SPRINGTIME PLANNING

Nothing is so delightful as spring-time on the farm! First a crocus-then a shower of springtime flowers. Baby lambs and litters of cute, pink piglets - grass trying to shake off the severe effects of winter, and overhead, the raucous cry of the crow. It's get-ready time on the farm.

Machinery is oiled again, and repaired, plans are made for each field, and expensive seed is secured and treated against the day of planting. In spring more than any other time, farmers depend upon a long list of farm chemical tools to assure a fall harvest. Pests capable of causing serious economic loss to farmers and to consumers through higher costs of food, if they are not controlled, include 10,000 kinds of insects,

600 weed species and 1,500 varieties of plant disease! If the farmer is to stay one jump ahead, both the seeds and the soil must be treated prior to planting. Pre-emergent chemicals kill off the cutworms and grubs and prevent germination of weeds. Seeds receive direct chemical protection from worm, beetle and rodent, and germination levels are assured through other treatment which knocks out molds and a long list

of killer-fungi. The farmer who skips even one treatment may have empty bins at summer's end. Obviously, agricultural chemicals are poisonous, or they wouldn't be effective, and they can be dangerous when carelessly used. For that reason, the springtime topic for discussion by 1,100 community Farm Bureau groups will include an examination of proper handling methods for pesticides and herbicides, including a review of how

best to use these products in ways which will not harm fish and wild life. A four-point program is recommended to include: Read everything on the label and follow instructions to the last word. Thoroughly plan application programs to assure use of right chemical for the right job. Store all pesticides in a locked cabinet, room or building, and dispose of all chemical containers and leftover amounts immediately.

**MICHIGAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS PLAN MEDIATION ARBITRATION BOARDS**

The Catholic Bishops of Michigan by unanimous vote Wednesday decided to take the first steps toward setting up boards of mediation and arbitration throughout the State. The boards will deal with disputes in the Church involving laymen, nuns and other members of religious groups, priests, or bishops in their relationships with each other.

The action was authorized at the conclusion of a two day meeting of the Michigan Bishops at St. John's provincial Seminary, Plymouth, presided over by the Most Reverend John F. Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit.

Others in attendance were Bishop Allen J. Babcock of Grand Rapids and Auxiliary Bishop Joseph C. McKinney also of Grand Rapids, Bishop Francis F. Reh and Auxiliary Bishop James A. Hickey of Saginaw, Bishop Alexander M. Zaleski of Lansing, Bishop Charles A. Salatta of Marquette, and Detroit Auxiliary Bishops Joseph M. Breitenbeck, Walter J. Schwanherr and Thomas J. Gumbleton.

"We believe the boards will serve a continuing purpose and will be especially useful in the present period of Church renewal. Archbishop Dearden said. "Undoubtedly there are various ways disputes might be settled, but it is our judgment that it will be helpful in such cases to have an impartial board address itself to the problem."

**Crisis in "Fun City"**

Ever since Mayor John Lindsay, in taking office, proclaimed New York "Fun City" its residents have found less and less justification for this moniker. Strikes like the garbage walkout and the teachers dispute added to the long list of city ills that appear to be getting worse instead of better.

In fact, Governor Nelson Rockefeller has already suggested that the Federal government should take over the various welfare programs entirely. One reason advanced for such a turnover is the disparity between state benefits: a welfare family in Mississippi gets only a small fraction of what one can draw in New York.

"Fun City" taxpayers are confronted with an enormous welfare problem. The city's welfare roll is growing at the rate of 20,000 persons a month. Estimates put the number being supported by welfare at one million, nearly one out of every eight residents, and more than the population of Houston.

Costs of this "public assistance" are rising even faster. The city has estimated its spending will reach \$835 million a year by this June, compared with \$454 million two years ago. Millions in state and Federal money is also used.

Under this "instant welfare" policy, a family can pick up stakes assured that taxpayers of another state will help finance the family's venture.

Besides the proposal that the Federal government finance and administer all welfare, there is talk originating in Washington that the present system of applications, investigations and paperwork be eliminated and that a simple "statement of need" be sufficient to start the welfare dollars coming.

The city's welfare cost—now more than it spends on education—is going up faster than the city can collect taxes from the gainfully employed and the businessmen, large and small. A crisis is at hand.

The situation in New York shows how a welfare program can get out of hand. As a cigarette commercial asks, "Where will it all end?"

Mrs. Mabel Vogeding, age 80 years, a life long resident of Manchester died suddenly at her home Friday night.

