Missing Link Which Would Connect Six Ann Arbor Murders?



Police continue to say they have no definite link between the murders of the six young women near Ann Arbor. On a hunch we did some checking as to what shows were playing at the various theaters when each of the girls were killed. You'll read our findings on page 6.

As officers have nothing definite to go on, we take the liberty of speculation. We do this only in the hope that it will help catch the killer before any more parents have to go through the agony of identifying their daughter in the county morgue. The following story is only speculation as we have no access to police records nor have we been at the scene of any of the crimes. Our story is based only on what we have read in the papers.

We think one man did all six killings. He is white, weighs between 140 to 160 lbs., has a medium heavy build, is between 19 & 26 years of age, and is very neat in appearance. Many people connected with the University know this man. To meet him on the street one cannot tell he is mentally sick. Inside lies a completely different man, a man who when triggered by some scene or lurid picture becomes a madman, a man who has taken the lives of six young women. He differs from what we normally think of as a mentally ill person because this man can control his outward emotions. Something has to trigger this sadistic nature and bring it to the surface.

The first victim was two years ago. The body lay unnoticed for a month. We think the killer revisited the body several times while it lay where he left it. We think the shock of this first and most vicious attack left him weak with fear that he would be caught. His visits to the body were meant to reassure himself that he did the right thing, but each time he came away more scared of what he had done. This fear kept

New Bridge Would Meet Water Flow Needs

Consulting engineers, McNamee, Porter and Seeley in a letter to the village council stated that the factors of economy and required waterway area were investigated and each dictated the use of a clear span bridge structure for the proposed new Duncan Street bridge.

The factors of economy were based on comparison of estimate of cost. The consulting engineers determined their criteria for the clear span over the culvert style on information given to them by the United States Department of Interior Geological Survey and from the Michigan Department of National Resources.

One disadvantage of the culvert design, the engineers decided, was that the required cross sectional water way area could not be obtained without widening the river crossing in order to construct multiple sections of culvert pipe. Also the existing roadway surface is located 10 feet above the normal river surface elevation.

When the river rises to more than three feet above its normal elevation it begins to flood the property of the nearby homes. This flooding occurred during last year's high water flows.

The engineers also determined that all culvert sections would require full width and height concrete headwalls on either side plus backfill to meet the existing roadway grade.

Monday, June 23, the village council will ask all eligible voters to approve the issuance of bonds for the purpose of financing the rebuilding of the Duncan Street bridge. Plans for repairing the Main Street bridge are also included in this program.

The Planning Commission has also gone on record as favoring a yes vote on authorizing the sale of bonds for the bridge projects.

Judge Jon Ringleberg, district judge from Clair and Gladwin counties, prosecutor James Fox from Isabella county and Sgt. Dan Kostreiva, post commander of the Mt. Pleasant State Police post gave the lectures.

Saturday night Judge Eugene J. Storey, municipal Wayne county judge spoke at the banquet. Storey has been the association's attorney for the past 10 years.

