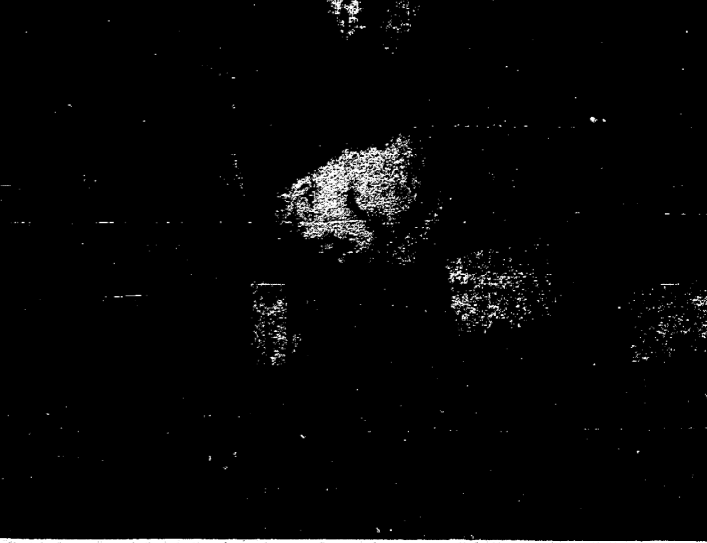

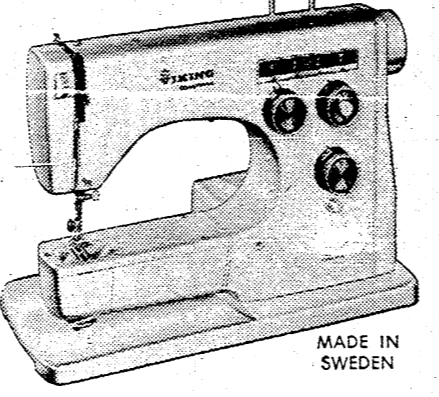

WASHINGTON REPORT

The attention of the national press is centered on the appointments that President-elect Nixon is making to his White House Staff. The choice of cabinet officers, which at this writing have not been announced, will give an indication of the direction in which the Nixon Administration will move. As each appointment is announced, the outlines of Nixon's plans for the National becomes clearer.

In all the attention being given to the appointment of top Washington officials, however, there has been little attention given to the fact that Nixon will not have full control over the government. Although he may propose and suggest programs, they will have to come before the U.S. Congress which is controlled, both in the House of Representatives and the Senate, by members of the opposition party. They will have the power of life and

death over the proposals and programs that the President will put forward and their cooperation is essential in order to carry out Nixon's plans.

The power in the House of Representatives, and in the Senate to a lesser extent, is for the most part held by Southern Democrats who control Committee chairmanships. These men, because of their near-dictatorial power over the legislation which goes through their committees, can frustrate all attempts to secure passage of programs. Committee Chairman can hold out for special pet personal beliefs and provisions as the price for acting on a Presidential proposal. Because he was a Southerner himself and because he had been powerful when he served in the Senate, Lyndon Johnson has been relatively successful in dealing with these men and in securing action on his legislative proposals.

Nixon, however, will face many difficulties in dealing with the Committee Chairman. It may well be that many of his Administration's programs will be greatly changed, or perhaps killed by this powerful and sometimes willful group. The problems which might result illustrate once more the need to revise the Rules of the House of Representatives. At the present time a man assumes power and leadership in the Congress not because of his abilities but because of the number of years he has served. The seniority system has sometimes promoted men of only slight ability to important posts in the Congress.

Since I came to the House of Representatives, I have worked with other Republicans to reform the Congress so that it is more able to meet the demands of the Twentieth Century. Our efforts so far have been unsuccessful. However, there are encouraging signs that many Democrats are now prepared to join in

the fight to modernize the Congress.

While the Nixon Administration would still face heavy Democratic majorities in both the House and the Senate, modernization of the rules and the seniority system would go a long way in making cooperation between the Executive and Congressional branches of the Government easier.

SCHOOL EMPLOYEES GET RIGHT TO STRIKE

An entirely new group of public school employees may now officially organize for purposes of negotiations with school boards, according to a decision and order issued December 2 by the Michigan Labor Mediation Board.

School principals, supervisors, coordinators and directors in the Hilldale school district, organized as a unit of the Michigan Education Association, have won these rights as teachers now employ in the area

of collective bargaining.