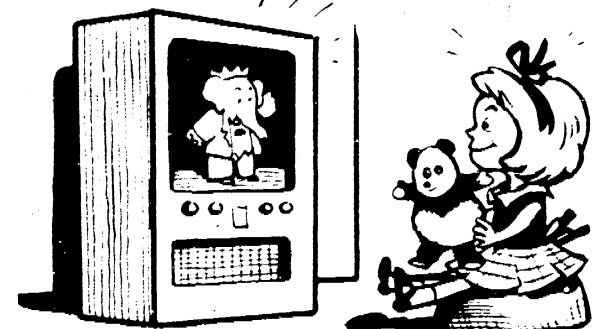

**CHILDREN LEARN FROM ANIMAL CARTOONS ON TV**



Have you ever marveled at how children identify with animals in stories, books, cartoons—even when the animals bear no resemblance to their real counterparts, and are pure fantasies? Ever wonder why these fantasies inspire such devotion and loyalty?

In the movie days before television, Mickey Mouse and Minnie Mouse were the most popular non-human contemporaries of a whole generation of youngsters. Kids of all ages mimicked them, and shared in their joys and woes. Then there

the child takes to bed with him. Babar the Elephant is a national hero to French children, much as Mickey Mouse was here.

Fantasy animals in books and films are endowed with human qualities, while still maintaining their inherent animal characteristics. In a child's make-believe world, this seems very natural. The story plots involve problems similar to those of humans, so the child can identify with familiar and understandable situations. Good and evil, wisdom and folly are communicated through the behavior of these fanciful animals. Children, like adults, can laugh at themselves through the antics of comic characters. A baby elephant being punished for a misdeed is very funny, but the message is not lost.

Psychologists say that the way a child sees animals will often reveal clues to his own personality. Some psychologists will ask a child what animal he would most like to be, if he had the choice.

Choosing to be a "wise owl," or a "ferocious lion," or "the big bad wolf" will indicate many things about the child's own feelings. These images of animals are learned mostly through children's books, movies and cartoons.

Animated cartoons are traditional children's fare on television, but not all cartoons are ideal viewing for children. Some are animal cartoons, some are comic strip superheroes; many contain a surprising amount of violence and less than desirable themes. But the most durable and best-loved cartoons become classics, and find their way to television screens via TV specials, often being brought back for repeat performances.

One upcoming TV special that's coming back for an encore is fast becoming France's favorite animal character to young American hearts. It's "Babar the Elephant," the highly acclaimed animated musical based on the French children's book classic.

Man wants security in order to be creative. We somehow feel that without fear and pressure we can more capably use our God given talents.

Man longs for security because he fears he will fail; because the pressures have been too high, too long.

This reasoning reminds us that we have some misinformation about security and insecurity. Look at the history of America. Our greatest pride surrounds those moments when our security was shattered and life was threatened. In these times, our creativity was greatest.

The early church lived under the cloud of extinction. During these dark days, the most glorious pages of her history were written.

Had Jesus waited for a secure situation in which to minister, we would still be looking for the Messiah. He would never have redeemed man from sin.

We can long for the calm contemplation of "The Good Ol' Days," but it will only bring those days back. It will only waste our time and talent. The appropriate conditions for creativity never happen they are caused. Human need will never be met waiting for good omens and pleasant circumstances.

We move toward meaningful

life as we follow Jesus into the midst of difficulty and insecurity. Jesus prayed "I do not pray that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from the evil one." (Jn' 17:15) The meaning of redemption is that on the Cross, Jesus made possible the complete transformation of our lives in order that we might be His people in the world. Today, Jesus purpose is not to remove his disciples from danger, but to strengthen them to overcome every foe.

The problems that stunt the growth of this community will never find solution by outwitting them. We will move ahead when we determine to solve those problems. We cannot wait for an auspicious time to serve God among the people of Manchester, today is the only day we have. Loneliness will not be more responsive tomorrow than today. The young people will not be more interested in a meaningful way of life tomorrow than they are today. Jesus said, "If any man would be my disciple, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." This is insecurity.