HOOVER BALL FLAG DEDICATION

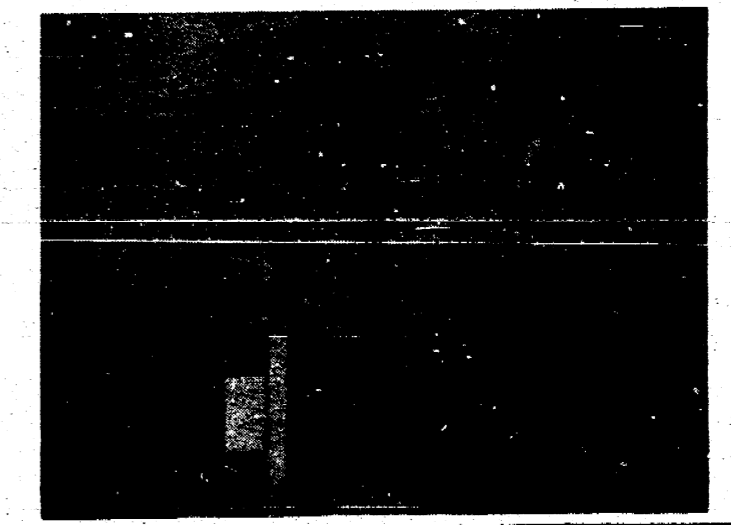



CHURCH EDITORIAL

LOVE FINDS THE WAY John 14:6

May I chat with you today about some charges or questions being directed at the church of Jesus Christ. And as I do so I express my gratitude to this fine newspaper (and especially to the Lord Jesus Christ my Savior) for freedom. On so doing I remind you of the same freedom and welcome privilege of reply!

Recently Radio announcer, Paul Harvey on his broadcast voiced the ever increasing, the echoing conundrum, "Has Christianity lost its forward thrust?" Let me reply by relating in brief some statistics taken from the Beacon Magazine.

Today in the USA there are more churches than ever before (123,000,000). This marks an increase of two per cent over last year. So it would appear to some a spiritual awakening is happening in our nation or that we are on the way to heaven on earth. But, crime has increased seven percent in this same year period. Illigimacy has increased 300% in the last ten years. Pornography has multiplied four times in the past 2 years. Venereal disease has increased 400% in the last 10 years or 72% in the past 12 months. Our crime bill is now above 20 billion dollars yearly, and crime is increasing 5 times faster than our population while juvenile crime is increasing 7 times faster.

For every dollar we spend for church we spend \$12,000 on crime. Our nation alone has 7 million alcoholics and 3 1/2 million problem drinkers. Is it a wonder why the church cannot communicate to the hearts of man. Some complain of too many churches but the fact is that the combined number of all churches, synagogues, and temples is outnumbered by 175,000!

So explain this, ours is the most civilized, most christian nation on earth and yet today 37 million of our own children receive absolutely no religious instruction. Our forefathers by blood, sweat founded our countries constitution on Biblical christian principles, but in doing so extended grace in religious freedom to all with but one essential stipulation, namely "God is and ever will be above all."

Why is it that we hear or read of "so called" leading clergy applauding (favoring) or should I say interpreting the country's Supreme Court ruling on prayer and Bible reading in public schools, as "a criminal act"?

How can that which is of God (holy, good and of love for fellow man) be exalting the modern emancipation of immorality? Why do some emphasize that the important thing today is not, that the church-co-operate with the Lord Jesus Christ and the Bible but that they co-operate with everyone and everything else (regardless of its evil intent). 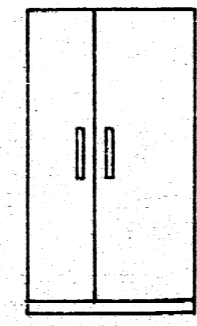

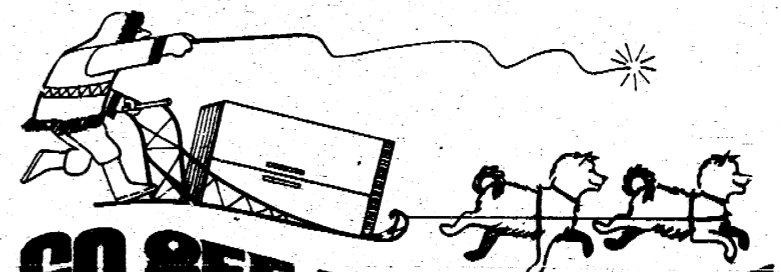

him from repeating any more such crimes for another year. Last July, he did it again. This time the fear and realization lasted only nine months. Now he has killed four within three months.

We think five of the six victims went willingly with this man. The other, Miss Basom was abducted.

