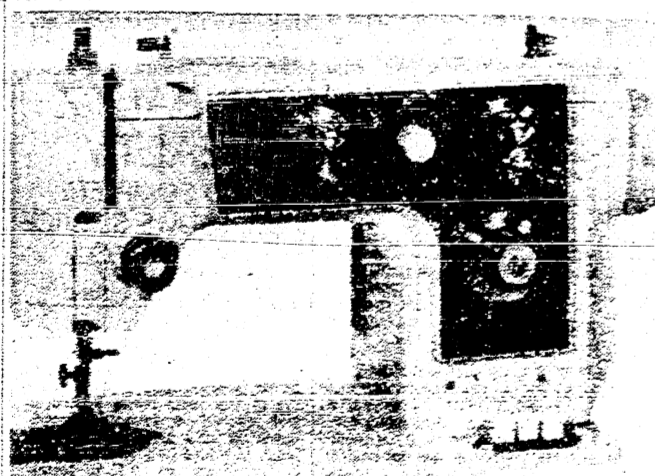

Scully demonstrated samples of portable radios which the Police Department may purchase. Purchase left to discretion of Health & Safety Committee.

Fitzgerald entered the meeting. Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart, to send a petition to the State Legislature, requesting modification of the present District Court set up to benefit the small community. All yeas, carried.

Members of Fargo Engineering from Jackson presented to present a proposal to the Council outlining what services they could provide as the Village Engineering Consultants.

Maynard Blossom was present as the school representative on the recreation committee council. He outlined what the committee has done to date and what is planned for the remainder of the school year. He raised the question as to what direction the recreation program in Manchester should take, especially for other than the summer program.

Mahony presented the proposed budget for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1971.

Walton entered the meeting. Moved by Reinhart, supported by Fitzgerald to adopt this as the proposed 1970 budget. Yeas, Mahony, Scully, Reinhart, Macomber, Fitzgerald, Abstain, Walton.

Macomber reported on a meeting with Willard Mann concerning the water level up stream of the mill pond.

Permits issued: Walt Schaible - siding - Bernice Shadley - siding. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Mahony, to refund \$6.00 to Mrs. Wilbur Shadley for a building permit never used. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald presented a proposal Ordinance to establish a Park and Recreation Fund for the Village of Manchester.

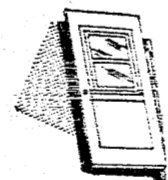
Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully, to adopt this Ordinance. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Walton, to put \$1,000 from a Series H bond and \$37.50 in donations and \$38.80 interest and \$5.00 cash and \$1,000 from the Lawrence Wurster Estate in the Park and Recreation Fund. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart, that Manchester participate in Mayor's Exchange Day. Carried.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to draft a resolution to the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission that the Village Council requests the Commission to complete the four unfinished phases of our program; advise if financial participation is needed and if so, to justify. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart, we adjourn. Carried. Douglas A. Hughes, Village Clerk

### MAN. UNITED METHODIST TO HAVE GUEST SPEAKER

Mr. Thompson and his wife, Zora, began their missionary service in Japan in 1927 in Hiroaki. During the Depression from 1931 to 1938, due to lack of funds to return them to Japan, Mr. Thompson served as pastor in a rural church in New Hampshire. From 1938 to 1941 they were once again in Japan until their work was again interrupted, this time by World War II. The Thompsons returned to this country to work with a Japanese-American community in Seattle. When their congregation was removed by the government to Idaho, they accompanied them to help them re-establish their lives there.

After the war, the Thompsons returned again to Japan where they did work on Okinawa and in Yokosuka. From 1958, Mr. Thompson was also engaged in teaching social work in Tokyo.

In 1967, at the age of sixty-eight, Mr. Thompson, learning of the needs of war-torn Vietnam, went to that country with his wife to work in a refugee colony for the severely handicapped in Saigon.

Mr. Thompson holds a bachelor of arts degree, a bachelor's degree in Sacred Theology, and masters degree in education and social work. He and Mrs. Thompson have one son, Lawrence, who is also a missionary to Japan.

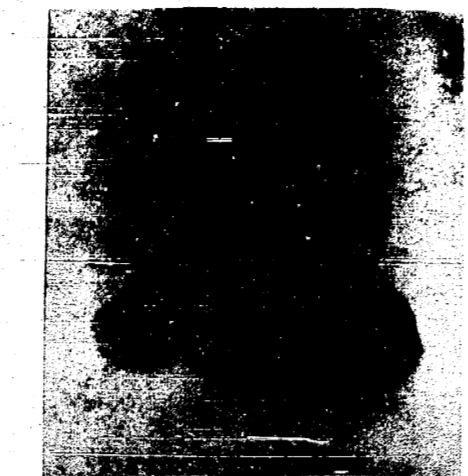

Monday night Council set a new record, for shortness. All business was concluded by 8:30 p.m.

