gamble. You can't always tell. It might look good but when the tree is felled it could be hollow and worthless, Sellers explained. One thing is certain, Sellers is pretty well aware of the location of the various kinds of trees - It's his business!

TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Distribution of new telephone directories will begin Saturday, November 18 in the Ann Arbor-Washtenaw area, Michigan Bell Telephone Company said today. Nicholas J. Prakken, manager here, said some 158,000 directories will be delivered in Ann Arbor, Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Milan, Whitmore Lake, Hills and Ypsilanti. The new telephone books have

an "old Michigan" cover containing a color reproduction of the oil painting, "The Lewis Cass Expedition," done by Robert Thom as one of the series of originals commissioned by Michigan Bell to preserve the more significant events in the history of Michigan.

The artist has portrayed the Cass expedition in 1820 passing beneath the Pictured Rocks, which border Lake Superior near Munising. Published reports of the expedition's discoveries gave Michigan favorable publicity

and helped attract settlers to the Michigan territory. Prakken said it will take four or five days to complete distribution of all the directories.

COUNTY TO GET NEW TAX

Washtenaw County is expected to realize an additional \$75,000 each year from a real estate tax on "Written Instruments which transfer any interest in real property." This applies mainly to deeds and land contracts.

The law will be effective January 1 in Michigan and the counties will benefit from the law when it takes effect. "All revenue received under this act shall be deposited in the treasury of the county where the tax is collected to the credit of the general fund."

The rate of 1.1 mill per dollar for each \$500 or fraction thereof consideration paid or if no tax is involved, then upon the fair market value of the gift or value of the consideration," is the way the tax will be administered.

The new law requires that the tax stamps be affixed to the documents before they are recorded in the register of deeds office. Gifts of property will also be taxed. Washtenaw county treasurer, S. A. Leonard, feels that the new law may provide for more uniform assessment on property, because local assessing officers will now receive copies of affidavits of value. Washtenaw County will receive these tax stamp-machines to record and dispense the tax stamps.

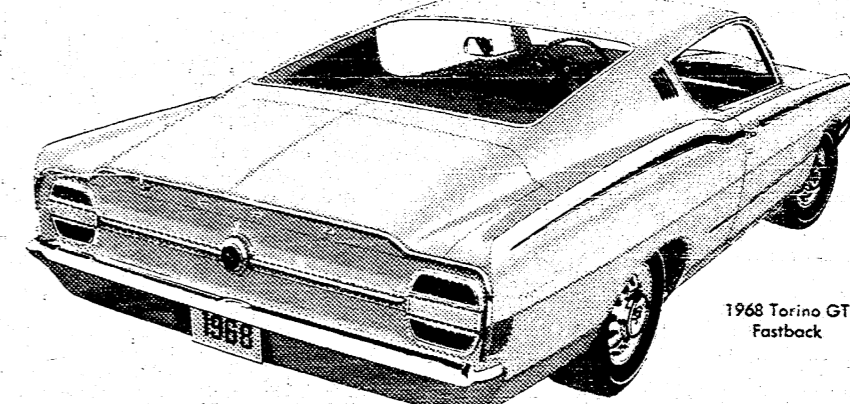

TWO AREA SOLDIERS, ONE FROM HERE KILLED IN VIETNAM

Army Sgt. Riekke D. Sparks of Manchester Township and Army S. Sgt. David P. Brooks of Tecumseh were reported killed in action Saturday, Nov. 18 in Vietnam.

The families were notified by Army officers courier Sunday. Sgt. Sparks, 20, was serving with the 1st Infantry Division when he was hit by shell fragments. He had been in Vietnam since late February.

A 1965 graduate of Clinton High School, he also played varsity basketball and football.

He was born July 26, 1947 in Beecher City, Ill., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sparks who now live at 17321 Ely Road, Manchester. He entered the army on September 1, 1966 and took basic training at Fort Campbell, Ky. and advanced infantry training at Fort Polk, La.

Other survivors besides his parents include his wife, the former Cynthia Parker of Clinton and three brothers, Samuel L., Mark D., and Eric all at home; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel R. Sparks of Beecher City, Ill., and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Miller of Shumway, Ill.

Sgt. Brooks was serving with Company C, 5th Battalion, 60th Infantry when he was killed by shrapnel Saturday.

He graduated from Tecumseh High School in 1961, where he played varsity baseball and football.

Sgt. Brooks entered the service

at Ft. Knox, Ky. where he took basic training and advanced infantry training at Ft. Polk, La. He served 4 1/2 years in Germany prior to being sent to Vietnam in October of this year.

He was born Oct. 12, 1943 in Adrian, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Brooks who now live at 321 N. Maiden Lane, Tecumseh. Survivors besides his parents are his wife, the former Marlon Braeuer of Germany, a daughter Marnie and a sister, Ruth Ann, all at the Tecumseh address.

The Proctor Funeral Home of Clinton is making the arrangements for both families.

This brings to 41 the number who have died in Vietnam so far.