We guess his weight at 150 with a medium to heavy build because the killer moved all of his victims from the place they were killed. We base his age on the fact that anyone older who paid attention to these girls would have been suspect and he would not have been able to get them to go with him. We associate the difference in the killings to whatever scenes he saw that triggered his violent reaction.

Although this man is outwardly calm, he does make mistakes. He seems to over-act; enjoy a movie such as "Bloody Pit of Horror" and similar movies which played the weekends of these murders. In others where the actress is cast in a seducing kind of role, he may show anger at her success. He also must have the privacy to wash the blood from his clothes after each murder, or be in a position so that being bloody would not cause concern.

This man would be identified and caught if those people who know him, but won't admit to themselves that he could possibly do these horrible things, would give police the clue. To remain silent could mean another murder, and the weight on someone's conscience when they realize they could have prevented it.

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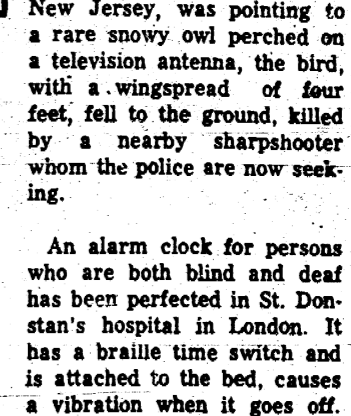
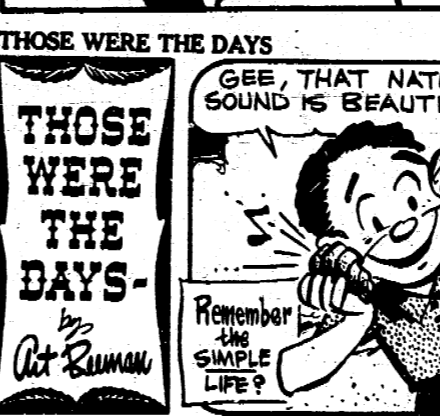
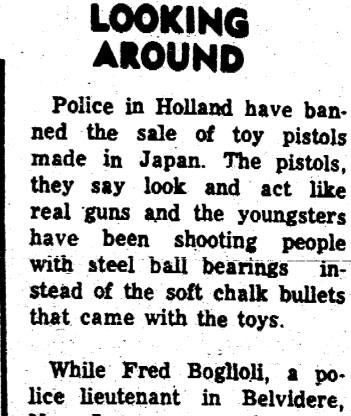
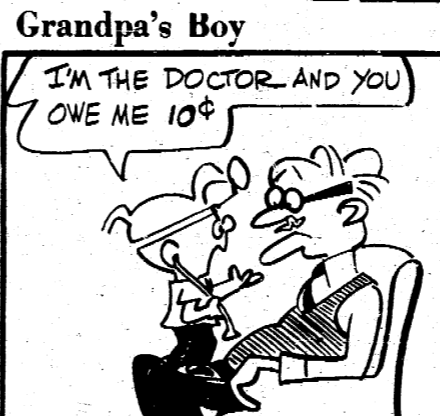
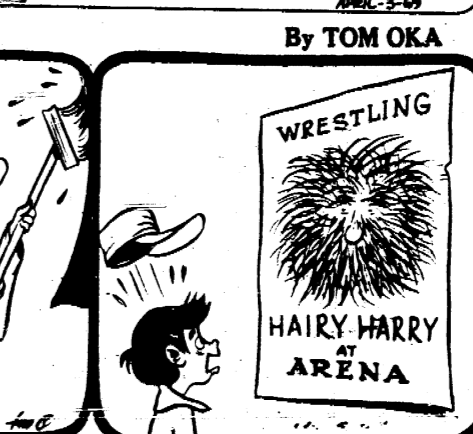
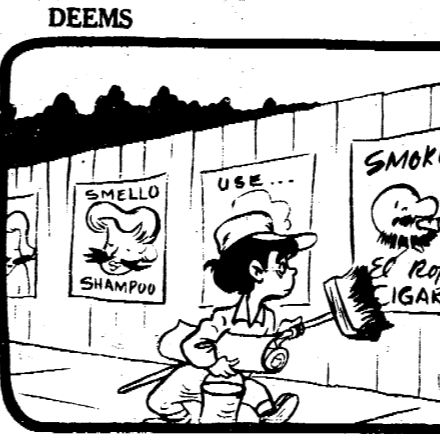
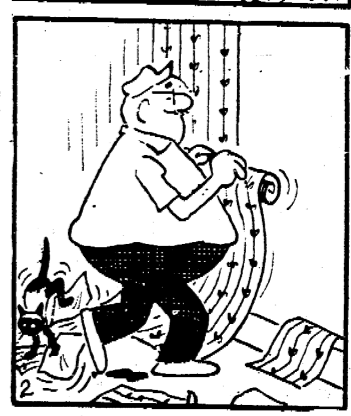
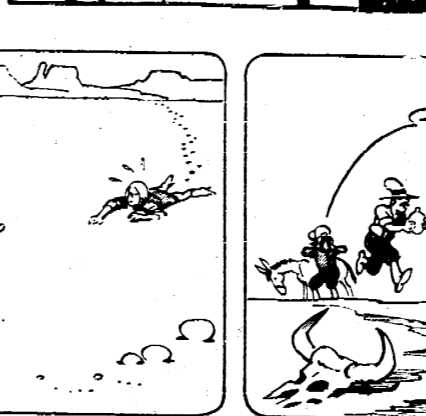
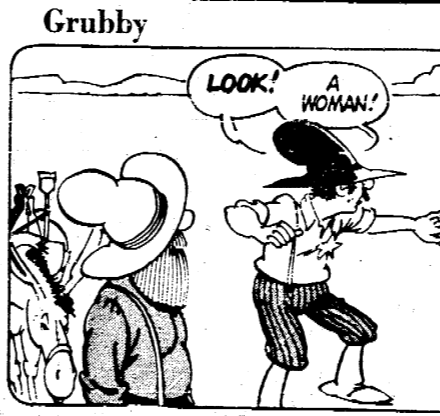
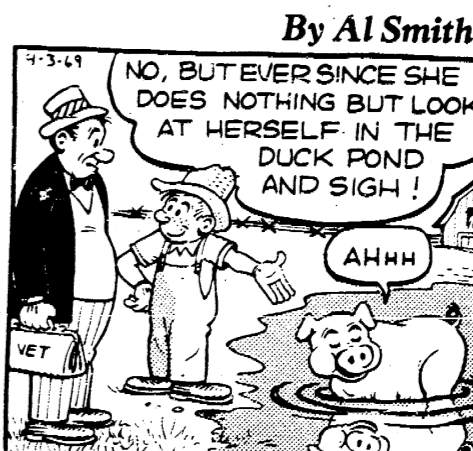
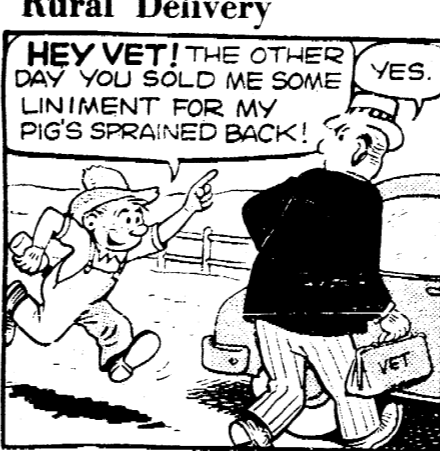
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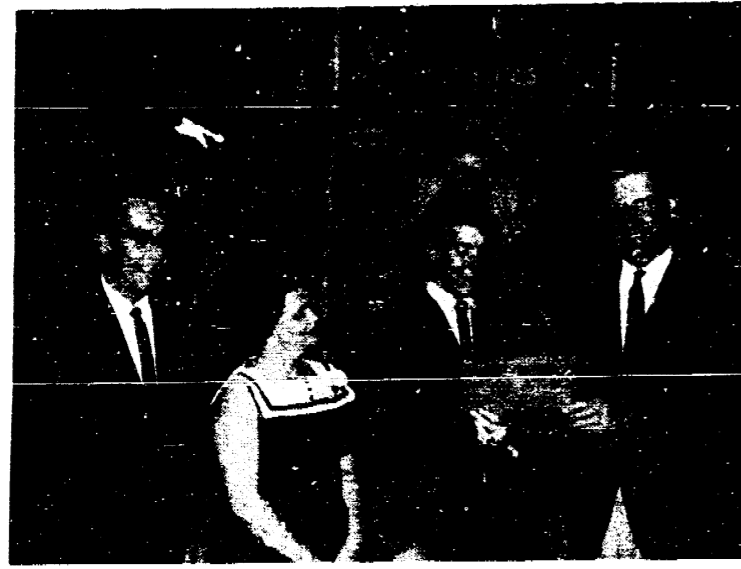


