HOOVER BALL FLAG DEDICATION





Why waste space in the Manchester paper for something happening in Ann Arbor? It all started when I happened to note that two "bloody horror" shows were playing at the time of the latest murder. My curiousity aroused, I went to the Ann Arbor News and checked what shows were playing when the other murders took place. My thought was that maybe here was the

connecting link" sought by the police. My findings aren't positive proof of such a link. Nor am I naive enough to state that they positively caused the death of those six girls. Also I have not personally viewed any of the movies showing at the time of the murders. However, I think the ads plus the X & M ratings are good enough indication that these shows aren't the same as "Cinderalla" or "Old Yellar."

You and I can watch these shows with the perverted, bloody scenes while we calmly munch popcorn and sip soft drinks, but what about the mentally sick person who doesn't have the relative grasp of life to note the difference between acting and real life. How does a man react that has had secret cravings to get a woman alone and torture her; who until he sees a similar scene in living color splashed across the screen in front of him doesn't connect thinking it and actually doing it. Could those sadistic scenes and sick perverted love shows or scenes trigger the man into actually committing the act he had only thought of before?

In a speech entitled "Telling It Like It Is", the Congressman will encourage the graduating students to take an active part n public affairs. We have orderly processes through which to bring about change. The challenge to this generation is whether you will accept the responsibility to bring about orderly reform or whether you will let the environment impose its will on

On Friday, June 6th, Congressman Esch will conduct office hours in the Ann Arbor office, 200 East Huron Street, from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Any persons with problems concerning the federal government or its relations with local issues are encouraged to see the Congressman during this period. "Even if people don't have problems I hope they will take the time to come by and meet their Congressman," Esch said.

the Capitol to Manchester Division, Hoover | tracting firm had maintained an equal-opportunity policy in hiring, and that no Negroes had applied for employment, since very few lived in the area.

It apparently made no difference, as well, that the contractor had searched, insuccessfully, as far away as Flint for some twenty carpenters and brick masons making it very clear that black workers would be welcome.

Nor did the Commission seem concerned by the fact that its activities could have forced the taxpayers to pay over \$100,000 more, had this contractor been denied the right to proceed and the next-lowest bid been accepted.

Fortunately, the Department of Public Health, not the Civil Rights Commission, had the final say in this case. And the local contracting firm will evidently be allowed to go ahead with the project.

Just one week prior to this incident, a highly-similar case was brought to the attention of another colleague of mine, Representative William P. Hampton (R-Bloomfield Hills).

In this instance, a complaint was filed against a firm by a Mr. Thomas J. Peloso-who was not identified in the complaint. The firm was puzzled by the fact that it had no employee of that name. Even more puzzling, Mr. Peloso turned out to be the Director of Compliance of the Civil Rights

Perhaps stranger yet, the only basys of the complaint seemed to be the annual "head count" of minority-race employees all firms engaged in interstate commerce must file with the federal government. (Although the company did employ a substantial number of Negroes, the Commission evidently felt the percentage or "quota" should be higher.) A so-called "investigation" followed, consisting of little more than a review of hiring and examination

Then a conference took place, at which the Commission refused to state what alleged violation had supposedly taken place, refused to show the firm report of the investigation--and would discuss only a formal " conciliation agreement" which had been prepared in advance. Among other things, this agreement required the firm to advertise in the Michigan Chronicle and use the services of six specific employment

In response to Representative Hampton's protest, the Civil Rights Commission has since promised that this highly-questionable practice of forcing firms to do business with certain private, profit-making advertisers and employment agencies would be stopped. But to my mind, other practice, evident in both these cases, raise some very basic and serious questions:

First, does the Commission itself have the right to initiate complaints in cases where no individual citizen has claimed he was discriminated against?

According to the Michigan Constitution it is the Civil Rights Commission's duty "to investigate alleged discrimination against any person because of religion, race, color or national origin in the enjoyment of the civil rights guaranteed by law and by this Constitution, and to secure the equal protection of such civil rights without discrimination." I see nothing in that mandate that could authorize the high-handed type of actions seen lately in cases where no person had alleged he was discriminated

Second, does the Commission have the ight to attempt forcing any type of "quo-" system for hiring minority-group employees upon any employer?