The LMB upheld a decision of trial examiner James R. McCormick that such a group of "middle management" school personnel may:

--Organize for purpose of negotiating their conditions of employment with the employing school board;

-- That their administrative and supervisory duties are routine in nature, therefore would not conflict with the Michigan Public Employment Relations Act;

--That such a group may affiliate with any state-wide group of their own selection, and not be in conflict with another local classroom teacher group who organize under the same state-wide association(MEA).

This landmark decision will enable 4,300 public school professional employees to organize and negotiate with more than 500 school boards.

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NEWSPAPER PUBLISHES DRAFT INFORMATION

The Monroe County (Mo.) Appeal recently published the following list of requirements under the Military Selective Service Act of 1967 which, although not all-inclusive, seemingly are of paramount interest to the average young man of draft age:

1. Register at your local board on your 18th birthday or within 5 days thereafter.

If you are away from home, you should present yourself to the nearest local board.

2. Complete in full and return your Classification Questionnaire (SSS Form 100) within 10 days after the date on which it is mailed to you.

3. Present to your local board all written information which you believe to be necessary to assist the board in

determining your proper classification.

4. Answer any inquiry received from your local board within 10 days after the date on which it is mailed to you.

5. Complete in full and return to your local board within the time allowed all forms mailed to you by the board.

6. Keep your local board advised at all times of the address where mail will reach you.

7. Report to your local board any change of home address or of status which might result in a change of classification within 10 days after the occurrence of such change.

8. Obey all orders of your local board.

9. The registrant has the duty to keep himself informed of his classification status.

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ELECTION REFORM

Perhaps enough time has passed since the national election to allow most people to consider what happened without becoming too emotionally involved. In the first place, the margin of popular vote was not as razor-thin as many would have supposed next, the election may have provided as many telling points in support of the electoral college system as it provided against it.

For openers, Nixon won the Presidency with approximately three times the popular vote-edge held by Kennedy in 1960 when he won over Nixon-- providing just that much more of a "mandate" from the people. Still, fear that indecisive returns might throw a close election into the House of Representatives caused many people and responsible organizations to suggest changes in the electoral college system.

Farmers have examined the electoral college with an eye to undating it for some years and again this year the Michigan Farm Bureau adopted a policy recommendation calling for a Presidential Commission to review possible methods of improving our political processes. In doing so, they noted how framers of our Constitution implied that public reaction should not be wholly trusted in such an important matter as the selection of the President of the United States.

At that time, educational levels were low, public communications barely existed and the electoral college was devised as a buffer to protect the country from possible unwise actions of the masses.

Is such a fear totally unfounded in these days of television, daily newspapers, "electronic computers, political polls and high pressure voter-motivation techniques?

What of the "lost" precincts in Illinois? What of the days and days of waiting for the vote to come in from Missouri? Are not these cases upon which strong support may still be built for the electoral college system-- perhaps in modernized form?

Michigan farmers suggest that the college be retained with these improvements to bring it closer to the people; A constitutional Amendment to provide that two of the Presidential Electors in each state be elected on a state-wide basis and to cast their ballots as prescribed by the statewide majority; the remainder elected from Congressional Districts and to cast their ballots as prescribed by the vote of the district.

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PROJECT SHOWBOAT

Lt. Governor William G. Milliken has been appointed Honorary State Chairman of Project Showboat, a Michigan Jaycee program.

Project Showboat is an attempt on the part of the Michigan Jaycees to raise \$112,000 to purchase, equip, and staff a medical houseboat to be used on the Mekong River in Southeast Asia.

In accepting the appointment as Honorary State Chairman for the project, Milliken said, "I know that one of the important tenets of the Jaycee creed is 'that service to humanity is the best work of life'. This project Showboat is a testament to that creed. As Americans it behooves us to share out great wealth with others and to be concerned about the welfare of those less fortunate than ourselves."

"Project Showboat is an excellent way for all of us to contribute to the welfare of the people of Southeast Asia," Milliken added.

The Michigan Jaycees are working in co-operation with the Thomas A. Dooley Foundation in raising the money for the houseboat. The Dooley Foundation will be in charge of the maintenance and administration of the houseboat in Southeast Asia.

The houseboat, to be called "State of Michigan", will be a gift from the people of Michigan to the people of Southeast Asia. It will travel up and down the Mekong River in giving aid to the residents of Thailand, Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam.

The basic unit will be a U.S. manufactured houseboat modified for use as a clinic. It will travel up and down the Mekong River providing medical care for the villagers and serving as health education center to introduce good health practices and to train local villagers in the art of health care.