LOOKING AROUND

past three years and has been a team member of our golf team since its existence as a sport three years ago. Tom is on the Trans-Am Auto Racing circuit as part of a pit crew.

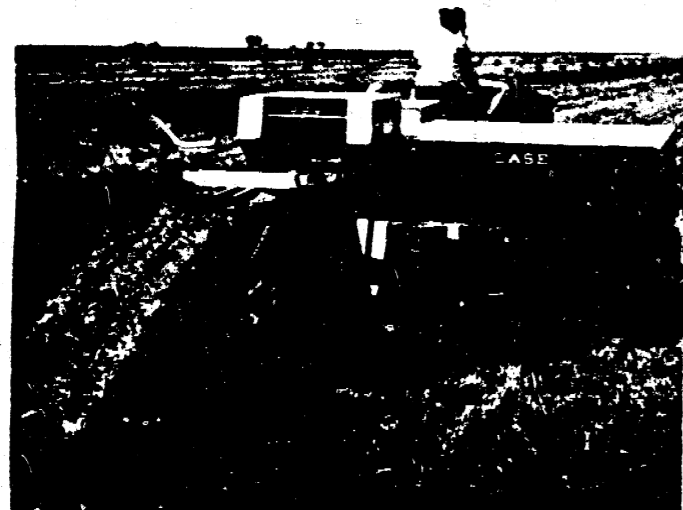
Tom's future plans include going to Northern Michigan University where he will major in business administration. Hopefully he plans on working with his father in developing a transport trucking business.

