#### AN OPEN LETTER TO PRESIDENT NIXON

Mr. President:

I and many other Americans would have liked very much to have heard you declare very firmly in your Vietnam speech that you were withdrawing all U.S. troops from that country immediately. We understand, as we know you must, the suffering and heartache of many American families who have seen their young men cut down in their prime, and yet so would a loss of our freedom be a terrible thing. To those who ask what our freedom has to do with Vietnam, the answer lies in the Communist aim (and we were glad to hear you call them our enemy). They intend to have a world dominated by the Communist Party. They aren't interested in people's rights but only people's obedience to a philosophy that says a few men know what's best for millions. But thank goodness, our forefathers also made our position very clear. We intend to live as free men. We don't believe that a few men should control the minds of millions. We don't believe men need to be spoon-fed information by their government in order to be happy. We stand on our belief that every man has the intelligence to think for himself, that we can live together as free men with simple laws to guide us, and we believe in the right of the individual over the right of the state. Like many Americans before us these beliefs are very important, important enough to die for.

While we criticize daily, actions by those individuals whom we elected we still know there is no nation as great as ours. Though we get depressed by the news broadcasts, we know that every problem we face can and will be solved by people young and old who care for their country.

Mr. President, we remember you as the man who sought solitude to write his convention speech. We know now the suffering you must bear as the weight of the war rests on your shoulders. We hope you know that the thoughts and prayers of those who expressed their opinion at the polls last November are with you now.

Yes, it would be nice to withdraw from Vietnam, but that relief and joy would be short-lived indeed if the Communists took our withdrawal as an open invitation to take over more small countries. We want you to end this war, but not on the enemy's terms, not on the terms of men who believe a manifesto gives them the right to force others to live in suppression.

There are many problems in our country today, but they are not the fault of our nation's principals, but rather an example of men's frailty in living up to those ideals.

We, the silent majority, laid our future freedom on the line with our voice, our ballot, and we know Mr. Nixon that as our chosen leader you won't let anyone destroy that.

**CHIEF SAYS ANTI-FREEZE BELONGS IN CARS, NOT DRIVERS**

Chief of Police Lawrence G. Becktel worries about Manchester's traffic record like the rest of us worry about next month's Christmas bills.

Recently, Chief Becktel was both concerned and emphatic. He was concerned about the traditional holiday pattern of parties, drinking and winter weather that is already showing signs of pushing the local accident curve upward.

"Research and study information circulated to us from the International Association of Chiefs of Police indicates that alcohol is a factor in as many as half of the traffic accidents," he said. "The Christmas-New Year round of festivities often includes more alcohol than many of us can take."

Chief Becktel was emphatic about the measure his department is taking to hold down holiday traffic problems.

"If you think you can drink freely at parties and then slide behind the wheel of your car hoping you can get away with it this time, remember this fair warning: Our department will be out with all the manpower we can muster to protect you - and others - from your own dangerous thinking.

"We may not win popularity contests with those who can't seem to say 'no thanks' soon enough," the chief concluded, "but we are determined to see that our drinking and driving laws are strictly enforced, and fairly enforced."

**LOCAL YOUTH ATTEND YOUTH FORUM**

More than 125 students from 30 area high schools engaged in lively discussions on national priorities Saturday, Dec. 6 in the Second Bi-Annual Esch Youth Forum. There was general agreement that more intense effort is needed if the United States is to solve the multitude of domestic problems pressing in on everyone.

The conference, held at McKenny Union at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti, was sponsored by Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Michigan) and EMU. Esch urged all senior high schools in his Second Congressional District to send representatives to the meeting. High school newspapers were invited to send members of their editorial staff to cover the event. Attending from Manchester were Scott Brown, Cindy Schiller and Mr. John Korican.

At lunch, the windup event on the program, two students from each of three workshops reported briefly on the discussions that took place. At the workshop on environment it was made clear that the need for more legislation and greater public education remains high. It was suggested that praising organizations which make significant progress in fighting pollution is a desirable step done too infrequently.

In the workshop on education, welfare, and human needs students reviewed the country's inadequate welfare system and President Nixon's comprehensive program. And in the workshop on housing and community developments the students talked at length on the need for low cost housing and the prospects for greater use of factory built housing.

Each, in his second term, emphasized his pride in the students. "Their belief that accomplishments can be made within our social structure is vital. They do believe as I do that they can be effective in government, that they can make useful changes within our system. Despite imperfections," he said, "it is still the best system devised by man."

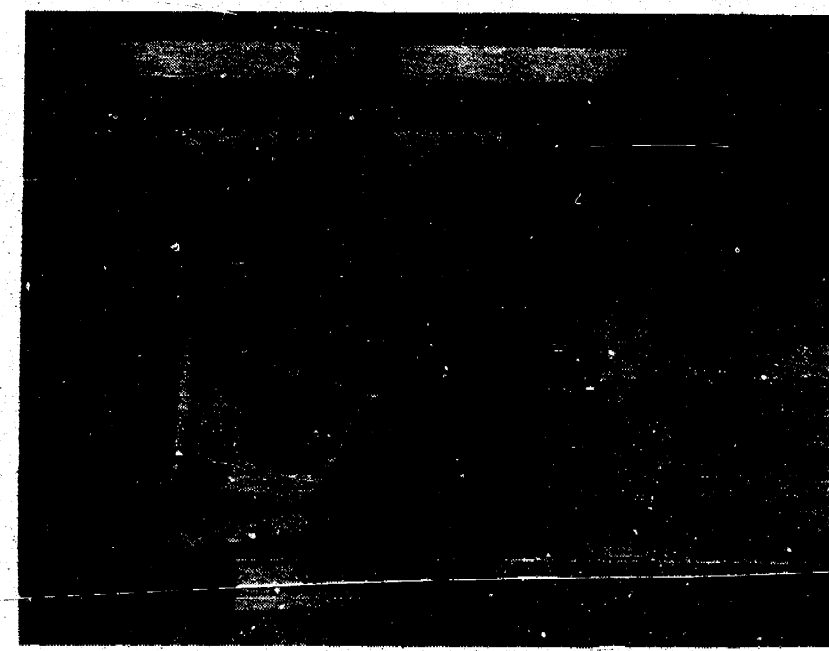
