RECREATION COMMITTEE **MEETING NOTES**

The Manchester Recreation Committee met Monday, Nov. 24 to discuss the scheduling of their winter recreational program. The objective of this program is to provide activities for the areas young people on weekends when events are not going on at the school.

Jim Fielder presented the results of a survey he conducted at the high school as to what kinds of events the students would be interested in. The survey showed that the activities best suited to meet the students' needs were dances, regular and square, open movies, and recreational activities in the gym. It is the concern of the committee to provide events that would be of interest to a majority of the young people, so it was decided to start a program that consisted of these types of events as soon as possible

The committee set Dec. 6 as the kickoff date for this new program with a dance at the high school. It was also announced at the meeting that three local facilities had been made available to put on these events; the high school, the Emanuel Church Hall, and the K of C Hall.

The committee also discussed the idea of creating a youth advisory council that would be a representative of the students to the committee. The function of this council would be to coordinate activities between the adult committee and the local youth. Such a council would give the young people a chance to express their opinion as to what they would like to see

AN OPEN LETTER TO PRESIDENT NIXON

Mr. President:

I and many other Americans would have liked very much to have heard you declare very firmly in your Vietnam speech that you were withdrawing all U.S. troops from that country immediately. We understand, as we know you must, the suffering and heartache of many American families who have seen their young men cut down in their prime, who must face a future without that loved one's thoughts and dreams. War is a terrible thing, and yet so would a loss of our freedom be a terrible thing. To those who ask what our freedom has to do with Vietnam, the answer lies in the Communist aim (and we were glad to hear you call them our enemy). They intend to have a world dominated by the Communist Party. They aren't interested in people's rights but only people's obedience to a philosophy that says a few men know what's best for millions. But thank goodness, our forefathers also made our position very clear. We intend to live as free men. We don't believe that a few men should control the minds of millions. We don't believe men need to be spoon-fed information by their government in order to be happy. We stand on our belief that every man has the intelligence to think for himself, that we can live together as free men with simple laws to guide us, and we believe in the right of the individual over the right of the state. Like many Americans before us these beliefs are very important, important enough to die for.

While we criticize daily, actions by those individuals whom we elected we still know there is no nation as great as ours. Though we get depressed by the news broadcasts, we know that every problem we face can and will be solved by people young and old who care for their country.

Mr. President, we remember you as the man who sought solitude to write his convention speech. We know now the suffering you must bear as the weight of the war rests on your shoulders. We hope you know that the thoughts and prayers of those who expressed their opinion at the polls last November are with you now.

Yes, it would be nice to withdraw from Vietnam, but that relief and joy would be shortlived indeed if the Communists took our withdrawal as an open invitation to take over more small countries. We want you to end this war, but not on the enemy's terms, not on the terms of men who believe a manifesto gives them the right to force others to live in suppression.

There are many problems in our country today, but they are not the fault of our nation's principals, but rather an example of men's frailty in living up to those ideals.

We, the silent majority, laid our future freedom on the line with our voice, our ballot, and we know Mr. Nixon that as our chosen leader you won't let anyone destroy that.



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
