During this one and half hour meeting, the judge reviewed each file folder (which looked like a book) and stated "we don't have any place to put them, as you can see we have tried a number of places and none lasted very long."

Reference the complaints that were taken into the court at this meeting, about the only satisfaction that was gained was that they possibly would be heard by the court somewhat faster than usual. But as Judge O'Brien stated that these juveniles would be called into court and have to be given the opportunity to either admit their guilt or deny it and that a hearing would have to be held on the case. Yet we have these juveniles which are supposed to be under the jurisdiction of the court at this time and when accused of a crime can continue to walk our streets and continue to violate the rights of other people.

Judge O'Brien was advised to the fact that there was talk of other adults within the community taking the law into their own hands if the courts would not do anything with these kids, yet this did not seem to upset him or his staff in the slightest. (Of course, we know that if this was done these people would be locked up right away because they "violated the law.)

The meeting ended with the feeling of no more satisfaction other than that we made the judge aware what was happening and that action by the court may be somewhat speedier, yet we most likely will have to continue to put up with these juveniles until they reach the age where they can be arrested and jailed for their