Cost breakdown on the program indicate that equipment, including the boat itself, medical equipment, teaching and entertainment aids and miscellaneous equipment will total approximately \$45,000. Staff salaries for doctors and local native help will total approximately \$23,000. Travel to Southeast Asia for U.S. personnel will cost approximately \$9,000. Operating expenses, gas and oil, will cost about \$11,000. Medical supplies and equipment maintenance will cost about \$17,000 and administration of the program will cost approximately \$6,000.

Milliken said that persons wishing to contribute to the project can contact their local Jaycee Chapter or can mail

Sponsored by JCC and the college's Student Commission, the program will be held at 8 PM Saturday Dec. 14, in the Cortland Bldg. auditorium. The public is invited.

Dr. Polgar works hard for his fee. As part of his routine he undertakes to find his check wherever it might be hidden within the auditorium where he is performing. If he can't find it, there is no charge to the sponsors for his performance.

Polgar's skill at finding hidden objects has won him fame across the nation. All he asks is the presence of the person or persons who hid the check. He then reads their minds.

He has found his check without hesitation under a woman's hat in an audience of 2,000 persons; he located a hidden postage stamp in an office building in Chicago; and in New York City he met the challenge of a paper clip "hidden anywhere in the city" - it was in the Empire State Building.

Although his feats are usually performed as entertainment, he is called on occasionally to solve real problems.

In Dallas, he helped a businessman track down a misplaced stock certificate essential to the completion of a company acquisition. Dr. Polgar hypnotized the man who had had no success probing his own memory, took the subject through successive stages of life and discovered that the executive had wrapped the stock certificate around his will, which was in an envelope in a safety deposit box.

Dr. Polgar was born in Hungary, where he studied at the University of Budapest and worked as a hypnotist with physicians. He came to the U. S. in 1933, and soon changed the direction of his work.

POST OFFICE NEWS

Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson suggested three ways a family can handle the raising volume of unordered merchandise Americans received during the holiday season.

"If you don't want an unordered item--such as ties, greeting cards, pen and pencil sets or auto key rings--put the merchandise aside for a reasonable period of time, and if unclaimed, dispose of it."

"Another way," Postmaster General Watson said, "is to refuse to accept a package you believe contains goods you didn't ask for. Just write: 'Refused--Return to Sender' on the package and put it back into the mails."

"If a person uses an item, he is legally obligated to pay in most states. However, New York and Illinois have enacted legislation which makes such items an 'unconditional gift.'"

"We have found that unordered shipments trouble many postal patrons," the Postmaster General said. "Many families mistakenly believe they have two choices: Either send back a payment, or return the package and pay postage for its return."

In some instances, promoters attempt to collect by sending

notices which suggest a family may pay for the unordered item. "Don't be troubled by these letters," Mr. Watson said, "because one might charge the mailer storage and handling costs."

The Manchester Post Office will accept packages Saturday afternoons on the 14th and 21st.

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EXTRA DOLLARS FROM FARM WOODLOTS

During the winter months landowners with existing woodlots can earn many extra dollars by carrying out a good forestry plan. Frank Light, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, encourages woodland owners to recognize and participate in the Federal Forestry Program which provides cost-shares through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

This practice is for the improvement of a stand of forest trees on farmland. Up to 80 percent of the estimated cost will be paid for pruning, thinning and site preparation for natural restocking. The forester must be consulted and the practice carried out in accordance with approved forestry standards.

There is a great demand for quality timber and this can only be produced by cutting, girdling or poisoning the diseased, culling or weeding trees and protecting the area from grazing or fire.

Landowners may use any of the wood products that result from thinning for fuel or pulpwood which result in additional earnings above the 80 percent paid for carrying out the practice.

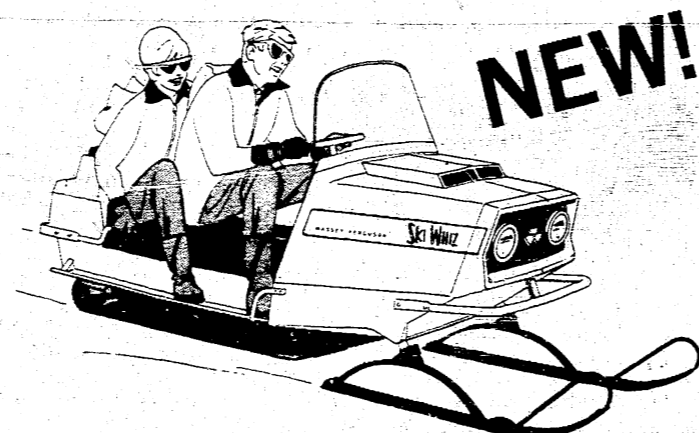

WINTER IS HERE

Old Man Winter officially arrives on Saturday, Dec. 21, at 2 p.m. when the sun reaches the southern most position of the year.