Seems everyone wants it after Don went to the expense and trouble of getting it approved. Council tabled the matter for further study into the rules governing the awarding of the license.

Herb Mahony reported on Don Limpert's water bill. The unpaid balance on the multiple billings now amounts to over \$700.00. If not paid, Council plans to add it to the tax roll.

**"TEMPORARY JOB" LED TO 48 YEARS IN CLOTHING BUSINESS FOR WALT SCHAIBLE**

Fashion it seems is the keynote of the world whether high button shoes and billowing skirts, the flapper of the roaring 20's, the ankle-length street dress or gradual hemline rise to today's mini. The high style of fashion appeared to be caught by the ladies alone. Today, it's a different story.

Although men's styles changed considerably over the years not until the past few years did it change so drastically. Today the young men don plaids, paisleys and psychedelic prints as never before. Mod fashions have brought a greater variety of style and color in everything from formal to beach wear. Walt Schaible of Schaible's Mens Wear said, "There's always been a continual change in men's styles. It's just that today their styles are going "way out." True they are similar to those of the 20's and 30's but are actually quite different and it wouldn't do much good to dig in the attic for dad's old suits and ties because they would be as outdated as the old wide-brim hat and long top coat." Schaible has seen the changes in men's fashions for many years and contends they've been as changeable as the ladies' although until now maybe not as noticeable a change.

In the clothing business since 1922, Mr. Schaible began his future career on a temporary basis. "I thought I'd stay six months when I hired in at Wuerthner Brothers Clothing Store but here I am 48 years later in the same business and the same building."

The building housing Schaible's Mens Wear was built in 1880 by John Wuerthner who owned a saloon next door. He leased the building and for several years it was the Robinson & Koebe Clothing Store. In 1891 Wuerthner decided to use the store himself and opened the Wuerthner Clothing Store. Then in September, 1922 Walter Schaible accepted a temporary job that led to his buying an interest in the store in 1927 and the complete business in 1941. "And we worked long hours in

those days," he continued. "We opened early and stayed open until 11 p.m. on Wednesday and Saturday nights. My starting pay was \$12.00 a week."

When Schaible bought out the Wuerthner Brothers in 1941 he kept the business under their name. "In those days we were rationed the number of pants, shoes, etc. that we could get. The quota for a new business was really limited so with Gus and Carl's permission I continued under their name for several years."

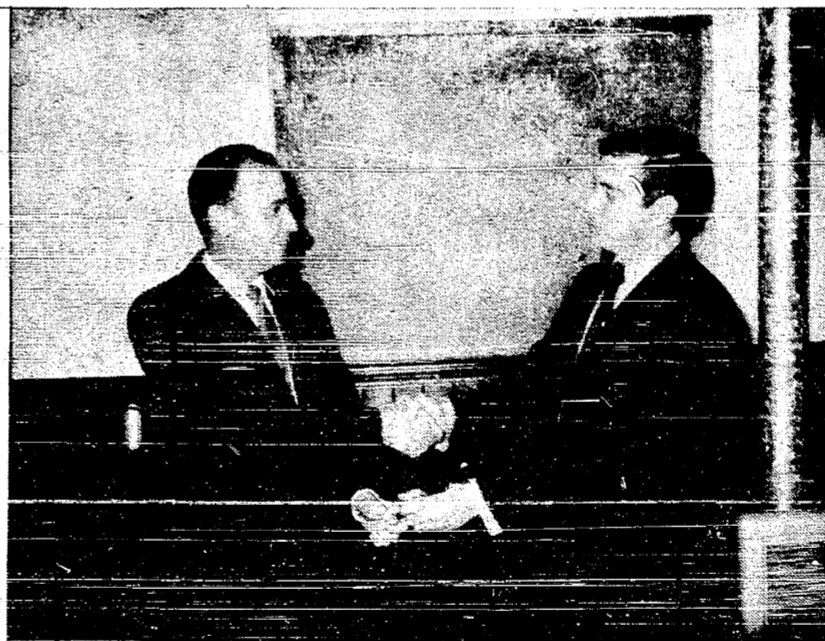
Today Schaible's Mens Wear carries the same complete line of men's clothing as it did many years ago. The styles have changed but the service remains the same. With a complete line of clothes from work clothes to formal wear, boots and shoes, Schaible's Mens Wear draws customers from several surrounding towns including fashion conscious Ann Arbor. "But I couldn't have made this business without my wife, Vera," Mr. Schaible said.

In addition to the Schaibles at present Mrs. Lyle Widmayer, John Pratt and David Westphal are employed at the store as have many high school students and area residents been employed throughout the past years.

A life-long resident of Manchester, Mr. Schaible and his wife have a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Fasoli of Cranbrook Village, Southfield and three grandchildren.