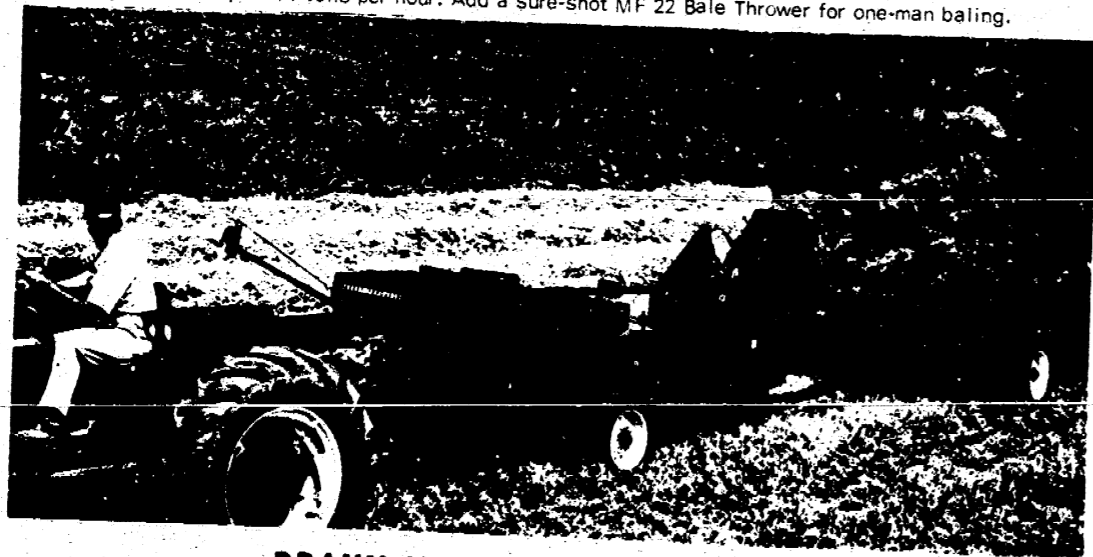

The "Overuse" of Our Recreation Facilities

The Manchester summer recreation program grows more every year. In 1967, \$4,337.33 was spent and this year, approximately \$5,300, may be spent by the Community Chest and the Village Council. The school's contribution during the summer months is the nominal cost for maintenance and the use of the building according to the Superintendent Robert Swartz.

In 1967 and 1968 the Community Chest spent \$3,000 and anticipates spending \$3,400 this year. The council has spent \$800 and \$900 in 1967 and 68 respectively and this year expects to spend over \$1,100. During the summer the Manchester High School spends about \$6,000 for the summer band program and the driver training program which the state aid reimburses 50 per cent.

According to Mr. Cameron, superintendent of Chelsea public schools, the board of education pays for all gas and oil for the buses used in their summer recreational program. They also maintain the school buildings during the summer.

In Clinton, the school partially finances the swimming pool and administers its operation said Mr. Wagner, Clinton public school superintendent. The Clinton Village Council, township board and community chest also co-sponsor the pool.

One reason this year's program budget increased is the addition of a new night program under the directorship of Jim Fielder. The program is for young people age 16 to 21 years. The village decided to have a summer program for this age group after the school-sponsored dances were discontinued. Six summer dances (the first was held last week) and two outdoor movies are planned. The village council decided last Monday, June 16, to back the summer night program for what losses they may incur.

The recreation committee decided to hire a program director because teachers

are not expected to volunteer their time when the school is not in session.

Presently the summer recreation program, headed by Ted Gulliver, includes school age children up through the age of 16. During the day there are two separate playgrounds, junior and senior. The senior has such activities as tennis, badminton, baseball, archery, bike races, soap box derby, field day and a bank sponsored ice cream day. Most of these events occur on the athletic field. The senior group will also go to BobLo this year.

Junior playground includes crafts and field trips and the children use the junior high playground.

In the afternoon two separate groups are taken to Wauplers Lake to swim. Instruction is given to non-swimmers and experienced swimmers arrive later for supervised swimming.

He developed the statewide Michigan Industrial Relations Conference series to its current level of 96 conferences in 16 Michigan industrial areas.