University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh notes that the sun will rise and set about 30 degrees south of the east and west points and will swing its shortest daily arc across the southern sky.

On this, the shortest day of the year, there will be nine hours of daylight and 15 hours of darkness.

The earth is actually closer to the sun in winter than in summer. Prof. Losh explains that the earth is tilted some 23 1/2 degrees in winter and the sun's rays strike the surface obliquely, reducing their heating effect.

"being closer to the sun in winter makes the northern hemisphere winters a little milder and the southern hemisphere summers a little warmer," Prof. Losh notes.

The movement of the sun may have had something to do with the date for the celebration of Christmas.

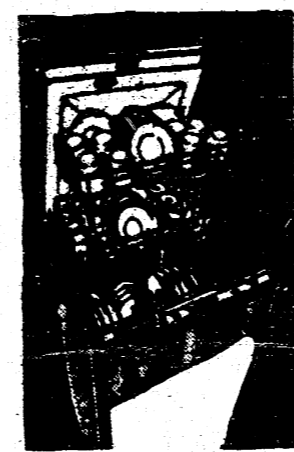

WOOL PROGRAM ENDS DECEMBER 31

Growers were reminded today that the 1968 marketing year under the wool program ends December 31.

Earl Dolezky, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, explains that this means that payments for the current 1968 year will depend on completing all details of marketing either wool or unshorn lambs by that date.

Marketing completed after December 31, 1968 will become marketings in the 1969 marketing year, and thus not eligible for payments until early 1970.

The Chairman urges producers to make sure that all details for the 1968 sales are completed by the end of the year. This includes passing title to the buyer, delivering the wool to the buyer either physically or through documents (such as warehouse receipts or bills of lading).

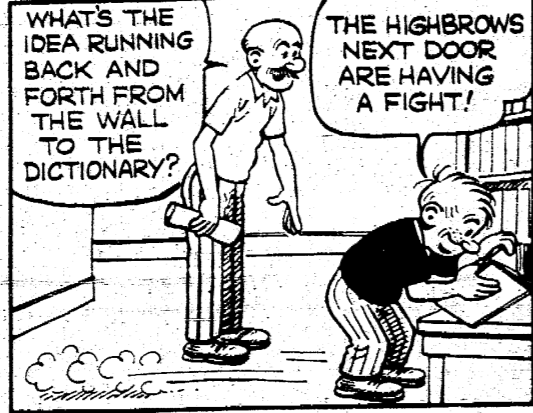
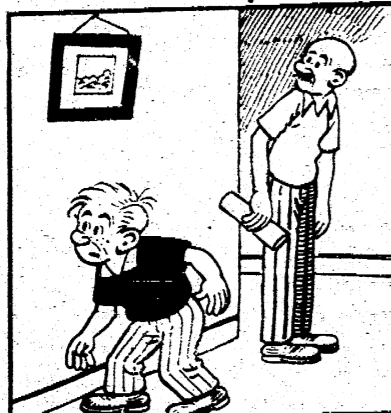
Applications for 1968 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act may be filed with the county ASCS office at any time, and the Chairman advises that this be done as soon as possible. Incentive payments under the wool program are based on the average national price for

marketings during the whole year, and this can be determined more exactly if reports on marketings are complete. ASCS therefore is urging that all 1968-year applications be filed before January 31, 1969. Payments for the 1968 marketing year will likely begin in April of next year.

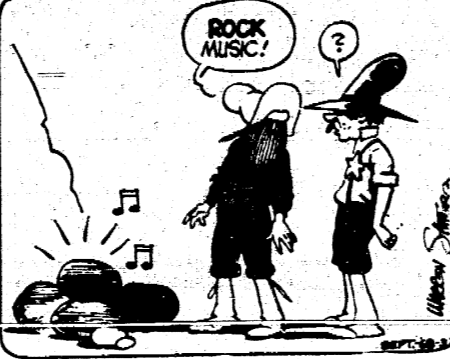