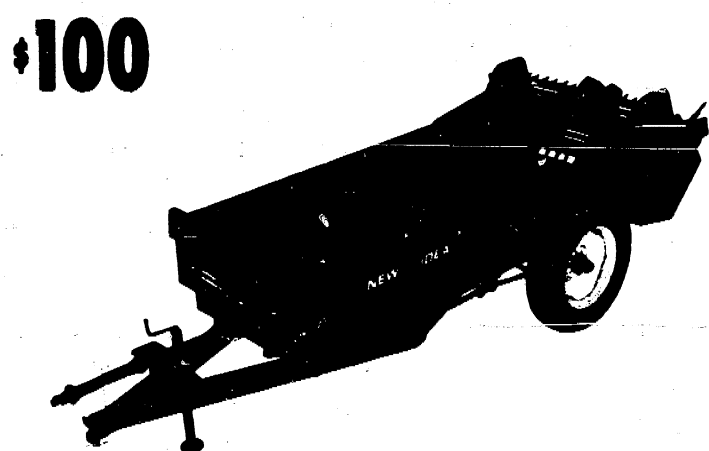

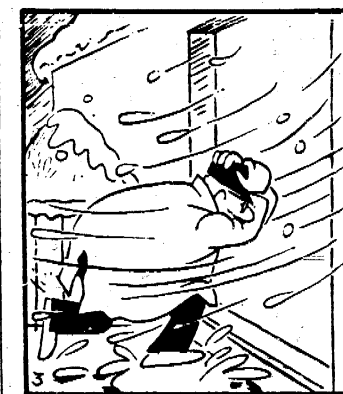

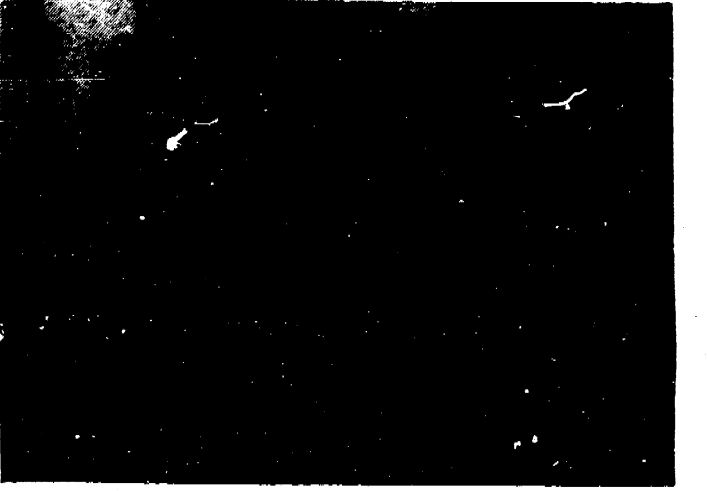

**TRACK SEASON GETS OFF TO A FINE START**

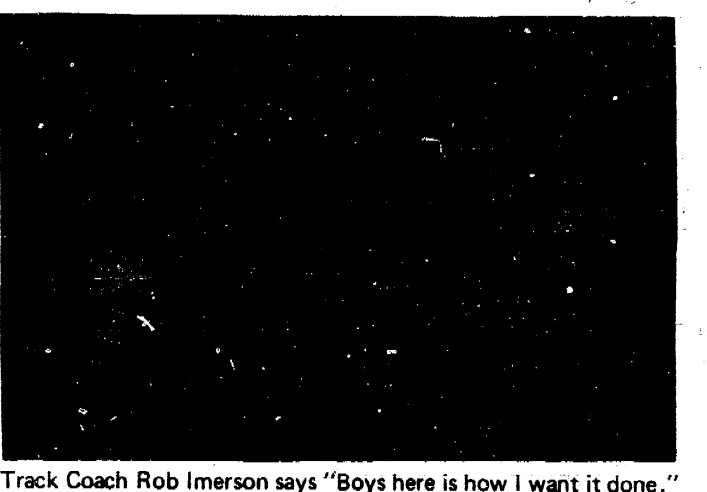

SPRINGTIME PLANNING

Nothing is so delightful as spring-time on the farm! First a crocus-then a shower of springtime flowers. Baby lambs and litters of cute, pink piglets - grass trying to shake off the severe effects of winter, and overhead, the raucous cry of the crow. It's get-ready time on the farm.

Machinery is oiled again, and repaired, plans are made for each field, and expensive seed is secured and treated against the day of planting. In spring more than any other time, farmers depend upon a long list of farm chemical tools to assure a fall harvest. Pests capable of causing serious economic loss to farmers and to consumers through higher costs of food, if they are not controlled, include 10,000 kinds of insects,

600 weed species and 1,500 varieties of plant disease! If the farmer is to stay one jump ahead, both the seeds and the soil must be treated prior to planting. Pre-emergent chemicals kill off the cutworms and grubs and prevent germination of weeds. Seeds receive direct chemical protection from worm, beetle and rodent, and germination levels are assured through other treatment which knocks out molds and a long list

of killer-fungi. The farmer who skips even one treatment may have empty bins at summer's end. Obviously, agricultural chemicals are poisonous, or they wouldn't be effective, and they can be dangerous when carelessly used. For that reason, the springtime topic for discussion by 1,100 community Farm Bureau groups will include an examination of proper handling methods for pesticides and herbicides, including a review of how

best to use these products in ways which will not harm fish and wild life. A four-point program is recommended to include: Read everything on the label and follow instructions to the last word. Thoroughly plan application programs to assure use of right chemical for the right job. Store all pesticides in a locked cabinet, room or building, and dispose of all chemical containers and leftover amounts immediately.