Our law clearly makes it an unfair labor practice to "establish, announce or follow policy of denying or limiting, through a quota system of otherwise, employment or nembership opportunities of any group because of race, color, religion or national origin or ancestry of such group." Hasn't the Civil Rights Commission, in the recent cases I've cited, been violating the very law t is charged with enforcing?

After all, at least one company has protested that, in order to meet a Commission ultimatum that a certain "quota" of black workers be hired, it would have to lay off or fire a number of its present workerssimply for belonging, in this case, to the wrong race. Wouldn't this be a clear violation of the Fair Employment Practices

This entire matter, to my mind, can be summed up by one very simple question: Don't majority-group employees have civil





CHURCH EDITORIAL

LOVE FINDS THE WAY John 14:6

May I chat with you today about some charges or questions being directed at the church of Jesus Christ. And as I do so I express my gratitude to this fine newspaper (and especially to the Lord Jesus Christ my Savior) for freedom. Some complain of too many churches but the fact is that the combined number of all churches, synagagues, and temples is outnumbered by 175,000!

So explain this, ours is the most civilized, most christian nation on earth and yet today 37 million of our own children receive absolutely no religious instruction. Our forefathers by blood, sweat founded our countries constitution on Biblical christian principles, but in doing so extended grace in religious freedom to all with but one essential stipulation, namely "God is and ever will be above all."

Why is it that we hear or read of "so called" leading clergy applauding (favoring) or should I say interpreting the country's Supreme Court ruling on prayer and Bible reading in public schools, as "a criminal act"?

How can that which is of God (holy, good and of love for fellow man) be exalting the modern emancipation of immorality? 





The "Overuse" of Our Recreation Facilities

The Manchester summer recreation program grows more every year. In 1967, \$4,337.33 was spent and this year, approximately \$5,300, may be spent by the Community Chest and the Village Council. The school's contribution during the summer months is the nominal cost for maintenance and the use of the building according to the Superintendent Robert Swartz.

In 1967 and 1968 the Community Chest spent \$3,000 and anticipate spending \$3,400 this year. The council has spent \$800 and \$900 in 1967 and 68 respectively and this year expects to spend over \$1,100. During the summer the Manchester High School spends about \$6,000 for the summer band program and the driver training program which

the state aid reimburses 50 per cent. According to Mr. Cameron, superintendent of Chelsea public schools, the board of education pays for all gas and oil for the busses used in their summer recreational program. They also maintain the school buildings during the summer.

In Clinton, the school partially finances the swimming pool and administrates its operation said Mr. Wagner, Clinton public school superintendent. The Cinton Village Council, township board and community chest also cou sponsor the pool.

One reason this years program budget increased is the addition of a new night program under the directorship of Jim Fielder. The program is for young people age 16 to 21 years. The village decided to have a summer program for this age group after the school-sponsored dances were discontinued. Six summer dances (the first was held last week) and two outdoor movies are planned. The village council decided last Monday, June 16, to back the summer night program for what losses they may incur.

The recreation committee decided to hire a program director because teachers




are not expected to volunteer their time when the school is not in session.

Presently the summer recreation program, headed by Ted Gulliver, includes school age children up through the age of 16. During the day there are two separate playgrounds, junior and senior. The senior has such activities as tennis, badmitton, baseball, archery, bike races, soap box derby, field day and a bank sponsored ice cream day. Most of these events occur on the athletic field. The senior group will also go to BobLo this

Junior playground includes crafts and field trips and the children use the junior high playground.

In the afternoon two separate groups are taken to Waniplers Lake to swim. Instruction is given to non-swimmers and experienced swimmers arrive later for supervised swimming.

He developed the statewide Michigan Industrial Relations Conference series to its current level of 96 conferences in 16 Michigan industrial areas.