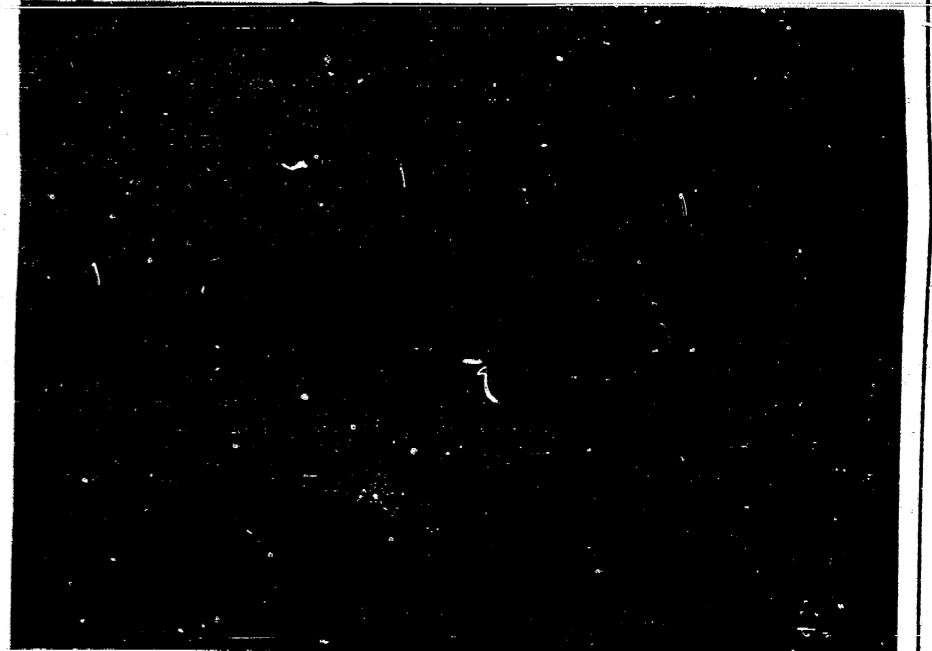

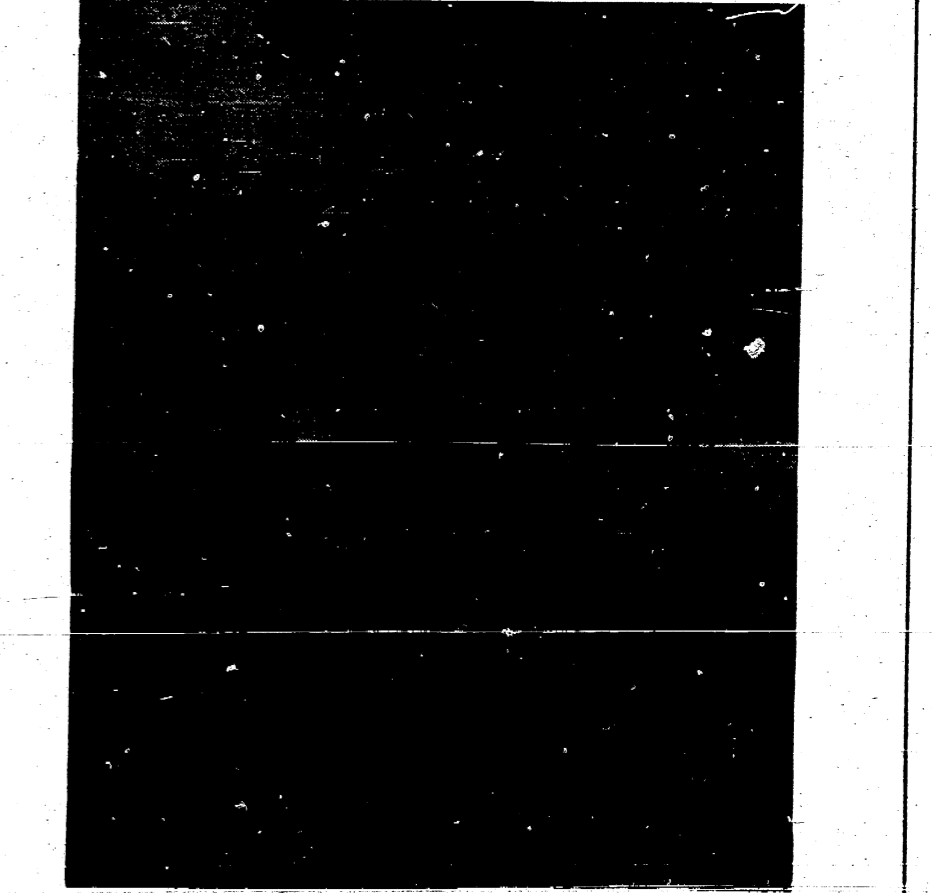
